#### Marjorie Prime & improv comedy for all at Verge Theatre

Verge Theater continues its lively season of hilarious antics with some great shows and performances! Here's a look at what's happening this month.

Bozeman Actors Theatre, in cooperation with Verge Theater, will present Montana's first fully staged production of "Marjorie Prime" in February and March at Verge Theater.

The critically acclaimed play by Jordan Harrison, nephew of the late Montana novelist and poet Jim Harrison

(Legends of the Fall), completed its successful run Off Broadway in 2015 and was a finalist for that year's Pulitzer Prize for Drama. Set in the unspecified but oddly familiar

future, the story takes place in the household of an average middleaged couple, Tess and Jon, played by Cara Wilder and Gordon Carpenter, who share their home with Tess' 85year-old mother, Marjorie (Dee Dee Van Zyl). Also present is Walter (Ryan Lawrence Flynn), a thirtysomething holographic representa-tion, or "prime," of Marjorie's late husband, programmed to collect and sort Marjorie's fading memories. With gentle humor and subtle yet poignant insight, the play confronts issues of aging, death, memory loss, and identity. "I was fascinated by the themes

of the play on my first reading, as it offers food for thought on so many levels," said Wilder, who is also artistic director for Bozeman Actors Theatre. "It's spare, simple storytelling tackling some very profound subjects."

Bozeman Actors Theatre's mission, Wilder said, is to provide pro-

fessional-quality and adventurous live theater to the community through a mix of contemporary and classical productions. In November, the group presented a staged reading of Edward Albee's ageless masterpiece Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf? at MSU's Black Box Theatre. Now, with Marjorie Prime, under the direction of Tonya Andrews, the ensemble brings to Bozeman a domestic drama of an entirely different sort.

Some of these crucial services include: monthly visits from RNs; weekly assistance with essential shopping, laundry, light meal preparation and light housekeeping; and one-on-one assistance to navigate community and HRDC resources/ applications, affordable housing, energy assistance, financial counseling, transportation service, volunteer opportunities, and food security.

#### **Book Review:** *Silver City*

The only ൗററർ thing about it was the frontier Mountain Home, Arizona, to be specific-was where that same woman lived now, and Gabrielle was willing to give him another chance. He'd just fought a ferocious battle against the Indians at Adobe Walls, and fighting left him more settled now, more mature and less impulsive. McLendon was sure he could win his lady back. Patrick Brautigan knew the rules. He understood that businessman Rupert Douglass didn't want any laws broken. No fuss, just efficiency

when evening a score or taking nge lt's that the Boss de ed, just like he demanded that Cash McLendon hauled back to St. Louis Years ago, McLendon married Douglass' only daughter and when she committed suicide, Douglass blamed McLendon. If Brautigan succeeded in bringing McLendon back alive, and in a timely manner, Douglass might even let him watch McLendon die. But catching McLendon wouldn't be easy. The man was sociable and always surrounded by people, so Brautigan had to hire help in the form of Ike Clanton, who flapped his gums too much. Even so, Clanton could take Brautigan through Apache country, to Mountain View from Silver City, a lawless and corrupt new settlement where Brautigan had recently arrived to study the situation. Brautigan figured that capturing McLendon would surely be easier if McLendon's woman was taken first. Capturing McLendon and getting him back to Silver City, however, would be a whole different matter...Every time a western cycles to the top of my reading list, I realize anew how much I love them-although Silver City, set in the late 1870s, is a puzzler. Though you could read it by itself, its characters have been featured in past books and, as such, author Jeff Guinn spends too much time explaining their backstory here. That gets to awfully wordy and pretty tiresome. Cash McLendon is a good-enough hero, although not scruffy enough for my tastes: he's too clean-cut, too goshdarn nice, a bit of a dandy. To the good, however, Guinn gives readers a good chase up and through the Arizona desert, an exciting fight with a young Geronimo and his men, and a scrappy new heroine with a definite mind of her own-which is not a bad thing. Overall, neither is this book: it's got its flaws, but it's also got its moments. Ignore the former, revel in the latter, and Silver City is where you should be going. •

#### What's Eating Gilbert Grape: The Double Bind of Family

The Swedish director Lasse Hallström often gravitates toward stories about families and the challenges they face. At his best, such as his feature debut My Life as a Dog (1985) and the Oscar-nominated The Cider House Rules (1999) and Chocolat (2000), Hallström can evoke what is typically dis-

missed as "dysfunction" with tender sympathy and insight. If the script isn't well wrought, this instinct for sympathy can tilt over into schmaltz. What's Eating Gilbert Grape (1993) is one of

Hallström's best films, and much of the credit goes to screenwriter Peter Hedges, adapting his own novel to the screen. It is a tragicomic, deeply humane consideration of how personal happiness can take a back-

seat to family responsibility, and the challenges inherent in forming a life of one's

