he Human Resource Development Council's (HRDC) Housing Programs assists thousands of community members each year who are facing housing vulnerability. HRDC works to empower those

experiencing a housing crisis to achieve a long-term sustainable housing solution. They work across the housing spectrum to make this vision a reality. HRDC supports our neighbors transitioning from sleeping outside to under their own roof. HRDC's team of dedicated housing professionals use every tool in their toolbox to combat the challenges of securing affordable housing in Bozeman and

the surrounding communities. From shelter, education, rental or down payment assistance, and one on one coaching, this team is positively impacting more than 1,000 households and families each year in our

community.

For HRDC, helping those facing a housing crisis begins at the Warming Center. Preparing to open for its sixth season of providing emergency shelter to men, women and families experiencing homeless in the Gallatin Valley, the Warming Center provides a model of shelter which is unique in the state of Montana. The center, which is open nightly during the winter months, provided a safe place to sleep to more than 200 men, women, children, seniors and the disabled members of our community who have fallen on hard times. The Warming Center is rooted in the assertion that everyone deserves a

warm place to sleep at night.

As our community's only immediate response to homelessness, the Warming Center is funded entirely by community donations and made possible by the community volunteers and supporters who share our mission to provide a safe, warm alternative to the cold Bozeman nights which are right around the corner.

The month of October, Warm Hearts Month, will be filled a variety of event and opportunities to learn more about homelessness in our community and ways to get involved with making sure that no one is left outside in the cold.

October 10th will by their Annual Flying Signs events. Volunteers of all ages will take to the streets, holding signs on street corners at designated areas around Bozeman raising awareness and dollars to support Warming

Center operations. Looney Toons, the Universe at the Museum of the Rockies

Museum of the Rockies will open its newest exhibit, The Art of Warner Bros. Cartoons, on Saturday, September 19th. The exhibit will run through January 31st, 2016. The Art of Warner Bros. Cartoons is a major exhibition of original artwork from the world of "Looney Tunes" and "Merrie Melodies." It is a colorful, comical overview of the rambunctious Hollywood animation studio that created legendary cartoon characters that have become part of American folklore–from Bugs Bunny, Daffy Duck and Elmer Fudd to Tweety Bird, Porky Pig, Wile E. Coyote and Roadrunner, Visitors will see actual production artwork-drawings, paintings, "cells" and more-used in some of the most beloved cartoons from

the 1930s to the early 1960s. Works by all of the studio's directors, including Chuck Jones, Tex Avery, Friz Freleng and Bob Clampett, now considered the giants of American animated filmmakers, are richly represented in some 165 pieces of artwork and other related art objects. Never intended to be

displayed, these works all reveal the remarkable talent and ingenuity that was hidden within the finished films, and all are marvelous visual icons by themselves. The exhibition also explores the elaborate creative process that supported the making of these

masterpieces of humor and satire. The Art of Warner Bros. Cartoons at Museum of the Rockies will merrily entertain all ages today as much as these memorable cartoons did decades ago.



Intermountain Opera Bozeman presents Donzetti's "**Don Pasquale**" October 9th at 7pm and October 11th at 3pm at the Willson Auditorium in Bozeman.

In "Don Pasquale," the rich and miserly old Pasquale (Corey Crider) plans to marry Norina (Lindsay Ohse), a young and beautiful woman, who loves a young and penniless man, Ernesto (Thomas Glenn), who is Pasquale's nephew. Norina and Ernesto scheme with the wily Dr. Malatesta (Sean Anderson) to outwit Pasquale. Pasquale schemes with the same Dr. Malatesta to outwit Norina and

Ernesto. Confusion abounds. Who's doing what with whom and where? Join in October to find out. All of this confusion is seamlessly woven together with Donizetti's enormous gift for melody from the coloratura of emotional highs to lyrical, love-lorn laments. Better still, he wrote humor into his music-rollicking, rhythmic and playful. Donizettii knew that depth and humanity lay behind this comic façade, and he lavished the score with special care. The music will be brought to life under the baton of conductor Dean Williamson. The whimsical

"spaghetti western" setting for this production, under the direction of Benjamin Smith, completes the infectious fun.

Tickets range from \$25 to \$75 reserved seating, with students discounted 50% and new patrons discounted 25%. The Willson Auditorium offers seating for only 1100 people, so there isn't a bad seat in the house

The fully staged productions typically feature hand-painted drops from Italy (rented from Stivanello Costume Co. in NYC). Russian Woodpecker at Emerson

The Bozeman Doc Series returns for another season of brilliant, challenging documentaries from around the world. In last year's inaugural season, the series showcased 14 award-winning films, including 11 Montana premieres, 2 films that would later be nominated for Oscars, and 1 that would go on to win the Oscar for Best Documentary. The series presented major festival award-winners from twelve different countries and screened films in ten different languages focused on subjects ranging from the mountain gorillas of the Congo's Virunga National Park to Edward Snowden's revelations to the lives of nomadic fishermen of Borneo.

The second season kicks off Thursday, October 8th at 7pm, with the Montana premiere of the critically-acclaimed 2015 Sundance Grand Jury Prize winner, **The Russian Woodpecker** at the Emerson Cultural Center. Young, eccentric Ukrainian artist Fedor Alexandrovich was just four years old when the Chernobyl disaster struck, but the event had a profound effect on him. In seeking to learn more about what happened at the nuclear plant, Fedor becomes fascinated with the Duga-a massive, Soviet-constructed radio antenna near the Chernobyl site that remains shrouded in mystery. Fedor discovers the Duga was one of the USSR's secret Cold War weapons built to penetrate Western communications systems and, possibly, minds. He arrives at a terrifying conclusion that not only explains the radio antenna's role in the disaster but also lays bare the cruelty inflicted on Ukraine by its Russian neighbors. Fedor must decide if he will protect his family and himself, or tell the world what he believes. In the package of a wildly inventive paranoid thriller, The Russian Woodpecker takes us

on a fascinating journey through a labyrinthine conspiracy theory that becomes more shockingly plausible by the moment. "4 stars...a rollicking ride of masterly narrative construction unlike any other documentary in Sundance," declared Charlie Phillips of *The Guardian*. "A complex documentary about Chernobyl that is surprisingly, richly enjoyable... inventive, even buoyant in its presentation of several issues that could scarcely be more sobering," said Dennis Harvey of *Variety*.

