Three-Minute Thesis event at MSU

For a second straight year, a group of graduate students from Montana State University will give the public a chance to hear an 80,000-word thesis distilled into 180 seconds. MSU will host the Three-Minute Thesis event on Thursday, March 3rd from 3-4:30pm in the Procrastinator Theater in the Strand Union Building. The seven finalists chosen for the 3-Minute Thesis competition at MSU come from disciplines across the College of Engineering. They will try to explain, very concisely, how their research might affect you. Contestants must condense their research into a brief, engaging presentation for a non-

specialist audience, using a single

presentation slide.

Following is a list of finalists: Jeff Simkins will present "MRI: A New Tool in the Fight to End Infectious Disease," highlighting his research pioneering a better technique for measuring oxygen concentration in biofilms; David Walters will present "The Microscopic View of Big Mountain Avalanches," an examination of the small-scale interactions of individual snowflakes and how they produce avalanches; Anali Huggins will present "Mental Workload and the Scheduling System," a look at nursing workloads and scheduling patients; Martin Tauc's thesis, "Laser Sensing of Insects for Probing National Park Ecology," considers monitoring the effects of noise and light pollution

on flying insects using lidar; Utkarsh Goel, with his thesis "Making the Internet Faster," will highlight his ongoing research on improving Internet connectivity; Sarah Mailhiot will offer a look at her thesis, "A New Use for MRI: Diagnosing Arthritis," and how water could be the key to diagnosing arthritis; and Julie Muretta and her thesis, "Making Environmentally Friendly, Strong Polymers," will offer a glimpse of her research into creating durable, "green," nanocomposite films.

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Movie Lovers

Presents: Benny and Joon: Johnny Depp's Early Eccentricity

By Kari Bowles To young Millennials who have come of age with the Pirates of the Caribbean franchise, it may be impossible to conceive of a time when Johnny Depp wasn't one of the most recognizable movie stars in the world. But over

twenty years ago, before he starred in mega-blockbusters, Depp was a performer that only a relatively small band of aficionados were aware of. From his breakout in 1987 with the short-lived TV series 21 Jump Street, to his poignant turn as the title character in Tim Burton's Edward Scissorhands(1990), he developed a specialty in portraying deeply odd characters who nevertheless held more appeal and warmth than more straightforward leading men might. It could be argued that at the present stage of his career he has started to become a parody of himself, with the eccentricities seeming rote calculated instead of appealing. However, such an assessment cannot wilt the bloom on his early 90s persona. Benny and Joon(1993) is an example of his eccentricity at its most charming and unaffected. It is now retired from Netflix, making it all the more of a hidden gem.

Benny Pearl(Aidan Quinn) works as a mechanic in Spokane, Washington; he also has the responsibility of serving as the caregiver to his sister Juniper(Mary Stuart Masterson), an artist with a serious mental illness. Benny is at the point of deciding to have Joon committed to a group home, when a young man named Sam (Johnny Depp) comes into their lives, filling the role



himself on Buster Keaton; he has the same quiet, generally stone-faced calm

and the acrobatic physicality (although there is a nod to the "dancing dinner rolls" scene from Charlie Chaplin's 1925 picture The Gold Rush). Accordingly, much of the humor in the film is staged in a way comparable to the stunts in a silent comedy, with emphasis falling on timing and the quirky incongruity of the action. The scene where mashed potatoes are prepared with a tennis racket is a case in point. Depp has no affectation or mugging during this culinary endeavor; he isn't "trying" to be funny. He is engrossed in a task he approaches with earnest attention, and therein lays the key to the laugh the moment gets.

But Sam's wackiness is meaningfully counterbalanced with Joon's sickness. He is different, but different in a way that can engage with the world. This grants a surprising, and significant, serious undertone to their relationship, as well as Benny's reaction to it. It is a credit to Aidan Quinn and to director Jeremiah S Chechik that Benny is never a cruel obstructionist. He loves his sister and wants to protect her, and his actions all spring from that.

