he Bozeman Bike Week celebration coincides with national Bike to Work Week and takes place between Monday, May 16th and Friday, May 20th. Morning stops will offer complimentary coffee and snacks to cyclists arriving between 7 and 9am. Monday at Rockford on Rouse, Tuesday at Sola Café, Wednesday at Cold Smoke Coffeehouse, Thursday at The Daily on Rouse, and Friday at the Community Food Co-op on 9th. Evening stops will offer \$1 off each pint for cyclists arriving between 5 and 7pm. Monday at Bozeman Brewing Co.,

Tuesday at Bridger Brewing, Wednesday at Outlaw Brewing, Thursday at 406 Brewing Co., and Friday at Map Brewing Co. REI is also hosting an event on Wednesday evening, May 18th, from 4-7pm.

Bike Week is the most celebrated week of the year for cyclists everywhere. It is more than just a jamboree of folks who prefer to commute via bicycle, it is also an opportunity to advocate safe cycling practices and routes, and to encourage alternative transportation to members of this great community. Morning and evening events will be happening all week, and knowledgable volunteers will be available at each stop to offer safe route guidance and answer questions regarding bicycle traffic laws

The Gallatin Valley Bicycle Club, based in Bozeman, is dedicated to providing cycling activities that promote recreation, individual health, education, and advocacy, and encourage a more bicycle friendly community in the Gallatin Valley. The Club supports shared-use trails in appropriate and accessible locations. GVBC was founded in 1978, and is a volunteer, non-profit organization. It sponsors the annual Bike Swap, their biggest volunteer event, which has been a huge success the past couple of years due to the help of club members! Roughly 1000 members donate time, while the club funds help sponsor a number of local organizations and events benefiting

cyclists, such as the Montana Special Olympics, Bike to Work Week, Longest Day of and Trails, the Bike Kitchen, and much more.

The club sponsors a variety of rides and events. For road cyclists, GVBC offers day tours, the annual Three Rivers Century, a new brevet series, a road race training series, and they also serve as an umbrella organization for local race teams. For mountain bikers, the mountain biking arm of GVBC, The Dirt Concern, offers day rides, trail work days, and other fun events. Hear ye, hear ye: Shakespeare in the Parks returns!

Montana Shakespeare in the Parks will perform William Shakespeare's Richard III and The Comedy of Errors during its upcoming summer tour of 61 communities throughout Montana, northern Wyoming, eastern Idaho, western North Dakota, and eastern Washington.

The company features ten professional actors selected from national auditions who tour without technical assistance to bring live theatre to mostly rural communities. This summer, 66 percent of the communities reached by the troupe have populations of 5,000 or fewer.

"We are very much looking forward to producing both plays this summer," said Kevin Asselin, executive artistic director. "This will be the first time in MSIP's 44-year history that we'll bring Richard III to our stage. Richard will fit right into what is already an active political year, reminding us how



Shakespeare stays relevant even 400 years after his death. We are also excited to announce that this season will be dedicated to all of our hard working and dedicated tour coordinators from across the region!"

Asselin will direct Richard III, while Chris Duval, a University of Utah professor with many credits at the Oregon Shakespeare Festival, will direct The Comedy of Errors, which the company hasn't performed since 2002.

All performances, with the exception of those at Bozeman's Sweet Pea Festival, are free and open to the public. Audiences are encouraged to arrive early with chairs, blankets and picnics. Montana Shakespeare in the Parks is an outreach program of Montana State University's College of Arts and Architecture. Grants, corporate sponsorships, and hundreds of individual donors support the free performances.

Richard

III first hits Bozeman at the MSU Duck Ponds, June 15th-18th, with all performances slated to begin at 8pm. The Comedy of Errors

You'll see the MOR paleontology heavy duty trucks and vehicles up close, meet members of Jack's field crews, participate in hands-on activities that highlight his most famous discoveries, and you'll be able to speak with

Jack in person. Please join in for this special tribute to one of the world's greatest scientists, Dr. Jack Horner. Since 1982, Jack Horner has expanded the Museum's threespecimen collection to an internationally recognized, scientifically significant collection of over 35,000 fossils. Along the way, he built the largest paleontology field program in the United States.