The series will continue with one screening every other Thursday through April. Doors open at 6:30pm, and the films begin at 7pm. Tickets are available at the door or before the show at Cactus Records and Movie Lovers. The Friends of Eddie Coyle

Think Outside The Red Box:

Regarding movies, the best axiom I've ever heard is that there are no old movies, just ones you haven't seen. This is solid advice for those who want to explore what cinema has to offer, it blows the conceptual cobwebs off of movies you would never otherwise seek out. It shows us how immutable the components of good story telling are, despite changes in technology or fashion... Still sometimes vou find a film so emblematic of its era that it almost that it almost throws you out of your chair. The Friends of Eddie Coyle feels like pure early-seventies concentrate, with all its greasy hairdos, sideburns, bra-burning references, corduroy, muted earth-tones (save for a lime green muscle car) and funky soundtrack. But more significantly, it carries a pervasive melancholy and sense of pessimism throughout which feels uniquely keyed into the national spirit of the time. Of course none of this would matter if the film wasn't engaging, and it is, even nerve-rackingly so during

Set in Boston, and though it's largely an ensemble piece, Hollywood Golden Age actor and legend Robert Mitchum "leads" the film as Eddie Fingers, a middle aged, low level gun runner facing a few years of prison up in New Hampshire for a botched truck hijacking. Trying to shave a couple years off his sentence, he begins collaborating with a police officer, who is in turn collaborating with a local bartender (Peter Boyle, better known to most as the father in Everyone Loves Raymond), an ostensible friend of Eddie's, who set him up with

throughout the film.

the truck job in the first place. During this time, a local crew of thieves, other "friends" of Eddie, start conducting a series of bank heists throughout Boston.

Meanwhile a gun dealer, a contact of Eddie's, accumulates M16s for other buyers. What ensues is a series of low-key betrayals and compromises, delivered through fantastic, witty dialogue, and several heists and stings that give the movie a propulsive sort of pacing. It's rare to see stars of Hollywood's Studio Era show up in such good form in films from the 70s.

The New Hollywood, with all its grit and honesty, had little room for those polished figures. Mitchum however, with his edge and history in film noir, fits perfectly within this world. He blends in seamlessly with the rest of the cast (largely composed of character actors, who are all also impeccable), and brings the right amount of sarcasm and exhausted contempt. It would have been easy to make his character a complete schlub and loser, but Mitchum brings the humanity out (there is a theme running through the film about lost opportunities, having "missed the boat").

Directed by Peter Yates (best known for Bullit), The Friends of Eddie Coyle is filmed in a very naturalistic way, with no great flourishes of gaudy style, but the story is none the less better for it. And though Coyle is something of a forgotten masterpiece of crime fiction, its DNA can be found in some of the best recent American movies: Killing Them Softly, The Place Beyond The Pines, The Town, The Departed. Even The Sopranos, with its duplicitous cops and informants, bears the mark of The Friends of Eddie Coyle, which makes this quintessentially 70s thriller all the more relevant. •

Wednesday, October 7th brings acclaimed film, The End of the Tour - the story of the five-day interview between Rolling Stone reporter (and novelist) David Lipsky (Jesse Eisenberg) and acclaimed novelist David Foster Wallace (Jason Segel), which took place right after the 1996 publication of Wallace's groundbreaking epic novel, Infinite Jest. As the days go on, a tenuous yet intense relationship seems to develop between journalist and subject. The two men bob and weave around each other, sharing laughs and also possibly revealing hidden frailties - but it's never clear how truthful they are being with each other. Ironically, the interview was never published, and five days of audio tapes were packed away in Lipsky's closet. The two men did not meet again. The film is based on Lipsky's critically acclaimed memoir about this unforgettable encounter, written following Wallace's 2008 suicide. Both Segel and Eisenberg reveal great depths of emotion in their performances and the film is directed with humor and tenderness by Sundance vet James Ponsoldt from Pulitzer- Prize winner Donald Margulies' insightful and heartbreaking screenplay. 92% Rotten Tomatoes. 





"Meetup" with new website

I guess the first question that needs to be addressed is what is **Meetup.com?** The definition the founders give on their website is that it's an online social networking portal that facilitates offline group meetings in various localities around the world. Meetup.com allows members to find and join groups unified by a common interest, such as politics, books, games, movies, health, pets, careers or hobbies. More simply stated, it's a way to find other people to hook up with who enjoy doing the same things that you enjoy. You can form a group to do almost anything, and the next thing you know you may have a cadre of like-minded people to share in the activities you enjoy. It's a great way to meet new people and to make new friends. All you do is enter your city or postal zip code and tag the topic you want to meet about. The website/app helps you locate a group to arrange a place and time to meet. Topic listings are also available for those who only enter a location. Meetup receives revenue by charging fees to organizers of groups. Currently US\$9.99/month for their basic plan, which includes max. 4 organizers and max. 50 members. The unlimited pricing starts at US\$14.99/month.

I'm starting this column in the BoZone to apprise readers of Meetup.com groups in Bozeman. My plan is to feature different groups in different issues. Of course you can access all of the groups available by looking them up for vourself online. The first group I'm featuring is Montana Social Dancing Meetup. It's charming founder is Kerie Hagler, a dance instructor with Dance Kinexion and owner of The MAC (Montana Movement Arts Center). She explained that she felt that while there are different pockets of social dance in Bozeman, there's been no concerted effort to coordinate and plan opportunities to get other people who enjoy dancing to show up to dance. I commented that it seemed that many of the better dancers I know seem to all show up at the same places, which is where the best dance music is available on any given evening. She noted that local dance enthusiast Peggy Olson has a calender she maintains to inform those in their circle informed, but it's not easily accessible to those who don't know about it and ask to get added to her list.

