#### Changes at this year's Gallatin County Fair

Socrates said, "The secret of change is to focus all of your energy, not on fighting the old, but on building the new." Management with the Gallatin County Fair is focusing on building the new this summer with night shows, an expanded carnival, a new fair entrance and most notable, free grounds entertainment with fair admission.

"We took a long, hard look at the balance sheet for the Gallatin County Fair," said General Manager Lori Cox, who took over the fairgrounds leadership role in January. "It was obvious we had room for a change in the way we conduct business. As we looked deeper, I knew we were not offering families the best entertainment deal their dollar could handle."

Cox and her team eliminated all ticketing fees for grounds entertainment inside the fair gates, such as motor sports or pig wrestling admissions. "The price of adult admission is \$8," said Cox. "A person can go to the motocross in the afternoon, the night show in the evening, and visit vendors in between for eight bucks. It simply doesn't get any cheaper than that."

Entertainment has doubled in offerings this year. On Thursday,

July 16th, Gallatin County Fair welcomes the **Van Halen Experience: Hot For Teacher**, the top Van Halen tribute band in the country. Arriving from Los Angeles, the group's performances are so tight that most fans cannot tell the difference between a Van Halen riff and a Hot For Teacher riff. Eagle Radio is the presenting spon-

On Friday, July 17th, country music superstar Terri Clark will perform, sponsored by XL Country. Clark has sold more than five million albums with six number-one hits such as "Better Things To Do" and "Poor Poor Pitiful Me". She is an eight-time CCMA Entertainer of the Year and has taken home CCMA Female Vocalist of the Year. She is the only Canadian artist to be a member of the Grand Ole Opry. Both Hot For Teacher and Terri Clark perform in the

In addition to the night shows, Gallatin County Fair is bringing in four days of motor sports. With support from Mountaineers 4X4 Club,

Anderson Arena.

Bozeman Jaycees and Big Sky Motocross, the Fair will feature a truck pull Thursday, a motocross Friday, a mud bog Saturday and a demolition derby on Sunday. "Motor sports is growing in the valley with a wide variety of interests," said Dennis Voeller, operations manager for the Fairgrounds. "The Mountaineers were excited to be a part of what is changing here, and

they led the pace with our other groups to bring new and exciting motorized entertainment to the fair." Motor sports action takes place in the motor sports area, just north of the newly placed carnival.

Voeller went on to note that with the building of the new ice rink, Northstar Carnival will move to the north side of the two ice rinks. "The carnival will expand its footprint by 20 percent which will give them the opportunity to bring new and more thrilling rides," he said. While only

part of the carnival will be located on grass this year, the Fairgrounds will plant the entire area this fall. "What a difference a lawn-like experience will make for our fair," said Voeller.

With the carnival movement, Cox said a domino effect happened. "We knew we needed to adjust our programming," she said. "Then we sank our teeth into the carnival change—and realized that

between that and the new Oak Street entrance, we had an opportunity at hand." Guests arriving to the Fair this summer can now enter the grounds from the north off of Oak Street, with the approach just shy of the baseball stadium. A new 360stall parking lot is being installed and the new interior road will connect with the traditional south parking lot where guests would normally park. "As a result, we will offer new guest box offices sponsored by Stahly Engineering – one just to the south of the Gun Range and the second entrance to the west of the new north parking lot." Guests can pay at these gates with cash or credit card only. An express line for those who purchase their admissions early online will be available.

The Gallatin County Fair runs Monday, July 13th through Sunday, July 19th. Monday and Tuesday feature the Gallatin County 4-H Horse Show and gate admission is free. Wednesday, July 15th, Northstar Carnival, vendors and gate admission begin. Admission is \$8 for adults 13 years and over and \$5 for youth 6-12 years; kids five and under are free; seniors are \$6.

#### Pirate Hunters review

LEGENDARY PIRATE SHIP

ROBERT KURSON

"Pirate Hunters: Treasure, Obsession, and the Search for a Legendary Pirate Ship" by Robert Kurson c.2015, Random House \$28.00 / \$34.00 Canada 304 pages

The hole you dug as a kid would never reach

China. That didn't matter to you, though; China wasn't your goal - treasure was. Alas, your map was incorrect and you never found riches, but that never stopped you from looking. So now read the new book "Pirate Hunters" by Robert Kurson, and dip your digits near doubloons instead.

