"Rancho Deluxe" to show at Livingston **Depot Center**

The Livingston Depot Center will present a film event on Thursday, August 20 starting at near dusk (approximately 8:30pm) in its courtyard, with a \$5 admission. Appearing on a very large staged screen, a reminiscences discussion and a few teaser shorts will preface the main attraction, the classic 1975 Livingston-set Western comedy "Rancho Deluxe" starring Jeff Bridges and an appearance by Jimmy Buffett.

The film, which enjoys something of a cult following, celebrates its 40th anniversary in 2015. Based on a script by local writer Tom McGuane, Rancho Deluxe is a comedy western movie filmed primarily in Livingston. It was directed by Frank Perry and released in 1975. Jeff Bridges and Sam Waterston star as two cattle rustlers in then "modern-day Montana" who plague a wealthy ranch owner (Clifton James). The film also stars Slim Pickens, Harry Dean Stanton, Richard Bright, and Elizabeth Ashley. Jimmy Buffett contributed the music and performed in a scene set in a then country-western bar, the Wrangler. Other local locations making an appearance include Chico, the former Dan Bailey's flytying operation, the Livingston railroad shops, Main Street, and additional

surprises.

The event is sponsored by Katabatic Brewing and Funflicks and follows in the tradition of other popular movie showings in the Depot courtyard. The museum's courtyard recreates the fun of a drive-in a more intimate environment without the

cars. As no seating is provided, lawn chairs and blankets are strongly suggested. The film will be prefaced with an introduction to when movies first "came to Livingston" and the sharing of audience recollections of the event from forty years ago, as

well as the Donald Duck dude ranch cartoon classic, "Dude Duck."

Popcorn and beverages will be available including specialty brews from Katabatic, whose property like other area locations made an appearance in the film. This is the final Third Thursday for the 2015 Depot Museum season. Visitors can also enjoy the adjacent Depot Museum's intriguing exhibits-"Rails Across the Rockies," and this year's special exhibit, "Train in Art: Train + Depot = Light, Energy, Motion," a contemporary look at life and activity on the rails. The Depot Museum exhibits are open seven days a week, Monday through



Besides directing the musical blockbuster Young Frankenstein and Ryan Cassavaugh's Jimmy's, I am proud to be a part of the creation of our annual Comedy Revue. This original sketch show parodies our society



Renowned author to present at MSU's freshmen convocation is a master story-

Rebecca Skloot, author of the bestselling The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks, and members of the Lacks family will speak at Montana State University's 2015 Freshmen Convocation, scheduled at 7:30 pm on Wednesday, August 26th,

2015. The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks is the 2015 MSU freshmen book selection.

Lacks was an African-American tobacco farmer and the mother of five who died from cervical cancer in 1951 when she was 31 years old. Before she died, cells from her cancerous tumor were harvested and cultured at Johns Hopkins University to create the first known human immortal cell line for medical research. The cells harvested from Lacks behaved differently than other cells that scientists had harvested. Instead of dying quickly, they could be kept alive and multiply in a short time.

The line was called HeLa, for the first two initials in Lacks' first and last name. HeLa cells have been used in more than 70,000 medical studies covering subjects ranging from lactose digestion to the development of drugs used for herpes, leukemia. influenza, and

Parkinson's disease. Skloot, an award-

winning science and medical writer, published the book in 2010. The book remained on the New York Times bestseller list for two years. Members of the Lacks family will join Skloot for a panel discussion following her speech.

Judge said the School of Art and the School of Film and Photography received accreditation a year ago. Gallatin College's design program received accreditation this spring. Judge said that means that all art and design programs at MSU are NASAD-accredited for the next 10 years. In addition, Judge has completed NASAD's visiting national accreditor's program and has become qualified as a visiting accreditor for NASAD site visits to

other colleges, schools and universities. Additionally, Vaughan said that MSU's School of Art is currently rated as number 93 in fine arts education by U.S. News & World Report.

The MSU School of Art was established in 1893 and its first graduate degree was conferred in 1932. The curriculum is divided into seven areas of study: art history, ceramics, graphic design, jewelry and metalsmithing, painting and drawing, printmaking and sculpture. If it wasn't for domestic violence, Mandy Smith might never have become a flight attendant.