MOR will also play host to an Apple Tree Grafting Workshop, Wednesday, May 25th from 6-8pm

in the Redstart Classroom. This course is \$10 for members and \$12 for non-members. Pre-registration is required. Learn how to propagate apple trees! The time tested tech-



niques of fruit tree grafting will be discussed including tools, timing and proper scion and rootstock. Attendees will then utilize what they have learned to "bud" and "whip and tongue" graft different varieties of apple trees onto modern hardy rootstock. This will be a hands-on class. Each participant will be able to take home their own grafted trees to plant on their own property. All the materials and tools will be provided for the workshop. The workshop will be instructed by Toby Day, MSU Extension Horticulturist.



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

MOR humanities center to break ground

The Museum of the Rockies has unveiled plans for its new

Curatorial Center for the Humanities, a 20,000 square foot facility that will house MOR's history, archaeology, Native American, art, and photography collections. The \$4 million project is funded completely with private support. A ceremonial ground-breaking was held on Thursday, April 28th. Actual construction will start in June with occupancy anticipated in eight months.

"We are very grateful to the many donors who are making this project a reality," said MOR, Inc., Board of Trustees member Kath Williams, also a member of the project team. She explained that several large bequests made the project possible. The Board had identified collections storage as its primary strategic goal in 2010 and has been earmarking funds and fundraising since then.

The two-story structure will adjoin the current building along the south wall of the exhibit hall and garage. A new loading dock and freight elevator will solve current problems with large fossil jackets and exhibition crates. Offices for the curators of history, art and photography, and the registrar and staff are included, but more than 13,000 square feet will be dedicated to collections storage and a mezzanine in the upper storey provides additional space. Controlling temperature and humidity levels to prevent fluctuations is one of the design challenges.

Slate Architecture in Helena is designing the building, Morrison Maierle is the project engineer, and Jackson Construction Group is the general contractor. The project is being built under the auspices of MSU's Campus Planning, Design, and Construction group. The building is a registered LEED project.

"It's been a long time coming," said Shelley McKamey, executive director. "Active collecting has been on hold for several years because we were out of space. The plan is to move our cultural history collections into new quarters and renovate the vacated spaces for paleontology collections. Everybody wins."

Museum of the Rockies is both a college-level division of Montana State University and an independent 501(c)(3) nonprofit institution. Accredited by the American Alliance of Museums, MOR is one of just 776 museums to hold this distinction from the more than 17,500 museums nationwide. The Museum is also a Smithsonian Institution affiliate and a federal repository for fossils.





The Bozeman Film Society will begin its spring Jazz Series on Wednesday, May 18th at 7:30pm when Ethan Hawke lights up the screen as jazz legend Chet Baker, whose tumultuous life is thrillingly re-imagined

with wit, verve, and style to burn in **Born to Be Blue.** In the 1950s, Baker was one of the most famous trumpeters in the world, renowned as both a pioneer of the West Coast jazz scene and an icon of cool. By the 1960s, he was all but washed up, his career and personal life in shambles due to years of

heroin addiction. Creatively blending fact with fiction and driven by Hawke's virtuoso performance, Born to Be Blue unfolds with all the stylistic brio and improvisatory genius of great jazz. Peter Traverse of Rolling Stone states, "Everything that makes Ethan Hawke an extraordinary actor-his energy, his empathy, his fearless, vanity-free eagerness to explore the deeper recesses of a character-is on view in Born to Be Blue." The film scored an 88% on Rotten Tomatoes. Rated R, the film runs 98 minutes. Then on Wednesday, May 25th, BFS will present **The Martian**, part of its Science on Screen (SoS) film

ences. "We are excited to highlight local talent through this partnership with scientists and nonprofits," says Lisa McGrory, executive director of the Bozeman Film Society.

