Commuter Challenge Get in on Bozeman

he Bozeman Commuter Project at Western Transportation Institute presents Bozeman's 6th annual Commuter Challenge. This is a friendly month-long competition between Bozeman businesses and organizations to log the most commutes to and from work by bicycle, walking, or public transportation during May.

Bozeman's Commuter Challenge will be

incorporated into the statewide Challenge, which will run from May 1st-31st. Commuters on teams at Bozeman workplaces will be able to log their miles at www.mtcommuterchallenge.org and compete both statewide and locally. Participants of the Bozeman Challenge will be eligible to win some great prizes from local coffeeshops, eateries, and retailers. The Bozeman Challenge is open to anyone working in the Bozeman area and there is no cost to enter.

Nearly 300 participants and 46 teams have logged over 14,500 miles in one month during past Challenges, and event promoters hope to see those miles keep adding up this year! Get creative with your commute this

May readings at Elk River books

Elk River Arts & Lectures will present a pair of free readings in the coming weeks. Here's a look at the events set to unfold in Livingston.

Painter, sculptor, and rancher Ted Waddell will read from and talk about a new retrospective of his work, Theodore Waddell: My Montana, on Friday, May 12th at 7pm.

Waddell stands as one of the West's most celebrated contemporary artists. His late modern "landscapes with animals" couple abstract expressionist technique with the creatures - Black Angus cattle,

David Thomas grew up on the Hi-Line, graduated from the University of Montana, then found himself on the streets of San Francisco where he began his literary education. Edited by Rick Newby, My Montana is richly illustrated with Waddell's work, and incorporates excerpts from Waddell's journals and letters, as well as an extensive oral history. The book includes essays celebrating Waddell's life and art by the Montana curators, critics, scholars, poets and fiction writers who have known him best, including Pat Williams, Greg Keeler, Scott McMillion, William Hjortsberg, Paul Zarzyski and Brian Petersen, among others.

"Theodore Waddell's vast (and intimate) canvases represent the pinnacle of contemporary Western painting and the telling of his life and work lends rich texture and depth to the evolving narrative of the development of modern and

contemporary Western art," Newby says. The Helena-based Drumlummon Institute writes, "Ultimately,

Theodore Waddell's works are important, not simply because they bring together disparate traditions but because they stand as emotionally and sensuously resonant works of art that speak of landscapes and animals, life and death, austerity and abundance. They possess, in the words of Seattle Times critic Robin

published in anthologies including The Last Best Place, Poems Across the Big Sky, and New Poets of the American West, and periodicals including Blue Collar Review and the Cedilla literary journal. His essay "Gothic Days" appears in The Complete Montana Gothic, which also features Thomas' earliest published work. Most recently he has published poems and an interview in Talking River and poems in San Pedro River Review.

Originally from Iraq, Saif Alsaegh currently is a film student in Missoula. His work has appeared in Witness, the Great Falls Tribune, The Legendary and other venues. His first book, Iraqi Headaches, was published in 2013. Alsaegh's appearance at the event is sponsored by Humanities Montana.

Humanities Montana organizer Sarah Kahn says some of her favorite programs in the last year involved students at the middle and high schools. One class made a film about teen dating, abuse and assault. Another hosted a talk on what it's like to be a Muslim in America. "Kids went from knowing nothing about Islam and having some negative connotations to becoming engaged and curious about topics like prayer...and the spiritual significance of fasting," Kahn says.

These free, public events will take place upstairs at Elk River Books, 120 N. Main St., in Livingston. Elk River Arts & Lectures is a nonprofit organization that seeks to bring writers to Livingston for free public readings, and to provide opportunities for those writers to interact with local public school students. Bozeman Gem & Mineral Rock Show amazes during Mother's Day weekend



Following three months of a rigorous gentling process, the crew set off for this epic ride through New Mexico and Arizona. The hope is to integrate these animals into the Heroes and Horses herd and utilize them in the 2017 program beginning in June. The horses will be paired with the program's 16 combat veterans searching for clarity and purpose. The 500 Miles project will be documenting the amazing progression of these horses as they transition into their new lives – and find a new purpose while helping those striving to do

Book Review - Finding Gideon

It wasn't where you put it down. The last time you saw it, it was over there where you left it. You remember doing that; you even gave yourself a brain-nudge so you wouldn't forget but now it's not where it should be, and that bugs you. Now, as in the new novel Finding Gideon by Eric Jerome Dickey, you'll have to chase it down.

At an age when most boys are focused on their little toy cars, Jean-Claude was busy saving his mother's life.

The French prostitute known as Thelma (or was she Margaret, or Catherine?) had crossed the wrong johns, gotten pregnant, and told their wives. She hinted that Medianoche was a father. She hinted that the Beast was a father. She was lying to one or both, and the Beast told Medianoche to kill her. He was swinging Thelma around by her neck when her "snotty-nosed" seven-year-old son picked up Medianoche's gun... and shot the assassin in the face.

That was the first man the boy gunned down. Thelma set him on the second one, too, which changed him, and made him a killer. He was

a sought-after, talented assassin when he learned that Medianoche had lived, and Gideon (his professional name) knew he had to finish that long-ago job.

Medianoche hadn't planned on killing his best friend, but when he learned that the Beast had been lying for years about Thelma, there was no other choice. Once the Beast was gone, Medianoche could assume leadership of the Four Horsemen, the group that ruled Buenos Aires, and that's how it always should've been.