It was a summer night in 1999 when she'd gone out with her then-boyfriend to a concert where he immediately disappeared, presumably to buy drugs. Angry and fed-up, Smith told him she was breaking up with him and, in a rage, he beat her bloody.

Days later, a co-worker offered Smith sympathy and an idea: he'd just been hired as a pilot for Virgin Atlantic, and he knew they were hiring "stewardesses." He urged her to go for it – and why not? She was young, gorgeous, and newly footloose. She applied, passed her tests with flying colors and received her iconic red uniform.

On her first long assignment (to New York City), she knew she'd found her dream job. Shopping was fabulous. Parties there, and in every city where Virgin Atlantic had a hub, were non-stop: fancy food, alcohol, nudity, pranks, and new acquaintances.

Some were acquaintances she slept with, after breaking up with yet another boyfriend.


Though flying to exotic locations was a great perq (getting there really could be half the fun!), there were downfalls to the job. One of those was not seeing the people she loved for weeks on end. Smith indicates that passengers could be a challenge, too, but they were also another source for more parties, more dates, more fun — although even the

best of times can get old after awhile of turbulence, terrorism, and loneliness.

Smith wanted more out of life. She wanted love. And so, after twelve years of being a "trolley dolly," Smith says, "It was time for me to hang up that red skirt and move on."

Oh, I scarcely know where to begin.

Let's start here: I liked this book. I liked it because it was fluffy and rompy, a Britishism-filled, cotton-candy, end-of-summer read.

Columbia University. She also studied at the Los Angeles Museum School, the University of Southern California, the Colorado Springs Fine Arts Center, and the Art Students' League. She left teaching to return to the Johnson home ranch where she continued to paint and to write until her death in May 1992, at the age of 91.

Sadly, that's also a major drawback to "Cabin Fever."

Indeed, there's not a lot of solidity in this book, unless you count the sex: author Mandy Smith (with Nicola Stow) doggedly writes about sex on planes, the beach, pools, in hotels, pages and pages of four-letter-worded explicitness, which gets tiresome and disappointing and may infuriate readers who've fought hard to overcome old Coffee Tea or Me stereotypes. Yes, I believe you could be forgiven for wondering if there's just a little embellishment going on here, and you might roll your eyes. I

know I did.

And yet – I was amused. I didn't expect a lot here, but what I got was okay. And if that's the kind of summer's-almost-over book you need, "Cabin Fever" is what you'll want to see.


miles southeast of Emigrant, Montana. Submitted by Lucky Minerals Inc., the proponent will assess copper, gold, silver and molybdenum potential by drilling up to 30 exploration holes from 12 drill locations. The drill sites are located within four unpatented mining claims on the western flank of Emigrant Peak, (T6S, R8E, Section 36, T7S, R8E, Section 1) and five unpatented claims on the eastern side of Emigrant Creek (T6S, R9E, Sections 5-6). Exploratory drilling would occur in 2016.

"We are extending the comment period to ensure ample opportunity for public input," said Alex Sienkiewicz, Yellowstone District Ranger. "Public comment helps to determine significant issues that may arise, but comments do need to be substantive to the exploration project at hand. Once comments are received, the Forest will analyze feedback from the process and subsequently, this information will help us to determine the level of analysis to be applied to the proposal at hand. We have not yet made this determination.'

Proposed activities would involve conducting core drilling at up to nine sites within the

area. Three of the proposed drill sites located east of Emigrant Creek would be accessed via helicopter. The three helicopter supported sites would occupy drill sites previously used in 1991. To minimize new disturbance, no new road construction is proposed for the project. Once all exploratory drilling is completed, the drill holes would be plugged, the drill pads would be reclaimed, and all incidental disturbances would be restored to a pre-drilling condition.

Summer snow activates winter itch at Big Sky resort




But for those who want to save on fuel but cannot simply go out and purchase the latest hybrid at \$20,000 to \$30,000 or more, what

ASC is calling all hikers & paddlers!

Adventurers and Scientists for Conservation (ASC) is launching a project in the Gallatin Watershed to tackle microplastic pollution, and they need your help. Starting this September, southwest Montana hikers and paddlers will have an opportunity to contribute to a comprehensive study of the Gallatin River and its tributaries.