The Martian screens at 7pm and features guest speaker Dr. Mac Burgess, MSU Sciences and Plant Pathology. The film is set on Mars, where Astronaut Mark Watney (Matt Damon) is presumed dead after a fierce storm and left behind by his crew. But Watney has survived and finds himself stranded and alone on the hostile planet. With only meager supplies, he must

draw upon his ingenuity, wit, and spirit to subsist and find a way to signal to Earth that he is alive. Millions of miles away, NASA and a team of international scientists work tirelessly to bring "the Martian" home. In his presentation "From Mars to Montana: The Dirty Secret Behind Soil," Dr. Burgess will share the reality of growing food in poor "Martian" soil-and draw a few parallels with soil closer to home. Presents: Hook: 90s Nostalgia to the Max

It seems a bit odd in retrospect, but I saw Hook, Steven Spielberg's 1991 semi-sequel to J.M. Barrie's Peter Pan, before I saw the 50s Disney film or any other incarnation. It hardly effected my engaged enjoyment. Hook is one of a handful of

films occupy an indelible cultural niche for many Millennial viewers such as myself. The film is arguably overstuffed in terms of length, in its optically busy production design (courtesy of Norman Garwood), and in the amount of exposition it seeks to supply. But for many children of the late 80s and early 90s, it is shielded from such criticism because we loved it when we first saw it. The memory of initial exposure to thrilling cinema can be a powerful thing; it's largely how the cult of the Star Wars series has been maintained. The premise for Hook is that Peter Pan grew up, yet its continued fan base is, funnily enough, rooted in associations from childhood.

The late, great Robin Williams stars as Peter Banning, a corporate raider who has long forgotten his origins in Neverland. 92-year-old Granny Wendy (Maggie Smith) still remembers, and, unfortunately, so does his old nemesis Captain Hook (a virtually unrecognizable, delightfully preening Dustin Hoffman). The pirate renegade kidnaps Peter's two young children, forcing him to return to Neverland, with the assistance of Tinkerbell (Julia Roberts). Can Peter Banning learn how to fly and fight again? It's a family oriented Spielberg film, so the answer is never truly in doubt.

The destination isn't the point, it's the wild journey there.

There are heaping doses of escapist delight to be had, particularly in the early sequences on the pirate ship and where Peter meets the Lost Boys again. The requisite "training

montage" was one of my favorite parts as a child (what kid wouldn't have wanted to try out that gigantic slingshot?), as well as the feast full of imaginary food. The moment when Peter can finally "see" all of the fantastical morsels on display, accompanied by the strains of John Williams' melodic, stirring musical score, remains a great moment of imaginative awakening.

The film has crucial grounding in its supporting players, especially Bob Hoskins as Hook's first mate Mr. Smee, the young unknowns who appear as the Lost Boys, and Caroline Goodall as Peter's wife Moira; though absent from a substantial portion of the film, she offers a significant dose of poignant reality to the story. Peter has grown up, and can never be a boy again, even if he can remember how to fly. But even growing up, with its attendant pressures, obligations, and the promise of inevitable mortality, doesn't have to kill the spirit of youth or adventure that lives inside. In light of Mr. Williams' own sad fate, Hook seems all the more important as a testament to its star's youthful vitality and his audience's appreciation of it. 90s nostalgia is certainly a factor, but so is delight in a great performer.

The Middle Kingdom highlights Shanghai

The Bozeman Doc Series and Devolution Films present *The* **Middle Kingdom**, the new film from award-winning Bozeman-based filmmaker Jason Burlage, on Thursday, May 19th beginning at 7pm at the Emerson Center. An immersive documentary filmed in a neighborhood on the outskirts of Shanghai, The Middle Kingdom is a whirlwind view of the struggle for happiness in one of the world's largest cities.

In the space of roughly twenty years, Zhudi Town has transformed from a small farming village in the countryside near Shanghai to a bustling part of the city itself. Thousands of migrant workers have flooded the neighborhood's streets searching for a new life, and most of

the locals have been forced to sell their farmlands and fashion new lives for themselves as well. The film is a portrait of a neighborhood in transition filled with people in transition.