As experienced divers and successful treasure hunters, John Chatterton and John Mattera never let loose of a good story. Stories sometimes yield truth, and they weren't about to dismiss the legend of Joseph Bannister.

Hailed as a leader, Bannister

was known and respected as a

trustworthy seaman who knew how to safely transport cargo, England to Jamaica. He'd worked his way up, cabin to Captain and by 1680, he was well-paid, his future secure. But in June of 1684, something happened that can only be guessed. On-course from London to the Caribbean with a full load, Bannister's ship disappeared. British vessels tried unsuccessfully to find him until they realized, to their shock, that Bannister had stolen his ship, its cargo, and most of its crew - and he'd gladly do the same to others. Yes, Bannister had become a real-life pirate, and he knew enough about shipping corridors to confound merchants and authorities alike.

Outraged and embarrassed, the R

Brits vowed to capture him, but the pirate continued to taunt. They caught him once and jailed him, but he escaped aboard his ship, snuck past fortified British cannons and continued his marauding ways, inflaming the British even more. Bannister managed to elude

authorities until

Chatterton and Mattera read everything they could about Bannister and were aware of reports claiming that his ship was sunk in twentyfour feet of water, just off the coast of Santo Domingo. Finding it was an irresistible goal but searching was expensive, though the

man who owned the diving rights in the area where The Golden Fleece supposedly sunk had offered them 20 percent of the ship, found and recovered.

First, though, they had to find the essence of a pirate, and quickly. Everyone, including the Dominican government, wanted a piece of this action.

As I was sitting in a modern airport, reading about a seventeenth-century buccaneer, it occurred to me that I had an interesting juxtaposition going. It also occurred to me that I'd chosen a stellar book to take on my trip.

With high-seas history, a sense of intrigue, and the tales of two divers who possessed dogged determination, "Pirate Hunters" will speak to the part of you that craves a seize-life adventure and a little bit of danger. Bannister's swashbuckling story is better than anything you'll find in the movies because it's true, and author Robert Kurson seduces his read-

ers with an edge-of-your-seat telling. Just be prepared for an ending you'll never predict. Arrrgh!

Who hasn't dreamed of finding buried loot or undersea riches?

You know you have, which is why you'll love this phenomenal book. For you, and the child inside who never stopped looking, "Pirate Hunters" is treasure enough.



#### **SLAM** gears up for fifth annual Summer arts festival

SLAM (Support Local Artists & Musicians) began five years ago with a group of community members who saw that Bozeman was rapidly

outgrowing the number of opportunities available for artists and musicians. In response, they created an organization geared specifically to showcase local talent. At the Summer

SLAM Festival, artists from across the great state of Montana have the opportunity to connect with their community. Highlighting not just the visual arts,

but culinary art, performances, and music, this two-day event is a celebration of the artistic talent in Montana. The SLAM Festival is free

and open to the public. This summer, the SLAM Festival celebrates its fifth year and anticipates seeing 10,000 or more in attendance. In 2015, the SLAM Festival will feature some new interactive art projects for attendees of all ages. Spanning the entire park, SLAM has a variety of activities for people of all ages. The youth showcase kicks off each day on the bandshell, featuring the up-and-coming talent in the community, moving into more established acts as the weekend progresses, featuring all different types of genres on the stage.

SLAM is a three-pronged organization that not only organizes events that showcase Montana talent, but also provides grants and scholarships for the pursuit of education in the arts, and spearheads community art installations.

Each year, SLAM has funded a Worthy Student Scholarship at Bozeman High, and this year established the first Visual Arts Scholarship at the high school for seniors moving into college and going into education in the arts. SLAM scholarship applications

are available on their website and are open to all residents of the state wishing to pursue education in the arts.

To date, SLAM has completed two functional community art installations. Both are sculptural drinking fountains that adorn Bozeman city parks (Beall and Bogert). Their next upcoming installation will be functional bike racks in some of the parks that are severely lacking bicycle parking. Eventually, they hope to create a brick and mortar space to host regular events, workshops, and concerts.

The 2015 Summer SLAM Festival is scheduled for Saturday, and Sunday, August 8th and 9th. Saturday hours will be 10 am to 7 pm and Sunday hours will be 10 am to 5 pm. 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
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#### 28th annual Livingston Depot Festival

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

#### Visit MOR's Living History Farm

The Living History Farm at Museum of the Rockies is now open. Be sure to visit for a unique experience this summer.