But this young assassin, Gideon, complicated things. Medianoche heard that Gideon was looking for him, to settle a dubious score. It

wasn't enough that he'd taken Medianoche's eye, and destroyed his

No, Gideon was looking for Midnight, and there would be war. Which only meant that Midnight had to find Gideon first...

I have to admit, I spent the first thirty pages of this book hating it. As he often seems to do, author Eric Jerome Dickey jumps feet-first into his novel by letting the characters jump feet-first into bed. There is a bit of prelude this time, but it's strangely fixated on dog waste before we get to tiresome erotica.

Usually, I'd recommend skipping that and starting the book several pages in, though with Finding Gideon, you really shouldn't. You need that beginning; it's nasty, but it sets up a first-rate thriller and a surprise: this latest Gideon tale has character development that makes many of the killers human, almost likeable. Readers get a better understanding of who Gideon is, and what drives him. We meet his "brothers" and lovers old and new and, because this book screams toward an unsettling cliffhanger, we can only hope to see them again.

Certainly you can read this novel alone, but I'd recommend starting with Sleeping with Strangers. The overall tale relies on it, so enjoy that book first. Won't be long before you'll beg to put Finding Gideon in your hands. •

The Princess Bride: The Parodic and the Priceless

According to the writer Vladimir Nabokov, the difference between satire and parody is that

satire aims to teach a lesson, while parody is a game. The object, therefore, is to play with the conventions or expectations of a given genre for the sake of enjoyment and appreciation for their substance. In many ways, this formulation helps explain the longstanding

appeal of Rob Reiner's The Princess Bride (1987). Adapted by William Goldman from his own novel - itself a winkingframed narrative packed with referential irony — the film has moved beyond general cult status and into a beloved and wellentrenched place in the popular imagination. Overlooked upon its original theatrical release, it is now one of those pictures like Star Wars (1977) or Casablanca (1942) that people can quote random lines from with a decent chance someone else will be able to catch the reference, if not provide the rejoinder. The movie's success is rooted in the seemingly contradictory achievement of poking fun at fairy tales and old school Hollywood swashbucklers, while simultaneously becoming a sincere epitome of both.

A grandfather (Peter Falk, in his most famous role along with Columbo) comes to visit his sick grandson (Fred Savage), and reads him a book called "The Princess Bride," by C.S Morgenstern. The storybook story centers on the most beautiful girl in the kingdom, Buttercup (a radiant Robin Wright) and her true love, Westley (Cary Elwes, channeling Douglass Fairbanks Jr. and Errol Flynn to excellent effect), farm boy turned pirate. There are many obstacles

along the way, including the dreadful Prince Humperdinck (Chris Sarandon), kidnappers, shrieking eels, Rodents of

Unusual Size, the Pit of Despair, and death. But nothing can stand in the way of true love. Bit by bit, the grandson loses his reluctance ("Is this a kissing book?") and becomes deeply engrossed.

> One of the main pleasures

of The Princess Bride is the vividly drawn supporting characters. Inigo Montoya (Mandy Patinkin), the Spanish swordsman sworn to avenge his father's murder, nearly walks off with the whole film; the sword fight that arrives a quarter of the way in is one of the finest duels in the New Hollywood era. Professional wrestler Andre the Giant is perfectly cast as the giant Fezzik, superhumanly strong and softhearted. And multi-talented actor and writer Wallace Shawn has his most enduring performance as Vizzini, the meanest and most egotistical Sicilian ever; the Battle of Wits is a masterpiece of circular reasoning and deadpan zingers. And a heavily made-up Billy Crystal has a memorable cameo as Miracle Max, seller of miracle pills (they go down best covered with chocolate).

I first saw The Princess Bride when I was about five or six, which is probably the ideal age to encounter it for the first time, though it isn't essential. The pleasures it offers are as accessible to grown ups as they are to children; storybook stories are there for us, whether we happen to be grandsons or grandfathers.





New era of wildfire demands new protections of people, ecosystems

Current wildfire policy can't adequately protect people, homes and ecosystems from the longer, hotter fire seasons climate change is causing, according to a new paper from the University of Colorado Boulder, Montana State University and other institutions

Efforts to extinguish every blaze and reduce the buildup of dead wood and forest undergrowth are becoming increasingly inadequate on their own. Instead, the authors a team of wildfire experts - urge policymakers and communities to embrace policy reform that will promote adaptation to increasing wildfire and warming.

Wildfire is catching up to us," said lead author Tania Schoennagel, a research scien-

as the "new era of western wildfires." This pattern of bigger, hotter fires, along with the influx of homes into fire-prone areas than 2 million since 1990 — has made wildfire vastly more costly and dangerous.

"For a long time, we've thought that if we try harder and do better, we can get ahead of wildfire and reduce the risks," said Schoennagel, who also is an adjunct faculty member in CU Boulder's Geography Department. "We can no longer do that. This is bigger than us and we're going to have to adapt to wildfire rather than the other way around."

Cathy Whitlock, professor in the MSU Department of Earth Sciences in the College of Letters and Science and co-author on the

ecosystems adapt to increasing wildfire.

They also argue for reforming federal, state and local policies that have the unintended consequence of encouraging people to develop in fire-prone areas. Currently, federal taxpayers pick up the tab for preventing and fighting western wildfires - a cost that has averaged some \$2 billion a year in recent years. If states and counties were to bear more of that cost, it would provide incentive to adopt planning efforts and fire-resistant building codes that would reduce risk.