At the center of the film is Mr. Che, a highly respected fortuneteller in the community. As they struggle to find their way in the new China, the people of Zhudi come to Mr. Che to reveal their fears and desires and to seek guidance. Bankers and housewives, rich and poor, young and old look to Mr. Che for a glimpse into their futures.

Through the juxtaposition of the real daily lives of the people of the community of Zhudi and the inner lives they reveal to Mr. Che, The Middle Kingdom paints a complex portrait of modern Chinese society.

The film is intended to be a companion piece to Burlage's first feature documentary, Mi Chacra. Chronicling one year in the life of an indigenous Peruvian family in a small village in the mountains near Cuzco, the film examined the family's desire to leave their traditional life behind to find a better life in the city. Mi Chacra screened at festivals around the world, winning six awards, including the Grand Prize at the 2010 Banff Mountain Film

Book Review "Political Suicide"

258 pages Who will you vote for, come November?

No doubt, you probably know who you're not voting for, but at least one candidate on your party's ticket has captured your attention. does anything to jeopardize that or make you change your mind. In the new book, "Political Suicide" by Erin McHugh, you'll see that all kinds of things can go wrong. Politicians are human.

There are surely times when you'd like to think otherwise, but the truth is that they laugh, they cry, they love - and they do boneheaded things. Their greed gets the better of them. Their egos need stroking, or their tempers take over. Take, for instance, Daniel Sickles. Though the New York State assemblyman was a known philanderer himself, he was furious that his missus enjoyed a dalliance. Sickles killed his wife's lover and went to trial but

pleaded temporary insanity, becom-

ing the first person to successfully be acquitted in that manner. Also lucky was a California Congressman who killed a man over a lack of breakfast; he likewise served no jail time.

Throughout history, there have been many scandalous quirks in politics. One sitting Congressman served his country from an insane asylum. One was re-elected to Congress while in jail. And one notable Congressman told a megawhopper of a lie to gain his seat, then tried to explain it by saying that he was "a prisoner" of his own story.

There's money to be found in politics – although, unfortunately, it doesn't always belong to the politician. That doesn't always stop them from taking the cash, however: one state treasurer who called himself Honest Dick, "in fact, was not." Questionable loans are altogether too common. And imagine the shock when one small town discovered that its comptroller-treasurer "stole \$53 million... money right out of the pockets of her friends and neighbors."

There have been sex scandals aplenty in politics, words that went awry, and a lot of big mouths. Racism has reared its terrible head, as has double-crossing and blamelaying. History repeats itself in contentious elections and Supreme Court nominations. And at least one political "man among men" wasn't a

man at all... Looking for a little levity in the wreckage of this political year? You'll find some between the lines in "Political Suicide," but don't expect belly laughs or goofy stories. No, author Erin McHugh gives readers ots of true (and outrageous!) tales, but the humor comes from the situations themselves more than from the author. McHugh is quick to point out the ridiculousness of what happened but she also puts things into historical and cultural perspective; what's more, her accounts seem sympathetic now and then, especially when naiveté is involved. That gives readers a nice balance of silly, sad, and scandalous. What's not to like about that?

Nothing, that's what - so, White House watchers, voters, fedup folks, and historians should want to read this book. If you need a hint of disgracefully-laden lightheartedness between now and November 8, "Political Suicide" is just the ticket.





Endangered whooping cranes beat the odds

Seeds, Seedlings, Plants & Transplants

This year I started plants in the house, again. I vowed that I'd not do that again, as usually the plants get too tall and leggy before time to plant them outside. But this year I bought some heating mats to put under the travs and it's making a difference. The ground cherries especially need the warmer soil in which to germinate. We'll see how the growing goes and what results I have transplanting them to the garden. There are tomatoes, ground cherries, kale, and lots of flowers. The coleus is really doing great.

Along about the 15th of May—when you'll be reading this—I plan on moving all these small seedlings to the season-extending greenhouse. Moving

them from inside to outside during the day, will get them hardened off. And of course, I'll watch the weather. If a freeze is predicted, I may have to bring them back in the house.

