he ultimate celebration of
Montana craft beer is back! Tap
Into Montana Brew Fest &
Craft Beer Week returns to
Livingston for its fourth annual
event early this month. This
extended event is the ultimate celebration of
Montana craft beer. It encompasses a week of
craft beer-related events hosted by local businesses throughout Livingston, ending with a
Montana-focused Brew Fest. Craft beer week
will take place April 2nd-7th with beerinspired events throughout town, followed by
the main event on Saturday, April 7th from
2-7pm in Miles Park.

Like events in previous years, the Brew Fest will feature regional breweries and those from around the state. This year's brewery lineup includes 29 Montana breweries from

Local food from Farmgirl Pizzeria & Bakery and Rancho Picante Bison Hut will be available, in addition to cocktails, wine, and non-alcoholic drinks from The Office Lounge for those non-beer drinkers who want to come down and enjoy the music.

WindRider Shuttle will be providing a free shuttle service to the brew fest from several

locations around town between 1:30pm and 8pm. Stops at The Buckhorn, The Livingston Depot, Neptune's Brewery, The Office

Lounge will run on a loop all afternoon.

Craft Beer Week Events will be happening throughout Livingston and include beer and sushi pairings, beer trivia, a print making and beer class, the beer mile, and the 2nd Annual Creek to Peak Soap Box derby.

Get weird with Verge: Rocky Horror, Barbeque Apocalypse & more

Spring is upon us, and the staff is practically jumping out of its shoes at Verge Theater! So in honor of the uncanny energy that explodes this time of year, they're ramping up the unconventional, the odd, the strange, the queer.

For nine years running, for one weekend only, Verge has celebrated the quirk and the camp, the kinked and the warped, with its live stage production of The Rocky Horror **Show**, by Richard O'Brien. It's an annual tradition and experience not to be missed with call-outs, audience participation, costume prizes, and a great musical performance by a one of a kind cast, is a loving homage to the classic B sci-fi and horror film genres. With an irresistible rock n' roll score, The Rocky Horror Show is a hilarious, wild ride that no audience will soon forget. There will be four showings, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, April 12th-14th at 8pm each night, followed by a special midnight show as Saturday turns into a very sinful Sunday. Three couples gather on the back deck of a very modest suburban home for a mid-summer barbecue where the hosts, Mike and Deb, struggle with feelings of inadequacy about their home decor, their clothes, their careers, their culinary skills, and pretty much everything else. Throughout the first act, feel-

ings are hurt over petty gossip, inconsequential concerns, physical slights, and pop cultural deficiencies. The superficial, neuroses-laden interpersonal squabbles bubble over to a flash of inept violence when one of the guests makes what we learn is just one in a series of passes at Deb. As the act closes, the group discovers the rest of the world has been literally falling apart during their little, terrible barbecue.

Act Two takes place on the same deck for another barbecue to celebrate their one-year post-apocalypsiversary. In a year where the only way to measure success is survival, roles have reversed, and we explore how each character's basic nature has allowed them to adapt and thrive or has pushed them to the brink of extinction. *Barbeque Apocalypse* runs Fridays and Saturdays at 8pm, April 27th–May 12th. Tickets are \$14 in advance, or \$16 at the door.

The Bozeman Improverts are at it again with Improv on the Verge Monday nights, i.e. the biggest laughs for the fewest bucks! Guaranteed to be a hilarious start to your week, popular improv games are played in the style of Whose Line is it Anyway?, as well as long-form improv. And on the family stage, Judith







Children's Museum opens newest exhibit: Create a custom collage It's a Bug's World!

The Children's Museum of Bozeman (CMB) recently announced the opening of their latest exhibit, It's a Bug's World, developed to encourage visitors to learn together and explore what makes an insect unique.

The goal of this exhibit is to encourage children and families to creatively and critically think about the world of insects, learning about the anatomy of bugs, their distinct differences, and the ways in which we interact with bugs on a daily basis. For some age groups, it will be an introduction to insects, and for others, it will provide an in-depth lesson on habitats, anatomy and characteristics of bugs.

