Bozeman pays homage with Memorial Day events

ere we are again, that maddening time of year when spring has sprung and many are stuck playing the "ready, set, wait" for summer game. Though summer-proper doesn't arrive until later in June, we've

already been taunted by one or two preview days. Live music and family-friendly events have begun to make the move outside as area farmers markets prep their inventories and sun-seeking outdoor enthusiasts ready their equipment, heading out in droves. But before we slip into the nonstop craziness summer in Southwest Montana brings, we must honor those who gave their lives and granted us the freedom to do so. **Memorial Day** falls on Monday, May 29th this year — here's a look at a few local events stoking patriotism in recognition of the fallen.

Bozeman Film Society will present the Bozeman premiere of **And We Were Young** at The Ellen Theatre on Wednesday, May 24th at 7:30pm in early commemoration of Memorial Day.

Three years and over 250,000 individual frames in the making, this moving stop-action animated oral history of American soldiers ('Doughboys') in France during the last months of the Great War is brought to life by Montana filmmaker Andy Smetanka. Brutal and beautiful, Smetanka's first feature film paints an unforgettable picture of the "war to end all wars," narrated with the words of the men who survived.

Smetanka will join for this very special

Evening of Remembrance on the 100th Anniversary of the United States involvement in WWI. Prior to the film screening, the public is invited to Wild Joe*s Coffee Spot for a free animation demonstration by Smetanka from 6–7pm. Delicious soup and Doughboy rolls will be available for \$5.

Following the demonstration, American Legion Post #14 will open the film presentation with a Color Guard. Adapted from *Doughboy War: The American Expeditionary Force in World War I* by James H. Hallas, And We Were *Young* is not rated and runs 75 minutes. Tickets are \$8.75 for general admission, \$8.50 for seniors and students (plus fees), and are available at www.theellentheatre.com.

The annual **American Legion Memorial Day Parade** will take place on Monday, May 29th at 9:30am. Line up downtown and pay your respects as the procession moves from 7th and Main on its way to an 11am memorial service at Sunset Hills Cemetery, located directly behind Lindley Park. The morning will kick off with a pancake breakfast at Bozeman's American Legion from 7–9am. Come enjoy a short stack, visit with local servicemen and women, and hear or share stories about the Gallatin Valley's own heroes.

This year's parade will feature a number of honored WWII vets from the area, Gold Star Mothers on the steps of the Gallatin County Courthouse, members of the Absaroka tribe, and more. The public is invited to stop by the American Legion the evening before the parade for a meet and greet beginning at 6pm in support of those who have served our country.

Elling House presents Nancy Cooper Russell, MT Poet Laureate

I he Elling House Arts & Humanities Center will present "Kid Gloves and Brass **Knuckles: The Life of Nancy** Cooper Russell" on Friday, May 19th at 7pm. This historical portrayal will be led by Mary Jane Bradbury, an independent scholar and actress.

Annual series brings timely films of Jewish interest to Bozeman

Under the auspices of Congregation Beth Shalom, this summer marks the third consecutive year of the Bozeman Jewish Film Festival bringing outstanding films of Jewish interest to Southwest Montana. From comedy to drama to documentary film, the presentations will run the gamut. Films will be screened at the comfortable Procrastinator Theater in the Student Union Building (SUB) on the MSU campus on various Wednesdays between May and August at 7pm each evening.

All award winners in various categories, here's a peek at this season's film schedule.

The Women's Balcony will kick off the series on May 24th. A hit in both Israel and the United States, this movie is set in Jerusalem and tells the story of what happens when the balcony of a (modern) orthodox synagogue collapses. It's a lighthearted look at the reactions of moderate people being faced with extremism.

Tense, fastpaced drama AKA Nadia will follow on May 31st. The film is about what can take place when your past catches up with you. Maya, the wife of an official at the Israeli Ministry of Justice and a successful choreographer in her

own right, was not always Maya. Several years earlier, she had been Nadia, an Arab woman in love with a PLO activist ...

Check out A Grain of Truth on June 7th. The film delves into the ways modern Polish society handles and avoids — the historical memory of anti-Semitism during and immediately after World War II. It's a crime drama as seen through the eyes of a state prosecutor whose own life has fallen apart.