Re-targeting forest thinning efforts is another reform suggested by the authors. The federal government has spent some \$5 billion since 2006 on thinning dense forests and removing fuel from some 7 million hectares (17 million acres) of land, often in remote areas. But these widespread efforts have done little to reduce record-setting fires. Directing thinning projects to particularly high-risk areas, including communities in fire-prone regions and forests in particularly dry areas, would increase adaptation to wildfire, the

Additionally, as climate change forces species to move their ranges, some may vanish entirely, the authors said. Familiar landscapes will disappear, a fact that makes many people balk. But such changes, including those caused by wildfire, could be necessary for the environment in the long run, says Max Moritz, a fire scientist at the University of California Cooperative Extension and a co-author on the paper. "We need the foresight to help guide these ecosystems in a healthy direction now so they can adjust in pace with our changing climate," he said. "That means embracing some changes while we have a window to do so.'

Critical to making a policy of adaptation successful, said Schoennagel, will be education and changing people's perception of wildfire. "We have to learn that wildfire is inevitable, in the same way that droughts and flooding are. We've tried to control fire, but it's not a control we can maintain. Like other natural disasters, we have to learn to adapt." •

This means accepting wildfire as an inevitable part of the landscape, states the new paper published [recently] in the journal Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences.

The Western U.S. has seen a 2-degrees-Celsius rise in annual average temperature and lengthening of the fire season by almost three months since the 1970s — both elements contribute to what the authors refer to paper, agrees.

"Fires are a natural part of our western ecosystems, but earlier springs and warmer summers are leading to more and more-severe fires than we've experienced in a long time,' said Whitlock, who also serves as co-director of the Montana Institute on Ecosystems.

As part of this adaptation process, the authors advocate for actions that may be unpopular, such as allowing more fires to burn largely unimpeded in wildland areas and intentionally setting more fires, or "controlled burns," to reduce natural fuels like undergrowth in more developed areas. Both these steps would reduce future risk and help

A year ago Angela Marie Patnode, Transformational Coach and Spiritual Teacher, couldn't walk more than 200 feet before needing to lie down to let the back spasms dissipate. 



Yellowstone tourism creates \$680M in economic benefits

A new National Park Service (NPS) report shows that a record 4.25 million people visited

Yellowstone National Park in 2016. These visitors spent \$524.3 million in communities near the park. That spending supported 8,156 jobs in the local area and had a cumulative benefit to the local economy of \$680.3 million.

"Yellowstone attracts people from around the country and the world who contribute significantly to the local economies in Wyoming, Montana, and Idaho," comments Superintendent Dan Wenk. "The economic benefits our neighbors enjoy are a direct result of preserving Yellowstone's spectacular thermal features, abundant wildlife, and dramatic scenery. As we look to the future, preservation has to be the key value we consider as we address increasing visitation. Protecting the park also protects the regional tourism economy."

The peer-reviewed visitor spending analysis was conducted by economists Catherine Cullinane Thomas of the U.S. Geological Survey and Lynne Koontz of the National Park Service. The report

shows \$18.4 billion of direct spending by 330.9 million park visitors in communities within 60 miles of a national park. This spending supported 318,000 jobs nationally; 271,544 of those jobs are found in gateway communities. The cumulative benefit to the U.S. economy was \$34.9 billion.

According to the 2016 report, nationally, most park visitor spending was for lodging (31.2 %), followed by food and beverages (27.2 %), gas and oil (11.7 %), admissions and fees (10.2 %), souvenirs and other expenses (9.7 %), local transportation (7.4 %), & camping fees (2.5 %).

Well-known wolf severely injured, killed in Yellowstone Park

On April 11th, hikers discovered a severely injured wolf inside Yellowstone National Park near Gardiner, Montana. Park staff investigated the situation and concluded the wolf was in shock and dying from the injuries.

"Staff on scene agreed the animal could not be saved due to the severity of its injuries. The decision was made to kill the animal and investigate the cause of the initial trauma," said P.J. White, Chief of the Wildlife and Aquatic Resources Branch. At this time, the nature of the initial injuries is unknown. An investigation into the cause of the injuries has begun which will include a necropsy.




Park staff identified the wolf as the white female of **the Canyon Pack**, one of three known white wolves in the park. This wolf lived to 12 years, twice the age of an average wolf in the park and had a broad range that extended from Hayden Valley to the Firehole River area to the northern portion of the park. For these reasons, the wolf was one of the most recognizable and sought after by visitors to view and photograph.

MSU undergraduates key to solar eclipse ballooning project

When more than 70 high-altitude balloons take flight on August 21st as part of a Montana State University-led project to live-stream aerial video footage

of a total solar eclipse, federal air traffic controllers will track the balloons using a system built by MSU undergraduates.

"That's kind of stressful, knowing that people are relying on us,' said David Schwehr, a senior majoring in computer science at MSU's Gianforte School of

Computing who played a leading role in developing the balloontracking system. "But at the same time, it's pretty satisfying.'

About 30 MSU undergraduates have directly contributed to the NASA-sponsored **Eclipse Ballooning Project**, according to Angela Des Jardins, director of the Montana Space Grant Consortium, which is housed in the Department of Physics in MSU's College of Letters and



Science. Since Des Jardins proposed the MSGC-coordinated project in 2014, it has grown to include 57 teams from across the country.