Keric's idea is to inform anyone who enjoys dancing where to meet up to dance on a particular evening. It's not important that you be an

As a dance instuctor, she's found that many people who take lessons don't get out enough to use what they've learned; and, we all know, that if you don't use it, you lose it! She feels that many men who are newer to dance seem to have a hard time going up to women they don't know to ask them to dance. The women, conversely, either aren't comfortable going out alone, or when they do go, venture out with friends, they often sit there tapping their feet or swaying to the music, longing for some gentleman to come up and ask them to dance. As a last resort, they get up and dance with their girlfriends. This opportunity to meet up gives social dancers a risk-free opportunity to overcome the anxiety associated with "a cold call" and the chance to make friends and improve your dancing abilities. And it enables dancers to help spread the word about where the good dance bands are playing and how to find out about local dance club gatherings. 

Storyteller Melissa Bangs comes to Verge

Storyteller and one-woman show Melissa Bangs will make her way to the Verge Theater stage for three nights of live, nonfiction storytelling Thursday,

October 15th through Saturday, October 17th. "Playing Monopoly with God & Other True Stories," will begin at 7pm each evening, with doors opening at 6pm.

Tickets are \$15 in advance and \$18 at the door. Melissa Bangs is a storyteller at heart. For her, a true story with all of its highs and

lows, its light and dark, its clarity and murkiness is the route to understanding, forgiveness and compassion. Her hope is that by sharing this story, boldly, truthfully with a dose of humor and a deep self-love, others will be inspired to tell their own stories. As we deeply hear one another and ourselves...we transform.

During her first class at the comedy New York City club

Upright Citizens Brigade, Bangs' teacher gave her two tasks. One-Every time you get on stage, have the guts to make a fool of yourself. Take risks. Find out what's on the other side of the more intimidating (more interesting) action. Two-See as much comedy at the club as possible. Do your homework. Study the ninjas. Find the magic. Then, figure out how it's done. Bangs had landed at Upright Citizens Brigade (UCB) on a double-dog dare from her mother. Everywhere she lived, her mom visited. Every time she visited, they took in some

comedy. Their night at UCB was a phenomenal knee-slapper. One problem. Of over a dozen comics, only three were women and

only one was funny. That one was Amy Poehler. Given that Bangs had never been able to walk away from a double dog dare from her mom, Poehler soon became Melissa's homework. Her ninia. Her master.

When Melissa left NYC in 2004 to return home to Montana, comedy class (& the live performances in front of a NYC audience) were among the hardest parts to leave behind. Comedy, and specifically improv, had taught

her so much. The ninjas like Amy did several things at a level she'd never imagined. They played it real, demonstrating the brilliance of the improv mantra "The funniest things are true." They listened more deeply, remembered details far beyond normal pedestrian capacity. And wildly, rather than finding conflict again and again as they invented scenarios and relationships at break-neck speed, they found agreement. Endless agreement. It was hilarious. Bangs never could have imagined that the next time she'd be performing comedy live onstage, she'd be telling the true story of her agonizing journey to the psych ward.

In September 2012, at 40 years old, Bangs gave birth to her beautiful daughter, Adelaide. One month later, profoundly sleep deprived, Bangs was admitted to the Providence Psychological Inpatient Unit. What came next was an extraordinary journey, one she has transformed into a non-fiction storytelling experience that is both wildly funny and terribly tragic. Bangs sold out four shows in Missoula earlier this year and packed two additional houses. The most common bit of feedback she heard was, "I was laughing or crying the entire time." While a reported 15%of women will experience a post partum mood disorder of some kind, Post Partum Support International suggests the true number is larger due to the fact that stigma and fear leave women isolated and enduring, rather than seeking help. While this show is definitely for parents that have experienced a rough post partum patch, it is also for anyone that has experienced deep or tragic loss. Bangs says, "We've all had our post partum psychosis. Yours might have been cancer, divorce or the death of a dear one. For anyone that has ever

arrived in a moment in life in which the bottom momentarily drops out, this story is for you." Bangs shares, reflecting on the first two runs and the upcoming West Coast tour in 2016, "Comedy taught me to deeply listen, to find agreement rather than blame and to play it real. It allowed me to find the funny, and in turn the healing, in the hardest, truest thing I've every experienced. I am profoundly grate ful to share this with others." She hopes that by telling this story with a large dose of truth, humor and self-love, she will give others permission to tell their stories, shed any shame or regret and follow their guts.

Join Melissa Bangs during her three-night series at the Verge for an evening of true stories full of bewilderment, chaos and hilarity. She has a knack for telling true stories that cut to the bone of our shared, vulnerable human condition. Bangs' true gift, however, comes in the moments in which she's able to string away the shame or agony of an experience and transform the room into an uproar of laughter. 

Ivan Doig papers featured at MSU

The papers of the late Ivan Doig, called "a presiding figure in the literature of the American West," will return to the writer's native state, finding a home at Montana State University, university officials announced.

MSU's President Waded Cruzado said the university was "overjoyed" at the acquisition of the archive. "Few times in our lives we have an opportunity to witness a transformational event. This is exactly what the acquisition of the Doig collection represents for our library and for Montana State University," Cruzado said. "The Doig collection will continue to establish Montana State University not only as a great school in agriculture and STEM, but also as a land-grant university fully committed to the humanities." Carol Doig, widow of the celebrated writer who died in April at age 75, said she chose MSU over two major West Coast universities as a location for the archive, which will be housed in the MSU Library's Special Collections and Archives. In addition, the MSU College of Letters and Science will integrate the papers into several teaching, research and scholarly activities, including a future conference.