Fast forward to July 5th and enjoy Welcome. The timely release describes the arduous journey of an Iraqi immigrant who makes his way from Mosul to, finally, France as he endeavors to reach his Kurdish girlfriend in London. The film presents two stories: one, Bilal's love for his girlfriend and his effort to overcome the final obstacle in his way (the English Channel); and the second, his relationship with Simon, the Frenchman he meets.

Set for July 26th, Denial is the

gripping drama of the pursuit, through the United Kingdom court system, of a historian by a Holocaust denier. This is taken from what actually happened in 1996 and, given the current conversations about alternative truths, is as up-todate as today.

Closing out the film festival on August 2nd is Keep Quiet. The riveting documentary follows a young Hungarian neo-Nazi politician whose life is upended when he learns of his Jewish roots. Truth is often inconvenient.

Alfred Hitchcock is most readily associated with macabre thrillers. The role of winking humor in his movies is frequently overlooked when discussing them, though it is

almost always present, as is a strain of deep, grandiose romance.

To Catch a **Thief** (1955) is the director's most successful "light" film. Nothing too grizzly happens (though death is not outside the realm of

possibility) and laughs are frequent. It isn't concerned with "real life," which is one of the reasons it's so fun. It's the cinematic equivalent of champagne: sweet, refreshing, and just the thing to treat yourself with when life begins to seem drab.

An exceedingly tanned Cary Grant stars as John Robie, once a notorious jewel thief known as "the Cat." After serving in the Resistance during the war, he retired from his life of crime, choosing to tend vineyards on the French Riviera. But when a series of new robberies is committed in his old style, Robie must clear his name. It isn't long before he meets up with a young American named Frances Stevens (Grace Kelly), who possesses some of the most valuable jewelry in the area. Sparks fly (literally and figuratively), but time is running out to catch the real culprit. Robie just may need Frances' help to succeed.

To Catch a Thief was filmed on location in the French Riviera, and this choice is a huge part of its success. An early helicopter shot is used to highlight the splendor of the countryside and the mansions that occupy it. The color palette for the film is prima-

rily summary, with splashes of vivid color when danger is heightened (Robert Burk received an Academy Award nomination for Best Color Cinematography). It's the cheapest vacation to the south

of France one is likely to have. Everything is refined and gorgeous, from the landscape, to the architecture, to the two stars. But it

isn't just a matter of sleek surfaces. The

script is stuffed with hilarious innuendo that is far more satisfying than blatant display could ever be. Just note the dialogue exchange in the picnic scene that comes midway through the film. Frances asks, "Do you want a leg or a breast?" and Robie responds "You make the choice." Kelly, Hitchcock's ideal actress, is wonderful at projecting playful sensuality beneath her immaculate beauty. She is intrigued by Robie largely because he is a thief, and she finds the element of criminality exciting.

Special notice must be given to Jessie Royce Landis as Frances' earthy, no-nonsense mother. She provides some the best laughs and sight gags in the movie — watch for the moment when she extinguishes her cigarette in an egg yolk — while providing a spur to her daughter's interest in the gentleman thief. Amusingly, she was cast as Cary Grant's mother in North by Northwest four years later (despite being only a year older than Grant in real life). You can't do much better for escapist fun than To Catch a Thief.

Can a country doctor alter the fate of his patients? Or his own fate? In mid-October 1918, the largest epidemic of the 20th Century struck in a small eastern Montana town. Within a few weeks, influenza had killed dozens of people in the rural county. But this was just one of a series of extraordinary events attacking the social fabric of the community in 1917 and 1918.

Rich in detail, broad in scope, this story places a fictional physician in the midst of the riveting events of those years. The physician grieves the death of his wife and unborn child. He is deeply troubled by the limitations of medical science. Then he is tragically enveloped by yet another epidemic.



Steven Helgerson was born in Washington. He received degrees from the University of Puget Sound and the University of Washington. His medical specialty is preventive medicine. During a fortyyear career in public health he worked with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, and the Indian Health Service, as well as several state and local health departments. He served as the Montana State Medical Officer from 2006 to 2015. He lives in Seattle.