The Living History Farm is free and open to the public daily from 10 am to 5 pm; normal admission fees to the main Museum still

The historically accurate, working 1890s Montana homestead treated visitors to the sights, smells and activities of Montana's long-ago homesteading era. The Farm's costumed interpreters provided historical understanding of the period as they spoke with visitors, cooked on the wood-fired stove, worked on the loom, forged iron in the blacksmith's shop and started the spring planting of the Heirloom gardens.

The Tinsley House, centerpiece of the Living History Farm, is the original home of the Tinsley family. Built in 1890 in Willow Creek, Mont., it was moved to the Museum's grounds in 1986. Visitor programming includes daily cooking lessons in the Tinsley home's kitchen, and morning and afternoon hands-on participation in children's games, farm activities and tending the gardens.

MOR is also bringing back its adultfocused monthly event, Hops & History, to the Living History Farm. Now in its second

year, Hops & History takes place the last Tuesday of every month from 5:30 to 7:30 pm, with the next events coming up on Tuesday, June 29th and Tuesday, July 28th. The event pairs the diverse history of brewing in the Gallatin Valley with beer tastings from different local breweries. Admission to Hops & History is \$8 and includes a free beer glass and beer tastings. The event is sponsored by Montana Ale Works Community Partnership. Guests must be 21 or older to participate. Admittance is limited and is on a first-come,

As part of the Living History Farm's learning outreach, MOR will also offer an urban homesteading class with instructor Toby Day, MSU Extension Horticulture Specialist. The class, titled Heritage Apple Trees, teaches how pruning and proper care can increase the productivity of apple trees, as well as explores what heritage orchards, with trees over 100 years old, can teach us about growing fruit today. Pre-registration is available through the Museum's website.

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#### Renowned author to present at MSU's freshmen convocation

Rebecca Skloot, author of the bestselling The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks, and members of the Lacks family will speak at Montana State University's 2015 Freshmen Convocation, scheduled at 7:30 pm on Wednesday, August 26th, 2015. The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks is the 2015 MSU freshmen book selection.

Lacks was an African-American tobacco farmer and the mother of five who died from cervical cancer in 1951 when she was 31 years old. Before she died, cells from her cancerous tumor were harvested and cultured at Johns Hopkins University to create the first known human immortal cell line for medical research. The cells harvested from Lacks behaved differently than other cells that scientists had harvested. Instead of dying quickly, they could be kept alive and multiply in a short time. The line was called HeLa, for the first two initials in Lacks' first and last name. HeLa cells have been used in more than 70,000 medical studies covering subjects ranging from lactose digestion to the development of drugs used for herpes, leukemia, influenza, and Parkinson's dis-

Skloot, an award-winning science and medical writer, published the book in 2010. The book remained on the New York Times bestseller list for two years. Members of the Lacks family will join Skloot for a panel discussion following her speech.

"This year's convocation speaker is a master storyteller who will also prompt a lively campus-wide discussion about scientific ethics, cultural diversity, and gender rights," said MSU Provost Martha Potvin. "We welcome the community to join us."

MSU's Freshman Convocation is the formal welcoming of its incoming class where the university focuses attention on academic affairs. It shows the support of the university and community to help the new students reach their goal of becoming the graduating class of 2019. Skloot's lecture will be MSU's ninth freshman convocation.

#### MSU earns recognition for its scientific collaboration and impact

For the second year in a row, Montana State University has received recognition in a respected ranking system for its scientific impact and collaboration.

The university earned a spot on the CWTS Leiden Ranking for 2015, which orders the 750 universities in the world with the largest contributions in international scientific journals. MSU is one of only 158 U.S. universities to be included on the list. It is the only university in Montana to be recognized.

The ranking is based on universities scientific contributions published in scholarly ournals, as well as the impact that those tific findings have on the international community. Impact is measured by the number of times the research is cited in subsequent articles published in scholarly journals.

MSU s overall publication impact rank was 370, while its overall collaborations rank was 442. According to materials published by the Leiden Ranking, MSU had 1,148 published articles appear in the citation database it uses for the three years the ranking covers. In addition, about 10 percent of those articles were classified as high-impact under one of the ranking system s measures.