"Ivan's archive is coming home," Carol Doig said in announcing the commitment of her husband's manuscripts, file cards, drafts, slides, tapes and other materials to MSU. 'He considered Bozeman as home territory:


the shopping center for his family when they lived in Ringling and White Sulphur Springs, and when his family ran sheep in the Bridgers. Montana State University welcomed him early in his writing career, and recognized him with an honorary doctorate. I'm delighted that MSU will make his archive available both locally and globally." Doig, who grew up in White Sulphur Springs and Dupuyer, was a writer of international acclaim who published 16 volumes of fiction and non-fiction. His first book, "This House of Sky: Landscapes of a Western Mind," a poetic memoir published in 1979, was a finalist for the National Book Award. Doig then turned to writing fiction that perennially hit best-seller lists. His final book, "Last Bus to Wisdom," which was published last month, is currently number 13 on the New York Times fiction best-seller list and number 9 on the National Independent Booksellers Association list. Although he had lived in Seattle for many years, the lives of his characters more often than not shared Doig's Big Sky roots. In his obituary, the New York Times wrote that Doig "created a body of work that helped shape our understanding of rural working-class life in the postwar

Doig held both bachelor's and master's degrees in journalism from Northwestern University and a doctorate in history from the University of Washington. He was editor of The Rotarian magazine prior to turning to writing books. In 2007, Doig won the prestigious Wallace Stegner Award, named for the fellow prominent novelist and Western historian. A frequent visitor to Bozeman, Doig received an honorary doctorate from MSU in 1984. Doig was profiled in a 2009 issue of MSU's Mountains and Minds magazine about his book, "The 11th Man," which was inspired by MSU lore-the death of 11 players on Montana State College's football team during World War II. In the Mountains and Minds interview, Doig spoke about his friendship with MSU's late President Michael P. Malone, a historian whom Doig considered a colleague.

Kenning Arlitsch, dean of the MSU Library, said the library will digitize the entire collection and make it available to the public on the Web as well as in print in the library's Special Collections and Archives. "By committing Ivan's archive to MSU, Carol Doig is placing immense trust in the institution and its people," Arlitsch said. "Our proposal to Carol was unique in that it offered a partnership of the MSU Library and the College of Letters and Science that will ensure open access to print and digital versions of the collection, as well as integration with MSU's teaching and research programs." Nicol Rae, dean of the MSU

College of Letters and Science, said the college plans a scholarly conference on Doig's legacy to be held in 2017. He added that the arrival of the Ivan Doig Collection at MSU, following the appointment of Rick Bass as the college's first Western writer in residence earlier this year, cements MSU's standing as a major center of excellence for teaching and scholarship on the American West. "The arrival of the Doig collection will have a transformational impact on teaching and scholarship on the American West at MSU. Rae said. He added that the college will be raising funds for a visiting professorship at MSU named in honor of Doig.

Arlitsch and Rae said 26 people, including scholars, local writers and members of the community, wrote in support of housing the archive at MSU. "(The proposal) rallied an enormous expression of support from the Bozeman-area literary community and MSU faculty and administrators," Arlitsch said. He added that funding the acquisition will be made possible, in part, by a lead gift to the MSU Alumni Foundation by long-time MSU Library supporters Jim and Sue Hamilton of Bozeman. "We are grateful to Carol Doig for entrusting this extraordinary collection to MSU, and we were delighted to participate in the collaborative effort to make the acquisition," the Hamiltons said in an email statement.

The Bridger Raptor fest lands in Bozeman

The Bridger Raptor Festival is back for its 2015 fall festivities, Friday, October 2nd through Sunday, October 4th, with events in and around the Bozeman area. The Bridger Raptor Festival is an annual event held in early October throughout the Bozeman area. The festival, which is free to the public, centers around the the largest known Golden Eagle migration in the United States. Since 1991, a raptor migration count has taken place every fall at the Bridger Bowl ski area in the Gallatin National Forest just north of Bozeman. Founder of Raptors of the Rockies and keynote speaker Kate Davis will kick off the weekend with a presentation of "Raptor Education in the West" at the Museum of the Rockies at 7pm. People have always been enchanted with birds of prey, and Davis' lecture will investigate the reasons in a PowerPoint and presentation with live birds. Topics of disscussion will center around what makes up a raptor and their special place in history and society. Participants will meet a falcon, an eagle, and owls up close. Individual life histories and species specifics are explored with a discussion of Peregrine Falcon population recovery, Golden



Eagles' persecution and now protection, the enigma of owls, and importance of natural resource conservation. The presentation will finish, as in every program, by learning how to hoot up an owl.

The Bridger Raptor Festival: A Migration Celebration is an annual event dedicated to promoting an awareness and appreciation Rockies. NASA's Mars Exploration Rover Opportunity gears up for winter

NASA's Mars Exploration Rover Opportunity is conducting a "walkabout" survey of "Marathon Valley," where the rover's operators plan to use the vehicle through the upcoming Martian winter, and beyond, to study the context for outcrops bearing clay minerals.

Marathon Valley slices downhill from west to east for about 300 yards or meters through the western rim of Endeavour Crater. Opportunity has been investigating rock targets in the western portion of the valley since late July, working its way eastward in a thorough reconnaissance of the area.

The rover's panoramic camera has captured a scene dominated by a summit called "Hinners Point," forming part of the valley's northern edge. The image also shows a portion of the valley floor with swirling reddish zones that have been a target for study. It is online at:

For several months starting in mid- to late October, the rover team plans to operate Opportunity on the southern side of the valley to take advantage of the sun-facing slope. The site is in Mars' southern hemisphere, so the sun is to the north during fall and winter days. Tilting the rover toward the sun increases power output from its solar panels. The shortest-daylight period of this seventh

Martian winter for Opportunity will come in January 2016.

"Our expectation is that Opportunity will be able to remain mobile through the winter," said Mars Exploration Rover Project Manager John Callas of NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory, Pasadena, California.