Fortunately, the performances form an essential foundation of authenticity, allowing viewers to connect with these people. Johnny Depp, in the post-Pirates of the Caribbean stage of his career, is sometimes written off as being distractingly "weird" in every role. Gilbert Grape is a stunning counter-example. Depp makes Gilbert a

> quiet, self-contained island of sanity, his strength only occasionally ruptured when long suppressed sorrow or anger bubbles to the surface, as they do in a few key moments in the film. Leonardo DiCaprio is almost unrecognizable as Arnie. Only nineteen at the time (and nominated for a Best Supporting Actor Oscar), DiCaprio succeeds not only in presenting an accurate depiction of mental retarda-

tion, but in the more formidable task of creating a real character with feelings and per-







In 1979, James Baldwin wrote a letter to his literary agent describing his next project, *Remember This House.* The book was to be a revolutionary, personal account of the lives and successive assassinations of three of his close friends-Medgar Evers, Malcolm X, and Martin Luther King, Jr. At the time of Baldwin's death in 1987, he left behind only thirty completed pages of his manuscript.

Now, in his incendi-

ary new documentary, master filmmaker Raoul Peck envisions the book James Baldwin never finished. The result is a radical, up-to-the-minute examination of race in America, using Baldwin's original words and flood of rich archival material. I Am Not Your Negro is a journey into black history that connects the past of the Civil Rights movement to the present of Black Lives Matter. It is a film that questions black repre-

sentation in Hollywood and beyond. And, ultimately, by confronting the deeper connections between the lives and assassination of these three leaders, Baldwin and Peck have produced a work that challenges the very definition of what America stands for.

One of the most critically-acclaimed documentaries of the year, and currently nominated for the Best Documentary Oscar, I Am Not Your Negro world-premiered at the 2016 Toronto International Film Festival and has gone on to win several major awards at film festivals around the world.

Juliette Lewis gives Becky a kind and embraceable presence, while also serving as a something of a foil to Gilbert. To a person bound to a particular place and a particular group of people, being able to travel wherever you want seems like an impossible dream.

But that may be the core truth in What's *Eating Gilbert Grape*: everyone is living the story of their life, and whatever directions it may take, the story remains their own. The people in our life shape us, but an individual is still the primary author.

### Body acceptance, gendered professionalism & human trafficking at Montana State University

The MSU Women's Center will present a pair of programs in the coming weeks to keep you informed and inspired during this chilly season.

Sack Lunch Seminar *Improving Body Acceptance of Self and Others: The Montana Research* will be held on Wednesday, February 22nd from noon–1pm in SUB 168.

In observation of National Eating Disorders Week, Lynn Paul (EdD, RDN, MSU Extension Food and Nutrition Specialist) and Galen Eldridge (Strong Hearts Montana Research Associate) will present this program on improving body acceptance among females. Poor body image impacts health by leading to eating disorders, eating less healthfully, and reduced self-esteem and self-worth. A parent/only child obesity prevention program in Montana resulted in reduced body dissatisfaction and improvements in body esteem and appearance attitudes for the 8-12-year-old children. In a study of rural Montana adults participating in the Strongwomen Strength Training program, women improved their body image after the 10-week twice-weekly program. As a result of these programs, Montana children and women improved thoughts about their appearance and body. Children also

decreased their endorsement of societal appearance ideals.

#### **Recycling Education Trunks are available to borrow**

Four public libraries throughout Gallatin County are now outfitted with **recycling education trunks** that can be borrowed just like a regular book. The trunks are part of Gallatin Solid Waste Management District's outreach and education program to teach county residents about recycling and waste diversion. A library card is all that is needed to take home a trunk from the public library in Belgrade, Bozeman, Manhattan, or Three Forks.

Trunks include classroom curricula, activities, books, and local resources for recycling, as well as hands-on items to demonstrate how recyclables are collected and transformed into new products. Anyone is welcome to borrow a trunk, but they are especially geared towards K–12 teachers, home school educators, scout groups, and community clubs. Rob Pudner, Recycling Outreach Educator with GSWMD says the trunks are modeled after similar kits used at Exploration Works! science center in Helena.

"These types of trunks are in use all across

the country by solid waste districts, providing educators with extra resources that work with their busy schedules. The lessons included in the trunk, combined with hands-on items, provide new ways to approach science education while promoting natural resource conservation through waste diversion."

The abstract idea that Americans each generate 4.5 pounds of trash daily becomes more tangible when holding the included bag of the same weight. Plastic bottles in different stages of deconstruction and remanufacturing offer a glimpse into the complicated world of resource recovery. Pudner is excited to see how the community utilizes the trunks and emphasizes that they will be updated periodically with current information and additional tools as the program grows. # Join the 2017 Great **Backyard Bird Count**

The 20th annual Great **Backyard Bird Count** (GBBC) will take place Friday through Tuesday, February 17th-21st. This is a joint project of the Cornell Lab of Ornithology, Bird Studies Canada, and the National Audubon Society, while Wild Birds Unlimited is a sponsor for the international event. Wild Birds Unlimited of Bozeman, a local backyard bird feeding and nature spe-

cialty store, as well as a sponsor for the event, is encouraging the public to get involved in this international project.