Planting seeds in the garden can begin now for the hardier crops—carrots, peas, beets, greens of all kinds. For more tender crops like squash, cucumber, corn, marigold, zinnia, poppies, better wait a couple weeks.

Here we have a short growing season, with hot days and cool nights. Some plants really enjoy this environment, especially sweet peas and delphinium. When buying seeds, seedlings, trees or shrubs, look for those adapted for our area—zone 4. Buy local from a reputable dealer, rather than the big box stores.

Have a good spring growing season; enjoy these sunny days.

Informative lecture offers grisly details on bear attacks

In an effort to encourage more day hikers to carry bear spray, thereby reducing the potential for harm to both humans and bears, Yellowstone Bear Management Biologist Kerry Gunther will be at Bozeman REI on May 25th to give a talk entitled "Bear Attacks: A Cautionary and Instructive Guide." He will discuss grizzly bear attacks in Yellowstone over the last 46 years, human behaviors that contribute to attacks, attack prevention, how to respond to attacks when they occur, camping in bear country, and how to use bear spray.

In addition to his position as Bear Management Biologist for Yellowstone National Park, Kerry is a member of the Interagency Grizzly Bear Study Team for the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem. He has worked in grizzly bear and black bear research, monitoring, and conflict management in Yellowstone National Park for 33 years. He received his B.S. in biology and earth science from Northland College in Wisconsin, and his M.S. in Fish and Wildlife Management from Montana State University. His interests include the conservation of bears and finding practical solutions for reducing bear-human conflicts. During his career, Kerry has assisted in the investigations of seven fatal and

dozens of non-fatal bear attacks.

REI offers regular classes on staying safe in bear country. Taught by the predator coexistence experts at People and Carnivores on the fourth Wednesday of every month, these classes run from April through October and include a hands-on session with inert bear spray canisters. Kerry's talk on May 25th is in lieu of the monthly bear talk by P&C. It starts at 6:30pm and is free and open to the public. Registration is suggested for all REI classes and events to ensure seating. Visit rei.com/bozeman/ to register and for further information. •

With summer nearly here...sunscreen

We've patiently waited for the return of those eternal afternoons playing at the Bozeman Beach, exploring Hyalite Canyon, barbecuing in the back yard, splashing at the water park, and enjoying a cold one on the deck. And with summer nearly here, it's time to closet the coats and bring on the mini skirts, short shorts, tank tops, and bikinis.

Which equals a whole lot of bare skin... ooo la la!

As most of us know, skin cancer is the most common form of cancer in the United States and is thought to be the result of overexposure to radiation from the sun. Each year, over two million people are diagnosed — more than the combined number of cases of breast, prostate, lung, and colon cancer. It is estimated that one in five Americans will develop skin cancer during the course of their life.

Despite these startling statistics, sunlight is a great and wondrous

thing essential to our health and well-being. Sunscreen-free sun exposure is essential to optimizing your levels of vitamin D — but it is important to get this exposure in smart, limited ways. If you are heading out to worship the sun gods for a length of time, take precautions. For those particularly prone to sunburns, consider covering up with light layers and wearing sun hats or billed caps.

But baby, if you are intent on baring it all, consider the following sunscreen hints and tips.

First off, don't be willy-nilly when picking out your sunscreen at the supermarket. Sunscreens are not created equal! Choose a water resistant sunscreen that has an SPF above 30 and provides broad-spectrum coverage against both UVA and UVB rays. Know your sunscreen lingo — SPF means sun protection factor and refers only to the level of protection from UVB radiation — the radiation that causes sunburns. It will not protect

you from UVA rays — a radiation that causes skin cancer and skin aging.

Next, don't use sunscreen powders or towelettes, as they are nearly useless as sun protection. Avoid spray-on sunscreen, as it is easy to inhale, which poses health risks. Avoid sunscreen with Retinyl palmitate, which has been shown to speed the growth of skin tumors. Skip sunscreen-bug repellent combos. Sunscreen should be reapplied every two hours, but the chemicals in bug repellent should not! And please, skip the tanning bed and oil — unless you want to look like a leather bag when you're forty.