"The Eclipse Ballooning Project is an undergraduate student-led effort," Des Jardins said. "Without the MSU undergraduates to develop the balloon payloads, the project wouldn't have happened."

Schwehr began working as an intern in MSGC's high-altitude ballooning facility, called the BORE-

> years ago. At first, he worked on the electronics that will transmit photos of the eclipse. Then, as part of a senior "capstone" project that included two other computer science students, Dustin Spivey and Garrett Cornwell, he

was confronted with the challenge of designing the balloon-tracking system.

"The idea was to create one central resource that air traffic controllers with the Federal Aviation Administration could go to to see where the balloons are" and, if necessary, immediately contact any of the teams, Schwehr said.

Schwehr's team programmed a software interface to receive the signals sent by cell phone-sized satellite modems that will be housed alongside the cameras in each balloon's payload. The team also designed a website capable of displaying the balloons' precise geographical coordinates and altitude on a map.

According to Des Jardins, creating the balloon-tracking system has been a key part of working with the FAA as well as NASA's Balloon Program Office to ensure that the project is carried out safely.

On Aug. 21st, when the moon casts an eerie, daytime darkness along a path stretching from Oregon to South Carolina, the Eclipse Ballooning Project teams will also use the balloon-tracking system to precisely point dishshaped antennas at their balloons in order to receive the video signal that each will transmit. The video will be live-streamed on NASA's website and on NASA TV.

And when the video streaming is complete, and the balloons top out at altitudes of up to 100,000 feet, the teams will use the satellite modem system that Schwehr's team created to send the signal for the balloons to release their payloads, which will then parachute back to

Micaela Moreni is anticipating that moment. A senior majoring in mechanical engineering in

MSU's Department of Mechanical and Industrial Engineering, she designed the system that will actually sever the strong nylon cord tethering each balloon to its cargo.

In the BOREALIS lab recently, she demonstrated the machine. which looks like a quarter-sized pizza cutter attached to a small motor and circuit board. The apparatus is contained in a custom-made plastic housing that Moreni designed and fabricated with a 3D printer in the lab.

"We printed these here all summer," producing parts for the teams across the country, she said. "I'm excited to see it in action."

According to Schwehr, who came to MSU at age 34 after working 17 years as a heavy equipment mechanic, "the whole eclipse project is a really good engineering problem" because it integrates a number of classic engineering constraints, including size, weight and budget.

He said he appreciates "knowing that all the work we did will be used for something, that it's not just an assignment for a grade."

Along with other members of the MSU Eclipse Ballooning Project team. Schwehr will travel to Rexburg, Idaho to send MSU's balloon skyward on Aug. 21st, then get ready to personally witness the eclipse, a rare phenomenon.

After all the hard work, he said, "I'm looking forward to being an observer, and enjoying the show." •

Yellowstone reminds film & news crews, photogs about permit requirements

Yellowstone National Park encourages visitors who intend to capture images, videos, or sound recordings for commercial purposes to review its permit require**ments** before arriving in the park. Images, videos, and sound recordings captured in Yellowstone for personal use generally do not require a permit.

Permits are required for any individual, business, or organization (including nonprofit groups and educational institutions) involved with projects intended for a market audience or performed for compensation. These projects include, but are not limited to:

- Feature films or documentaries
- Student films
- Stock footage
- Advertisements (including social media posts associated with a product or service)
 - Educational films Interviews of park
- staff or other visitors
- Television shows

Commercial

Professionally ot portraits Contest entries

Commercial photographers using models, props, lighting or specialized equipment may be required to secure a permit. Portrait photographers who wish to conduct business in the park must apply for a Commercial Use

Authorization (CUA). Permits are not usually required for

credentialed news organizations to cover park events in a timely fashion. Some news crews may require a permit if their work will impact park visitors or resources. News crews travelling through Yellowstone for business outside of the park must pay the park entrance fee.

National Park Service employees performing their duties in public may be photographed or recorded at any time, but interviews with or portraits of park staff must be arranged prior to arrival in

The use of unmanned aircraft systems (drones) for any purpose is strictly prohibited in all national park units, including Yellowstone. For additional information,





MT Brewers get green light for growth

The Montana House [recently] concurred with Senate amendments on **HB 541** with a vote of 94-6. The bill allows Montana breweries to grow past 10,000 barrels of annual production without losing their taproom by raising the production cap to 60,000 barrels.

"HB 541 is the most important legislation we've seen for Montana's craft brewing industry in 18 years. The Legislature has signaled a green light for Montana breweries to grow, giving breweries the confidence to make investments to expand their production. That means more jobs, increased demand for Montana-grown barley and greater access to Montana craft beer," said Matt Leow, executive director of the Montana Brewers

HB 541 is sponsored by Rep. Adam Hertz (R-Missoula) and cosponsored by Rep. Ellie Hill (D-Missoula) and Rep. Greg Hertz (R-Polson). The bill faced a tough road in the Senate where it was amended in committee to set the production cap at 12,000 barrels and include a tax increase for breweries producing between 10,000 and 20,000 barrels annually. The 60,000 barrel limit was restored on the Senate floor along with new regulations for taprooms, limiting breweries to no more than three taprooms and a total of 2,000 barrels of on-premises sales. The Montana Tavern Association withdrew their opposition to the bill with the inclusion of the taproom limitations.