Participating individuals, families, schools, and organizations are encouraged to count birds at bird feeders and in backyards, local

parks, or other locations. Those tallies are then reported online through the www.eBird.org OR www.bird**count.org** websites. Scientists then use that data to analyze bird populations, migration patterns, habitat needs and identify birds at risk of becoming endangered.

To participate, birders should watch birds for at least 15 minutes at the location of their choice on one or more of the count days. They are to estimate the number of birds they see for each species they can identify. Participants select their location on a map, answer a few questions, enter their tallies, and then submit that data to share their sightings with others around the world.

The data for the count will be powered by "eBird," an online checklist program for all of the world's 10,240 bird species. Birders can view what others see on interactive maps, keep their own records, and have their tallies recorded. Because of the GBBC's partnership with eBird, this year marks the first

time that the annual study is open to bird watchers worldwide who wish to participate.

On Friday, February 17th at noon, Lou Ann Harris (serving as Vice President on the Sacajawea Audubon Board) will be giving a short presentation on "Winter Feeder Birds In Our Area" to help us identify the birds we count. She will also review the process to par-

ticipate in the GBBC and answer any questions you may have. The event will be sponsored at the Bozeman Wild Birds Unlimited Store. Local Participants in the GBBC will be eligible to participate in a drawing to win a prize from Wild Birds Unlimited, one prize to be given out each of the four days. Eligible participants for the drawing will be derived from everyone who logged on to eBird the previous day and submitted their count.

In conjunction with Sacajawea Audubon on Saturday, February 18th, there will be a beginner's hike at Lewis & Clark Caverns. It will depart at 9:30am and is designed to help beginners identify birds. More information on this hike can be found www.saca-

#### **USFS & MDEQ seek comment** on exploratory drilling

The United States Forest Service and Montana Department of Environmental Quality are providing an opportunity for *public* review and comment on the Environmental Assessment for Stillwater Mining Company's Iron Creek and West Fork Stillwater Plan of Operations for Mineral Exploration.

This Plan of Operations proposes exploratory drilling at up to thirty-six drill sites over a six year period in the Iron Creek area and a single drill site in the area of the West Fork of the Stillwater River. The purpose of the exploratory drilling is to evaluate the platinum group metal potential between the Stillwater and East Boulder Mines. Exploration activities are proposed on the Beartooth and Yellowstone Ranger Districts of the Custer Gallatin National Forest. The Iron Creek drill sites would be located on the Beartooth Plateau between the West Fork of the Stillwater River and the East Boulder River about 12 miles west of Nye, Montana. Road access to the project area is provided by the Picket Pin/Iron Mountain Road #2140 and the Horseman Flat/West Fork Stillwater Road #2846.

The Iron Creek drill sites would be helicopter supported with limited use of existing roads. The West Fork Stillwater site would be supported with ground-based vehicles using West Fork Stillwater Road #2846. Drill sites would be located at least 200 feet from surface waters and best management practices would be implemented to minimize erosion and surface water runoff. Areas impacted by exploration activities would be reclaimed. The drills would be operated 24 hours per day, 7 days a week, requiring 20 to 25 people working in the area from

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# "The Valley of Flowers" – a short history

In the time-honored tradition of their ancestors, the warriors met on the battlefield in the beautiful valley of Bridger Canyon. The Nez Perce arriving from the west and the Blackfoot from the east paved the way for those members of their own tribes to pass through the valley in order to hunt in the Yellowstone or trap in the Snake River plains.

The battle raged for two days, but on the third, a phenomenon occurred that would forever change the face of the land. While in deadly combat, darkness overspread the sun and a strange noise seemed to come from the heavens. A sweet voice was heard singing and a white flame appeared on the top of the mountain, since called Mount Bridger. The flame settled on "Maiden Rock," where the figure of a maiden was seen as the darkness disappeared.

In a strange language all seemed to understand, she said, "Warriors, children of the Great Spirit, sheathe the hatchet and unstring the bow. Shed not the blood of your brothers here, lest it mingle with yonder foaming water and defile the Valley of Flowers below. There must be no war in the Valley of Flowers; all must be peace, rest, and love. The Spirit Maiden has spoken the words of the Great Spirit."

John Richau, a French-Indian who was an experienced guide and trapper familiar with the customs and languages of several Montana tribes, retold this story. John lived and worked in Montana during the time when the Montana Territory was operated through Virginia City, the political and economic epicenter of the Territory before it achieved statehood in 1889.

Before the Louisiana Purchase, before the white man arrived to conquer and resettle the land, before Lewis and Clark arrived to catch the first glimpse of this world, the Nez Perce tribe called the Pacific Northwest home. The extent of their territory was approximately 17 million acres that covered present day Washington, Oregon, Idaho, and the western base of the

River. The Blackfoot tribe relocated from the Great Lakes area about 10,000 years before and settled primarily in present day Alberta, Canada, throughout Northwestern Montana, and somewhat east into the Dakotas.