The Gallatin is home to some of the nation's most pristine landscapes and its best river recreation. The river is a lifeblood for our local communities, but preliminary ASC samples show that it is threatened by microplastic pollution. Microplastics are an emerging problem for waters near and far, and this is an opportunity to join a community leading

worldwide change. The Gallatin Microplastics Initiative is an extension of the ASC Worldwide Microplastics Project, in which microplastic pollution has been found nearly everywhere in the marine environment. This spring

the ASC expanded the research into freshwater ecosystems worldwide, following plastic particles upstream.

The local initiative is a targeted attempt to further understand this issue. To obtain a clear picture of the problem locally, they will begin by sampling four times between September 2015 and June 2016, with continuing efforts in the years to come. Once they've determined what types of plastic are in the Gallatin River and where they're entering, they will work with their partners-among them local NGOs, businesses and government-to stop it. ASC will imple-

ment the data as a direct catalyst

for change, using it to inform

consumers and regulators, and to encourage corporate responsibility. Bozeman, Big Sky and beyond is urged to work together to keep the Gallatin clear! This cannot be done without your help!

Fifth person injured in bison encounter this summer

A 43-year-old woman from Mississippi received minor injuries Tuesday when she turned her back on a bison to get a photo with it near the Fairy Falls trailhead in Yellowstone National Park. This is the fifth person injured after approaching bison this season.

The woman and her daughter were by the trailhead sign when they decided to take a picture with to the bison to take the picture, someone warned that they were too close. They heard the bison's footsteps moving toward them and started to run, but the bison caught the mother on the right side, lifted her up and tossed her with its head. The woman's father covered her with his body to protect her and the bison moved about 3 yards away. The family drove to the Old Faithful Clinic, where the woman



a bison that was approximately 6 yards away from them near the trail. When they turned their backs

was treated and released with minor injuries. "The family said they read the warnings in both the

park literature and the signage, but saw other people close to the bison, so they thought it would be ok," said Colleen Rawlings, Old Faithful District Ranger. "People need to recognize that Yellowstone wildlife is wild, even though they seem docile. This woman was lucky that her injuries were not more severe."

Wildlife should not be approached, regardless of how tame or calm they appear. When an animal is near a trail, boardwalk, parking lot, or in a developed area, visitors must give it a wide berth and not approach it closer than the required minimum distances: 25 yards (23 m) away from all large animals-bison, elk, bighorn sheep, deer, moose, and coyotes and at least 100 yards (91 m) away from bears and wolves. Bison can run three times faster than humans, can sprint, and are unpredictable and dangerous. Visitors are advised to give the animals enough space and alter their plans to avoid interacting with an animal in close proximity.

End of Summer?

The rumor is that Fall will come early this year. However...

There are things we can do right now to get ready for Fall and yes, Winter -much as we'd not like to think about that right now. Most importantly, take time to enjoy these wonderfully warm fall days. Sit out there and soak up all the colors, fragrances, and textures of your beautiful garden. Enjoy the bees and birds who are visiting. Be grateful for such bounty.

At the end of each summer, I like to take note of what plants have done well and what have not. The Zinnias and Calendulas planted along the south of the house did well

they seem to like the hot sun. The Hostas along the north side thrived in heavy shade. I have one Delphinium that bloomed magnificently last year, but not so this summer. Its neighbor, the Phlox, has grown so tall, probably providing too much shade. Perhaps I should move Delphinium to a more open location.

Some Petunias and Snapdragons have been exceptional bloomers and some have not. I purchased them at different places and wonder if that's the reason. Next year I'll keep track of where the plants were bought. Those with a good start early on will naturally do better in the home garden.

Now is the time to divide irises. Digging them carefully, I'll separate the rhizomes, re-planting some to new locations and giving the rest away. Deadheading annuals, especially the Calendulas, Sweet Peas, and Pansies, keeps them blooming longer. And those Calendulas will bloom

way past those first frosts. Leaving

some flower heads — Calendula, Cosmos, Marigold, Bachelor Button, Poppies — to form seed will allow them to volunteer next spring.

Watering less during late summer is a good idea for shrubs and trees. They need time to harden off before the killing frosts arrive. Last year, because of the early hard freeze, my shrub roses were really damaged. Giving them a good soaking of water just before the ground freezes (if you figure that one out, let me know!) helps them winter over. Stop fertilizing — allow plants to slow down their growth rate and toughen up for winter. Vegetables can use all the water they can get — we want them to produce up to the end of the season.