Renee Reijo Pera, MSU vice president for research and economic development, said that the ranking also confirms that the research matters.

Our faculty and students are tremendous, both in the quality and the quantity of their

work, Reijo Pera said. Research that MSU s faculty members and students produce has a range of applications.

Reijo Pera pointed to several recent research findings as examples, including those that have the potential to help fight flu pandemics, produce biofuel, combat agricultural pests and spur innovative energy research.


She added that MSU faculty and students publish research findings in numerous major scholarly journals, including Cell, Nature, Science, the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences, the Journal of the American Chemical Society, the Journal of Applied Ecology, the American Jo Public Health, and the Journal of Animal

MSU conducts an average of \$100 million

in research annually. MSU is also ranked by the Carnegie Foundation as one of the top 108 universities in the nation with very high research activity, a distinction the university has held since 2006. This top tier classification out of more than 4,600 institutions nationally recognizes the significant opportunities for research, scholar-

ship and creative work at MSU. The Leiden Ranking is based on 2010-2013 data from a leading bibliographic database, the Web of Science, produced by Thomson Reuters. For more information about the Leiden Ranking, including the full list, is available at

#### HRDC joins national movement to end senior hunger

When it comes to eating a healthy diet, millions of Americans 65 and over face a double whammy: their income is fixed, and their

spending on food is consuming a larger portion of their budget. Nationally, adults aged 65+ have an average annual income of \$41,000, and they spend nearly \$5,200—or more than 12%—on food. Their friends just 10 years younger have a greater income (averaging \$63,000 annually), and they spend less (10.6%) on groceries.

HRDC, in partnership with the National Council on Aging (NCOA), has joined a nationwide effort to support these older adults



by helping them access the **Supplemental Nutrition** Assistance Program (SNAP). The U.S. Department of

Agriculture estimates that only 2 out of every 5 seniors who are eligible for SNAP are enrolled in the program. This means that millions of lower income seniors are missing out on this nutritional opportunity of an average of \$113 each month for the purchase of

healthy food. This benefit could put adequate nutrition within reach for many seniors who are struggling to make ends meet.

HRDC is one of more than 30 community organizations around the country that is stepping up its efforts to assist seniors in applying for SNAP. The organizations will use NCOA's free online BenefitsCheckUp tool (www.BenefitsCheckUp.org) to screen older adults with limited income for SNAP eligibility. In 2014, the initiative helped more than 30,000 seniors apply for SNAP through local partners and assisted more than 300,000 access the SNAP application online. "We're excited to be part of this proven effort that has the potential to help tens of thousands of low-income older adults improve their health and financial security," said Margaret Mason, HRDC Senior Programs Director. "HRDC has a strong history of helping seniors in need. We're confident that increasing SNAP enrollment with BenefitsCheckUp and other proven outreach methods will have a profound effect on lives of seniors in Gallatin, Park and Meagher."



A Weed is a Weed

Montana days.

...But not necessarily! Once when my Mother came to visit, she spotted a tall plant with lavender blossoms in my garden, and declared it a weed.

But I planted that on purpose, it s dame s rocket, I explained. I had seen these lovely flowers blooming all around my Aunt Inez s home in the Black Hills of South Dakota. Taken with what I saw as beautiful, she gave me a small plant to take home. Usually plants that grow so profusely are weeds, are they not?

If you really like it, then it s not a weed, Marie Rodale states in her book Organic Gardening. The dame s rocket (aka sweet rocket) clearly would have been a weed in Mother's garden, but not in mine! Other favorite self-seeding flowers in my garden are the forget-me-not, calendula, alyssum, and several poppy varieties. They grow with abandon?right now the forget-menots are putting on quite a show. With their blue, pink and white blossoms, they fill up the spaces between the perennials that will bloom later. In summer and into fall?even after the first frosts?the calendulas continue to show their colors of yellows and oranges. They could, and sometimes do, tend to become weedy: so I thin as necessary.

Definitions of weeds vary: a weed is a plant out of place; a nuisance plant; one that takes over; and so on. But I

like this definition the best; any plant that will survive at least one week without being watered, fertilized, pruned, sprayed, staked, mulched, misted, dusted, or wrapped in burlap, paper or plastic. (Gardening; A Gardener's Dictionary by Beard and McKie.)