Apply your sunscreen before you put on your swimwear or clothing. It is very easy to miss the areas around the sleeves and hems of garments. Don't forget easy-tomiss areas like the back of the neck, shoulders, and knees; ears and nose; and the tops of the feet and hands. Apply generously and

let it soak in for at least fifteen minutes prior to going outside. Remember to reapply every two hours, and more often if swimming or sweating.

Yellowstone's Pronghorn need help

The National Parks Conservation Association will present **Celebrating Yellowstone's Pronghorn** on Wednesday, June 1st in the Large Community Room of the Bozeman Public Library beginning at 7pm.

National parks provide refuge for much of our nation's wildlife. However, many species of wildlife need to migrate beyond park borders to reach important habitat in order to thrive. For centuries, Yellowstone's pronghorn have migrated from summer habitat inside the park to critical wintering grounds north of the park. Unfortunately, over the last half-century, development and increased fencing along this critical migration route have impacted the long-term survival of this iconic herd.

Unlike elk, pronghorn do not readily jump and often turn back when confronted with fences.

However, pronghorn pass easily

under altered fences.

Through its pronghorn program, NPCA works to re-establish winter migration habitat for Yellowstone's pronghorn antelope. Since 2010, NPCA has been working with private landowners, public land managers, and hundreds of volunteers to remove or modify fences that once restricted pronghorn migration, allowing this species to thrive again.

What is green building?

This is part 6 of 6 articles that aims to demystify the popular jargon used within the green building industry.

According to the 2013 U.S. Census, the average newly constructed single-family American house is 2,598 square feet, hitting a new square footage record. As of 2014, "smaller homes, of 1,400 square-feet and less, [represent] 4% of homes built" and "extremely large houses, 4,000 square feet and up... account for more than 9% of new homes. [...] Houses that are a little smaller but still verging on mansion territory, those between 3,000 and 4,000 square feet, made up 21.7% of new homes in 2013."

Not to be confused with "Tiny Houses," **smaller homes** are moderately-sized homes that use less of the construction budget on square-footage and instead focus that money on quality design, quality materials, and/or energy-efficiency strategies. Smaller homes typically consume less energy and use few construction materials than larger homes and therefore are generally more energy-efficient and green by default. "The U.S. Energy Information Administration says homes of 2,000 to 2,500 square feet use an average 102.3 million BTUs of fuel yearly-13% less than homes that are 1,000 square feet larger." Terms to smaller house may include simplified home, down-sized home, or "Not So Big House."

LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) certification is a rating system for the design and construction of green buildings that is managed by the U.S. Green Building Council, a private non-profit organization. The owner, designer, or contractor of a building can pay a fee to have their structure approved by the organization and achieve levels of certification ranging from "LEED Certified" to "LEED Platinum." LEED buildings are designed and built to provide environmental and economic benefits and requirements may include the use of recycled materials, energy efficiency, renewable energy, water conservation, etc. Additionally, building professionals themselves can choose to become LEED Certified after paying a fee and taking an exam.

Energy Star is an EPA (Environmental Protection Agency) rating program for energy-efficient consumer products such as computers, electronics, appliances, lighting, heating and cooling systems, and new homes. Products with the Energy Star label "generally use 20-30% less energy than required by federal standards." A product can be Energy Star Certified after meeting energy efficiency standards and having it tested by a licensed professional (testing is paid for by the manufacturer of the product).







The Interview

Natural elements key to folk pianist's virtuosity

Master folk pianist **George Winston** is returning to Bozeman for a one-night-only concert event in benefit of local nonprofit Hopa Mountain. This benefit concert will feature Winston's Summer Show, including spring and summer songs, melodic folk piano songs from his recordings, Vince Guaraldi's Peanuts pieces, and songs inspired by the New Orleans R&B piano tradition and the Harlem stride piano tradition. In anticipation of his upcoming Emerson show, The Rolling Zone was able to catch Winston during his westbound drive to talk music, the listener experience, and the changing of the seasons. **RZ:** Hey George. How's your

day going? **GW:** Good, good. On the way to Montana from Virginia.