Take a visit to other gardens in your neighborhood. Observe what has done well, and visit with the gardener. Often new ideas are gained about new plants you may want to try. This year, I toured several gardens and was once again amazed at what gardeners can do. Gardening friends would appreciate an invitation to your garden as well. Just look at how much you have to share!

Happy Fall to all! Do the chores that need doing, but do take time to enjoy the fruits of your labor! •



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Yellowstone National Park approves Soda Butte Creek project (rotenone) to Soda Butte Creek

From YELL Public Affairs Yellowstone National Park, in coordination with partner agencies Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks, Wyoming Game & Fish Department, and the US Forest Service, has approved a project to remove nonnative brook trout from Soda Butte Creek and reintroduce Yellowstone cutthroat trout into the stream as part of continued efforts to restore Yellowstone's native fish

population.

The Soda Butte Creek **Native Fish Restoration** Project will help restore an important fishery in upper Soda Butte Creek by protecting native cutthroat trout populations of the entire Lamar River watershed from future invasion by nonnative brook trout. This project is part of Yellowstone's 2010 Native Fish Conservation Plan to conserve native fish from threats of non-native species, disease, and climate. Under this proposal, biologists will remove brook trout by applying an EPA-approved piscicide upstream of Ice Box Canyon. Pursuant to the National

Environmental Policy Act, a draft Categorical Exclusion (CE) for this project was prepared and made available for public review from May 20 to June 19, 2015. The park received a total of 56 pieces of correspondence. In response to public comments concerning potential negative impacts to native Yellowstone cutthroat trout currently living in Soda Butte Creek, both Yellowstone National Park and Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks will use electroshock fishing to remove cutthroat trout prior to the rotenone treatments. The salvaged cutthroat trout will be held within the Soda Butte Creek watershed and returned to the creek in the areas of Cooke City and Silver Gate following the rotenone treatments. Cutthroat trout are the only

trout species native to Yellowstone and were once the dominant fish species within the park prior to

Euroamerican settlement. Native cutthroat trout are thought to be among the most ecologically important fish of the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem and are highly regarded by anglers. Genetically pure Yellowstone cutthroat trout populations have declined throughout their natural range in the Intermountain West, succumbing to competition with and predation by nonnative fish species, a loss of genetic integrity through hybridization, habitat degradation and predation.

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Exoplanets 20/20: Looking Back to the Future


Geoff Marcy remembers the hair standing up on the back of his neck. Paul Butler remembers being dead tired. The two men had just made history: the first confirmation of a planet orbiting another star.

The groundbreaking discovery had been announced less than a week earlier by the European team of Michel Mayor and Didier Queloz. But the news was met with some initial skepticism in the astronomical community. By a stroke of good luck, Marcy and Butler happened to have previously scheduled observation time on a 120-inch telescope at the Lick Observatory, atop California's Mount

The scientists, who would become two of the world's most famous planet hunters, remember driving down the mountainside together in October 1995. They'd spent four straight nights making their observations. And while further processing would be needed to make the scientific case, their data seemed clear and unmistakable -- and almost impossible. A huge planet, at least half the size of Jupiter, was not only orbiting its host star more tightly than Mercury hugs the sun. It was racing around that star, making a complete orbit in just four days.

The planet, called 51 Pegasi b, would open a new era in humanity's exploration of our galactic neighborhood. It would be the first in a series of "hot Jupiters" -- giant planets in

fast, tight orbits -- discovered in rapid succession. The rush of new worlds would propel Marcy, Butler and their research team into the media spotlight, and forever change our view

of the cosmos.

'A spine-tingling experience' But for the moment, on that solemn drive down the mountainside, Marcy and Butler were alone with their world-altering news. "We knew we were the only people on the planet to be sure that 51 Peg, the planet, really

did exist," Marcy said recently. "It was exhilarating. We were absolutely thrilled to know an historic moment in science history was happening before our eyes. It was a truly spine-

tingling experi-

Still, the astronomical pioneers had a few struggles ahead to gain the acceptance of the scientific community. The hunt for extrasolar planets -- exoplanets, for short -had a poor track record, with decades' worth of false detections. Among them was the thrilling discovery of a planet orbiting Barnard's star in the 1960s;

it turned out to be an unnoticed shift of a telescope lens. Once the shift was accounted for, the "planet" disappeared.