With another school year already coming to a close, one local company is collecting used textbooks and educational media that's no longer needed. 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Recycling in Southwest Montana: where & what

Summer is headed to Southwest Montana, the color green spreading across the Gallatin Valley. Compliment area lawns and foliage by going green yourselves with easy access to *recycling* at one of the greater Bozeman area's 19 FREE drop-off sites! It's simple and sites are conveniently located throughout the area. Below you'll find a guide of where and what you can recycle!

Belgrade locations include W. Madison Avenue and Eileen Place. Find a drop-off site in *Bozeman* at Walmart, Gallatin County Fairgrounds, Ballfields – Highland Blvd., MSU, Billion Auto, Safeway, Home Depot, the Bozeman Convenience Site, and Gallatin Valley Motors (Subaru). Near *Four Corners*? Pack your recyclables to Four Corners



Accepted Items at these locations are as follows: *Plastic Recyclables* should be emptied and flattened with caps on. ONLY #1 and #2 plastics are accepted. NO clamshell contain-

ers (from berries or mixed salads) or tubs (cream cheese, yogurt, and sour cream). *Cardboard Recyclables* should be broken down to conserve space in the bins prior to pickup. Brown bags are accepted in cardboard bins. *Paper Recyclables* including newspapers, magazines, phone books, junk mail, office paper, and paperback books are accepted (staples are ok). *Aluminum and Steel* cans are all accepted, but please crush.

Unacceptable Items for Collection Sites are as follows: *Glass* of any kind is not currently being accepted due to current market conditions and shipping and handling costs. *Plastics* with numbers 3–7 (usually on the bottom) are no longer being accepted. These include bags, films, wraps, large plastic items, and motor oil, solvent, and other hazardous material containers. *Paper* including those of neon colors, paper that won't tear, paper plates, napkins, and Kleenex. The collection sites also DO NOT accept *scrap metal*,

wood products, yard trimmings, or electronic waste. The Gallatin Solid Waste Management District (GSWMD) attempts to divert as much recy-

clable material from the landfill

as possible. Collected materials become part of local, national, and global markets. Sales of these materials, along with support from the GSWMD, pay for the fuel, freight, containers, wages and administrative costs. Your cooperation makes this program possible.

Take a walk through Bozeman's history

The past is a place where you can go and experience a different world. Join an Extreme History Project **Walking Tour**, returning for the 2017 season at the end of the month. Come for an adventure through time and see the past through new eyes. Here's a look at some of the upcoming tours.

Beginning May 27th, Murders, Madams, and Mediums: Bozeman's Dark Side will be held Fridays and Saturdays at 7pm. From horrific murders to notorious madams and mediums communicating with the spirit world, Bozeman's darker history comes to light in a walking tour designed to send a shiver up your spine. Hear how "Steamboat Bill" murdered the China woman Linn Lum and Bozeman's "Week of Horror!" Learn how Mrs. Mounts proved to Bozeman society that she could communicate with the dead. Meet Louise Couselle, Bozeman's notorious madam whose income rivaled that of Bozeman's wealthiest merchants.

Also beginning May 27th, *Tents to Town: Bozeman's Historic Main Street* will take place Tuesdays and Saturdays at 10am. The Bozeman Main Street Historic District, the heart of the city of Bozeman and the only urban environment in the Gallatin Valley, is composed of a virtually uninterrupted streetscape of commercial buildings along both sides of four blocks. Learn about Bozeman's early history through the historic architecture and people that founded our unique town.

Returning May 28th, *Ghosts of Bozeman's Past: Historic Sunset Hills Cemetery* will be held Sundays at 4pm. The early residents of Bozeman laid their love ones to rest in this sanctified ground overlooking the town that their toil and labor helped establish. Bozeman's early movers and shakers rest here along with others whose stories make up the town's historical narrative.

On May 29th, Seeking Fortunes: Bozeman's Historic China Alley returns on Mondays with tours at 10am. The Chinese were an integral part of early Montana life, fulfilling roles as miners, laundry men, restaurant owners, and purveyors of fresh vegetables. They came to the West, as many did, to find a better life for themselves and their families. While these Chinese people faced discrimination in many areas of their life, they made a major impact on the city of Bozeman.

Coming June 2nd, Family Matters: Bozeman's Historic African American Community tours will be held Fridays at 10am. The African American community in historic Bozeman is nearly invisible until you begin to examine the historic census records, newspaper accounts, and city directories. Only then do Bozeman's black citizens come into focus. One name leads to another and soon a tight-knit and thriving African American community emerges during the late 19th century. Working as machinists, laborers, laundresses, housekeepers, and porters, Bozeman's African American people contributed to the building of our city through their labor, religious activity, child rearing, social clubs and community participation.