"Rep. Hertz brought a great bill



that was turned on its head in the Senate Business and Labor committee. We are pleased that the Senate restored the bill to 60,000 barrels. While we would prefer a clean bill without the new taproom limitations, the limits are set high enough that they will not impact what any breweries are currently doing," said Leow.

Senate committee amendments sparked controversy last week when KettleHouse Brewing realized the changes, if they became law, would force the Missoula brewery to close its popular Northside taproom. The Senate resolved that issue with the amendment to restore the bill to 60,000 barrels.

"It's been a rollercoaster ride for HB 541 over the past week, but we ended up in a good place.

Raising the production cap to 60,000 barrels clears the way for Montana breweries to compete in the regional marketplace. Montana is known for producing high quality beer, with our brewers winning national awards. This legislation will enable Montana brewers to pursue export opportunities and provide beer lovers in other states a taste of Montana," said Leow.

With the House vote approving the Senate amendments, HB 541 is now heading to Governor Bullock's desk to be signed into law.

ROCK 'N' ROLL VETERANS ASSEMBLE FOR RIFF-HEAVY JAM AT THE BRICK

Multi-platinum rock band **Tesla** leave their base of Northern California this spring, hitting the road with Poison in support of fellow industry veterans Def Leppard and their 2017 North American Tour.

Tesla formed in Sacramento, CA, in 1985 out of the earlier, locally popular group City Kidd. They knew their name didn't fit the sound of their original music. At management's suggestion, the band named itself after the eccentric inventor Nikola Tesla, who pioneered the radio but was given only belated credit for doing so.

Tesla's music and lyrics stray

from the themes popular in heavy metal — particularly in the 1980s at the beginning of their career. A further distinction from their contemporaries, Tesla's bluecollar, T-shirt-and-jeans image also found itself in strong contrast to glam bands of the time who were often characterized by big hair, leather pants, and flashy makeup.

Leppard and Poison, Tesla has previously toured with the likes of David Lee Roth, Alice Cooper, Aerosmith, Styx, and REO Speedwagon, among others. Thanks to a diehard, loyal following and younger generation of fans, Tesla continues to perform for sold-out crowds around the

In addition to Def

Tesla is comprised of four of its original members — vocalist Jeff Keith, guitarist **Frank Hannon**, bassist Brian

Wheat, and drummer

Troy Luccketta. Fifth member and guitarist Dave Rude has added a fresh energy and creativity since being added to the lineup following Tommy Skeoch's departure in 2006.

In anticipation of their Bozeman performance at the end of the month, The Rolling Zone was able to get Hannon on the phone to talk rock 'n' roll, life on the road, and keeping the legacy going some three decades and counting.

RZ: Hey Frank. **FH:** How are you doing?

RZ: Good! Thanks for taking the time to talk with me.

FH: Likewise.

RZ: You're gearing up to hit the road with Def Leppard for their North American tour. Given the pairing, what do you anticipate will unfold on this outing? **FH:** Man, it's going to be a lot of

great songs and great memories from people. It's kind of a full-circle reunion with both Poison and Def Leppard. We toured with both those bands back in 1986 and '87.

RZ: It's going to be so fun. What do you guys have planned for your portion of the shows?

FH: We have a very short amount of time, so we'll try to play a lot of the crowd-pleasing songs

people love — "Love Song," "Modern Day Cowboy," "Signs." And we're going to throw in a few obscurities. We've been really stepping up our production a lot, so we may have some video projections. It's going to be a high-energy rock 'n' roll show.

RZ: Sweet. Over the years, many have commented how even though your recorded material is repeatedly excellent with every release, the greatest way to experience Tesla is live. What is it about being in that moment with you

FH: You know, it's really hard to describe. The thing that happens as

of metal, elements of blues, elements of even some country. We've got some folky stuff. We're not really a hair metal band, or a glam band, or even a blues band. We're rock 'n' roll. We're an American rock 'n' roll band.

RZ: We recently spoke with Phil Collen [of Def Leppard] who's producing your next album and who said it might be the best work you've ever done. How has that process been going?

FH: It's been an interesting process. It's definitely different than anything we've ever done. It's been a learning process — and it's been great. Having an outside

What do you have going on on that

FH: I have a lot of different eclectic ideas and things I experiment with. My last solo venture was doing a tribute at the Haight-Ashbury Fair called "Never Slowin' Down" [music video found at www.redhawkrecords.com/fra **nk-hannon/** alongside Frank's solo material]. I'm really interested in doing some blues jamming. I'm producing an album for a guitar hero of mine named Greg Golden, a rock 'n' roller from Reno, NV. But I really don't have a whole lotta time [for side projects] because Tesla is really busy and [that's

FH: One of the best memories I have is opening for Boston, 1987 at the Texxas Jam at the Cotton Bowl in Dallas. That was back in the day when there used to be huge rock festivals in America. Most of these festivals take place in Europe now. We do have Rocklahoma and a few others, but this was a huge festival? 90,000 people were there. It was with Boston, Aerosmith, Whitesnake. That's a *great* memory.

RZ: Sure wish I could've been there and to have those memories.

FH: I remember Brad Delp and Tom Scholz from Boston being really nice people. The guys in Aerosmith, Joe Perry has always been super nice to us. Some of the best memories are when you meet your heroes and they're super nice

RZ: Who are some of your personal heroes to this day?