The early '90s had seen the actual detection of "pulsar planets," but these seemed too strange to count, orbiting a rapidly spinning, radiation-spewing stellar remnant called a pulsar. Most scientists would reserve the "first" designation for a planet orbiting a normal star.

"The whole field had a snake-oil sort of feel to it," Butler said in a recent interview. "For the previous fifty years or so, there were many announcements, all proved to be wrong. If we went to a meeting and said we were looking for extrasolar planets, we might as well have said we were looking for little green

Even Marcy greeted the announcement of 51 Peg, made at a scientific conference in Florence, Italy, by Mayor and Queloz, with a bit of a yawn -- at first.

"This claim on October 6, 1995, of the first planet ever discovered was sort of business as usual," he said. "Here's another false claim. This one is more obviously a false claim. The orbital period is claimed to be 4.3 days. Nobody in their right mind thought planets could orbit so close to a star."

But the four nights of observations at the Lick Observatory -- perfectly coinciding with 51 Peg's four-day orbit -- changed all that. Both the Mayor and Marcy teams had been trying to develop a planet-hunting technique based on wobbling stars. The wobbles, known as the star's "radial velocity," were induced by the gravitational tugs of orbiting planets. The starlight wavelength was compressed, then stretched, as the star moved toward and away from astronomers' telescopes. •

MSU's center for biofilm engineering celebrating 25 years

This week, Montana State University's Center for Biofilm **Engineering** is marking its 25th anniversary at its semiannual conference with representatives from 35 companies and eight universities-including collaborators from England, Belgium, the

Netherlands, China and Taiwan.

The CBE story is one of tenacious efforts-to get a center funded, to keep it from fading prematurely, and to fulfill or even exceed its original research mandate. Under its founder Bill Characklis, it began with a vision that the transfer of university research transferred into the commercial sector could benefit society and buoy the pursuit of fundamental science and engineering. Biofilms are known to cost a wide rage of industries and health care billions annually, yet the phenomenon has been poorly understood. Over the past 25 years, the center has led the way in bringing this little-understood microbial phenomenon into focus. Biofilms include everything from tooth plaque, to the slime coating the inside of pipes in municipal water systems, to gunk that fouls oil pipelines. Free floating bacteria that can be easily controlled with cleansers and medicine become intractable when they latch onto a surface and bond together with a shared connective lattice becoming a biofilm.

"When Bill Characklis won funding to start an Engineering Research Center at MSU, there was little research being done on biofilms outside of his own work," said Phil Stewart, CBE director. "He had worked for a decade assembling an interdisciplinary team that could change that and, in the process, bring a major National Science Foundation award to a lightly populated and relatively remote state like Montana." The \$7.5 million NSF award Characklis helped land in 1990 was one of the biggest MSU had earned to that point. However, Characklis died just two years after the initial grant and the federal funding was suddenly in doubt. "The NSF told MSU it had a year to wind things down and then they

intended to pull the plug, because they viewed the loss of our visionary founder as insurmountable,' Stewart said. Al Cunningham, now

a retired professor of civil engineering who was one of the earliest faculty members affiliated with the CBE, said keeping the center became a top priority of then-MSU president Michael Malone. Malone and Robert Swenson, MSU's vice president of research, where able to convince the NSF to give the center a chance to replace Characklis.

The center's future, once in doubt, turned out to be a bright one. The NSF grant ran its full 10-year, \$40 million course. Lynn Preston, one of the chief archi-

tects behind the NSF's Engineering Research Centers program, said the CBE has proved its worth, pointing

to the CBE's groundbreaking research into how biofilms colonize to share nutrients and are linked to illnesses like cystic fibrosis and medical device infections. "It was clear from these guys had this great passion for

their mission,

and there was no doubt about their commitment to working with industry partners," Preston said. "And, despite Montana being difficult to

get to, industry loved being a part of CBE because it basically nurtured a whole new field. Without question, we (the NSF) certainly got our money's worth." The industrial associates program now lists more than 30 companies, including giants like BP, Dow Chemical Company, Procter & Gamble and W.L. Gore &

Whether in technology transfer, collaborative efforts with industry or research sponsored by government agencies, the core of the CBE's work is the recognition that biofilms cost industry billions of dollars annually in maintenance, repair and ency; the fact that biofilm are at the root of many medical device infections, costing billions in increased costs for medical care and leading to the deaths of numerous

patients; and, on the plus side, a new understanding of the benefits from microbial biofilms, including environmental bioremediation,

water treatment and human health. In 2014 alone, the center had 73 research and testing projects underway for industrial sponsors and four new faculty members were hired. The National Institutes of Health awarded CBE principal investigators \$3.8 million in new funding. Student participation at the center reached a record high with 55 graduate and 55 undergraduate students.