The Working Class Hero: Bozeman's Historic Tracy District will be offered by request only this season. Bozeman was not built by the Nelson Storys alone. It took a large community of masons, shopkeepers, brewers, builders and farmers to build Bozeman's infrastructure in the late 19th century. This tour gives an overview of the "working class" or blue collar section of Bozeman.

'Farm to Campus' encourages consumption of MSU-grown meat, local products

Thanks in large part to Montana State University's local food purchasing program known as **Farm to Campus**, the university now buys more than 20 percent of its food products locally, according to university officials.

In fiscal year 2016, MSU's Farm to Campus purchases totaled more than \$1.5 million, or 22.4 percent of the university's total food purchases, according to Kara Landolfi, Farm to Campus coordinator. That percentage is expected to increase by the end of fiscal year 2017, she

added.

Culinary Services serves food in MSU's dining halls and Strand Union Building retail operations, as well as through University Catering and concessions. MSU Farm to Campus was formerly known as Montana Made.

"As the largest university food service operator in the state of Montana, MSU Culinary Services is in a unique position to leverage their buying volumes with local producers to provide them with reliable demand for their products," Landolfi said.

The recent partnership between Culinary Services and the

Tom Murphy, assistant professor of sheep production in the Department of Animal and Range Sciences, said that the partnership and future efforts to incorporate university-grown and finished lamb onto dining hall menus is a "great opportunity to introduce students and the MSU community to American lamb while stressing the importance of a well-balanced meal."

Providing food for MSU students to consume is satisfying for the students and researchers who raise the animals, as well, added Patrick Hatfield, head of the Department of Animal and Range Sciences.

Strike Farms hosts extend-

One of the program's most recent examples of investing in local food is the purchase of 30 lambs both raised and finished for slaughter by the MSU College of Agriculture's Department of Animal and Range Sciences. In March, MSU Culinary Services which houses the university's Farm to Campus program — partnered with the department to purchase the animals. The meat, which was processed at Pioneer Meats in Big Timber, is likely to be used by the end of the semester, Landolfi said. Department of Animal and Range Sciences blossomed from an initial collaboration with MSU's Steer-A-Year program, according to Landolfi. Through Steer-A-Year, last fall Culinary Services purchased and served meat from nine steers that MSU students had raised. Landolfi said that she expects Culinary Services to purchase approximately 30 Steer-A-Year program steers this summer, and all of that beef is estimated to be consumed within the fall semester.

Rich Huffman, director of MSU Culinary Services, said that Culinary Services is pleased to support MSU's land-grant mission of "focusing on the teaching of practical agriculture.

"We do this by collaborating with local producers, ranchers and farmers, and by supporting students and future producers from our College of Agriculture," he said.

Huffman said that while the MSU Farm to Campus program is working internally to source the most local meat possible, the program couldn't do it without the assistance of Montana's local meat processors.

"Most rewarding is developing relationships with our local partners, and really understanding and sincerely appreciating what it takes to bring our food from farm to campus," Huffman said. •

Living History Day at the Yellowstone Gateway Museum celebrates the museum's 40th year on

Saturday, June 3rd from 10am-5pm. Shane Doyle, a member of the Crow Tribe, will conduct the opening ceremony. Throughout the day, artisans demonstrate flint knapping, blacksmithing, painting, quilting, Dutchoven cooking, and more. All are welcome to attend this FREE event, which includes museum admission and a special quilt show. Docents give free museum tours for groups on demand.

After the opening ceremony, Shane Doyle will give a short program about area tribal history. He grew



up in Crow Agency, Montana. Doyle has worked as an education and cultural consultant, and as a tribal liaison in response to the recent DNA analysis of a young boy found in 1968 who was buried 12,600 years ago near present-day Wilsall, Montana.

Local flint knappers, Ray Alt and George Bryce, demonstrate the art of breaking rock and making projectile points. An extensive museum exhibit also showcases their work.