And as a parting note of commendation: Benny and Joon helped popularize The Proclaimers' song "I'm Gonna Be (500 Miles)". •

Started as a four-day conference in California 26 years ago, TED has grown to support those world-changing ideas with multiple initiatives. At TED, the world's leading thinkers and doers are asked to give the talk of their lives in 18 minutes. Talks are then made available, free, at TED.com. TED speakers have included Bill Gates, Jane Goodall, Elizabeth Gilbert, Sir Richard Branson, Benoit Mandelbrot, Philippe Starck, Ngozi Okonjo-Iweala, Isabel Allende and former UK Prime Minister Gordon Brown. Two major TED events are held

each year: The TED Conference takes place every spring in Long Beach, California (along with a parallel conference, TEDActive, in Palm Springs), and TEDGlobal is held each summer in Edinburgh. 

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
Bozeman Monologues set to return



Montanans ready for new food, energy economy

A recent scientific poll commissioned by Northern Plains Resource Council found that Montanans are ready for an economy powered by new energy sources and promoting regional agriculture. Only 15% of Montanans believe that the transition to renewable energy will have a negative effect on jobs, while 77% believe it will have a positive or neutral effect. The survey was created by Professor Michaël Aklin of the University of Pittsburgh, Department of Political Science, and 705 randomly selected registered voters in Montana were polled from January 7th-17th, 2016.

"Despite posturing to the contrary by Montana's investor owned utilities, fossil fuel companies, and some politicians, Montanans know that renewable energy is one of the fastest growing sectors of our nation's economy and that it can benefit Montana too," said Ed Gulick, former chair of the Northern Plains Resource Council and an architect at High Plains Architects in Billings. "Solar employment has grown at 20 times the national average for the past few years. These good-paying jobs await hard-working people all across the state if we open up more

opportunities for distributed solar and wind energy."

Additionally, Montanans are broadly supportive of increasing our consumption of Montanagrown food and believe it is a way to support the local economy. At

local economy.

"We're an agricultural state. Rather than importing food to eat and sending our food dollars out of state, we can keep Montana food dollars in-state by buying products from Montana farmers and ranchmy of our rural communities-besides, its fresher and probably tastes better."

Northern Plains Resource Council and its Billings affiliate, Yellowstone Valley Citizens Council, are actively working to increase conto institutional markets throughout Eastern Montana.

Regional food hubs are a proven nationwide model for creating the infrastructure necessary to increase consumption of local food; one successful example in Montana is the Mission Mountain Food Enterprise Center in Ronan. To ensure that the 705-person sample was representative of the broader population of Montana, post-stratification weights were added. The sample is representative of Montana's population in terms of age, income, gender, educational, and racial distribution. Respondents heard one of four possible versions of a combination of arguments in favor and against local food production. The combination was randomly selected. Hearing about the cost of food or about seasonal reliability did not statistically affect the average level

94%, almost all Montanans support their local school district buying at least 20% of their food from Montana farmers and ranchers, even if it is more expensive or seasonal. When asked why they try to purchase local food, respondents' top two reasons were knowing more about their food and supporting the ers." said Jean Lemire Dahlman, a Northern Plains member who ranches outside Forsyth. "Those dollars will have a multiplier effect as they circulate throughout Montana communities. Creating additional, local markets for Montana producers to sell into is critical to strengthening the econosumption of locally produced food in Eastern Montana's schools, hospitals, restaurants and other institutions. MT sheep producers on bighorn conservation

Hardly a month goes by without a new article about how domestic sheep will destroy Montana's wildlife population and quite possibly the entire Western U.S. ecosystem unless they are eliminated. Over the past 40 years, domestic sheep have mostly disappeared from federal forest allotments in Montana, originally set up for "multiple use." At the same time, demographic trends have seen a good portion of Montana's traditional winter ranges subdivided and paved over. Wildlife are now forced onto smaller areas of private land for their winter feed, increasing the tension between private landowners, sportsmen and women, and FWP. Mounting bureaucratic regulations brought on by lawsuits, are forcing management decisions of our state's wildlife into the hands of federal courts and away from local control. These regulations also make it difficult for ranchers to continue to graze their federal allotments.

"Good!" some people will say. In the long term, the loss of grazing rights will exacerbate

the subdivision of even more open rangeland as these family ranches become unsustainable.