Additionally, CMB blends technology with entomology by incorporating an insect web cam, a hex bug maze, and a "bug wall" where visitors can use their senses to understand insects. The different parts of the exhibit speak to children of all ages; the youngest visitors will be

able to dress up and walk through the grass forest while the oldest will explore the live species and explore entomophagy (edible insects).

CMB encourages parents to explore the exhibit with their children, as they do with all parts of the museum, in order to create a collaborative learning space. CMB looks forward to welcoming local classrooms into the space for educational field trips this Spring and next Fall.

"Bugs are fascinating to children and adults alike, yet they are misunderstood on the simplest levels," says CMB Executive Director, Abby Turner, "Because there is no end to discovering new insects, scientists continue to study and examine them as a critical part of the world around us. Additionally, as bugs become a more viable food source, introducing entomophagy to children early is an essential step to increasing awareness. We have teamed up with a number of local entomologists and insect experts to create this fascinating exhibit. We are grateful to James Rollin, Miles Maxcer, Bob Peterson and Adrian Massey for their expertise. Also, to John Allwine and Greta Moore, who provided critical parts of the exhibit to make it engaging and interactive. This was a community effort to expand the exhibit excellence

CMB's exhibits are designed and manufactured in house by Pamela Jacques, Director of Exhibits and Design. Her experience in this field has brought a stunning display of fun, engaging activities to the Museum.

The Children's Museum of Bozeman is open Monday through Saturday from 10am-5pm. This exhibit is included with general admission and is open to the public during regular operating hours.

Renowned Native American chef to visit MSU this month

From MSU News Service A renowned chef of Native American cuisine will visit Montana State University in April to deliver

a public lecture and host a

fundraising dinner. Sean Sherman, founder, CEO and co-owner of the company The Sioux Chef, will deliver a public lecture on Native American cuisines in today's world at 7pm on Tuesday, April 10th, in the MSU Strand Union Building Ballrooms. Doors

will open at 6pm. Sherman will sign copies of his new book, The Sioux Chef's Indigenous Kitchen, immediately following the lecture. On Wednesday, April 11th,

Sherman will host a fundraising event, "Dinner with The Sioux Chef." The dinner, which Sherman will prepare with MSU and Gallatin College MSU culinary students and MSU culinary arts staff, is a fundraiser for Montana ProStart, a two-year program that develops culinary, leadership and food service skills in high school students. The dinner will begin at 6:30pm in MSU's Hannon Hall, with doors opening at 5:30pm. Dishes for the event will include stewed rabbit with sunchokes, dandelions and dried strawberries; roasted yucca puree with watercress, smoked trout and rose hips; cedarbraised bison with turnips, huckleberries and corn shoots; and sunflower and amaranth tarts with local apples, mint and squash. A cash wine and beer bar will be

Sherman, who is Oglala

Lakota, was born in Pine Ridge, South Dakota. He has been cooking in the U.S. and Mexico for 30 years and is internationally renowned in the culinary movement of indigenous foods. Sherman has been focused on the revitalization and evolution of indigenous foods systems throughout North America and has worked to gain a better understanding of how to bring back Native American cuisine to today's world.

In 2014, he opened a catering and food education business, The Sioux Chef, in Minnesota. He and his business partner, Dana Thompson, also launched and previously operated the Tatanka Truck in partnership with Little Earth of United Tribes. The food truck featured foods common in the Dakota and Minnesota territories before

Sherman said his work is motivated by a desire to raise awareness about indigenous food.

"We really want to share as much of our knowledge as we can and show young people that it is possible to eat very locally in a sustainable and environmentally friendly way," Sherman said. "They need to know what foods are traditionally from their area, how to procure those foods and how to make delicious meals with them."

Sherman's visit to MSU illustrates the university's commitment to local, sustainable foods, according to Richard Huffman, director of MSU Culinary Services.

"By bringing Sean Sherman to campus, we are really saying that we are committed to expanding our efforts with regard to indigenous foods and outreach and edu-



Film classics light up Ellen silver screen in April

The Ellen Theatre, a Downtown Bozeman institution, is your source for some of the area's best big screen entertainment and stage performances. It also houses some great musical acts, both local and those coming through town. Here's a look at what's coming up.