Blacksmiths Jem Blueher, Andy Olds, and Martin Hildreth demonstrate and interpret the traditional art of blacksmithing using the origi-

nal forge in the museum's Vink Blacksmith Shop. Peter "Jack" Vink, r. used this shop for refitting wagon wheels, welding, and blacksmithing from 1903 until his death in

New data shows 1 in 8 Montanans live in food-insecure households

Montana Food Bank Network (MFBN) announces the release of **Map the Meal Gap 2017**, the latest report by Feeding America on food insecurity at the state and county level. Map the Meal Gap 2017 reveals that food insecurity exists in every county in the nation and across Montana. In Montana, the percentage of individuals living in food insecure homes ranges from 9.4% in McCone County to 20.9% in Glacier County.

While it is clear that we have significant work to do, the new figures show a notable decline in our statewide numbers. The report finds that thirteen percent of Montanans lived in homes that experience food insecurity, or the inability to access food in a consistent manner. This level is down from our previous rate of 13.6% and a peak of 14.9% in 2011, following the economic recession. In fact, 13.0% represents Montana's lowest level of food insecurity since the first Map the Meal Gap report in 2009.

Montana Food Bank Network is hopeful this downward trend is a reflection of a strengthening economy and our communities continue to see fewer Montanans struggling with hunger. MFBN also recognizes the hard work and collaboration between Montana's hunger and poverty-fighting organizations, working together to meet the need for food while also addressing the root causes of hunger. In the meantime, MFBN continues to concentrate on the nearly 134,000 Montanans, including 42,500 children that live in food insecure homes.

Montana Food Bank Network and their network of nearly 150 agencies across the state are working to end hunger in Montana through direct food assistance, innovative programs such as Mail-a-Meal and Hunters Against Hunger, and by connecting households with public nutrition programs such as SNAP, School Meals, and Summer Food.

Map the Meal Gap 2017 uses data from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, U.S. Census Bureau, U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics and food price data and analysis provided by Nielsen (NYSE: NLSN), a global provider of information and insights. The study is supported by founding sponsor The Howard G. Buffett Foundation, Conagra Brands Foundation and Nielsen.

The Montana Food Bank Network, located at 5625 Expressway in Missoula, secures and distributes donated and low cost food to nearly 150 hunger relief agencies throughout Montana. 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Biologists begin YNP grizzly bear trapping for research purposes

As part of ongoing efforts required under the Endangered Species Act to monitor the population of grizzly bears in the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem, the USGS and Yellowstone National Park would like to inform the public that biologists with the Interagency Grizzly Bear Study Team (IGBST) and Yellowstone National Park will be conducting scientific grizzly bear and black bear research operations in Yellowstone National Park through July 30th.

Team members will bait and trap bears at several remote sites within Yellowstone National Park. Once trapped, the bears are anesthetized to allow wildlife biologists to radiofor study. All trapping and handling are done in accordance with strict protocols developed by the IGBST.

None of the trap sites in the park will be located near any established hiking trails or backcountry campsites, and all trap sites will have posted warnings for the closure perimeter. Potential access points will also be posted with warning signs for the closure area. Backcountry users who come upon any of these posted areas need to heed the warnings and stay out of the area.

The Interagency Grizzly Bear Study Team was established in 1973 to collaboratively monitor and manage ecosystem bears on an interagency basis. The gathering of critipart of a long-term research effort required under the Endangered Species Act to help wildlife managers devise and implement programs to support the ongoing recovery of Yellowstone's grizzly bear population.

The IGBST is composed of representatives of the U.S. Geological Survey, the National Park Service, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the U.S. Forest Service, the Eastern Shoshone and Northern Arapaho Tribal Fish and Game Department, and the states of Idaho, Montana and Wyoming.

Bruggman leaving Bobcats

Former four-star prep recruit Tyler Bruggman has chosen to leave the Montana State football program, head coach Jeff Choate announced recently.

Bruggman arrived in Bozeman last spring as the likely replacement for Dakota Prukop who chose to forgo his final season in Bozeman and transferred to the University of Oregon. Bruggman did earn the starting spot under center for the Bobcats during Fall camp, but was only able to hold onto the position through the first six games of the season before giving way to true freshman Chris Murray. Bruggman saw little action over the final month and a half of the season, and was unable to overcome Murray as the starter this spring.

Although Bruggman was the clear backup heading into Fall camp, he has chosen to transfer to a school closer to home to pursue his MBA after graduating from MSU this spring.