A visitor to our farm years ago asked my dad which plants were weeds and how he could tell the difference. Dad just grinned. His blue eyes sparkled as he replied, Pull 'em all, if they come back, they're weeds!

Some plants are invasive and therefore labeled as weeds. Some are noxious, while others are simply obnoxious. Most are pesky and hard to be rid of. Take for instance, the mint plant. This can be a very invasive plant, taking over the surrounding areas with tough roots, crowding out everything in its path. Others include lily of the valley, snow on the mountain, Sweet William, or even the ground cover sedum. We need to be careful

where we plant them in the first place.

Other weeds are edible. Take for instance the dandelion, lamb s quarter, chickweed, purslane or pigweed. Each of these can add interesting touches to salads, or may be cooked. In this case, don t fight 'em, eat 'em!

Weeds like knapweed or leafy spurge are recognized as noxious weeds. These are not just pests?no one likes them?humans and animals can t eat them, and their populations can lead to desert-like conditions. They tend to replace the native plants and grasses and are the cause of range lands and wildlife habitats being destroyed. Control them we must!

Interesting, isn t it, just what we call a weed? For me, I ll cherish those plants that take care of themselves; growing, spreading, reseeding, providing me with color?even the lovely dame's rocket! •



#### REI Stewardship Grants awarded to local nonprofits

Three local nonprofit organizations that care for and increase access to Bozeman's favorite outdoor places are the recipients of 2015 grants from Recreational Equipment, Inc. (REI), a Seattle-based outdoor retailer with stores in Bozeman and Missoula. REI annually donates a portion of the previous year's operating profits to its community partners (grant donations totaled \$4.6 million dollars in 2014). This year's grantees are the Gallatin Valley Land Trust (GVLT), Montana Conservation Corps(MCC), and Friends of Hyalite.

GVLT will use the grant funds to develop new park land

adjacent to Bozeman Pond Park in the fast-growing and densely populated west end of town. Planned work includes 2,500 feet of natural fines trail, a natural playground, benches, and an information kiosk.

The REI grant to MCC will provide much-needed maintenance at the popular M trail. In a coordinated effort between MCC and the U.S. Forest Service, the maintenance projects will include closing and rehabilitating social trails, adding drainage structures, trimming trees and brush, land-scaping the trailhead and parking areas, and developing a

long-term maintenance and safety plan.

Finally, with annual visitation at Hyalite Canyon at approximately half a million people, public demand for information is considerable. The REI grant to Friends of Hyalite will be used to produce a winter recreation map for the benefit of ice climbers, cross-country and backcountry skiers, snowshoers, and hikers. Grant funds will also be used to build kiosks at four primary trailheads to distribute the maps.

Visit the Vet: Make sure your pets are up-to-date on all necessary vaccinations and ask your veterinarian about heartworm prevention. This destructive parasite can easily be stopped with year-round preventatives and yearly tests.

**Sunscreen:** Pets can get sunburned, particularly if they have pink skin and light hair. Talk to your vet about a sunscreen that is safe for pets.

**Heat Stroke:** Heat stroke is life-threatening and can be deadly if not treated immediately. Signs of heat stroke can include inability of your pet to raise its head or stand, a clumsy gait, excessive heavy banty with a limp tongue, reddened whites of the eyes as well as altered mental status. If our pet shows these signs, begin cooling down your pet and contact your vet. Wet your pet down to the skin with cool (not cold) water directly or use wet towels. Take your pet to the vet immediately in a cool vehicle.

**Parked Cars:** Never leave pets in a parked car. Even with the windows rolled down and parked in the shade the temperature in your car can reach dangerous heights within minutes. On an 85-degree day, your car's inside temperature can reach 102 degrees in 10 minutes and 120 degrees in 30 minutes.

**Backyard Parties:** Sugary snacks you serve your friends during backyard parties should not be treats for pets. Remember, any change in diet can give pets severe digestive ailments. Keep alcoholic beverages away from pets and avoid raisins, grapes, onions, chocolate, and

products containing the sweetener xyliton since it can be toxic to animals.

ID Tags and Microchips: Make sure all pets, even



indoor-only cats, are wearing a collar with an ID tag that includes your name and phone number. A microchip is also an excellent idea.

#### Yellowstone seeks public comment

Yellowstone National Park is seeking public comments on a draft Winter Use Adaptive Management Plan as part of an effort to continually improve the management of winter use in the park using the best available science and public input. The draft plan will be available for public review and comment at parkplanning.nps.gov/wuamp until Friday, August 21st, 2015.