On Saturday, March 31st, the 1974 American crime epic *The Godfather Part* **II** brings the talents of Al Pacino, Robert Duvall, Diane Keaton, and Robert De Niro to The Ellen. The film is both a sequel and a prequel to The Godfather, presenting two parallel dramas. The main storylines center on Michael Corleone (Pacino), the new Don of the Corleone crime family, trying to hold his business ventures together from 1958 to 1959, as well as a series of flashbacks following his father, Vito Corleone (De Niro), from his childhood in Sicily in 1901 to his founding of the Corleone family in New York City. Due to its length of 3 hours and 20 minutes, the film will begin at 7pm.

Sunday, April 1st means BIG laughs with *Abbott and Costello Meet Frankenstein*. The film is the first of several in which the comedy duo of Bud Abbott and Lou Costello meets classic characters from horror film staples. Baskets finds comedy & tragedy in the story of a sad rodeo clown

The best comedy on tv, which places it fairly high in the running for best show of any kind, is about a sad man who lives in Bakersfield, California, though he'd rather be in France. He's married to a woman who told him she'll never love

him. He's lost and he doesn't know who he is, but knows he wants to be a clown. A French clown, if possible. His name is Chip Baskets, and the show takes its title from his surname.

Baskets is currently in its third season on FX (though seasons one and two are available at your local, friendly, independently-owned video store), and each season has

mixed hilarity and pathos to slightly different effect. The first season, which may be the funniest, cleaves closest to the kind of cringe-comedy that *Curb Your Enthusiasm* and others have been mining for some time. But with the second two seasons the show blooms into something wholly unexpected and also kind of rare on television these days, a comedy that sees both the absurdity and the gorgeous, sunset-nostalgic beauty of Americana. In its sad and lovely view we see people hoboing up and down the rails, and elderly cowboys at the rodeo, but some less gorgeous but no less iconic symbols of America, like Costco, and horrible local

commercials.

Zach Galifianakis is fantastic as both Chip and his twin brother Dale (who inexplicably has a Southern accent not shared by his brother). But the best reason to watch the show, surprisingly enough, is to see

> Louie Anderson, that most gregarious of 80s and 90s standup comics, playing Christine Baskets, the twins' mother. That performance, which becomes more central to the show as it goes on, is one of the greatest ever delivered in drag. It is artful, subtle, and uncompromisingly humane, even when Christine, one of the bestobserved characters I've ever seen on tv, is being kind of awful.

Baskets is intimately involved with its character's interior lives in a way that most sitcoms aren't. You'll find yourself genuinely moved by moments that take place in Arby's, and by the death of a character who previously adopted the moniker of Keanu Reeves's character from *The Matrix*. You'll pause to examine the poignancy of having a coyote locked in your apartment.

How else can I put it? Watch *Baskets*. It's what's been missing from your life, even though you didn't know it.

Marina and Orlando are in love and planning for the future. Marina is a young waitress and aspiring singer. Orlando is 20 years older than her, and owns a printing company. The groundbreaking life story of this rebel athlete, who inspired generations with his monumental first ascents, eloquent books and the lifestyle he fearlessly pioneered, is told for the first time in this exclusive documentary film. American film in Hollywood, *Neither Wolf Nor Dog* is adapted from the acclaimed Native American novel by Kent Nerburn and has soared to become the most successful non-Hollywood Native American film in years.

This funny and deeply moving film follows

an author who gets sucked into the heart of contemporary Native American life in the sparse lands of the Dakotas by a 95-year-old Lakota elder. Kent Nerburn (Christopher Sweeney), a good-hearted, white American family man and writer, receives a mysterious call from a distant Indian reservation regarding an oral history book he made with Red Lake Ojibwe reservation students in northern Minnesota. Despite misgivings, Kent travels across America's northern plains to arrive at the bleak, poverty-stricken reservation deep in the high plains of the Dakotas.