This is not the first time Bruggman has decided to leave a school early. Originally recruited to Washington State out of Brophy Prep in Phoenix by Mike Leach in 2013, the 4-star recruit lasted one

season in Pullman before taking his show on the road to the University of Louisville. However, his stav in Kentucky was shortlived, and Bruggman was once again on the move, this time to Scottsdale College where he put up steady numbers and earned another shot at Montana State.

However, Bruggman struggled with accuracy and never seemed to fully grasp Courtney Messingham's offense. He threw for 888 yards and six touchdowns, but only completed 46.6 percent of his passes while also tossing six interceptions. Bruggman was replaced by Chris Murray against Sacramento State, and the true freshman would go on to lead the 'Cats to a stunning season-ending victory over the Grizzlies in Missoula to cement his spot as the starter heading into the offseason.

"Tyler is a great person and an excellent student and he wants to begin work on his MBA degree," Choate said. "He brought us stability, and we appreciate that. I know our coaching staff wishes Tyler nothing but the best in his future."

A grassroots ride through Wyoming's musical landscape

Described by *The New York Times* as "a traveling concert circus," the 5th annual **WYOmericana Caravan Tour** is an award-wining Square State talent to the Rocky Mountain Region, the storied tour is expanding to include new bands to the lineup as well as returning alum-



ning, collaborative music tour featuring an eclectic bill of Wyoming's top acts. To revel in five years of bringni on select dates. For its Southwest Montana stop, **Screen Door Porch** and **Low Water String Band** will represent the tour at The Murray Bar of Livingston on Thursday, May 18th beginning at 8pm. This is a 21+ show. Free admission.

The national tour is a rolling representation of Wyoming's burgeoning songwriter scene — a blend of Americana, world-class flat pickin', rock, bluegrass, folk, alt-country, and vintage slide blues. Featuring three engaging acts per date and a dozen musicians "caravanning" down the road together, artists perform individual sets with a heap of adlibbed collaborations. A "Last Waltz" style encore with all members of the tour closes each show, adding a camaraderie element absent from most modern day traveling shows.

Casting an artful sound with lyrical purpose that nods to soulful Americana, roots rock, and vintage country blues, Jackson Hole quartet Screen Door Porch is akin to "Stevie Nicks meets The Band, with Ryan Adams and Bonnie Raitt

hanging out backstage" (605 Magazine). It's grooving, electrified porch music adorned with the soulful pipes of Seadar Rose and propped-up by Aaron Davis' gritty slide guitar, quirky banjo pickin', and an infectious rollercoaster of a live show. Screen Door Porch's album Modern Settler was voted Album of the Year by Wyoming Public Radio listeners, while the band's fourth release Pay it Forward (2017) showcases the rawness of their acoustic roots heroes combined with the spirit of late 60s/70s golden era rock 'n' roll. With 100 million records sold worldwide and two prestigious Diamond Awards to their credit, **Def Leppard** — comprised of Joe Elliott (vocals), Vivian Campbell (guitar), Phil Collen (guitar), Rick "Sav" Savage (bass), and Rick Allen (drums) — continues to be one of the most important forces in rock music. Over the course of their career, the band has produced a series of classic, groundbreaking albums that set the sound for generations of music fans and artists alike. The group's spectacular live shows, filled with powerful melodic rock anthems, have become synonymous with their name. For the past thirty plus years, Def Leppard's concerts have become must-see events and have quickly made an institution of them in the touring industry as they continue to sell out arenas worldwide.

and put it out. So we're actually bringing that show to a lot of places we missed. We didn't bring that to Bozeman, MT, for example. A bunch of places. So we're digging in a bit deeper.

RZ: Def Leppard has helped set the standard for what "rock bands" aspire to be. And touching on your work with Tesla, do you feel a sense of mentorship for groups with similar aspirations?

PC: Yes and no. I'm just a conduit, passing what I learned from [record producer/songwriter] Mutt Lange. It was the total inspiration for Def Leppard, really. Our blueprint was a cross between Queen and AC/DC. And Mutt was able to bring that to fruition, make a hybrid of it so it was more palatable for a wider audience. He also did that with Shania Twain, and AC/DC actually. Before that they were a

In anticipation of their Bozeman show, The Rolling Zone hopped on the phone with Collen to talk road memories, artistic freedom, and the music, then and now.