The draft plan provides direction for the Winter Use Adaptive Management Program, which has three primary objectives: To evaluate the impacts of oversnow vehicle (OSV) use and help managers implement actions that keep impacts within the range predicted under the SEIS, to gather additional data regarding the comparability of impacts from a group of snowmobiles versus a snowcoach, and to reduce impacts on park resources after implementation of the final rule by gathering additional data regarding the overall social and ecological impacts of winter use and using those data to guide future management decisions.

Additionally, Yellowstone National Park will hold a public meeting on Monday, August 10, 2015 at 10 a.m. at the Visitor Information Center in West Yellowstone, Mont. This meeting will include an update on the development of the draft plan, as well as a discussion of public feedback and prioritizing metrics for monitoring the Park's resources. More details about this meeting will be announced in a future press release and online on the plan's NPS PEPC webpage.

Members of the public may comment on the draft plan by submitting comments through the PEPC webpage, or by mailing or hand-delivering comments to Christina Mills, Office of the Superintendent, Adaptive Management Plan, P.O. Box 168, Yellowstone National Park, Wyoming 82190. The deadline to submit comments is August 21, 2015.

At the conclusion of the public comment period, the NPS will analyze and consider all feedback received for inclusion in the final Adaptive Management Plan, scheduled for release in 2016.

#### Yellowstone sees increased visitation

Visitation to **Yellowstone National Park** for January through May was up more than 24 percent compared to the same time period in 2014. Although some of that increase could be attributed to a new after-hours counter at the West Entrance, a mild winter and early spring also played a role in drawing people to the park. Tourism to the world's first national park typically begins to pick up in May as weather improves and interior roads and visitor facilities open to the public. Yellowstone saw 383,670 recreational visits in May and a total of 515,693 for the first five months of 2015. That compares to 310,039 recreational visits for May 2014 and 415,185 recreational visits for January through May 2014. The nine visitor centers, museums, and contact stations in the park

showed 624,710 visits from March 16-June 13 this year, which is a 22.6 percent increase from 2014 totals.

Visitation statistics are calculated by taking the actual number of wheeled vehicles entering the park gates, and using a person-per-vehicle multiplier to calculate the number of monthly recreational visitors. July is typically the park's peak visitation month, followed in order by August, June, September, and May.



later again-I finally record it and then release it." Blues is driven by its



artistry and the loyalty of its fanbase, making it one of the most celebrated brands in the music industry, past and present. Still, its soul-stirring sounds have not won everyone entirely over. Those who don't call themselves blues fanatics can still appreciate and enjoy its sound, but there is no best way to absorb and experience this variety of instrumental. "I really don't believe you can give advise to people on how to enjoy something," he shares. "Almost every song and every artist we choose to listen to has its base in the blues. Just let the music flow to you and flow through you." Blues is clearly a passion of Charles, but he ascribes his own style to a number of other genres he's enthusiastic about-each having influence on the musical arrangements he creates for his own discography. "I believe I incorporate many genres into my music as I am surely inspired by them all," he says. "The bold spirit of the blues, the live feel of rock, the intricacies of jazz, and the ballad feel of country. I try to take from it all."

Michael Charles celebrated his 30-year anniversary of his personal recording career in 2014, but his musical pilgrimage started over five decades ago, in his birthplace of Melbourne, Australia. While enjoying a successful musical crusade of touring, recording, and numerous television and radio appearances in his homeland, Michael received an invitation from Buddy Guy's management to appear at the infamous Legends in Chicago, Illinois USA. Graciously accepting the honor, Michael Charles traveled the twelve thousand five hundred miles and took the stage with Mr. Buddy Guy. After numerous trips back and forth, Michael Charles made the monumental and life changing decision to make America his home. Charles worked the whole Chicago blues circuit performing with Mr. Buddy

Guy, Phil Guy, James Cotton, Eddy Clearwater, Junior Wells, George Baze, as well as touring with blues legend, Jimmy Dawkins. Through the next twenty some years, Michael Charles enjoyed being featured in numerous television and radio broadcasts and several music magazines, along with gracing countless stages and pages including Chicago Blues Fest, Philadelphia Jazz and Blues Fest, Windy City Live Television, WGN TV, JBTV, The Chicago Tribune, The Chicago Sun Times, and The College Music Journal.