The old man, Dan (95 year-old Dave Bald Eagle, in an unforgettable final performance), who lives alone in a clapboard shack back in the hills with his only real companions – his dog, a close friend named Grover (Richard Ray Whitman) and his granddaughter, Wenonah (Roseanne Supernault) – interrogates Kent as to his motives for working with Indian people. Once satisfied he is not a turquoise clad "wannabe" spouting Indian philosophy, Dan recounts the story of American history from the Native point of view. As the stories pour from Dan, Kent's understanding of the world is turned upside down. An inanimate landscape comes alive, and a history he thought he knew is called into question.



Temple professor examines gender labels at MSU lecture

A free public lecture questioning the need for gender categories and labels will be given at 4pm on Monday, April 2nd, at the Procrastinator Theater in the Strand Union Building at Montana State University.

Heath Fogg Davis, an associate professor in the Department of Political Science at Temple University, will speak about "Beyond Trans: How Does Gender Matter?"

The author of Beyond Trans: Does Gender Matter?, Davis will discuss the need to mark people and places with sex categories and whether these labels serve a purpose or are instead mechanisms of exclusion. Davis argues that we should rethink the usefulness of dividing the world into not just male and female categories and whether additional categories of transgender and gender-fluid

should be used. Davis, himself a transgender man, explores the underlying gender-enforcing policies and customs in American life that have led to transgender bathroom bills, college admissions controversies and more, arguing

that it is necessary for our society to take real steps to challenge the assumption that gender matters.

Davis was also a member of the groundbreaking James Weldon Johnson Institute Working Group on Black Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender Civil Rights, which was the first U.S. working group bringing together activists and scholars to explore the convergences and divergences between the African American civil rights movement and



Now in its third year, the Wild Rivers Film Tour celebrates our love for clean water and free-flowing streams. Juried films document a veteran's path to healing through river guiding, the marriage of research and recreation to preserve Peru's free-flowing Rio Maranon, the fate of the Yellowstone River in a tale told from a Paradise Valley rancher, the loss of the Dolores and her near-famous female champion, and a speed decent through the Grand Canyon of the Colorado River.

125 Years of Agriculture at Montana State University

One hundred twenty-five years ago, the Agricultural College of the State of Montana opened its doors to the sons and daughters of Montana's working families. Tuition was \$10 a year and courses included agriculture, applied science, ladies courses, music and academy. Students could request a course catalog in writing.

That same year, 1893, the Montana Agricultural Experiment Station (MAES) was created based on the Hatch Act of 1887. This established a research enterprise dedicated to supporting

Montana's production agriculture.

What started as humble outbuildings in a newly admitted western state provided opportunity to those dedicated to reach higher through education. Today, MSU is a vibrant campus with a blend of modern buildings and historic landmarks.

One hundred twenty-five years later, much has changed, yet plenty remains the same.

The first class comprised eight students. By 1907, when Linfield Hall was built on campus, the College of Agriculture enrolled 50 students. This fall, the College of Agriculture had a record enrollment of 1,281 students, a 70 percent increase since 2007, marking a decade of enrollment growth. Like our first class, our current students have interest, passion and dedica-


tion for how we manage our natural resources, food and fiber production. We can be assured our future is in good hands. The upcoming generations will transform agriculture with innovative thinking, new technology and relationships that cross borders and accomplish what MSU's founders once thought impossi-

In 1893 the faculty was composed of three members, including S.M. Emery, the first director of MAES. Today the college has over 125 faculty members, more than 70 of whom are supported by MAES. Collectively MAES invests over \$35 million in research every year with over \$18 million of these expenditures coming from infectious diseases in humans and animals, climate change, agricultural economics, pollination, water, livestock health, crops, and pest and

ences in our daily lives, creates new knowledge and pushes the boundaries of scientific discoveries.

faculty-led grants. The research conducted by MAES scientists spans

disease management. This is research that makes tangible differ-

tural industry as diverse as the state's landscape. Farms and ranches are woven into the landscape and history of Montana and, by extension, MSU. This history provides a rich foundation for future success. Today our livestock, wheat, pea and lentil crops are valued the world over for their quality, creating an economic impact that exceeds \$4 billion annually. We lead the nation in the production of pulse crops (peas, lentils and chickpeas). We have rich natural ecosystems shown in the recent MSU study that demonstrates Montana has the most bumblebee species in the nation. When we enjoy an artisan microbrew, the barley grown in Montana is likely to be the source for the malt used in the brewery.