The following interview took place on the afternoon of March 8th.

- RZ: Hey Phil.
- PC: How are ya?

RZ: Great. Thanks for taking the time.

PC: No worries. No worries at all. **RZ:** You're gearing up for the 2017 North American Tour. What are you doing ahead of your first batch of shows?

PC: Well we've got a month before the first, so we've got a little bit of time. I'm in Sacramento producing, completing recording the new Tesla album as we speak — which is mind-blowingly amazing. We're all just freaking out at how good it is. If we want to [have a mix of] Queen, Zeppelin, The Beatles. This album kind of gives everyone that.

Everyone's so excited, especially me. We're digging it.

RZ: That sounds awesome. So what does Def Leppard have planned for this tour? Maybe a blend of what

up the mind a little bit. So I think, if anything, that's what I learned from Mutt and that's really what we're doing. There's so much potential in Tesla so inspired, they're such great players, and such an amazing live band. We've known each other for forever. We took on this artistic

endeavor together. It sounds a bit artsy, but they've got so many influences, me too, and they needed to come out in their music. It just crossed over, all of those things, and it's sounding like the classic Beatles stuff, Zeppelin. It's got all that power and energy and everything. It's a thrill to be a part of, I've got to say. **RZ:** Many look up to you, to the band, but you've got to have a few role models of your own. Who are you personally inspired by? **PC:** Wall like Logid bafere up

PC: Well like I said before, we wouldn't be if it wasn't for Mutt Lange. My favorite band of all time was The Police. Again, another hybrid band. Dub reggae punk, and kind of pop music. Sting's my favorite writer, actually. Even to this day. Even when he does kind of pompous stuff, I still really dig it. I can see it from a different level. That's amazing. And the Pistols when they came out, it was such an amazing thing. I have the honor of playing with Paul Cook in one of my other bands, Manraze. They're actually doing a Professionals album, I just guested on one song. Steve Jones is on it, and Paul Cook. It's kind of a punk thing. It's just amazing. It's kind of cool getting a lot of inspiration from different places, really. It can be a book, it can be a movie, it can be a story. Lots of different things kind of blow my skirt, if you like, just kind of gets the stuff moving. **RZ:** Def Leppard released its eponymous album in 2015 after a

seven-year gap. You were quoted as calling the album "liberating and expressive," and many have Because of that, that's why it ended up so varied. It was great. No agenda. It was so liberating, it really was.

RZ: There are surely many, but can you share with us a stand-out recollection from your time with Def





applauded its variety. Are these recordings representative of what's still to come? Are you guys working on any new material? PC: I'm always working on Def Leppard stuff, and just songs in general [wherever] they end up. You know, we're doing a new Delta Deep album. And a couple of the songs that were going to be on the first Delta Deep album, one ended up on the Def Leppard record. It was "Sea of Love," which should have been a Def Leppard Song, and "Save That Goodness" which ended up being a Tesla song because the guys in the band [said] hey we should do that, it sounds great. I'm constantly writing, and it can kind of go different avenues. With the Def Leppard album, it was very varied, [something] we haven't really done before. We've always had an idea or a brief, we gave ourselves a brief of what the record should be. This one we didn't, we actually thought it was just going to be a single. We just got inspired by it and kept writing the songs. The great thing about that record, there's no record company, no business agenda, it's like pure we didn't have to do an album, so it had a different kind of element to it. Something that I'd never experienced, or any of us. It's not an industry thing. We haven't got to have twelve songs, we haven't got to do this, and we ended up having like fourteen songs written. We made music for the love and sake of making. It was a real artistic endeavor. It was like pure coasting, you know, we were cruising and doing our thing.