The 2015 RIFF Tour promises a multitude of concerts and publicity appearances as Charles is due to perform a whole new list of cities, festivals, and nightspots-not to mention revisiting some favorite venues from the last seven annual tours. Michael Charles is in the company of some of the most celebrated and respected artists in the blues community and greater music industry. Membership with this exclusive club is no simple feat. Charles attributes his success to "determination, being in the right place at the right time, and the desire of the people to hear your music." Even with so many career successes and as many years behind him, Charles does not see himself slowing down in the foreseeable future. "This is the only life I have ever known so as long as God allows it, I guess my future is pretty much carved out for me."

## The Interview

#### On the road with Holly Williams

Holly Williams' honest, personal lyrics delivered in her beautifully distinct voice are enough to bring listeners to tears. She has released two critically-acclaimed albums, and will begin recording a third this fall. She also happens to be part of one of the most famous families in country music — her father is Hank

Williams, Jr. and her grandfather is Hank Williams, Sr. However, part of the key to Holly Williams' success is that it's never been her mission to live up to her family's legacy. This multi-faceted artist stands out on

Anna Sagatov spoke to Holly Williams about life on the road. plans for her upcoming album, and making music a family affair.

**RZ**: You said you wrote your first song when you were eight, though you didn't start to take music seriously until your late teens! What was it that made you decide to finally pick up the guitar?

**HW**:I think it happened that all the songs I was writing were really personal, and I would just wander around the house with the guitar, playing around a little bit, and then I started writing songs about really personal things and I felt like I just wanted to do something with them. So I started performing at local coffee shops around town, singing here and there, and I fell in love with performing and went with it from there! I didn't pick up the guitar 'til I was about 18. I was just writing lyrics.

**RZ**:What is your song-writing process like? Do you typically start with lyrics and add music later?

**HW**:Usually for me it comes all at once or it doesn't come at all. I've never sat down and thought to myself, "Ok I'm gonna write a song today", it just doesn't happen like that. Some years I might write a hundred songs and some years I might write 12 songs. It's just kinda comes out of the sky. Sometimes I pray for songs! I feel that my best ones and fan favorites have been kind of "ten-minute songs". Grandfather Hank Williams had a quote that says, "If a song can't be written in ten minutes it ain't worth writin'." Obviously some songs take

longer to write, even years, but usually songs just pop into my head out of nowhere. I'll be washing dishes or driving on the highway, doing a kind of mundane activity, and something just comes up out of nowhere.

RZ:That's awesome, I wish I had inspiration like that, I'm a musician myself. Do you ever write on the road or is it usually when you're in a more relaxed state, like you said, doing something mundane?

**HW**:I do on the road sometimes, like if we're all doing a soundcheck beforehand, just

messing around, I'll hear a guitar player play something and I'll stop him and be like, "Stop, what's that!" ya know? We need to record that. I've gotta write that later! Finding little melodies that stand out to me...I'm always open

being on the road, but I'm sure there are challenges as well. So what are the best and worst things about being on the road?

**HW**:The best things for me have always been getting to explore the world in this kind of Jack Kerouac style. It's always been, I'm in Europe on trains, playing the guitar, you get to see the real kind of gritty side of things, and then in the US, I love the feeling of packing up the van at the end of the night and getting on the road and putting on my favorite Tom Waits album and just driving and driving. I love local food experiences, and local chefs and local businesses. I've got a retail business out in Nashville so that's always been a

passion of mine. I just love really getting to know people. My friends who are big musicians and they're on tour buses... they're so indirect with their fans. They go to a parking lot, do a soundcheck, play their show, and then they leave. I get to get the real experience and go whitewater rafting and eat at local restaurants. So I love that part of it, just getting to know a place and the people who live there. I would say the worst thing is

definitely...well on one hand I love

**HW**:Definitely! Stella is sitting sitting here next to me right now. I was pregnant with her while I was on tour and she hangs out all the time so I think she's getting pretty used to it. 
This summer, the 25 year-old rising amer-

#### Path Through Paradise interview with Bike/Walk Montana

Bike/Walk Montana is an organization formed under the idea that Montana was one of the few states devoid of a state-wide advocacy group for bicyclists and walkers. With the belief that there was a void to fill, they assembled a leadership team, and later a board of directors. Their goal is simply to make the state more bike and walk friendly.