March [was] National Agriculture Month, and we in the College of Agriculture and MAES are proud to salute our partners across the state. It is not important whether you're a Bobcat, a Griz or a proud alumnus of another Montana campus. We all share a connection to agriculture and enjoy a diverse, abundant and healthy food system.

This spring, I challenge you to reflect with gratitude on how agriculture sustains your life and I invite vou to honor those working in agriculture and those who planted the seeds for MSU and MAES 125 years ago. Thanks to this strong foundation, we look forward to our shared future. From this vantage point, nothing is impossible.



First bear sightings of the year in **Yellowstone National Park**

From Yellowstone Public Affairs The first grizzly bear sightings of 2018 occurred in

Yellowstone National Park [recently]. On Tuesday,

March 6th, staff observed an 11-yearold male grizzly bear wearing a radio collar in the west-central part of the park. On Wednesday, March 7th, employees reported seeing a grizzly bear in the east-central

part of the park.

Male grizzlies come out of hibernation in mid-to-late March. Females with cubs emerge later, in April to early May. When bears emerge from hibernation, they look for food and often feed on elk and bison that died over the winter. Sometimes, bears will react aggressively while feeding on carcasses. All of Yellowstone National Park

is bear country: from the deepest backcountry to the boardwalks around Old Faithful. Your safety cannot be guaranteed, but you can play an active role in protecting yourself and the bears people come here to enjoy by following these guidelines:

about the conservation of park bears," says Kerry Gunther, the park's bear management specialist. "Reducing human-bear conflicts by preventing bears from obtaining food and garbage, hiking in groups of three or more people, carrying bear spray, and making noise in blind spots on the trail are the

best way for visitors to protect bears while recreating in the park.'

While firearms are allowed in the park, the discharge of a firearm by visitors is a violation of park regulations. Bear spray has proven effective in deterring bears defending cubs and food sources. It can also reduce the number of bears killed by people in self-defense.

Since 1916, the National Park Service (NPS) has been entrusted with the care of America's more than 400 national parks. With the help of volunteers and partners, NPS safeguards these special places and share their stories with millions of people every year. •

The Bozeman hive experiences a

surge in activity in April compared to the winter months. Each female bee has a job to do and an incredible work ethic. The same is not true for male bees, or drones, but there aren't any in the hive just yet – it is still ladies only. Stay tuned for more on these lazy boy bees in May.

In April, the queen bee resumes

and would like to mentor a newbee. her life's mission as an egg-laving machine, with 1000-2000 eggs laid per day. All the remaining ladies are worker bees (cue sigh

> from female readers). Job titles change with age. The queen bee does not want her workforce to get stuck in dead-end jobs, and instead promotes lifelong learning and career development.

> > So what are the jobs

of worker bees? The "queen's court" of worker bees continuously feed and groom the queen. Nurse bees tend to the larvae (pre-bee) and feed the baby bees, which hatch after 21 days. Cleaner bees scrub down the house. Builder bees construct honeycomb. HVAC bees ventilate the hive by flapping their wings and cool the hive by evaporating water. Undertaker bees remove dead bees from the hive. Guard bees keep watch at the entrance, and gang up on robber bees that come to steal their honey. Forager bees collect early sources of pollen, which the baker bees transform into beebread. That's right, baker bees add their digestive fluids to pollen, which enables fermentation into beebread - a protein-rich superfood for baby bees!

What the beekeepers are up to...

April is a busy month for both hobbyists and commercial beekeepers. The migratory beekeepers and



their bees are now back in Montana. Those starting new hives are finalizing their apiary equipment and installing new bees. Those with existing hives are lifting the lid to check on viability, supplementing with food as needed (sugar for carbohydrates source and pollen for protein), inspecting for disease and pests and treating if necessary.