Rocky Mountains to the Columbia

Montana had been discovered, and a slow progression of people arrived for a variety of reasons. The abundance of natural resources, particularly gold, brought miners and trappers such as

John Richau who learned how to make a life for themselves with the natives. Bozeman was defining itself as a town full of forward-thinking intellectuals who wanted to make a new life for themselves free of the restraints of civilization. President Benjamin Harrison declared

Montana the 41st state in the union in 1889, and civilization imparted its wisdom upon Montana and the Gallatin Valley.

The turn of the 20th century saw the Gallatin Valley as a thriving town, boasting a successful industry of Sweet Peas that were harvested for both canning and seed. By the 1920s, Bozeman produced approximately 75% of all seed peas in the United States. We became known, therefore, as the Sweet Pea capitol of the nation. To celebrate this fact and to promote the area, local business owners began a Sweet Pea carnival, which included a carnival, parade, and queen contest, and the Sweet Pea flower became the symbol of the festival. The celebration was overtaken with the pain of the Depression, and the loss of life in every sense of the word of World Wars. Consequently, prosperity returned after a period of time that heals all wounds, and in 1977, the Sweet Pea concept was revived as an arts festival rather than a harvest celebration.

The beauty of the plant life was

not lost on the new settlers, and the term "Valley of Flowers" came to define this very special place in Montana. However, the Natives utilized the plants growing in abundance for millennia as food and medicine. Take a walk through Burke Park, Linear Park, and Peets Hill and you may recognize some of your favorite foods and flowers, like wild raspberry bushes whose fruit is rich in Vitamins A, B, C, E, and traditionally taken for indiges-



tion and rheumatism. Wild asparagus, onions, silky lupine, wild roses, and bluebells abound in this fertile valley.

Hidden among the flowers though are medicinal herbs such as Balsam Root, Arnica, Yarrow, Flax, and many others like Pokeroot which is used as a heart stimulant, Purple cone flower, currently being utilized in AIDS therapy, and Stinging Nettle which is a Spring Tonic that stimulates blood circulation and is astringent and diuretic.

The human compulsion to explore the possibilities that may exist on the other side of the hill has moved humankind forward since the expulsion from the Garden of Eden. The impact of a culture making its mark upon the peoples who have created their own utopia is powerful and poignant. Such is the case with the Blackfoot and Nez Perce tribes of long ago. Native tribes in the United States were moved onto reservations and the land was divided to create states containing ranches and towns. The drive to survive in this new world caused the native peoples to establish a new set of boundaries that were much less about the land upon which they lived, but upon the strength of the human spirit within 2011. Before the influx of the white man, initiated by the exploration of Lewis and Clark, the Nez Perce occupied 17 million acres in the present day Pacific Northwest states of Washington, Oregon, and Idaho.



each heart to overcome the control the incoming peoples wanted to exercise over their lives.

Today, the Blackfoot nation boasts four tribes amounting to 25,000 members, three of which live in Alberta, Canada. The remaining tribe in the United States (known stateside as Blackfeet) lives in the Northwestern portion of Montana near Browning. The Piegan tribe is the largest in Montana with 17,320 members, and 7,000 living on or near the reservation. The tribe has established a constitution and is self-governing. They have established their own Tribal Business and Council, a Community College, and maintain their own language, Algonquin, by teaching it in their schools. The website they have designed enables the visitor to read about their legends, learn the Algonquin language, and explore their art. The longterm goal is to establish a 4-year teaching degree to reservation residents without leaving the reservation.

The Nez Perce tribe, the "Children of Coyote," currently boasts 3,500 tribal members according to the last census taken in The famous last words of Chief Joseph, "From where the sun now stands, I will fight no more forever," surrendering to the cavalry in 1877, submitted his freedom to the newcomers.

The Nez Perce reservation is now located in Idaho, bordering Washington State with headquarters in Lapwai, Idaho. The tribal connection to the rest of the world is accomplished in different directions, including a restoration plan for salmon, sturgeon, and lamprey in the waters close to home. They have established their own government, laws, and police enforcement of those laws. They integrate their own cultural beliefs with the rest of the world by involving themselves in discussions regarding the Public Review of a new Energy Plan, their Department of Technology Services, and by educating the public in their native language.

Progress cannot occur without the intervention of individuals who represent a new civilization. Mutual respect, and seeing the best in one another's intentions requires a willingness to examine our own motives and the direction our lives take based upon those motives. •

management policies. "The future of grizzly bears rests with each and every one of us. We can choose to coexist with these majestic animals on the landscape with respect and compassion, rather than fear and hostility. Finding ways to accommodate grizzly bears and coexist peacefully is really the only way to ensure the long-term health not just of and so that I might inspire others to care."