The current disputes over bighorn sheep are case in point. Montana has a Bighorn Conservation Strategy agreed upon by the state and interested parties. The plan calls for 5 new herds to be established over a 10 year period. The

main issue in finding new ground for bighorn herds is private landowners near potential release sites are intimidated by future regu-

lations that may be imposed on them. Groups are finding ways



around the arduous task of listing species through the Endangered Species Act by using the "minimum viable population" clause in Forest

Service policies. While bighorns are not a listed species and are still

hunted across the west, lawsuits are driving single species management on federal lands. Ultimately

> bighorn/domestic sheep conflict will be tame compared to the coming free ranging bison/cattle conflict. Montana needs

to make a decision on whether to manage bighorn herds as a group or as isolated herds.

Managing bighorns as a group, allowing population flow, and contact with domestic livestock will ultimately evolve a robust, healthy gene pool across the bighorn population. We know from past sampling that current bighorn herds carry the Pasteurella bacteria. Even if all domestic sheep are removed from the state, Montana

will continue to experience bighorn sheep die-offs. With disease vectors already in the population, all that's needed is an extremely severe winter like 2010 to weaken the herds and make them susceptible. The Sun River herd experienced a dieoff that winter which reduced numbers from over 900 to under 500. This herd is struggling to regain its footing. However, those remaining will have been exposed and develop resistance to the pathogens. It is important to note there have been no domestic sheep grazing anywhere near the Sun River herd for several generations. Instances like this are never widely reported.

The take home message here is "coexist." Bighorn sheep and domestic sheep each play an important role in our Montana landscape. Bighorn sheep are part of our national heritage. They represent a time when the United States was truly wild. Ironically, it is domestic sheep providing a renewable, sustainable living for ranchers who will help preserve the open space necessary for Bighorn sheep to survive.

Bozeman Cemetery stories: Mary Blackmore

George Eliot wrote "Our dead are never dead to us, until we have for-

gotten them." The **Extreme History Project** hopes to remember some of our dearly departed in Bozeman and surrounding region by sharing with you the stories of people buried in our local cemeteries. With this series,

learn just who those people are in the cemetery.

They all have lifetimes of stories to tell. The following is the story of **Mary** Blackmore, a woman whose death brought about the creation of Bozeman's Sunset Hills Cemetery.

Mary Sidford, born 1822, married William Blackmore in 1851 at the church of Saint John the Baptist in Bishopstone near Salisbury, England. Purportedly a confidant of Queen Victoria, Mary was described as a, "kind and friendly individual" and a prominent social leader, who entertained such 19th century celebrities as Mark Twain and Charlotte Bronte at their extensive country estate. William was a frequent traveler of the American West and had made quite a fortune promoting the frontier. As a wealthy man with interests in anthropology and Native American customs, he helped to fund explorers and photographers like William Jackson and Ferdinand Hayden. In 1872, William and Mary decided to travel to the United States with their nephew to visit Yellowstone National Park during its inaugural year. Before they left, the Blackmores agreed that if either died on their journey, the other would arrange for the burial at the place where the death occurred.

Unfortunately, while travelling by stagecoach from Helena to Bozeman, Mary fell ill. As hotel accommodations in that day were not abundant, the Blackmores stayed with the Willson family in their log cabin on Main

Street. Mary stayed behind with the Willson family, while William and their

nephew travelled on toward Yellowstone. Soon after they left, Mary took a turn for the worse, a messenger was sent for William Blackmore, and he quickly returned to Bozeman, but there was nothing that could be done, and Mary died soon after. Her death was likely caused by periostitis, the inflammation and infection of a layer of connective tissue that surrounds the bone. At the time, there was no cemetery in Bozeman, so William bought five acres on a hill overlooking the town for \$250. This tract where Mary is buried is now known as Sunset Hills

William left instructions and money with the Willson family for an elaborate triangle shaped mausoleum to be constructed over her grave. It is believed that the gravestone is shaped like a triangle to look like Mount Blackmore, which is named in memory of William and Mary Blackmore. Mount Blackmore can be seen from Mary's grave in Sunset Hills Cemetery. After Mary was buried, other citizens of Bozeman began to bury their dead in this area, but it was also used as a place to graze cows. The cows knocked down gravestones and the original cemetery has over 500 unmarked graves.