In recent years, the CBE has taken a leadership role in facilitating dialogue with both the **Environmental Protection**

Agency and the Food and Drug and Administration about pathways for addressing biofilm as a public health issue. Pradeep Singh, a professor of medicine and microbiology at the University of Washington, who spent six weeks training at the CBE, said the CBE is a world-class research center, both in fundamental science and in preparing and turning out future researchers. "My short time with the CBE has had a tremendous effect on my career," Singh said. "The remarkable people there see it as their mission to help other people get started and to give them the technology and expertise them into applications. It's a national scientific treasure and I hope it continues for another 25 years and

Trevor Powers, the Idaho musician known as Youth Lagoon, has found what used to be destructive is now what gives him life. "I've never felt truly comfortable. It's this feeling of uneasiness that follows me everywhere I go because my thoughts never shut up," says Powers. "It used to exhaust me, but I've learned discomfort is invaluable. Safety makes us numb. It's when we find ourselves in territories we're unfamiliar with that we can really grow."

While on tour throughout

Europe, Powers received a phone call from home informing him that one of his closest friends had drowned in the local river. After canceling the tour and flying home for the funeral, the following months marked a defining shift in Powers' approach to songwriting. "Just how entwined we are never truly hit me before that," claims Powers. "We are all connected. Even strangers. Our existence is one dazzling pattern that repeats itself endlessly. What makes us distinct is our flaws. In our defects lies something great."

Youth Lagoon's third album Savage Hills Ballroom is rooted in discomfort, rather than avoiding it. Influenced by society's desire to exude a flawless existence, the album's musical direction and visual aspects were conceived on Powers' late-night walks through Idaho's suburbs. "There's these rows and rows of seemingly ideal houses, but there's this emptiness to it all. Usually the better someone's life seems from the outside, the more they're hiding," states Powers. "I've had a lot of barriers for a long time that I haven't let people past, and I've gotten really sick of playing pretend."

Shortly after meeting co-producer/engineer Ali Chant (PJ Harvey, Gravenhurst), Powers relocated to

Bristol, UK for 2 months to record Savage Hills Ballroom at Toybox Studios -- an underground recording space in a vaulted Georgian basement. With clear, pleasantly immediate produc-

tion from longtime collaborator Gregg Williams (Blitzen Trapper, Dandy Warhols), Jerry Joseph draws out hidden gems from his writing for Stockholm Syndrome, The Denmark Veseys and earlier overlooked solo releases to explore the soul floating inside his work. It's an intimate, passionately delivered, patiently rendered portrait of a serious songsmith laid bare akin to Chris Whitley's "Weeds," Joni Mitchell's "Blue," Michael Hedges' "Watching My Life Go

songwriting presented in a super intimate, completely unaffected way. We tried for perfect takes early on and figured out quickly that we just needed to let the tape roll and let each performance be as honest as possible."

"They're not my children, but I feel like I owe it to the songs to explore possibilities and reflect on them in a different light," says Joseph. "With this record we wanted to leave every verse in, let the songs breathe a bit like early Dylan albums-clean, recorded with really good mics, versions that mean something."

Joseph first came to prominence in the mid-1980s with still-beloved cult band Little Women, a reggae-rock proto-jam band that dominated the Rocky Mountain club scene for nearly a decade, and notably helped break jam giants Widespread Panic, who looked up to Joseph and opened for his band before rising to prominence. To this day, many of Panic's favorite concert staples were written by Jerry Joseph, including such blazing epics as "North," "Chainsaw City" and "Climb to Safety." Today, Joseph neatly describes Little Women as "a mash-up of Burning Spear and the Grateful Dead dressed up like the New York Dolls."