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is expected to issue a final decision on whether or not to remove endangered species protections from grizzly bears in the Yellowstone region in the coming months.

Following MSU's public presentation and reception for Miguel Fraga, first secretary of the Cuban Embassy, a benefit concert with local African and Cuban Latin jazz group BoZambique will be presented at the Cikan Residence on Friday, February 24th at 7pm. Fraga will offer greetings to those in attendance. Doors open at 6:30pm and beverages will be available. Tax deductible donations of \$15-\$20 will fund community education programs about Cuba.

BoZambique covers songs that came out of Ghana and West Africa between the late '60s and early '80s. The music from this time period was originally inspired by the Delta Blues, R&B, and American rock 'n' roll of the '60s and '70s that migrated through the UK and, in turn, was adopted by West African musicians mixing the electric sounds of the guitar, organ, and brass with the organic African rhythms played on traditional drums.

Since many of these rhythms originally

emanated out of Africa and traveled with slavery through the Caribbean, Cuba, and Brazil,

BoZambique adapts the feel of their own North American rhythm and blues with the



dynamic feel and grooves of mozambique, rhumba, son, mambo, samba, and bossa nova into originals, as well as other latin jazz standards. With a variety of time signatures and tempos played on cajon, wood block. bells, congas, tambora, and shakaree, you will hear smooth melodic lines played on sax and flute backed by rhythm and leads on electric guitar supported down low-surprisingly deep and warm—by a ukulele bass. These are the sounds of BoZambique.

BoZambique is comprised of Loren Block (Uke bass), Aaron Banfield (guitar), Matt Sloan (saxophone), Jelani Mahiri (percussion), and Doug Wales (congas).

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# The Interview

# Soulful music industry veteran utilizes universal language to unite, inspire

The artist whose sound is elevated by what *Rolling Stone* calls a "soul marinated voice" comes through Bozeman for what will surely be an excellent night of friends, family, and contagious live music.

A native of Syracuse, New York, and the tenth of 12 children, Martin Sexton grew up in the '80s. Uninterested in the music of the day, he fueled his dreams with the timeless sounds of classic rock 'n' roll. As he discovered the dusty old vinyl left in the basement by one of his big brothers, his musical fire was lit. Sexton eventually migrated to Boston, where he began to build a following singing on the streets of Harvard Square, gradually working his way through the scene. His 1992 collection of self-produced demo recordings, In the Journey, was recorded on an old 8-track in a friend's attic. He managed to sell 20,000 copies out of his guitar case.

From 1996 to 2002, Sexton released *Black Sheep*, *The American*, *Wonder Bar* and *Live Wide Open*. The activity and worldwide touring behind these records laid the foundation for the career he enjoys today with an uncommonly loyal fan base. Sexton sells out venues from New York's Nokia Theatre to L.A.'s House of Blues, and tours regularly across Canada and Europe.

Happily and fiercely independent, Martin Sexton launched his own label, KTR, in 2002. Since then he has infiltrated many musical worlds, performing at concerts ranging from pop (collaborating with John Mayer) to the Jam scene to classic rock (collaborating with Peter Frampton), from the Newport Folk Fest to Bonnaroo to New Orleans Jazz Fest to a performance at Carnegie Hall.

Regardless of his reputation as a musician's musician, Sexton can't keep Hollywood away. His songs can be heard in many feature films and television including NBC's Scrubs, Parenthood and Showtime's hit series Brotherhood and Masters of Sex. Stage, film, and television aside, when Sexton isn't touring he often mixes entertainment with his sense of social responsibility, performing at benefits for Paul Newman's Hole in the Wall Gang camp, the Children's Tumor Foundation, Japan earthquake/tsunami relief (The John Lennon Tribute), and Hurricane Irene relief efforts in Vermont, to name some.

Critical praise runs rampant for Sexton. *Billboard* says he is "The real thing, people, a star with potential to permanently affect the musical landscape and keep us entertained for years to come."

The New York Times adds, "[Sexton] jumps beyond standard fare on the strength of his voice, a ment. His unpretentious heartiness helps him focus on every soul singer's goal: to amplify the sound of the ordinary heart."

Though busy on tour, Sexton was able to give The Rolling Zone a call to talk *Mixtape*, a life on the road, and fulfilling his purpose as a musician—and as a human being. **RZ:** Hey Martin. Thanks for taking the time to talk with me. Where am I catching you today? **MS:** I'm in the Redwood Forest of

Northern California at the California- Oregon line, surrounded by elk and giant sequoias. It's just outrageous, spectacular beauty. **RZ:** Very nice. Looks like you're in the Pacific Northwest for your next batch of shows. How's the tour going so far?

MS: It's going beautifully. Meeting a lot of wonderful people, seeing amazing places—from crossing the Great Plains, into the High Desert and the West Coast, up to the Northwest. It's really one of the reasons why I love my job so much. RZ: It's fitting you're touring in support of your latest, *Mixtape of the Open Road*, which is described as a "musical cross-country trip." Tell us a little about this album and what inspired you to create it.