Raptor workshop & field trip announced

The Montana Raptor Conservation Center and Montana Audubon have announced a Two-Day Raptor Identification Workshop & Field Trip to take

place on Friday, March 4th and Saturday the 5th in and around Bozeman. This event is to be presented by Steve Hoffman, Executive Director of MT Audubon and founder of HawkWatch International.

Have you ever wanted to sharpen your raptor identification skills? If so, this is the workshop for you. Everyone will benefit. Beginners will find this workshop quite helpful to understand the basic forms of raptors. Intermediate and advanced raptorwatching enthusiasts will find the identification fine points especially valuable.

On Friday evening from 7-9pm at the Montana Outdoor Science School, Steve will provide a

detailed discussion of the identification and natural history of all raptor species (e.g., hawks, eagles, falcons, etc.) wintering in the Gallatin Valley. Steve's illustrated



talk will include a description of the many plumage variations (including subspecies and color forms, as well as age and sex varia-

tions) of the more common and observable species. Helpful behavioral clues will also be incorporated. Eagles, falcons, and the "buteo" hawks (such as Red-tailed Hawks) will be emphasized.

Leaving from the Museum of the Rockies parking lot on Saturday morning at 8:30am and running until 1:30pm, participants will then go into the field (north of Bozeman) to practice their newlydeveloped skills. Be sure to bring your binoculars, dress for the weather and bring lunch, drinks, or snacks for this 4-5 hour trip. If you have a spotting scope that you can bring, that would be helpful.

Cost of this event is \$59 for Adults and \$49 for children. The price includes: a \$25 donation to MRCC to support education programs for rural and un-funded schools and a \$25 donation to Montana Audubon to support the annual Bridger Hawk Watch. A graduate of MSU's Science and Natural History Filmmaking program who has a part-time home in Bozeman, Matheson currently leads the Video as Evidence program for WITNESS, an organization dedicated to exposing human rights abuses through film across the globe. As head of the program, Matheson teaches filmmaking skills to activists worldwide in order to spark change. She then works to ensure that the videos that activists collect can be used as evidence in courts of law to secure justice.

A former practicing attorney, Matheson has worked on a wide range of human rights issues including Ebola prevention, climate change, the trafficking of children and war crimes. Through her work, Matheson has helped imprison warlords who utilize child soldiers, expose gender-based violence and ensure elderly Americans are protected under the law. For example, Matheson returned in January after founding a project dedicated to filming and documenting human rights abuses in Ukraine. Matheson has been awarded a Telly award for her film on pilots who voluntarily fly over threatened islands in Costa Rica, and her work in Brazil was featured in The




An African Adventurer Wes Krause

Blustery February

By Zelpha Boyd After I talked to my brother who lives in Spokane, I felt really depressed. His daffodils and tulips are 2 to 3 inches! As I write this on the 10th of February, my yard and garden are covered with a foot or more of the cold white stuff. The wood stove is putting out heat, the outside air is frosty, and I'm wishing for warmer weather. Saving the day, was the arrival of the Park's Seed





Catalog—so many colorful pictures of possibilities!

You'll be reading this the first of March—still winter here in the mountains of Montana!

So what could we be doing-garden-wise—while waiting for spring? There are several things actually; cut back the geraniums, repot those African Violets, start seeds under the lights, read a good book, sharpen the gardening tools...

Starting geranium cuttings this

time of year really makes good sense. Those older plants need haircuts. The cuttings being started now will be ready to plant in the garden come June. I simply cut off the leggy parts of the plant; dip the end of the stem in a rooting hormone and "plant" in a pot of good potting soil. Keeping the soil moist, and the pot covered, insures the development of a good root system.

In repotting those overgrown African Violets, I cut off the straggly older leaves, and put the remaining plant into some good, new potting soil. Again, keeping it watered but not too much—insures good growth. Soon they'll be blooming

And starting seedlings? It really is a tad early for that. But I may try any way. It's so much fun to see new growth this time of year. I'm going to use a soil heating mat under the planting tray. Keeping those emerging roots warm encourages root growth. The fluorescent gro-lights need to be very close to the tops of the tiny plants as they grow, ensuring plenty of light to make for sturdy

Another before-spring-activity is to read a good gardening book. There are the catalogs of course, but other books may encourage a new approach to our gardens this season. The library has a good supply as does the Country Bookshelf. Pick out books by local authors who write about gardening in our particular area.