The walkabout is identifying investigation targets in and near the valley floor. Rocks in

valley floor for detailed measurements of outcrops that may host the clay minerals.

Endeavour Crater spans about 14 miles (22 kilometers) in diameter. Opportunity has been studying its western rim since 2011. Marathon Valley became a high priority destination after a concentration of clay minerals called smectites was mapped there based on observations by the Compact Reconnaissance Imaging

The rover team has been dealing for more than a year with Opportunity's tendency to undergo unplanned computer resets when using the type of onboard memory that retains information when power is off: flash memory. For three months until mid-September, operators fully avoided use of flash memory. In this mode, images and other data cannot be stored overnight, when the rover is powered off to conserve energy. To gain operational flexibility in a trade-off with possible "lost" days from resets, the team has resumed occasional use of flash memory.

NASA's Mars Exploration Rover Project landed twin rovers Spirit and Opportunity on Mars in 2004 to begin missions planned to last three months. Both rovers far exceeded those plans. Spirit worked for six years, and Opportunity is still active. Findings about ancient wet environments on Mars have come from both rovers. The project is one element of NASA's ongoing and future Mars missions preparing for a human mission to the planet in the 2030s. JPL, a division of the California Institute of Technology, manages the project for NASA's Science Mission Directorate in Washington.

'We have detective work to do in Marathon Valley for many months ahead," said Opportunity Deputy Principal Investigator Ray Arvidson, of Washington University in St. Louis. "During the Martian late fall and winter seasons Opportunity will conduct its measurements and traverses on the southern side of the valley. When spring arrives the rover will return to the

Spectrometer for Mars aboard NASA's Mars Reconnaissance Orbiter. Smectites form under wetter, milder conditions than most rocks at the Opportunity site. Opportunity is investigating relationships among clay-bearing and neighboring deposits for clues about the history of environmental changes.

Major opposition to Montana railroad

The federal Surface Transportation Board has received more than 110,000 comments opposing plans for the Tongue River Railroad (TRR). Northern Plains Resource Council, a conservation and family agriculture group which has been fighting the TRR for $35\,$ years, and other groups in the Northwest have organized members in sending comments to the Board. Commenters cited inadequacies in the draft environmental impact statement (EIS) for the proposed coal-hauling railroad in southeast Montana.

The Northern Cheyenne Tribal Council voted unanimously to oppose the TRR, and Missoula City Council will vote on a resolution whether to oppose the TRR. The TRR would condemn up to 90 miles of working family farm and ranch land and industrialize an important agricultural valley in order to move Otter Creek coal toward the West Coast for export to Asia. "The TRR will only haul coal

and is not a common carrier," said Mark Fix, a rancher on the Tongue River and member of the Northern Plains Resource Council. "They should not have the right of federal eminent domain to condemn and take our property to build this railroad. The TRR will forever disrupt

our operations and will bring noise and fires and weeds to our doorstep. And for what? To ship coal to Asia."

The railroad has faced long years of opposition from southeastern

Montana ranchers and

tribal members, who have recently been joined by a growing coalition of down-rail cities and towns concerned about the effects of dramatically increased coal train traffic. Besides disrupting agricultural oper-

ations, coal train traffic between Montana and proposed West Coast coal ports would mean more coal dust and diesel exhaust pollution, more derailments, decreased property values along the tracks, and longer waits for emergency services as ambulances and fire trucks are

fall on us taxpayers-people who won't be benefitting from this increase in coal train traffic at all." In addition to the environmental and economic issues, commenters criticized the informational and analytic failures of the draft EIS. Many of its conclusions were based on

economic assumptions that the public wasn't even allowed to review. In the end, French said, the project will shove costs onto many people from eastern Montana to Puget Sound, but will only benefit the speculators behind proposed coal-to-Asia projects. That is why opposition has come from so many corners.

National Prescription Drug Take-Back Day

On Saturday, September 26 the Montana Department of Justice, local law enforcement agencies and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) gave the public its tenth opportunity in five years to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding their homes of unused prescription drugs.

Montanans were invited to bring their unwanted prescription pills and patches for free, anonymous, no-questions-asked disposal at one of over 20 participating sites across the state. "According to the Montana Office of Epidemiology and Scientific Support, in 2013 there were 125 overdose deaths from prescription substances on their own," said Attorney General Tim Fox. "That number doesn't even include deaths where prescription drugs were mixed with alcohol or illicit drugs, or deaths resulting from drug DUIs. Prescription medicines that sit in home cabinets are highly susceptible to abuse, misuse and diversion. That's why safe, responsible disposal at a Take-Back Day location or at a permanent drug take-back box is the best thing to do with unneeded medications.'

Residents who did not make it to a Take-Back Day event, or who do not live in one of the cities that hosted a Take-Back event can dispose of their unwanted medications by visiting a permanent drug drop box location. In Bozeman that is the Bozeman Police Department at 30 North Rouse Avenue and the Bozeman PD/ Gallatin County Sheriff's Office at 615 South 16th

Additionally, the Attorney General's Office recently awarded \$26,000 in grants to 13 Montana pharmacies to become pharmacy prescription drug take-back locations, making it easier for consumers to dispose of these dangerous substances safely and responsibly. The 13 awardees are Bitterroot Drug in Hamilton, Granite Pharmacy in Missoula, Florence Pharmacy in Florence, Benton Pharmacy in Fort



Benton, Health Service Pharmacy at the University of Montana's Curry Health Center in Missoula, Alpine Apothecary in Whitefish, St. James Healthcare Hospital Pharmacy in Butte, Family Pharmacy in Stevensville, Lolo Drug in Lolo and The Confederated Salish and Kootenai Tribes Tribal Health Department with locations in St. Ignatius and Polson. These pharmacy locations will be added to the list as soon as their sites are up and running.