**MS:** I wanted to make a record that was like a mixtape your friend made for you after you graduated, or had your heart broken, or [for a trip] across the country, what have you. I've benefited from mixtapes in the past, and so I did just that. I made twelve tunes that are all different from one another. Songs of different ilks, from different schools. [Then] kind of strung it all together with my singing.

**RZ:** Every track on the album feels a little bit different, but continuous. **MS:** Dig it. It's not too dissimilar from other records of mine, because I tend to make records that way. I've always done that, they've always ranged a lot. This one just ranges that much more.

**RZ:** What are a few of your favorite selections to perform, whether those be from this album or any other in your catalogue?

**MS:** It's funny, it's a family thing. The two that've come up most in my shows off *Mixtape* have been the one for my son called "Set In Stone," and the one for my mom, which is "Virginia." Those are the two I play most [during] my shows out here on the road.

**RZ:** Sharing a piece of you with the people at your shows. **MS:** Yeah.

**RZ:** Speaking of performing, what can Bozemanites, who maybe haven't been to one of your shows, expect from a Martin Sexton performance?

**MS:** Generally when people see me for the first time, the comment I

harmony. It's uplifting. People who are just seeing me for the first time are taken with a sense of unity, and harmony, and participation from the audience.

**RZ:** Kind of a family affair. Going back to the *Mixtape* album, how is this recording a representation of how your music has evolved since

tracks, and whoever else was in the room that day. There'll be things added like backing vocals or an additional percussion instrument. While the basics tracks are live—me singing, me playing—it'll be more like a record than a live recording. **RZ:** Do you think a song changes from when it is originally recorded maybe my cabin in the woods. I'll be sitting down with my guitar, maybe have a Dictaphone with me, and capture ideas on tape. I might finish it myself, or sometimes I'll finish it with others. On the Mixtape record. I co-wrote everywhere from Worcester, Massachusetts, to Jackson Hole, Wyoming. It was cool. "Set In Stone" was recorded in the woods of the Adirondack Mountains. Half of it there, and half of it was written in Jackson Hole. Songs like "Do It Daily" were written in Worcester at a diner with my friend Ned Claflin. The harder part of my job is the writing. For me, it's like chiseling a statue. It's something that's not there that you have to create, and it's easy to suck really bad. You know what I mean? RZ: Oh yes.

**MS:** The hard part is writing a song that doesn't suck. I'll start practicing it at home, singing it over and over [and] get comfortable with it, physically playing the chords and memorizing the lyrics. Then bring it out on the road to shows. If it doesn't work live, then I don't sing it live.

**RZ:** Kind of a trial and error process it seems. Are you working on any new material in between touring?

**MS:** For my next project, we're going to release not a traditional album, but just songs. Maybe classic country covers. I've been doing the traditional twelve, thirteen song album for my whole career. We're in a new era now where album sales are almost nonexistent. Luckily though, vinyl sales are good. People buy vinyl. And *Mixtape* was even out on cassette. We did it as a gag, but people buy them every night so It's kind of funny.

RZ: That is funny. I feel like some people are starting to miss how they used to get their music. Vinyl is popular around here as well. MS: It's the backlash of the digital age. We're still humans, and we still want that tactile experience. Something to hold in our hands, and see and feel and touch, and smell, and read while we're listening. And put a needle on that vinyl disk, have that analog experience. It's just more personal, more deliberate. You have to make an effort. If you're going to put an album on, you're probably going to listen to it a little more than if you just turn on your iPhone and stream.

**RZ:** Absolutely. So what's next up for you?

**MS:** Oh you know, more of the same I would think. Get this cover thing happening in the next year, and continue to travel North America and Europe. Keep loving what I do, being a dad, being an artist, being a husband, just being a human on this beautiful Earth. **RZ:** That's an awesome outlook. **MS**: I made a mission statement two years ago, almost to the day, to bring unity through the power of music. So I'm on a mission to bring folks together. People at my shows are of all different walks of life. It's a beautiful, beautiful experience seeing people, whether they're rich or poor, gay or straight, black or white, left or right. They're singing in harmony and leaving their differences at the door, recognizing how alike we all are and how much better we do when we're brothers and sisters. **RZ:** Totally. We need it more than ever, huh? MS: We sure do, man. This is why I'm so honored to do what I do, to be the messenger of something so powerful. Music is such a motivating, unifying force.

MS: It's representative [because] it's just a continuation of what I've done all along, which is to try and write songs that are honest to who I am, and produce them in a way that's also honest. Most of them are recorded live in the studio, [but] I use my backing vocals. I have many different voices I like to put on records-on one track you'll have a cowboy trio and another track you'll have a soul sister thing, or a chorus or a choir or a Motown trio even. But it's always me, and I try not to overuse it. I try to use it sparingly enough for it to still be tasteful. I guess that's what I've always done, and I hope I've evolved since the early nineties in doing that. **RZ:** You mentioned the way in which you record live in the studio, but you've also released a few live albums recorded from previous shows. How does a live studio

to when it's performed live, even years later?