Yesterday I visited a flower shop. What delicious fragrances with all those flowering plants! Just the pickme-up I needed for a cold February

Spring came last year, so I'm sure it'll arrive again this year! In the meantime, while we wait for the March weather to clear and become warmer, keep thinking green-and blossoms, fresh lettuce & radishes... Please keep me in mind with questions. Forum for conserving Gallatin Range announced

"Your Wild Backyard: A Conservation Strategy for the **Gallatin Range"** is set to be the topic of a panel discussion planned to take place at the Bozeman Public Library on Thursday, March 31st from 7-9pm. The public is invited, and the event is being sponsored by Montanans for Gallatin Wilderness, an informal group of citizens mostly from Gallatin and Park Counties.

Montanans for Gallatin Wilderness has proposed an unbroken 548,000-acre Gallatin Range Wilderness, which includes all of the remaining roadless lands in the Gallatin National Forest portion of the range plus contiguous lands in Yellowstone National Park. This 229,000-acre wildland is the groups' primary focus at this time. The Hyalite-Porcupine-Buffalo Horn Wilderness Study Area encompasses about 150,000 acres of the national forest roadless area.

The discussion will be a participatory event, with a question and answer session following the panelist's presentations. The panel consists of world-renowned Bozeman wildlife ecologist Dr. Lance Craighead; equally renowned bear biologist Dr. David Mattson of

Livingston; Bozemanbased conservationist, wilderness advocate and author Phil Knight; retired Forest Service biologist and conservation activist Dr. Sara Jane Johnson of Three Forks; and Sierra Club Organizing Representative Kiersten Iwai of Bozeman. The panel moderator will be long-time Montana wilderness guide and author Howie Wolke of Park County. According to panel

moderator and wilderness

guide Howie Wolke, "Gallatin Range Wilderness is important for maintaining wildness and biodiversity in the Yellowstone Ecosystem. This is world-class wildlife habitat supporting species that are sensitive to human intrusion. Half of the mountain range north of Yellowstone has already been developed and is open to mechanized transportation. Many people feel that what's left should be protected as designated Wilderness."

Joe Gutkoski, long-time



Montana conservationist, retired Forest Service landscape architect and current member of Montanans for Gallatin Wilderness added, "You can't have wilderness in little pieces; then it's not really wilderness. Wildlife needs big chunks of undisturbed wild country and so do many Montanans." •

Food Storage Order goes back into effect

Five of the seven districts, including Bozeman, Hebgen, Gardiner, Yellowstone and Beartooth, on the Custer Gallatin National Forest start their Food Storage Orders, in effect March 1

December 1, annually. Food Storage Orders are in effect to reduce adverse human-wildlife interactions including bear and other wildlife species.

The Food Storage Order requires that all unattended food, garbage and attractants be stored through one of the approved methods:

hard-sided vehicles, bear-resistant containers,

hung at least 10 feet above the ground, and 4 feet away from tree/pole, out of the reach of wildlife or

placed within a fenced area that meets the IGBC approved bear resistant products list. (The order defines appropriate methods for storing and possessing food, refuse

and other attractants, including animal carcasses and burning of

Individuals who do not comply with the food storage order can be

issued a violation and can be held civilly liable for any damages that occur from non-compliance. It is always good practice to maintain a clean camp and keep food properly stored in containers out of the

reach of wildlife and secured for both the safety of bears, other wildlife and for human safety.

The Interview

Madchild brings infectious sound to Bozeman

Famed Canadian rapper and hip-hop artist Madchild is no stranger to a busy touring schedule. He has appeared at countless venues in the United States, Canada, and around the world as a part of the group Swollen Members. But most currently, Madchild is on the road as a solo artist in promotion of his latest release Silver Tongue Devil. In anticipation of his upcoming Bozeman show, the passionate and energetic mc was gracious enough to hop on the phone with the Rolling Zone (prior to yet another lengthy drive) to talk memories and making

RZ: How are you doing today? **MC:** Good! How are you? **RZ:** Doing good! You're in the process of touring and coming to Bozeman on the 3rd to the Molly Brown. Tell us a little bit about what you've got planned for that show and what people can expect to see. **MC:** It's going to be live energy of

MC: It's going to be live energy, a lot of fun. I'm excited to come out there. I've been on a long run in Canada–I just did 28 shows four months ago, and then cam back and just did 37. I live in L.A. now and I love it. I'm definitely excited to come back and do some American shows.