The National Prescription Drug Take-Back addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. In the previous nine Take-Back events nationwide from 2010-2014, more

than 4.8 million pounds — 2,411 of drugs were collected. Many Americans are not aware that medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are at alarming rates, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. Studies show that many abused prescription drugs are obtained from

Last Saturday collection here in Bozeman was a huge success with 15 to 20lbs pounds being collected for proper disposal. In addition to that, all the existing boxes from Livingston law

center, Belgrade's law center, Manhattan's law center and West Yellowstone's law center were also collected totalling 92 pounds. Every location is confidential and open 24 hours. All the pills were shipped through the DEA for incineration.

The following items cannot be accepted at the Take-Back locations: Illegal drugs, chemotherapy drugs, needles, sharps, mercury (thermometers), oxygen containers, pressurized canisters, and radioactive substances. 



During the past seven years, Webster has managed law enforcement, emergency services, fire, visitor management, dispatch, and wilderness operations in his roles as the deputy chief ranger at Yellowstone, chief ranger at Denali National Park and Preserve, and deputy chief ranger at Shenandoah National Park. He began his National Park Service career in 1988 as a Student Conservation Association intern at Glacier

National Park. During his career, he has also served as the district and sub-district ranger at Glacier and at Sequoia and Kings Canyon National Park and has worked as a field law enforcement park ranger at Yellowstone, Glacier, Katmai National Park and Preserve, Death Valley National Park, Big Cypress National Preserve, and Mount Rainier National Park. A native of the Detroit, Michigan area, Webster received a Bachelor of Science degree in Fisheries and Wildlife Management from Michigan State University in 1989. He and his wife, Dawn, live in Mammoth, Wyoming, and have three children, ages 17, 15, and 10.



The Interview

Ramblin' Jack Elliott

National Medal of Arts winner and folk icon Ramblin' Jack Elliott is headed to Bozeman for a show at the historic Ellen Theatre on Friday. October 9th. Billed as the very special guest of Nell Robinson's "The Rose of No Man's Land," he will be performing songs and readings from the show which is now a PBS special.

Ms. Robinson says, "Jack is prominently featured on the album and in the show. The show is fun. very lively and features great music both familiar and new. Jack is one of the most present beings I've ever met and we are all honored and tickled to be onstage with this folk legend."

The legendary Elliott is one of the remaining folk troubadours and was dubbed, "King of the Folksingers" by Bob Dylan. After 60 plus years of touring, to say he's mastered his craft would be an understatement. Any chance to spend time with this national treasure should not be missed.

To that end, it was pleasure to ask Jack a few questions recently. He doesn't use the internet, so these questions were a combination of phone calls and missed connections. But we got there.

JG: What was the Best gig

of your life?

IG:

IE: "It is hard to think of a favorite, I have been very fortunate to have many wonderful gigs. One of my best was the Newport Folk Festival the following year after the moon landing."

What was the Worst gig of your life? JE: "I do have a favorite bad one. this is the strongest memory that stands out. July 20, 1969, my daughter was there she was just 2 months old and Iohnny Cash was there and I think this

was his first time at The Newport Folk Festival, my 3rd or 4th. Kris Kristofferson was there.

Scott Carpenter was one of the main distractions at that time, he was stepping on the moon for the

first time as I was attending this show-being called onto stage at that moment, George Wein was announcing me and I was glued to the tv, the ladder was down on the surface of the moon and he was about to step onto the ladder. I was trying to time myself to get to the

mic right as

he set foot

on the

moon. I'm

noticing he has about 10 rungs on the ladder and I have about 50 feet to walk, I divided about 10 feet per ladder rung. I must have made folks wonder what was taking me so long to get there, I shaded my eyes and looked up at the moon and pointed 'He's just stepping on the moon,' I said 'now' like I could really see it. About 18000 people laughed.

Everything was great, I started San Francisco Bay Blues and suddenly 80+ lights from cameras started flashing. I'm asking them to 'Please stop, I'd like to sing you a song.' Then it started raining, I wasn't getting wet but the crowd was. I was wearing some indian rain beads and I took them off and put my hat upside down on the stage and put the beads inside. I said a silent prayer for the rain to stop, but the rain god was not listening. Then there was a noise of some people laying against a fence, knocking it over, gradually the whole area seemed to be coming apart. I was grumbling about the flash and said some grumpy swear words, and I stopped after 20+ minutes.

JG: What is your most favorite road in all of the US?

JE: "I'm not telling, I don't want anyone cluttering it up. It is not the New Jersey turnpike." JG: What one item do you carry

with you always?

IE: "A capo-to change chords, I carry a couple, both have sentimental value, gifts from friends. A guitar, of course -to gigs. But you may be surprised that when I'm not playing music, I like traveling, trucking, cats, dogs and horses. I don't carry my guitar everywhere."

JG: What's the best advice you ever got?

JE: "Shut up and sing!' The genius who first said this was a man who was visiting me- Ray Buck, former husband of Alice (of Alice's restaurant) and a wooden boat builder from the eastern shore in Chesapeake Bay, Maryland - Arlo Guthrie's old shop teacher." **IG:** Welcome back to Montana you've got some history here. Care

to elaborate? **JE:** "Spent precious few days here, but they have been special because of the natural beauty which abounds. One of my fave cowboy heroes was Bill Linderman from Montana's Red Lodge- a



Greensky Bluegrass comes to Faultine North

Michigan-based
Americana group **Greensky Bluegrass** are set to perform at
Faultline North on Wednesday,
November 11th at 8pm with special
guests **Tom Hamilton's American Babies.** Tickets to this

American Babies. Tickets to the awesome show are on sale now at Cactus Records and online at Vootie.com for \$25 plus fees.

"There's this great duality to our band," reflects Greensky mandolinist, vocalist, and songwriter Paul Hoffman. "We're existing in a few different places at once: we're a bluegrass band and a rock band, we're song-driven and interested in extended improvisation." Dobro player Anders Beck adds, "We play acoustic instruments, but we put on a rock'n'roll show. We play in bigger clubs and theaters, there's a killer light show, and we're as loud as your favorite rock band. It's not easy to make five acoustic instruments sound like this-it's something we've spent years working on."