What the non-beekeepers can do... Interested in supporting the viability of honeybees without keeping a hive of your own? Then feed the bees! As good cooks know, content,

timing, and presentation all matter. What to feed, you ask? Bees get their protein and sugar from the pollen and nectar, respectively, of blooming flowers - this is their feed. When to feed? Whenever it is warm enough to fly out of hive, typically April through October. August and September are especially critical, since the bees are storing up food for the winter months when it is too cold to leave the hive: think asters, Russian sage, coneflowers, lavender, borage, mint and sainfoin. And come on, do bees really care about presentation, you ask? Yes! Their favorite colors are what we see as blue, purple, yellow, and white. Bees cannot see some colors, like red. But unlike humans, bees can see ultraviolet light, giving rise to eye-catching "bullseyes" of nectar and pollen that are invisible to humans. The dandelion photo indicates what we see (right) and what honeybees see (left).

Italian study links cellphone radiation to heart & brain tumors

Laboratory animals exposed to cellphone radiation developed heart and brain tumors similar to the types seen in some studies of human cellphone users, according to an Italian study published [recently]. EWG said the findings reinforce the need for people, especially children, to exercise caution when using cellphones and other radiation-emitting devices.

The study by the Ramazzini Institute, published in the journal Environmental Research, supports the findings of the federal National Toxicology Program. Last month, the NTP reported that male rats exposed to radio-frequency radiation at levels including those emitted by cellphones had a greater chance of developing malignant brain cancer, and tumors in the heart and other organs.

The Ramazzini Institute's research found that male rats exposed to the radio-frequency radiation emitted by cellphones using GSM networks had a greater chance of developing heart tumors and hyperplasias affecting Schwann cells, which support the peripheral nervous system. Schwann cell tumors were also observed in human epidemiological studies of tumor incidence in cellphone users, and in the NTP studies of lab animals.

"The Italian study reinforces the need for a precautionary approach when it comes to radiation from phones and other devices, especially for young kids," said Olga Naidenko, Ph.D., senior science advisor at EWG. "Children's bodies develop through the teenage years and may be more affected by cellphone use. As new telecom networks are built around the country, in-depth assessment of children's health risks from cellphone radiation is essential."

In 2011, the World Health Organization's International

Agency for Research on Cancer declared the kind of radiation emitted by cellphones a "possible carcinogen" based on human epidemiological studies that found increased gliomas and acoustic neuromas in long-term cellphone users. The data on health effects of cellphone radiation in laboratory animals collected by the NTP and the Ramazzini Institute studies support the earlier evidence from human studies that cellphone radiation increases the risk of cancer.

EWG has been at the forefront nublic interest organizations raising concerns about connections between cellphone use and cancer. EWG's 2009 Science Review on Cancer Risks and Children's Health summarized comprehensive studies showing a variety of health harms linked to long-term cellphone use. This included increased risk of brain tumors; lower sperm counts, motility and vitality among men; neurological effects; and changes in brain metabolism.

While the public debate on cellphone radiation risks has focused on cancer, which progresses slowly in response to lifelong exposures, a growing body of research suggests that even shorter exposures could cause harm. In a study published last year, Kaiser Permanente researchers reported that pregnant women exposed to radio-frequency radiation from sources such as wireless devices and cell towers had nearly a threefold greater frequency of miscarriage.

In December 2017, the state of California issued official guidelines advising cellphone users to keep phones away from their bodies. The state Department of Public Health also recommended that parents consider reducing the amount of time their children use cellphones, and encourage kids to turn the devices off at night.

To help concerned consumers, EWG has created tools and tips for reducing exposure to cellphone radiation. This includes EWG's Guide to Safer Cellphone Use and Six Questions About Cellphone Radiation and Your Health.



Her latest book is The Beginning and End of Rape: Confronting

Sexual Violence in Native America, which has received several awards.

Her work on violence against Native women has received national recognition from the American Bar

Association and the Department of Justice. She currently teaches at the University of Kansas. Deer is also the Chief Justice for the Prairie Island Indian

Montana State University Extension in Gallatin County is offering a six-week small acre management course from 6-8pm, Mondays, April 16th through May 21st, in the Gallatin County MSU Extension building on the Gallatin County Fairgrounds, located at 903 N.