RZ: Your career is marked with extensive touring. Do you ever get tired or are you always excited to be on the road?

MC: Yeah, I mean, this winter tour in Canada was pretty rough. There were some pretty crazy drives, with snowstorms and what not, but I'm excited to keep going. You know, you've got to just keep your mind in that mode. I'll go home for a day and a half, then back on the road. Then I go to Europe and come back and do some more American shows, then I go to Australia. Then when I get back from Australia, I can say, "Ok. Time to take a break for a minute." **RZ:** What went into the making of your latest solo effort, Silver Tongue Devil?

MC: I put a lot of effort into that record. I wanted to put the same amount of effort as I did into my first album Dope Sick. I definitely took my time. It was the number three album in Canada on the Billboard Top 200. I really thought the cover was cool. We got L'Amour Supreme from Michigan to do the cover. I bought the actual artwork off of the canvas after. Yeah, and I'm happy with how [the album]'s done. It's been great.

RZ: Has putting out material on your own Battle Axe Records had any sort of affect on the music or its release?

MC: Not really. I just record them at my crib—I got a set-up there. People send me beats and I get into a zone. Once I get into a zone, I

probably work like fourteen hours a day on music when I'm at home. [I] just made the album, there wasn't any crazy story to it really. Just like when I get into tour mode, I get into studio mode. I feel like I pushed it lyrically. It was a fun record to make. RZ: What does the recording process look like for Madchild? MC: Well rapping is not like riding a bike. To stay sharp, you gotta work at it. If I go on the road for four months and come back, I might write for like a week before I even

got on the radio. You couldn't turn the radio or tv on without seeing us or hearing us back then. So coming back and having a solo career and having success, it being a new world, success is measured in different forms now. [Because] music is free, I'm pretty thankful I've sold as many records as I have. I have a very loyal fan base and I'm thankful for that. I consider them my family. It's been fun coming back and being able to do it all over again.

RZ: What do you think separates

like four of Canada's version of the Grammys, eight or nine Top 10 hits, won seven Much Music Awards, and went platinum a few times. Those were shining moments for sure. And playing in front of twenty, thirty thousand people. The biggest show we ever did was fifty thousand people. That was pretty crazy, playing on the same stage as Coldplay. As far as Swollen Members goes, those were shining moments, the accolades and life on the tour bus. It was pretty cool. Now, coming back after a

an amazing feeling. I think I'm addicted to that.

RZ: What would you say to people who might be out chasing the same sort of dream and living the hip-hop culture?

MC: I would say, make sure to have a backup plan to be honest with you. I know that sounds weird, because normally I would say you can't have a backup plan if you want to make it. But it's so difficult now. Everything is so oversaturated.

There's literally a million rappers out there. There are probably as many fans as rappers. Everybody wants to live the same dream. When I started, I guess it was easier. But [now] there's no way to keep up. How do you keep up with music now? Albums come and go so fast; artists' careers come and go so fast. So many different things can happen. This is a very fast moving business and world now. Careers don't last, [which] is why I'm happy to come from the era that I came from. I'm honored to be one of the people-like Tech N9ne and Vinnie Paz-who have lifelong careers. I feel like I can do this as long as I want to. But it's different now. The chances of having a lifelong career for music are a lot slimmer than they used to be. It sucks, but it's true. We do it because we love it. Even with me, it's still a grind. Music's free! I'm lucky. I would say, it's smart to do it because you love it and make sure you tour as well as using the internet. You have to get out there

from the boys. **RZ:** Touring has to be great because it connects you with your fans, or as you called them, your family.

MC: Yeah, you build relationships even if you're not sitting there having conversation. Start recognizing people that have come to three, four of your shows, and kind of give them an extra pound and a handshake and say what's up. That stuff is really important. And fun!