Anyone who loves a great beer has some idea what these words mean, and you certainly don't have to pass a vocabulary test to

Rocky Mountain Pearls secure spot in local music scene

Local country crooner and lead vocalist/guitar player Lindsay "Pearl" Yenter of the **Rocky**

Mountain Pearls and upright bassist Jason "Crawdad" Uhlman sat down with the Rolling Zone to talk music following their August 6th show at the Eagles in downtown Bozeman. The Rocky Mountain Pearls are a fun, crowd-pleasing country group from right here in Bozeman. They enjoy playing for their energetic following and everybody else, throughout the bar scene and private events. They thrive off audience response to their powerful harmonies and music that makes everyone want to get up and dance. RZ: How was your guys' night?

RZ: How was your guys' night?

LP: It was a lot of fun. I thought we had a good crowd, most definitely.

RZ: Tell me about your featured artist tonight, the old feller that was playing.

LP: Oh, Strick Strickland. So, Strick finds us whenever we're close to Bozeman and he always asks very politely if he can just join our group for a few songs. It's just the most amazing thing I've ever seen actually, because I think he's like 83 years old and when he steps onto that stage and in those lights and plays that guitar he looks like he's 25 again. It's absolutely amazing. That's what it's all about to me-he sells the passion. That's how I want to be when I'm 83 years old. I love music, it's my passion right now, and I hope to be the same way when I'm older.

RZ: I noticed you did a lot of crossgenre stuff, with him substituting for a minute, then you came back on and did some country and then some alternative rock.

LP: Oh yeah. We do all sorts of random songs, just things that we personally like. We like to switch it up. I love country, I grew up with it, but sometimes you just need to throw in those random songs where nobody knows it's coming.

RZ: Keep it interesting. **LP:** Yeah. [laughs]

RZ: Very cool. What is your favorite genre to play?

LP: Well... To play? I like to *play* country, but I love to *sing* the blues. That's when my passion comes out. I love to belt a good blues song out. But I love it all, I can't really pick one favorite.

RZ: Not one favorite song? **LP:** I really can't.

RZ: Any repeats you love doing over and over again?

LP: Not really, no. Seriously, I just have so many favorites I can't just pick one.

JC: I love doing "Freedom" from

LP: Not a lot of people recognize that song unless they've seen the movie. That's a really soulful song, I actually really enjoy doing it. **RZ:** Do you guys have any original

material? **LP:** We did this one original that I wrote when I was sixteen, and we

wrote when I was sixteen, and we played that on KBZK on Jamie Leary's morning show.

JC: Funny story. We had got asked

to do that and I actually thought about two days before the taping. I was like wait a second, we can't do any cover songs that we enjoy doing. We probably have to do an original because of copyright and so we called them [KBZK] like two days before to see if that was the case,

as a band.

LP: And it went very well. I have faith in these guys because they're so, so talented. You could throw any song at them and be like "alright, here's the chords, here we go" and we just kind of figure it out. It's kinda cool we have that chemistry where we know what's going to happen next. I don't know how to explain it. [laughs]

RZ: What was that song called?

LP: I call it "Pearl's Song." I never really came up with a real name for it, but it's one of my favorites to play. I think people enjoy it, too.

RZ: Switching gears, how did the band come up with its name?

LP: That's kind of a funny story, too. When the Rocky Mountain Pearls first started, it was just three of us and the other lead singer

"Kentucky" [Josh Butcher] being one of them. We just started playing around bars just for fun, you know, just pulling out our guitars and sat

Pretty soon people started asking "what's your guys' name?" and we were like "oh my gosh, we're just playing for fun, we're not a band." So we just came up with a name with the help of the Gallatin River House's owner. He said "why don't you call yourselves the Rocky Mountain Pearls?" because Pearl is my middle name. We said "that'll work, whatever" and we settled on that. Then it just kinda clicked and now it's getting a little bigger as time goes on.

RZ: You mentioned rehearsing. You're all busy with your day jobs, but do you rehearse a lot? Is every weekend a rehearsal?

JC: We have a steady thing going there like once a week and when time allows. When we need new songs, or have ideas for new songs, or all decide we need to do *this* song, we get together and rehearse as needed.

LP: Also the weekends, if we don't have time to get together during the week, it's a paid rehearsal and that's awesome. 'Cause it's muscle memory, we remember what we're doing-most of the time [laughs]. Not all the time.