From these seemingly irreconcilable elements, the five members of Greensky Bluegrass have forged a defiant, powerful sound that, while rooted in classic stringband Americana, extends outwards with a fearless, exploratory zeal. The tension and release between these components-tradition and innovation, prearranged songs and improvisation, acoustic tones and electric vol-

ume-is what makes them so thrillingly dynamic, in concert and on record. "In theory," Hoffman explains, "greensky is the complete opposite of bluegrass. So, by definition, we are contrasting everything that isn't bluegrass with everything that is." From their unlikely Kalamazoo,

kalamazoo,
Michigan (home of
the original Gibson
Mandolin-Guitar factory), Greensky-which also includes
banjoist Michael Arlen Bont and
bassist Michael Devol-arrived at
their unique take on the bluegrass
tradition by working from the outside inward. "I found bluegrass

That's how I got to listening to Bill Monroe and Earl Scruggs. It's really interesting how many people in our

generation got into acoustic music through that channel." Approaching their instruments from an openended, rock perspective gave them the freedom to create their own rules. "We were always coming at bluegrass backwards," Hoffman says. "We were better musicians than we were bluegrass musicians. I mean, I didn't buy a mandolin until I was 18. Dave didn't start playing acoustic

guitar until he was 18. Bont got a banjo when he was 20. We discovered that, when it came to learning these instruments, we preferred to do so by improvising and writing our own songs, instead playing standard material and fiddle tunes."

By playing up to 175 shows a year, mostly in rock clubs and more openminded festivals like Telluride, Austin City Limits, Bonnaroo, and the

New Orleans Jazz and Heritage Festival, Greensky Bluegrass

became a word-of-mouth underground sensation, cultivating a devoted legion of fans entranced both by the band's improvisational acumen and the quality of their songwriting. Then and now, despite their wide-ranging musical interests, Greensky continues to work within the structure of a classic five-man stringband. "The cool thing about a bluegrass band or, really, any drummerless band," Hoffman explains, "is that it's like acoustic chamber music—challenging, exciting, and fun to play." "While there are potential limitations because of our instrumentation," Beck adds, "a really big part of what is Greensky Bluegrass is about is to essentially ignore those limitations."

With the release of their first nationally distributed album and a busy touring season ahead of them, Greensky Bluegrass are facing a new level of exposure. It's a challenge they are up to, that they embrace. As their music and their audience has grown, so have they, and their sites are set ever-higher. "When we were doing our first shows and making those early records," Hoffman concludes, "it was stressful because we wanted to hit the right notes. We just wanted it to be good enough. Both Segel and Eisenberg reveal great depths of emotion in their performances and the film is directed with humor and tenderness by Sundance vet James Ponsoldt from Pulitzer Prize-winner Donald Margulies' insightful and heartbreaking screenplay. 

Bobcat Offense Finding Its Groove

The 'Boo Birds' have gone away, and the dismal first half that was the Fort Lewis game is a distant memory.

After opening the 2015 college football season with a dud, the Bobcat's offense has been full speed ahead, putting up Playstation-like numbers over the past two weeks, showing once again that MSU has one of the top offenses in all of college football.

It didn't appear that way back on September 3rd in the 'Cats annual 'Gold Rush' game against lowly Fort Lewis College, a Division II school out of Colorado. In that one, MSU produced several threeand-outs and were held scoreless for the better part of the first half, scoring 14 points in the final five minutes to lead 14-0 at the break. Offensive coordinator Tim Cramsey and crew righted the ship a bit in the second half, as MSU put up 31 points over the final two quarters, but the stats were anything but 'eye-popping' when compared to the expectations coming into the season.

MSU finished with a pedestrian 421 vards of total offense, including 258 through the air and 163 on the ground. Dakota Prukop, MSU's recordbreaking junior quarterback completed 20-of-32 passes and added another 78 yards on the ground, but for the most of the evening, he was held in check. Fast-forward two weeks to the Eastern Washington game, and the story has a whole new chapter. The Bobcats took their bye week following the Gold Rush game to tweak a few things in preparation for the showdown with the Eagles, and the results were nothing short of spectacular. The 'Cats offense put up an astounding

718 yards of offense, scoring

50+ points versus the Eagles

for the second consecutive year. Bigger news for Bobcat fans was the reemergence of the electrifying Prukop who returned to last season's form, completing 29-47 passes for 353 yards and four touchdowns, while adding another 196 yards and a TD on the ground, just missing out on joining an elite group of quarterbacks who have ever thrown for 300 yards and rushed for 200 in the same game. Junior Chad Newell also appeared to establish himself as the feature back in this year's offense, gaining 97 yards and a TD to aid the offense's cause. And while MSU ultimately dropped a 55-50 decision to Eastern, the offense

appeared to find its footing. Following MSU's most recent victory over Cal Poly, it would seem as if MSU's offense has hit cruise control and is humming right along The 'Cats followed up their impressive outing versus Eastern by putting up another 602 yards of offense versus the Mustangs, as MSU earned a crucial conferenceopening victory over their California guests, 45-28.

Prukop was once again at his best, completing 19-of-26 passes for 399 yards and 3 touchdowns, and Newell led the way on the ground for the 'Cats, churning out 113 yards and three TDs. MSU may have also found a new receiving threat in Miami Hurricane transfer, Beau Sandland. The 6'5" tight end collected five catches for 156 yards and two touchdowns in his first extensive action in front of the Bobcat faithful.

With a defense that has shown glimpse of greatness, but is still trying to find its way under first-year Co-Defensive Coordinator, Kane Ioane, the increase in offensive production may be a necessity if Montana State is to hang in with Eastern Washington in the chase for the Big Sky title.