RZ: How's the drive going? **GW:** Great! I like the long drives a lot. I was working in the studio in Richmond and just [got] on the road right now.

RZ: Well you've got a little way yet, but that should give you plenty of time to prepare for your upcoming shows.

GW: I've got a couple of things to do on the way, then I'm playing there on the 18th at the Emerson. I've been many times, over

RZ: Bozeman's got some people excited to see your show. **GW:** Yeah, it's great to be back. The

benefit group I worked with last time-they're great.

RZ: You've labeled your music "rural folk piano." How does this style differ from the "classical" genre many may want to classify you as being a part of? GW: Oh I've never played any clas-

sical European. I started out on an

organ when I was eighteen and heard The Doors. About four years later, I heard "Fats" Waller's piano recordings of the 20s and 30s. So I started with stride piano (Fats' style) and I wanted something that was the opposite that was slow and melodic and simple-like folk songs. So I came up with that style on the piano. I said, "Ok. I've got stride and I've got folk." Folk guitar and folk songs [add] a rural sensibility and the stride piano has an urban sensibility more. Then eight years later I started playing New Orleans rhythm and blues. So if a song works out, I play one of three ways. If it's a slow tune, I'll do it folk-style. If it's a fast tune, I would call that R&B style. I'm basically a song player, whether it's someone else's or one

I've put together. **RZ:** That's a really interesting way to play piano. A lot of people seem to be receptive of your style.

GW: You really have to hear it.

Everything is different for every person. It really is not an objective reality. It really depends on the listener. **RZ:** What advice can you give to those who want to best appreciate and enjoy your music? What is the best way to absorb and experience this variety of instrumental?

Autumn. I've also done a couple albums of Vince Guaraldi (known for his pieces from the *Peanuts* TV specials). [He and the Doors are] of the composers I've endeavored to play everything they ever did. I've recorded everything for Volume III of Vince Guaraldi. That'll maybe be out this year. Everybody has heard those soundtracks. Vince is a great





Celebrate our trails with other volunteers

Each year, Gallatin Valley Land Trust volunteers celebrate **National Trails Day** by helping build and maintain the *Main Street to the Mountains* trail system. This year, volunteers will be working on trails at the new Bozeman Pond Park, bringing to a close a multi-year effort to create a truly unique urban park on Bozeman's rapidly growing west side. 

New head coach Jeff Choate continued his quest to add talent and depth to his first Montana State football squad, signing 11 new recruits, including seven players from the state of Montana.

Choate added good balance to his squad by adding five offensive players, five defensive players and one special teams ace.

Of the five offensive players, three played quarterback in high school, led by Kamden Brown, a Covina, California recruit who threw for 2,749 yards and 31 touchdowns in leading his squad to a 12-2 record last fall. MSU is short on quarterback depth after the transfers of Dakota Prukop and Jordan Hoy off of last season's squad. MSU also added depth on the offensive line, signing a pair of big men, including Luke Channer who



was an all-conference performer this past fall at Corvallis High School in Corvallis, MT.

Choate and crew also added some beef to the defensive line, an area Choate identified as a need, by signing a couple of in-state recruits to man the trenches. Linemen Denver Krone earned all-state honors on offense and defense at Augusta High, and Kyle Murack was a standout at Conrad

The Bobcats also looked to the future in special teams by locking up talented kicker, Gabriel Peppenger of Missoula Sentinel, who was the Class AA All-State kicker last fall,

Lady 'Cat Hoop Recruit **Offered Prestigious Invite**

If you win, they will come. May as well be the mantra of

every college basketball coach from Seattle to Tallahassee, and Montana State is no different.