FH: Joe Perry and Steven Tyler from Aerosmith are some heroes of mine, Mick Jagger, Keith Richards, Paul McCartney, Peter Frampton those are the ones that are living. Jimi Hendrix, Randy Rhoads, Ronnie Van Zant from Lynyrd

RZ: All masters of their craft. And speaking of masters, Tesla is a band of road warriors, touring exhaustively since the early 80s. Will this continue to be your MO in the future?

FH: I think that music and bands and having a career, even if you're starting out, you have to travel. That's just part of it. You have to be a ramblin', travelin' band. It's so different than when Dickey Betts was singing about being a ramblin' man, or when Robert Johnson was singing about it. You have to travel — and even more so nowadays that there's no record stores and CDs aren't popular anymore. I have friends in young, up-and-coming bands and I tell them the same thing. You've gotta find a way to book yourself in different cities and go and take your music to different people. So

yeah...that's the way it has to be. RZ: Well we can't wait for you to travel our way.

FH: Alright! I love Bozeman, looking forward to being there

a performer — there's an energy that, as a band, we've always been able to conjure up from within and project out to the crowd and have it come back. I've been to a lot of shows where you see great bands and great musicians, but they just don't have that certain something. [It's] an energy, an invisible fire that builds up. For me as a guitar player, even very young I remember getting on stage and playing guitar and feeling that energy as a live performer. It's hard to capture that live in the studio. Van Halen captured it live on their first album, you can feel that fire and that energy. I think that's what caught it live on ours as well? we played live in the studio on Mechanical Resonance. We don't just stare down at the floor when we're playing and try to play perfectly, we try to build up an energy.

RZ: That's great, you just gotta be there and feel it for yourself.

FH: Yep!

RZ: Tesla commonly falls under the "heavy metal" classification, but has been perhaps better described as a "blues metal" band. How would you describe the sound?

FH: I would describe us as a rock 'n' roll band. We're just rock we're rock 'n' roll. We got elements influence really interjecting and [inviting] some coaching and some positive vibes to the band in the studio, really helping things in a different way. I've learned a lot of different recording techniques from [him].

RZ: You say it's different than anything you've ever done. How would you describe what this new collection is going to look like once it comes to fruition?

FH: It's really been a process of the core development. The songs, the ideas have been developed and orchestrated more so. In the past, we didn't spend as much time as we have with this.

RZ: You and your other band members have side projects to keep you busy in between Tesla ventures. what] I'm mainly focusing on right now. Between producing Greg Golden's band and doing one-off solo gigs [of] mostly guitar-driven cover stuff, that's about it.

RZ: You can spread your talents around and always come home.

FH: I'm realizing now, the older I get, that time is very valuable and we have to manage it. I've had a habit in the past to not manage it, just going crazy doing everything under the sun being a workaholic. I have quite a few solo albums and efforts to show for it, but I've got to slow down just a little bit and focus on Tesla.

RZ: You've had quite the career with Tesla. Can you share a crazy memory from your time with this group?



our first day in the studio. We had the songs, but we didn't have a name. There were two of them, and two of us. I like to think they would have been fans of our music." 



Lady 'Cats ink two transfers

Fresh off their first trip to the NCAA women's basketball tournament since 1993, coach Tricia Binford and her staff have been hard at work on the recruiting trail in hopes of maintaining the program's recent success. The **MSU** women are coming off back-to-back regular season championships.

Martha Kuderer and Claire Lundberg of Seton Hall University have both recently signed letters of intent to join the MSU program beginning in the 2017-18 season. However, due to NCAA transfer rules, neither will be eligible to play for the Lady 'Cats until the 2018-19 season. Lundberg, a 6-1 forward from Andover, Minnesota, will have one year of eligibility remaining, while Kuderer, a 5-11 forward from Eden Prairie, Minnesota will have two years of eligibility remaining.

"We are thrilled to announce the additions of Claire and Martha to

our Bobcat family," Binford said.
"They are a natural fit for our program and the direction we are heading. Next year, they'll help make practices competitive and will bring championship experience to the gym. In addition, they'll get a year to pick up the system and will be able to come in and make an impact right away."

Lundberg played in 31 games last season for the Pirates, starting 27, and averaged 6.8 points and 2.9 rebounds, while averaging 25 minutes per contest. Standing 6-1, Lundberg did most of her scoring damage from the three-point line, connecting on 56 triples last season, including six in a win over Marquette. She also shot 82 percent from the free-throw line, and finished with seven double-digit scoring games in the 2016-17 season.

Kuderer was a highly recruited scorer out of Chanhassen High School in Eden Prairie, where she averaged 18.1 points and 9.0 rebounds per game her senior season. However, illness limited her to just 17 games last season for Seton Hall. She reached double-digits twice against Butler and Georgetown, and hit 54 percent of her shots from the field and 71 percent from the line.

Lundberg and Kuderer both played a role in Seton Hall reaching the NCAA tournament in 2016 after earning an at-large bid with at 23-9 record, including 12-6 in the Big East. They fell in the opening round to Duquesne.

"With the addition of Claire and Martha to our strong fall signing class we feel we have been able to strengthen the experience and future of our program," Binford said.

Kuderer and Lundberg join four other signees in the 2016-17 recruiting class.