Don't let good intentions stand between our children and their education

On September 24th Senator Jon Tester strongly urged the Obama Administration to reconsider a proposed rule that could deny many Montana students access to early childhood education through

In a letter to Health and Human Services Secretary Sylvia Burwell, Tester said the proposed expansion of Head Start to full-day, full-year classes is a good goal, but uncertainty about the availability of funding could threaten Head Start services for up to 126,000 children.


"Head Start gives our nation's children the skills and habits they need to be successful in elementary school and beyond. I ask you to ensure that your good intentions do not stand between our children and the education they deserve," Tester, a former teacher, wrote. "While it is important to explore every possible option to prepare our

children for their futures, we need to do so in a way that accepts difficult realities and provides adequate time and flexibility, so that we don't undermine existing Head Starts."

Tester wrote that while requiring full-day and full-year classes at Head Start would


lead to greater educational outcomes for some students, this proposed rule would pick winners and losers by threatening access to early education for thousands of students.

Earlier this year, House Republicans passed a budget that cuts \$19 billion from Head Start over the next decade.



Tester helped pass the Improving Head Start for School Readiness Act of 2007 which directed the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to improve regulations for Head Start.

Bozeman Police Department receives portable message display trailer

With the goal of improving public safety, the Bozeman Police Department has partnered with the Gallatin County DUI Task Force to provide an additional tool to educate the public.

The Bozeman Police Department recently received a hybrid RADAR/Variable Message Board mounted to a trailer that can be deployed anywhere in the City. The majority of the funding used to purchase this piece of equipment was received through a grant by the Montana Department of Transportation ("DOT"). With additional contributions from the Gallatin County DUI Task

Force, this DOT funding allowed the Bozeman Police Department to purchase the equipment.

This device will be used as a source of education and information, which directly ties into the



vision of the DUI Task Force. It will be used to provide information, directions, and reminders during major events in the Bozeman area. It will also be used to highlight problem areas in the City, to advise

of traffic flow changes, and to increase awareness of problem intersections. Additionally, it can be used to notify of local emergencies and to display such items as Amber Alerts. The goal of all displays is to provide information and to increase public safety.

The Bozeman Police Department embraces its partnership with the Gallatin County DUI Task Force and the benefits this partnership brings in protecting our community.

SBA Awards Grants

SBA Awards \$5 Million in PRIME Grants Funds for finance training and technical assistance to disadvantaged entrepreneurs

Thirty-nine community-based organizations across the United States that provide assistance to disadvantaged entrepreneurs are set to receive \$5 million in grants from the U.S. Small Business Administration's (SBA) Program for Investment in Micro-Entrepreneurs (PRIME). These organizations help low-income entrepreneurs

and expand their small businesses. "By training low-income and disadvantaged micro-entrepreneurs on how to grow their businesses, particularly through the smart use of information technology, the PRIME Program helps small businesses thrive in a 21st century economy," said Administrator Maria Contreras-Sweet, head of the SBA.

"The beauty of PRIME is that it assists small businesses and micro-entrepreneurs to become

lender ready, complementing the roughly \$140 million approved this year through SBA's mission-based lending programs."

This year's 39 recipients come from 16 states, Puerto Rico and the District of Columbia. The grants range from \$35,000 to \$200,000 and typically require at least 50 percent in matching funds or inkind contributions. In total, 104 organizations applied for PRIME awards. The Montana Community Development Corporation in Missoula, MT was one of this vear's recipients.

SBA placed special emphasis in this year's competition on applications for projects utilizing information technology and software to help small businesses start, strengthen and/or grow. Assisting small businesses with the tools needed to implement automated financial accounting, financial reporting, inventory management and webbased marketing and distribution is emerging as an industry best practice among SBA's most successful microlenders.

This year's awards also emphasized organizations participating in SBA's Community Advantage Program. This program provides mission-oriented, non-profit lenders access to SBA's 7(a) loan guarantees to help small businesses that have outgrown microlending but are not able to access more traditional financing, including funding from SBA commercial lending partners. Twenty SBA Community Advantage lenders submitted applications, and 13 were selected for PRIME awards.

PRIME was created by Congress as part of the Program for Investment in microentrepreneurs Act of 1999. Funds become available on September 30 and the grant is for one year.

Senator Steve Daines on Yellowstone Intake Diversion Dam

Senator Steve Daines led the Montana and North Dakota congressional delegations in urging the Army Corps of Engineers (ACE) and Bureau of Reclamation (BOR) to prioritize concerns at the Yellowstone Intake Diversion Dam.

In a letter to Assistant Secretary of the Army for Civil Works Jo-Ellen Darcy and BOR Commissioner Estevan Lopez, the bipartisan delegations emphasized the economic benefit that the dam provides to both Montana and North Dakota. On September 8, a federal judge blocked construction of the planned dam along the Yellowstone River near the Montana-North Dakota border due to environmental concerns.

"We urge ACE and BOR to address the concerns of the Court and conduct the necessary analyses in a timely manner to ensure this essential source of water for farmers, ranchers, and communities throughout much of northeastern Montana and northwestern North Dakota is not unduly disrupted," the Montana and North Dakota congressional delegations wrote.

"This project is critical

to close to four hundred farms and irrigates over 50,000 acres of cropland, and time is of the essence as winter is approaching and inclement weather could further damage existing

infrastructure." The delegations called on the ACE an BOR to quickly address the court's concerns, "As ACE and BOR move forward in addressing the issues

detailed by the Court in granting the injunction, we request ACE and BOR act in as expeditious a manner as possible."

This delegations' letter received support from the Richland County

Commissioners: "The Commissioners from Richland County, Montana want to thank all our congressional delegates from both Montana and North Dakota for standing together on this important issue. Through this non-partisan effort they have

come together to represent all the citizens of eastern Montana and western North Dakota. We are trusting these leaders to come to a workable solution to save the fish and the farmer."