Topics covered will include forest management, beekeeping, soil and water improvement, wildland fire preparedness, maintaining healthy pastures and controlling

noxious weeds. Each two-hour class will be devoted to a specific topic and will provide landowners basic knowledge and skills to manage property effectively.

Speakers will include specialists from the Montana Department of Agriculture, Montana Department of Natural Resources and Gallatin County Weed District. Speakers also will include MSU Extension specialists from across the state, as well as agents in Gallatin County.

Cost for the course is \$60 per rson for all six courses or \$15 pe individual course, including class



Miller has been interested in the Lewis and Clark story since the 1970s and continues to research and share his tales of the trail with others, including an exhibit in the museum's Expedition Room, Miller served on the local Sacagawea Statue Committee and is a member of the Park County board that governs the Yellowstone Gateway Museum.

This final 'A Moving History' program is part of the museum's Wednesday evening programming, Hump Day History, held at the Yellowstone Gateway Museum, located at 118 W Chinook in Livingston. Pianist **Philip Aaberg**, violinist **Angella Ahn** and cellist **Sara Stalnaker** will perform Tchaikovsky Piano Trio in A minor, Op. 50, Shostakovich Piano Trio No. 2 in E minor, Op. 67, and Frank Martin Piano Trio on popular Irish folk tunes.

Philip Aaberg gained international recognition through a series of successful piano recordings released on Windham Hill Records.
Classically trained, he incorporates classical, jazz, bluegrass, rock, and new music elements into his compositions and musical structures.
Although best known for his solo piano work, he is most at home in the chamber jazz genre. His compositions are noted for their "rigorous keyboard technique, diverse influences, and colorful compositional style."

Angella Ahn has said, "Every note you play has to have love and magic in it." While she has performed her alchemy as a soloist, playing with, among others, the Honolulu Symphony, the Louisville Symphony, and the KBS Orchestra, Angella often performs with the Ahn Trio, created by her and her twin sisters while they studied at the Juilliard School of Music. Musikverein, Leipzig's Gewandhaus, Argentina's Teatro Colon, and The Beijing Concert Hall. Pinky (x4!) at Downtown Bozeman's Rialto

Pinky and the Floyd is pleased to present its 8th Annual Spring Production to be held at the newly remodeled Rialto theater in Downtown Bozeman, Friday and Saturday, April 13th–14th. The twonight run will feature four completely different shows, each with its own full-album performance and bonus decade spotlight. All in all, the band will perform over 60 songs with zero repeats, with every show offering something totally unique.

In anticipation of their upcoming performance(s), The Rolling Zone sat down with lead guitarist, vocalist, and founding member **Luke** Flansburg talk the longtime tribute's latest (and likely greatest)

RZ: Pinky is going all out for its 8th annual spring production. Tell us how these performances will differ from those in years past, as well as what they'll retain for fans of the

LF: We did a soft opening for

the Rialto [in] January and were kind of deciding what we were going to do for our big Spring show. A couple of us were out talking and were like, 'wouldn't it be cool if we did two nights and four shows?' That would be incredible – our biggest undertaking. We were able to get a couple good dates at the Rialto and it snowballed from there. We love performing Animals, we love performing Wish You Were Here and Dark Side of the Moon, but we've never played *Meddle*. [That was] the album right before Dark Side, right before Pink Floyd really hit their big stride. It was made famous by Live at Pompeii with "Echoes." I generally write the shows and figure out what we're going to play, so when I started piecing these together it was like, 'Man, we could do this whole thing without repeating a song.' That would be really, really cool to play 60-plus songs and not repeat a single one. There's only going to be about five or six new songs to learn, and maybe another ten to really brush up on. Let's do it.

RZ: Along with performing these Pink Floyd albums, you're putting a 'decade' spin on these shows.