MSU students train wild mustangs in benefit of veterans

Nine wild mustangs stepped foot onto Montana State University's Agricultural Research and Teaching Farm on Jan. 3rd. They came to MSU virtually untouched, hailing from Bureau of Land Management facilities in Burns, Oregon, then were adopted by the Montana non-profit Heroes and Horses to ultimately be used for therapeutic mountain pack trips with combat

Heroes and Horses is a program that uses horses and the remote wilderness to challenge and inspire combat veterans suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder. The veterans learn horsemanship skills and wilderness survival, then embark on progressive, multi-day horse pack trips in order to overcome their difficulties and replace devastating memories with positive ones.

A handful of MSU students, with the help of local trainers and volunteers, assisted in **gentling and training the adopted wild horses** over the course of nearly 90 days as the first step in helping these horses transition into a life of mountain adventure. The horses, gelded males ranging from 2 to 6 years old, left MSU on March 28th, headed to Arizona to begin the second phase of their training.

"The horses trained by MSU students, faculty and staff will ultimately serve as tools to teach military veterans new skills to start a post-military life," said Dr. Shannon Moreaux, DVM and an associate professor of equine science in MSU's Department of Animal and Range Sciences in the College of Agriculture.

"By using BLM feral horses for this service learning project, we are also providing a far-reaching service," Moreaux said. "The horses will be uniquely repurposed and will have a better life than living in a long-term holding facility; we will have provided a significant amount of publicity for the BLM Wild Horse adoption program. And, ultimately, we save taxpayer money while helping to protect sensitive ecosystems from overpopulation."

Professional trainers — including

rnowned horse trainer Buck
Brannaman, along with his protégées Isaac Johnson, Noah Cornish,
Wesley Fazari and Jon Ensign —
began the gentling process, taking
about a week to work with the mustangs upon arrival at MSU. During
this initial phase, five horses were
paired with volunteer students based
on horse temperament and student
experience, while the remaining
horses continued their training
under MSU equine faculty, staff and
volunteers.

Each of the students selected to work with a mustang had prior horse-training experience, having taken MSU's colt-starting class as part of their equine science studies. However, this was the first time several of the students had worked with mustangs.

Andrew Couch, a sophomore

Miller Pavilion, teaching the horses to stand quietly, accept a saddle and bit and respond softly to leg and bit pressure.

As the horses progressed, the stu-

from Gardiner majoring in animal science and livestock management, said this was the first time he had worked with mustangs under guidance, learning how to prepare a horse for future situations.

Students worked with the horses for four hours, six days a week, beginning at 6am at MSU's Bob dents were also able to take them off campus to expose them to new surroundings, as well as varied terrain, said Stefanie Herrera of Helena, a 2016 fall graduate of the Department of Ecology in MSU's College of Letters and Science. After graduating in December, Herrera began volunteering for the MSU Horsemen's Club and was one of the students asked to work with the mustangs.

"Horses will show where the challenges are for veterans," Herrera said, speaking on the connection between horse and rider. "If (a veteran) is angry or closed off, the horse will show it. This is (the horse's) job. The horse has to be able to help that veteran out. Heroes and Horses is giving these horses and these people a purpose."

Herrera added that the horses are rehabilitation horses as much as they are pack-and-saddle horses.

"I believe in the Heroes and Horses program," Moreaux said. "It is important we honor the men and women who have suffered in foreign wars by ensuring they can reintegrate into a nonmilitary society."

And, Moreaux said, it is important for students to participate in these types of service learning opportunities.

"Service learning is an educa-

"Service learning is an educational application that integrates knowledge transfer with a social need," he said. "Service learning enriches the learning experience, teaches civic responsibility and strengthens communities."

"It was a pretty neat experience," Herrera said. "I learned a lot and it was very humbling to be able to work with something wild that puts that much trust in you. I'm quite happy I got to be a part of that, and impact a horse that will go on to affect so many lives." •

Sonny Holland Scrimmage concludes spring practices

Score one for the offense.

After getting outplayed by the defense in a mistake-filled Triangle Classic in Great Falls back on April 8th, the offense took its turn in the spotlight on a sun-soaked Saturday afternoon at Bobcat Stadium in the annual Sonny Holland Classic to

Dropped balls and missed assignments plagued the offensive side of the ball in the Electric City, but none of those issues were evident in Bobcat Stadium in front of a nice crowd of supporters looking to get their final glimpse at head coach Jeff Choates' squad before the fall.

Reigning Big Sky Conference Freshman of the Year, Chris Murray, displayed improved accuracy in the passing game, and fellow quarterback Tyler Bruggman showed the accuracy and leadership many expected last season when the highly touted transfer arrived

Murray completed 10 of 13 passing attempts for 107 yards, while Bruggman contributed another 119 through the air on 5 of 8 completions, and the No. 1 offense connected on three touchdowns through the air. In Montana State's final game last season, a 24-17 vicover rival Montana Murray completed just 2 of 9 passes for

Sophomore receiver Kevin Kassis had a spectacular conclusion to his spring, racking up four catches for 87 yards and two touchdowns, to go along with 17 yards rushing.

'He's a guy we can count on to do a variety of things," Choate said. "He's smart, we can line him up in a variety of positions, he's good with the ball in his hands in a lot of — as a returner, as a slot receiver, as an outside receiver, even in the backfield some. He's a valuable weapon in our offense."

The MSU offense also rolled up 148 yards on the ground, led by Nick LaSane who tallied 32 yards on just three carries, and Murray, who totaled 33 yards on eight carries.