Fresh off their 2016 Big Sky Conference regular season championship, the Lady 'Cats have been able to land talent to replace departing seniors Lindsay Stockton, Alexa Dawkins and Jasmine Hommes, but no recruit can boast the credentials of incoming freshman, Oliana Squires of Colorado Springs, Colorado. That's because Squires was recently extended an invitation to participate in the 2016 U18 National Team Trials at the United States Olympic Center later this month. Squires was one of 27 girls invited to tryout for one of the 12 spots on the United States U18 team that will participate in the 2016 FIBA Americas Championships July 13-17 in Valdivia, Chile.

With the invitation, Squires becomes the first, and only, Montana State women's basketball recruit to be invited to tryout with the United States National Team program, an honor head coach Trisha Binford was quick to point out. "This is such an incredible recognition not only for Oliana but for our program's first athlete to be selected to USA trials," said MSU head coach Tricia Binford. "We knew Oliana was talented and this invite recognizes her abilities. We are so happy for her to get this opportunity to compete against the best, and whatever the outcome, it will only pay dividends to her basketball future and development."

The competition at the trials will be fierce with 14 players already boasting Team USA basketball experience, including a pair of gold medal winners from the 2015 FIBA U19 World Championships in Lauren Cox and Crystal Dangerfield. Cox is headed to Baylor as the No. 1 recruit in the country, while Dangerfield, a UConn Husky commit, is considered the No. 3 recruit.

"There is a strong group of returning athletes that will benefit from the additional opportunities. We also have a strong group of firsttime participants," said Jim Foster (Tennessee-Chattanooga), chair of the USA Basketball Women's Junior National Team Committee, which is responsible for issuing the invitations to participate in trials.

Squires, who played her high school ball at Sand Creek High School in Colorado Springs, participated in the 2016 USA Basketball 3X3 U18 National Tournament. •

MSU Bobcats Land New AD

Following an about-face from the Montana State University Selection Committee's first choice for director of athletics, the Bobcats have finally landed their man with the hiring of


Costello comes to Montana State from South Dakota State University, where he has served in the athletic department since 2010, the past two as senior associate athletic director overseeing the volleyball, men's basketball and wrestling programs.

Costello, a Fairbank, Iowa native, was one of five original finalists for the top job in the Bobcat athletic department, coming to Bozeman for an on-campus interview the first week of May, but he was passed over for Kyle Brennen, deputy athletic director at the University of Utah who was offered the job on May 2nd. However, Brennen had a change of heart about coming to Bozeman, and Montana State University president, Waded Cruzado, wasted little time in reaching out to Costello to offer him the position.

"When I got the call today (May 10th), it was a little bit like deja vu it was just surreal. It's unbelievable the way things kind of work out," said Costello. "When you don't get the job the first time around, you're disappointed because you put yourself in that position a little bit, but you know it's still an incredible opportunity for whoever was going to get the job."

Costello brings a wealth of experience at the FCS level with him to Bozeman having served at SDSU for the past six years. The Jackrabbits defeated the Bobcats in the 2014 FCS football playoffs on the snow-covered turf at Bobcat Stadium, so Costello is familiar with what Montana State offers in terms of successes and challenges. "There's not the Power Five money, the TV money, there's not any of that, so we've got to go out and generate (revenue) on our own ... In

order to be in a community like this, the size that it is, and in order to move the mountains that we need to, we've got to be working together.





We've got to have community support and the support within our own internal operations."

Costello has demonstrated an ability to kick-start programs to improve the athletic department,

particularly at his last stop, where he oversaw record revenue increases in ticket sales, sponsorships and donations. Costello spearheaded a

\$57 million dollar campaign which led to the construction of the \$32 million Jackrabbit Athletic Complex, and SDSU is nearing completion of a new \$63 million dollar Dana J. Dykhouse football stadium.

But aside from his fundraising astuteness, Costello is happy to be coming to Bozeman because of the fit with his family. "The real big thing was ... we saw ourselves fitting in there," Costello said. "For me, there was never a doubt. We felt really good about it two weeks ago, and feel the same way now. It's a great place with huge potential."

Costello, who will make \$185,000 annually doesn't officially begin his reign until July 1st (Peter Fields contract expires June

30th), but chances are he will be up and running well before then. Danny Waldo is a local freelance