RZ: You're a busy guy. Any final words before we see you in

MC: Shout out to everybody that supports me. Without them, I'd be making music in my crib by myself. It's a lot more fun when you know people are enjoying your music and taking it in. Without my fans—my family—and people that support me, I'm nothing. They're everything to me. So thank you.

We toured the world back then with Black Eyed Peas, Nelly Furtado, Rihanna, Sum 41. It was cool because we were playing in stadiums, but we were this backpack rap group that just made our music. But at the time it popped off and

you from all the other rappers out there?

MC: I think I'm at a top-ranking place for my lyrical ability, but I also can make the songs fun. Even though I'll do what I call abstract expressionism, the style that I do is abstract at times, but I'm also speaking about things, so a lot of people relate to my music. All rappers have to have confidence if they're going to be successful. Real, true art comes from within. Nothing is pre-thought, it just happens. When you dig deep and talk about life and you talk about what you're going through and what you've been through and where you're headed, people relate to that. I try to be sharp, as far as my wordplay, but still touch people, reach people. I'm not afraid to talk about the struggles we go through in life. Life's a beautiful struggle.

RZ: Over the course of your career in music, can you pinpoint some shining achievements?

MC: Yeah, a lot of things. We won



Book review: Soul Serenade

Vinyl is making a comeback. Those are five words that put a smile on a music aficionado's face. A CD isn't the same, they say. An MP3 is nowhere near as good. You don't get the right sound unless you're spinning a record, so vinyl is coming back – but, for people like Rashod Ollison in "Soul Serenade," it never really left.

There was once a time when "Dusty" Ollison's parents were happy.


He knows it's true; he has evidence of it, in the form of a picture taken at the beginning of their marriage, which lasted thirteen years. When they split, he was old enough to witness but too young to understand, having become inured to the fights, the cheating, and the drinking at his home near Hot Springs, Arkansas.

After Ollison's father fled his family – leaving Ollison's mother with a 'tween and two small children - he rarely returned. But he left a gift behind: stacks of vinyl.

Ollison says he remembers poking around music stores with his father, ogling covers, eager for approval of his taste in performers. Chaka Khan, Bobby Womack, Stevie Wonder, Ollison recalls fascination with their record labels spinning on the turntable. Michael Jackson gave him comfort, Aretha was a mood barometer, they all taught him about grown-up love through lyrics. With his mother working two full-time jobs to keep food on the table, Ollison counted on music to anchor him. It was his means of escape as his oldest sister took her rage out on him, as his family moved repeatedly, as he was bullied in school for "actin' like a woman."

He denied feminine gestures and a tender heart, but by age thirteen, he could no longer ignore that he

School, by then, had joined music as a thing of refuge; Ollison excelled at his lessons, achieved good



grades, made friends, and expanded his playlist. As he grew, he also wondered about his father sometimes but was largely indifferent, even as the man lay dying. And then an aunt told Ollison some-

thing that made him change his tune. "Soul Serenade" starts where

many good memoirs do: with a faded picture of a time that barely seems possible. From there, we're surprised by a death that promises to taint much of what's to come, all wrapped in family lore.

But don't get complacent. Author Rashod Ollison doesn't allow any lingering. Soon enough, his story becomes angry yelling, a smack upside the head, profanity, TV-asbabysitter, fists and sore feet. We're taken from neighborhood to neighborhood as the lights are shut off, the rent isn't paid, and he's taunted with words that his sister has to explain. It's chaos - but it's also a darn good tale that it doesn't dissolve into whining or poor-me-ing, testament to Ollison's storytelling skills.

"Soul Serenade" is one of those books that sticks in your brain not only for the suggested music, but because the memoir itself leaves its mark. And if that sounds like solid gold to you, then give this book a spin •



As confusing as this new law may seem-well it is, as far as a shutdown date or actual imposition of the law, I have heard everything from it taking effect as of now, in three days, fifteen days, June of 2017, and

The part that has me so conflicted is the fact that people actually need this stuff. The medical benefits are endless and listless



stance abuse to ophioids, amphetamines, alcopletely legal to prescribe and, in my opinion, outrageously overprescribed. 