The offense looked much improved since the Triangle Classic, but the defense continued to make big plays, including a 55-yard pick six by Bozeman product Balue Chapman on the scrimmage's only turnover of the afternoon.

With the conclusion of spring practices, the players will now break until they reconvene for player-run practices in early June. Fall camp begins in August and coaches cannot organize workouts until that time. The Bobcats open the season on September 2nd in Pullman, WA versus the PAC-12's Washington State Cougars.

Nat'l "Business Against Bigotry" campaign engages small businesses locally

The American Independent Business Alliance (AMIBA), a Bozeman based nonprofit organization, has launched a national

"Business Against Bigotry" campaign to encourage independent businesses and community groups to counter trends of discrimination.

After hearing reports of local discrimination and intimidation from several Independent Business

Alliances around the U.S., AMIBA is enabling business owners to take a lead role in ensuring all people feel safe and welcome in local businesses and commercial areas.

The first campaign component is producing and giving away window decals and graphics for online use declaring "We Welcome Everybody/Diversity Strengthens Our Community." Schools, houses of worship and other institutions, as well as businesses are invited to spread the message. The decals are available free by mail, at the Country Bookshelf in Downtown Bozeman, and will be offered in other Gallatin Valley locations.

AMIBA sees the campaign serving independent businesses, as well as creating a presence to help halt the spread of bigotry that has occurred in recent months. "An individual who feels less than fully safe or welcomed will simply visit other places where they feel more comfortable to shop and dine, or they'll just

go online," said Jeff Milchen, AMIBA Co-director.

AMIBA also will produce radio public service announcements and print ads for community organizations around the U.S. to adapt locally. They debunk destructive myths about many minority groups and educating about the contributions a rich diversity of people make to our overall economic vitality.

Finally, The Business Against Bigotry campaign offers guidance to help business owners be a force for peace and diminish bigotry within their communities through advocacy and dialogue. Trainings will provide local business coalition leaders with the tools they need to facilitate community gatherings aimed at deepening understanding and creating local action plans for safer, more respectful communities. These trainings and much of the campaign are enabled by a grant from Open Society Foundations.

Though Montana has experienced fewer incidents than most states, it has not been immune from a rising tide of bigotry. In December, small business owner Jennifer Reynolds created gift baskets of items from her local business and others to give to businesses and families in her community of Whitefish who were harassed by a hate group simply for being Jewish. Although the group also attempted to intimi-

date Reynolds, local support dwarfed the hateful responses, which Reynolds said "empowered me and gave me the courage to stand up and not shrink away." Her business, Tree Hugger Soap Company, also fared well — online orders skyrocketed and she quickly sold out of most products.

Reynolds believes local businesses

have a responsibility to take a public

stand against bigotry. "If businesses are afraid to stand up, it doesn't help Whitefish's reputation" (in a region where white supremacist groups have a notable presence).

The Business Against Bigotry campaign recognizes that other com-

campaign recognizes that other community-based institutions play a role in cultivating a welcoming environment and welcomes partnerships with faith based organizations, non-profits, schools and other local institutions.

Pastor Jason Bowker from Bozeman's First Baptist Church believes pro-actively spreading such a message is key. "Let's commit to putting aside the false-binaries that our world teaches us exist," says Bowker. The First Baptist Church is one of several Bozeman faith-based organizations displaying "We Welcome Everybody" window decals.

Q1 real estate stats signal steady & strong

The Gallatin Association of REALTORS® [recently] released its **real estate statistics** for the first quarter of 2017.

"The Gallatin area real estate market finished the first quarter in solid shape," said Steve Candler, CEO of the Gallatin Association of REALTORS®. "Single-family residential sales are up, and the average number of days on market for single-family homes fell slightly. We expect the market to remain steady and strong as we move into summer."

Single Family Homes – Gallatin County

The number of new single-family listings in Gallatin County dropped slightly from 434 in the first quarter of 2016 to 415 in 2017, a 4.4% decrease. The number of closed sales jumped from 252 to 277, a 9.9% increase. The average number of days on market dropped from 94 to 88, a 6.4% decrease. The inventory of homes for sale fell from 510 to 405, a 20.6% decrease, and

the months' supply of inventory dropped from 4.1 to 3.1, a 24.4% decrease. The average sale price rose from \$459,031 to \$469,972, a 2.4% increase.

Condo/Townhouse Market Gallatin County

The number of new listings in the Gallatin County condo/townhouse market dropped from 227 in the first quarter of 2016 to 217 in 2017, a 4.4% decrease. The number of closed sales dropped from 140 to 131, a 6.4% decrease. The average number of days on market jumped sharply from 96 to 138, a 43.8% increase. The inventory of condo/townhouse homes available for sale dropped from 273 to 168, a 38.5% drop, and the months' supply of inventory fell from 4.2 to 2.6, a 38.1% decrease. The average sale price jumped sharply from \$254,376 to 362,263, a 42.4% spike.

The number of total new listings dropped from 703 in the first quarter of 2016 to 670 this year, a 4.7%

decrease. The number of closed sales increased slightly from 413 to 425, a 2.9% increase. The average number of days on market rose slightly from 94 to 103, a 9.6% jump. The total inventory of homes available for sale fell from 830 to 615, a 25.9% drop, and the month's supply of inventory fell from 4.2 to 3.0, a 28.6% decrease. The average sale price rose from \$383,494 to

\$443,358, a 15.6% increase.