MS: Sure, yeah. They evolve. You know, I ride this balance of keeping true to the original recording. I know fans like to hear songs they know and love. I do make [them] a little different during the performance, but I don't stray or jazz it up too much. I'm the only person in that room who sings the song every night, so it's easy for me to want to divert it and change the whole tune. I don't want to go there, because the listener wants to recognize the song. So I ride that balance of being true to the melody and the original recording, but also being open to spontaneity every night, which is a beautiful thing.

**RZ:** Very much so. Can you give us a peek into your creative process? How does the journey of writing to recording to performing unfold for you?

MS: Generally, I'll be somewhere,

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# Bobcats welcome 27 new additions

Tabbing them as the 'Class of Champions,' head coach Jeff Choate and his staff welcomed 27 new recruits to the Bobcat football family on National Signing Day back on February 1st.

Although Choate was around to lure several new recruits to Bozeman in his first spring at MSU in 2016, the 2017 class is his first in which he was part of a full recruiting cycle, and the results were nothing short of impressive. "We've called this the Class of Champions," Choate says, "because 25 of these players played on championship teams in high school. The kids in this class have won on the field, they've won in the classroom, with a cumulative grade 6-4, 255 lb. freshman defensive lineman from the Air Force Prep Academy; Jake Roper, a 5-11, 190 lb. freshman running back from Boise State; and Edward Vander, a 6-1, 215 lb. sophomore running back from Saddleback Junior College. All but Gardenhire are eligible immediately and should push for starting slots in fall camp. Gardenhire must sit out the 2017 season due to NCAA transfer rules, and he'll have one season of eligibility left in 2018.

Notable in-state recruits include O'Reilly and McCutcheon, the pass/catching duo that led Bozeman to the state playoffs, as well as Keaton Anderson, the starting safety on Billings Senior's state

point average of over 3.4, and they are the kind of people that will represent this program and our University the right way."

Choate and his staff were able to address a wide variety of needs with the 2017 class, including depth on the defensive line and at the skill positions, and they also made a strong showing in the state, signing several of Montana's top prep athletes, including Bozeman's own Callahan O'Reilly and Lance McCutcheon.

Included in the 2017 class are four transfers who should make an immediate impact on the program. The transfers are Darren Gardenhire, a 6-0, 185 lb. senior cornerback from the University of Washington; Stephen Omorogbe, a

title winning team, and Troy Andersen, a highly coveted athlete out of Dillon who has the ability to make an impact on either side of the ball.

In all, Montana State added 12 players devoted to the defensive side of the ball, and 15 offensive players. The 'Cats added five players slated to see time on the defensive line, three linebackers and five defensive backs, to go along with four offensive linemen, four running backs, four wide receivers, one athlete and a pair of quarterbacks.

### Bozeman's biggest St. Paddy's tradition returns next month

Race registration is now open for Pub 317's **2017 Run to the Pub**. Several thousand half-marathon and 10k race participants in their finest St. Patrick's Day attire will gather at the starting line on Saturday, March 11th.

Registering for the event gets race participants a technical running shirt, a commemorative pint glass, custom logo race socks, custom logo buff, and a well-deserved beer and cupcake at the finish line. As a bonus, each person who registers is automatically entered in a drawing for the dream prize—one of four paid trips to Ireland with free entry into the Dublin marathon.

Ten years ago, one of the owners of Pub 317 gathered a few friends for a run on St. Patrick's Day—they finished their run with a pint at 317. By the next year, the event was formalized and the local race has been drawing more and more runners each year. Participants include those looking to run a personal best on the mostly downhill course, creative costume enthusiasts, and everyone in between. Last year's Run to the Pub drew over 4,000 participants from 38 different states to



downtown Bozeman.

"We aim to make this a really positive event for Bozeman," says race director Tyler Wilkinson. "Not only are part of race proceeds donated to the Bozeman Area Community Foundation who support local nonprofits, but I get a lot of positive feedback from local businesses. This is a big, fun community event and many runners bring friends and family along to celebrate in Downtown Bozeman."

In 2013, *Runner's World* ranked Run to the Pub as the country's No. 2 "Must Run" half-marathon based on an online survey.

"We've only been getting better from there," says Wilkinson. "The race continues to grow and improve based on the feedback from runners. It's hard to go wrong when you have a mostly downhill course, gorgcous mountain views, and a finish line that becomes a party downtown."

The Bozeman Hawk wrestlers put the finishing touch on the 2016-17 season by taking home 2nd place at the Montana All-Class State Wrestling Tournament in Billings at the Rimrock Auto Arena recently.