Best athlete in Montana history

Last month, the Montana Mint initiated a campaign to name the top four greatest athletes in Montana history. With 2,500 votes cast, the Mint is pleased to announce the four athletes who will be etched (metaphorically) into our very own Mount Rushmore of Montana Sports: **Dave**

Dickenson, Larry Krystkowiak, Dave McNally, and Evel **Knievel.** Voters were able to vote for four athletes from the following 16: Brock Osweiler, Colt Anderson, Dan Carpenter, Dane Fletcher, Dave Dickenson, Dave McNally, Dwan Edwards, Evel Knievel, Josh Huestis, Kroy Biermann, Larry Krystkowiak, Laser, Ryan Leaf, Todd Foster, the Zadick Brothers, and the 1904 Fort Shaw Women's Basketball Team. The Montana Mint made a few observations about the results.

"We are excited that all of the winners represent different sports and different hometowns: Dickenson (Football/Great Falls), Krystkowiak

(Basketball/Missoula), McNally (Baseball/Billings), and Even Knievel (Stunts/Butte)."

"Montanans favor the nostalgia vote: Dickenson is the youngest winner at 43 years of age. Only one person under the age of 40 made the top eight (Brock Osweiler was seventh).

On Ryan Leaf taking 16th place: "We were surprised at how terribly Leaf did. His personal problems have been well documented, but he was an undeniable athletic freak. Montanans are not even a tiny bit forgiving when it comes to Ryan Leaf. We thought we made a compelling case to include him in the top four, both because of his athletic ability and as an example to show young athletes how far you can fall. He's also been on somewhat of a redemption tour-speaking publically about his problems with addiction and his concerns for Johnny Manziel. Despite this, Montanans are not eager to celebrate him."

On sports missing from list: "We heard from a LOT of fans about who were upset rodeo, track and field, and skiing weren't represented in the top 16, which is fair. These athletes were certainly hurt by the fact their sports aren't as broadly popular as many of those represented on this list."

On the lack of women athletes on the list: "It was an oversight not to include more women in the top 16. We had more female athletes in our internal top 30 list, but only the 1904 Fort Shaw basketball team made the final 16. If we were to run the competition again, we'd probably replace Laser with Shannon Cate, who played basketball for the Griz and was named the top female athlete in Big Sky Conference history back in 2014."

On those receiving write-in votes: "Marc Mariani (WR for the Chicago Bears), Pat Donovan (former LT for the Dallas Cowboys), Tim Hauck (former NFL safety), Shannon Cate


(basketball), Marvin Camel (boxing), and Dan Mortenson (rodeo) all received a considerable amount of write-in votes. All were in our original

MSU Guard Leaves Program

With just over two weeks left in the regular season, Montana State junior guard Stephan Holm has decided to leave the Bobcat basketball program for personal reasons according to MSU head coach Brian Fish.

"We wish Steph the best," Fish stated in a release by MSU. "We're here to support him in any way possible."

The timing of Holm's departure is a bit peculiar to say the least, in advance of a tough road swing through his home state of Utah, and takes an important offensive threat off the roster as the 'Cats gear up for the conference tournament in Reno, NV later this month.

Holm, the 6-fot-2 guard from Riverton, UT had been averaging 19.6 minutes a game for the

Bobcats, averaging 6.5 points and 2.5 rebounds in a backup roll to all-everything freshman Tyler Hall, appearing in 25 out 26 games. Those numbers were down from a season ago, when he averaged 9.8 points per game and was the third leading scorer in Fish's first season on the bench.

With emergence of the freshman Hall, Holm's minutes and production took a dip as the season progressed this year, making his role on the team less defined. Always a reliable shooter, Holm's greatest deficiency was on the defensive end of the floor.

Holm's most memorable moment in the Blue and Gold came last December when he knocked down seven 3-pointers on his way to a career high 25 points versus Texas-Arlington. He also hit four triples against Northern Arizona this season as part of MSU's record-breaking performance when they hit 25 3-pointers against the Lumberjacks last month.

For his career, the lefty with the sweet stroke finished with 124 3pointers, just 24 shy of MSU's top 10 all-time list, including 91 over his first two seasons, the second-most ever by a Bobcat in that time span. MSU wraps up the regular season portion of their schedule March 3rd and 5th with a pair of home contests versus Northern Colorado and North Dakota before heading south to Reno for the Big Sky Conference tournament.