RZ: You seem to primarily stick to the bar circuit, but do you hit up any other venues?

LP: We actually have a few weddings this summer and we do quite a few fundraisers and private events. We did the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation benefit, the Farm Bureau, and Eagle Mount. Whoever wants us, we're down to do anything. RZ: Do you prefer being around Bozeman or do you like a little tour-

ing in the mix?

LP: I kind of like the traveling. **RZ:** And the all-new people?

LP: Yeah. New crowd, new atmosphere. This is the first time we've ever played here [the Eagles] and it's *in* Bozeman. I thought that was kind of fun, but we also really love Big Sky and going there.

RZ: After seeing a couple of your shows, it can be said you have attracted a pretty big following. Do they follow you pretty much everywhere—at least a good chunk of them?

LP: Pretty much. We played in Whitehall and people showed up there. It's kinda cool how many people actually care about our band. I don't know if care is the right word, but we do have a pretty good following.

RZ: What do you have planned for the future, other than the habitual "weekend?"

LP: We try to just go day-to-day at this point. People e-mail us, he [Crawdad] answers. We decide if we want to do this or not. We're kind of just going with the flow. We have no plan. [pauses] If we get big, awe-some—I think. I'm not really sure where I want to go with the music, but we're having fun doing it, so wherever it takes us.


Eager MSU Bobcats Open Fall Camp 2015

Bolstered by nine returning starters on the offensive side of the ball, the Montana State **Bobcats** football team was the pick of league coaches to return to

the top of the Big Sky standings at the recent league kick-off media event in Park City, UT.

Montana State garnered six first place votes and 134 points total to edge out runner-up, and reigning Big Sky champion Eastern Washington, which also received six first place votes, but came in one point behind MSU at 133 points. Roles were reversed, however, in the media poll, which

picked Eastern to repeat with 553 points followed by Montana State with 541. Both the Bobcats and the Eagles grabbed 17 first place votes in the media poll. While Montana State and Eastern face each other again this season, this time in Cheney on September 19th, the outcome will not affect the conference title, as the matchup will be a non-conference affair for the second year in a row. Last season, the two league stalwarts squared off in Bozeman, putting on one of the greatest shows in Bobcat Stadium history, with Eastern sneaking out of

town with a gritty 52-51 victory thanks to a last minute touchdown and two-point conversion. Montana State or Eastern Washington has won a share of the league title every year

since 2010. The other member who has been a part of the Big Sky title, the Montana Grizzlies, were picked to finish third by both the coaches and the media in coach Bob Stitt's first year at the helm in Missoula. While the

Five Bobcats garner pre-season All-Big Sky nod

Led by dynamic quarterback, Dakota Prukop, five Montana State Bobcat football players were tabbed as Pre-Season All-Big **Sky Conference** selections at the League's recent Summer Kick-off in Park City, UT. Based on productivity, there was little surprise with the players selected for the honor. Prukop, an FCS Offensive Player of the Year candidate burst onto the scene last season in his first year as the Bobcats' starter, compiling 3,525 yards of total offense, the second most in school history. Prukop's dazzling play earned him a pre-season Third Team All-American nod from STATS, Inc. this year, in addition to a place on the Walter Payton watch list.

3P Flynn, a senior offensive guard, has been a mainstay on the all-league team having earned First Team All-Big Sky a season ago. Flynn has also been nominated as a First Team All-American selection by STATS, Inc. this season. The standout senior has started the past 21 games for the Blue and Gold.

Another offensive lineman, senior John Weidenaar, a Manhattan product, also earned a spot on the pre-season First Team after earning Third Team All-Big Sky last season. Weidenaar has started all 38 games he has suited up for Montana State. Flynn and Weidenaar's selection to the First Team means MSU and Eastern Washington are the only teams to have multiple offensive linemen represented. The Eagles and 'Cats are also the only teams to have three players named to the offensive First Team.

Chad Newell, a reigning First Team All-Big Sky selection a season ago, returns in that capacity again in 2015. The junior from Billings led the Bobcats in special teams tackles in 2014, finishing with 12 on the year, in addition to forcing and recovering a fumble.

Senior Taylor Sheridan is the Bobcats' lone selection on the defensive side of the ball. The defensive lineman from Littleton, CO finished with 50 tackles a year ago on his way to earning Second Team All-Big Sky.