RZ: You've worked through countless phases of the music industry, from the days of vinyl to the digital age. What are your comments on its current state, creating music? PC: You know, art in general has always been run by businessmen. Look at modern art. I've got a friend who's a real kind of art buff, she's in England, and

she's amazing. We were just talking about some of the stuff that's selling at Sotheby's [a London auction house], for $\pounds 48$ million and stuff like that, and got into the subject of Bowie, the fact that he gets a Grammy awarded to him after he died. Van Gough is getting thrown out of café's for being drunk and everyone laughing at his work, and then he died and it's like "genius!" **RZ:** That's kind of a funny thing. PC: I think you can't get too serious and precious about the music industry, you've gotta take it all with a pinch of salt and just do your own thing. I find it fascinating. It's always been run as a business and as a corporation, and if you're lucky enough to be able to be within that context and have an artistic expression and do your thing, then you're really succeeding. I feel what we do — we all get off on the fact that we actually get to express and do our thing. We're a band still accepted by the industry in one form or another, even though it's not like Oscars, Grammys, tv and all of that stuff. It's a different thing. We have a really loyal fan base, people really dig our stuff, and we're just a killer live band. I'm really pleased where we are. Vinyl just became a billion-dollar industry again, and downloads are way down. It's just amazing how it ebbs and flows. People get WiFi, streaming and that, they haven't got to download so much anymore. So it constantly changes, and it's gonna constantly change even more. It's like life in general - don't get too comfy because it's gonna change.

Leppard?

PC: There are so many, I can't even. There are so many. All these things flash by - Rick Allen falling off the back of the drum riser. We were waiting for him to come in on a song, he stands up, hits a bar. These Spinal Tap moments we've had, there's just so many. Us on a bus going to Australia and "oh my God we left Vivian at the airport." Just crazy things. A fan climbing up on a ninth-floor balcony to get into Rick Savage's room. Meeting Prince in a little club in Paris after he played an arena, getting to talk to him, and him getting up on stage and playing a Jimi Hendrix song. I mean just amazing, so many different things. RZ: You joined Def Leppard in the early 80s, shortly after its inception. What can you say about this group of guys you've spent a good portion of your life with?

PC: We've spent more time together than any of our own blood relatives. You figure people leave home at eighteen or twenty or whatever we've travelled on busses, been in studios, together, been through births, deaths, marriages, divorces. Everything for thirty-five years. It's pretty amazing. We have that union, it's a curse and a blessing. You take that for what it is. You're family you fall in, you fall out, but you stick together. And that's something that we've done. I appreciate that. And when we started off — you know I'm from London which is South England, and the guys from Sheffield up at Yorkshire. I remember joining the band and not really being able to understand some of what the guys were saying because their accents were so strong. It's funny, after a while you're in a bus and you develop your own language almost, your own accent. I think that's representative of everything else. You come in being a certain way and you become worldly because of all the traveling - your accent changes, and your outlook changes, your views change, your experience changes. It's pretty magical when you look at it from that point of view. I love the fact that I have these guys as partners to do that with. **RZ:** Very cool. And the fans. Do you have a message for those who continue to stick with this group some thirty-five years and counting? PC: It's amazing. And the reason we do that is because they do that. They stick by us, they put up with all our stuff, they wait for us when we're recording and going to other countries to tour. We're very appreciative of that faith in us. It really is a give-and-take thing and we appreciate that and that's why we keep doing it. It's really cool. **RZ:** Well we're excited for you to bring this tour to Bozeman. **PC:** My friend Larry DiMarzio lives in Bozeman, MT. I've been using his pickups feverishly for forty-one years. I had my first DiMarzio pickup when I was seventeen in England on my Les Paul. So I'm sure I'm going to see him. It's really cool. RZ: That's great! Best of luck finishing up the Tesla album and safe travels during the tour. PC: Cheers. Thank you. Phil Collen and Def Leppard will perform with help from fellow rock 'n' roll veterans Tesla and Poison on Wednesday, May 31st at Brick Breeden Fieldhouse at 7pm. Doors at 6pm. How about a crazy good sammy? **The Pickle Barrel** holds on to its *Best Sandwich* title. Located on West College, the original shop puts out hefty subs whose sheer size are matched only by quality and flavor. Order up a South of the Border Cheese Steak or Bobcat Special and don't forget the free pickles!

> Alleviate your hunger with a combo from **Burger Bob's**. The family owned and operated downtown joint wins for *Best Burger* this year. Chow down on the best patties in town, each built to satisfy your tastebuds (the Inferno Bob is perhaps best enjoyed with an ice cold beer).

Look no further than **Montana Ale Works** for your after work, post-class, end-of-day fix. As it has in years past, the retro-industrial restaurant and bar swept many of the categories in 2017's survey.