One of the current projects they are involved in is a trail from Wilsal to Gardiner. This would largely be constructed on the existing rail bed through paradise valley. When completed, it will provide a safe and inviting option for those wishing to experience this amazing valley on bike or foot. It will be separate from the road, thereby drawing bicyclists off the hazardous shoulder of a busy and high speed corridor. The trail will become an inviting option for the many who wish to experience

Executive Director Melinda Barnes was kind enough to field some questions about this organization and their ongoing work.

EZ:Do you collaborate with GVLT, or any other like-minded organiza-

MB:Our collaboration is primarily providing letters of support or helping to convince elected officials or community members of the importance of places to walk and bike. including trails. In that aspect, we have assisted many trails groups. We collaborated with Wyoming Pathways and the Walk Bike Alliance of Idaho on the Greater Yellowstone Trail as that will be a trail spanning all three states. Through that project, I have helped West Yellowstone advocates build community support for the Montana section of the trail.

**EZ:**On your website, you state the desire to create strategic partnerships. What form have these taken thus far?

MB:We have worked hard on establishing partnerships/relationships with state agencies to improve state level policies and practice impacting people who bike or walk. We have partnered with Adventure Cycling on trying to get the MT rumble strip guidance improved. In the Legislature, we partnered with specific Legislators to pass better laws. Be building partnerships with local organizations throughout the state, we can bring a louder voice to the Legislature and to Congress. **EZ:** This is an ambitious project.

How can people get involved and fund raise?

MB:I would suggest reaching out to Dale Sexton of Timber Trails in Livingston. He is intimately

involved in the project. **EZ:**What is the ultimate vision of the organization?

MB: The ultimate vision of Bike Walk Montana is that biking and walking will be safe and accessible for everyone throughout Montana. **EZ:**Any chance of connecting this trail through the pass over to

MB:I don't believe that is part of the vision of this trail. It will take a number of years just to complete the trail between Wilsall and Gardiner. However, that would be a good project for Park County and Gallatin County to collaborate on. If the interstate is going to be worked on in the future, it is possible to have MDT install a path at the same time if it is advocated for by local con-

EZ:So many roads in MT are twolane, 70mph, no--shoulder bicycle hazards. So much so that I currently bike mostly on trails and some city roadways as I have had too many close calls with distracted drivers. As a driver, I approach bicyclists on the road with severe trepidation, as I know of at least a few stories of bicyclists being struck and even killed. Is this part of the motivation for the Gardiner trail?

MB:I'm sure that is part of the reasoning, but also to take advantage of the current rail bed in creating a premier biking/walking route. We have been working diligently with MDT to establish better practices on wider shoulders and better rumble strip placement on our rural highways. However, not everyone will bike on the highways so to truly get more people biking, it takes separated trails. Trails also improve the economy, health, and environment of the region.

bucking horses were in Livingston and a rodeo had officially come to Park County. The Livingston Roundup really got going in 1925. The roundup was one of eight Class A rodeos in the nation and at the time had a purse of more than \$3,000, or \$41,095.89 in today's dollars. The Livingston Roundup Rodeo continues that tradition with some of the finest rodeo action that the West has to offer, and some of the best rough stock in the country.

In 1929, farsighted Livingston businessmen established the Livingston Roundup Association, declaring that its purpose was "to give shows, rodeos, roundups, to hold riding contests, roping contests, bull-dogging contests, horse races, and to give any and all other amusements in the City of Livingston or other places in the County of Park and any and all money or profit over and above any and all expense

Rodeo, a Professional Rodeo Cowboy Association and Women's Professional Rodeo Association event convenes nightly at 8 pm. Top hands compete in saddle bronc, bareback, team roping, tie down roping, steer wrestling, bull riding, and barrel racing. In 2013, the association ponied up \$84,000 "added money" to attract contestants to Livingston, which will be up for grabs, along with contestant entry fees, for a total purse in excess of \$200,000. Slack is held at 3 pm on Wednesday, July 1st.

The rodeo consists of bareback riding, saddle bronc riding, bull riding, steer wrestling, team roping, tie down roping, and barrel racing. The rough stock is the event in which the rider has to stay on the animal for eight seconds, which can seem like a long time for the rider. The riders have to do this without touching the animal with their free hand; if they