Head coach Nate Laslovich and crew took 20 wrestlers to the state tournament and racked up 189.5 points to finish a distant second to Kalispell-Flathead who took home the championship trophy after tallying 251 points.

Bozeman was able to place seven wrestlers in the semi-final round, but only three were able to earn their way into the championship round. Brothers Leif and Bjorn Schroeder and Brandon Cooper all made it into the Saturday main event, and while Cooper would fall 9-0 to two-time state champion Hayden Schrull of Helena High, the Schroeder boys made it a family affair by both securing state titles for the Hawks.

"They are great people," the coach added. "Bjorn is a warrior and he's going to be hard to replace leadership-wise. He's just been as hard of a worker and as good of a leader as you can ask for. Obviously, with Leif, it will be nice having him for the next three years. We will have an X-factor."

Several other Hawks secured points in helping take home the runner-up trophy. Sterling Quinn, Chance McLane, and Finn VaughnKraska all fell in their semifinal matches, but bounced back to win their third-place matches, and Keegan Mulhill battled back to earn a fifth place finish.

It was a very successful season for the Hawk wrestling team. Bozeman took home the title in both the AA Duals and their own Tom LeProwse tournament, in addition to their second place showing at state, and many of their point scorers will return next season, meaning 2017-18 could see even more hardware making its way into Bozeman's trophy case.

# FREE 2016 tax prep & filing

Need help filing your 2017 taxes? You're in luck! At several locations throughout Bozeman, IRS-trained tax preparers offer free tax preparation assistance for Federal and State taxes through the VITA program. This program is available to people who earn \$54,000 or less, persons with disabilities, the elderly, and limited English-speaking taxpayers who need assistance in preparing their tax returns. IRS-certified volunteers provide free basic income tax return preparation with electronic filing to qualified individuals. These trained volunteers can help with earned income credit, child tax credit, education credits, and homeowner/renter credit.

Here's a look at where you can get help with your 2017 taxes.

The Community Café of Bozeman will accept walk-ins only during tax season. Drop in Mondays, Wednesdays, or Thursdays between the hours of 12pm and 3pm through April 14th. The Community Café is located at 302 N. 7th Ave. in Bozeman.

Visit *HRDC's Bozeman office* for tax help Mondays and Wednesdays between the hours of 5pm and 7pm through April 14th. These sessions are by appointment only. Call VITA staff at (406) 404-0725 to make an appointment. HRDC's Bozeman office is located at 32 S. Tracy Ave. Over the pass? *HRDC's Livingston* office will also be available for free tax prep. Sessions are available Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays between the hours of 11am and 3pm through April 14th. These are also by appointment only. Call (406) 333-2537 to make an appointment.

Tax preparers will also be on hand through the *Bozeman Public Library* on Tuesdays between the hours of 10am and 6pm through April 11th. This service is offered in the conference room. Appointments are required and can be made by calling (406) 586-6641.

Additionally, MSU accounting students will also offer free tax prep in *Jabs Hall 215* for MSU students and individuals who made less than \$58,000 last year.

The 2017 help sessions will be held on the MSU campus on the following Mondays, Wednesday and Saturday: February 22nd and 27th; March 6th, 20th, 25th, 27th; and April 3rd. Monday and Wednesday sessions will be held from 5:30–7pm, while the Saturday session will be held from 9:30–11am. No appointment is necessary, but sign-up sheets will be posted at 5pm before each Monday and Wednesday session, and at 9am before the Saturday session. Now that you've decided where you want to go, here's what you need to bring to your tax prep session.

- W-2 forms for all jobs worked in 2016

account information – Voided check and/or savings

deposit slip for direct deposit – Copy of last year's tax return,

if you have it Please note: if married and filing jointly, both parties MUST be present to sign the tax return.

# Gallatin Association of REALTORS® releases '16 real estate statistics

The Gallatin County and surrounding area **real estate market** demonstrated consistent strength throughout 2016, according to year-end statistics released by the Gallatin Association of REALTORS®. The number of homes for sale was drastically down in year-over-year comparisons, along with days on market and months of supply. Meanwhile, sales and prices were up in most markets.

"The year-end numbers show that the Gallatin County and surrounding are real estate market finished 2016 in solid shape, and all indicators point to a strong, active market in 2017," said Steve Candler, CEO of the Gallatin Association of REALTORS®. The number of units sold increased 7.3 percent for single family homes but decreased 5.2 percent for condo/townhouse homes. Pending sales increased 62.5 percent for single family homes and 11.4 percent for condo/townhouse homes. The median sales price increased 0.1 percent to \$335,000 for single family homes and 47.5 percent to \$298,000 for condo/townhouse homes.

Available inventory decreased 15.5 percent for single family homes and 36.0 percent for condo/townhouse homes. The months' supply of inventory decreased 22 percent for single family homes and 41.5 percent for condo/townhouse homes. The average days on market decreased 14.1 percent for single family homes but increased 14.6 percent for condo/townhouse homes.