LF: Little decade vignettes. This is big for the fact that you get to see the majority of the Pink Floyd catalog over four shows. The '80s is going to be Momentary Lapse of Reason and The Final Cut, the '90s is strictly just Division Bell, the '70s is going to be a little bit of The Wall and there's another album called Obscured by Clouds that came out in the very



beginning of the '70s that we're going to throw a couple tunes in from. The '60s is kind of loose in the fact there's stuff from 1970-71 that creeps in there, but I'd classify it as early Floyd, really early Syd Barrett stuff. You'll get to see the gamut of the whole thing. It's really cool.

RZ: Pinky's performances showcase music whose original releases

sound for us for the last 10 years. For this particular show, the Rialto is nice because it's all built in. All the stuff behind the scenes is very conveniently in place and we don't have to do too much. But we're starting our rehearsals tonight. We're ramping in and we're going for it.

RZ: Pinky's members are independent musicians in their own right, also lending their talents to

RZ: Say you bumped into one of the, obviously living, Pink Floyd members in an airport somewhere and had a chance to chat. What would you say?

LF: First off, thank you. Thank

RZ: Well we can't wait for those and the Spring production. Final thoughts before we go?

I can't express how much it means that people come back over and over again to see our shows. We're growing the name of our band, our brand, and also the love of Pink Floyd's music.

spanned decades and whose enjoyment certainly cannot be confined to any one generation of listener. What's your sell to a person who maybe isn't particularly familiar with Pink Floyd but loves an awesome

LF: If you're new to Pink Floyd's music, pick something like Dark Side of the Moon that's paired with The Wall and you're going to get a lot of hits you've probably heard before. The thing is, so many people know the catalog and so many people know and embrace the music, it's hard to find somebody in a stone's throw who doesn't know Pink Floyd. But even the young kids and younger generations, their parents are turning them onto Pink Floyd or they're finding it on their own. And these shows are all ages, so that's pretty cool. There's also an early show, so if you have a family and you can only get a babysitter from 6-10, you can still come out and see the show.

RZ: Pinky's got an expansive lineup of performers, as well as plenty of folks behind the scenes. From lighting design to rehearsals to

everything else, what goes into a production like this?

LF: Thank goodness we know a lot of the people at the Rialto. Drew Fleming, our drummer, is one of the stage major guys behind the scenes already. The lighting designer, Chris Cundy, played organ with us for about five or six years and knows the music really well. Their videographer, the other lighting designer, has been on tour with us for three or four years. We'll bring our own sound guy in, Chuck Goodwin, who's been doing

other groups as well. What does it mean for area artists to have this fantastic new space in the arsenal, as both performers and lovers of live music?

LF: It's incredible. We played the soft opening and I saw The Motet last week. That was my first show as a listener. Being a musician and a listener, it's doing so much for our community. It's a place designed so we can just show up, set up and play knowing the sound is going to be fantastic, that the lights, front of house stuff, and security is all going to be taken care of. As a performer, we've got a nice cushy area that we can just go and create. We can be ourselves and create our art and do our music. The sound and the acoustics spared no expense. It's amazing. You can walk in there, experience a show and you're not auditorily drained afterward. You're not like 'I just went to a show and I got beat-up.' The sound's nice, you can sit and talk in the back if you like, and if you want to go up front and get into the mix, it's up there too. For our community, it's going to bring a whole other level of music appreciation for concertgoers because it's a venue designed for this. It's not in a bar, it's not centered around drinking - it's centered around the performance.

RZ: Last time we spoke, you said ou were partial to Floyd's '70s, Dark Side of the Moon era. Does that still hold true? What's the draw for you?

LF: I am. That's when they were writing and creating some of their best music, some of the most influential and some of their most poignant. Going back and listening, I do have a love affair for The Division Bell, the '90s Floyd. Being a big David Gilmour fan, I thought that's when David was really hitting

you for your music - would you like to come play a show with us? [laughs] Aside from being awestruck and dumb, I would probably make a fool out of myself and be a little bit of a fanboy. I would thank either Roger or David or Nick for their music and their contribution to rock n' roll, and for being one of my major influences and main drive to create. They gave me a whole different palette of colors to work with and a couple different brushstrokes I can take away and make into my own art. I'd thank them for that.

RZ: Pinky continues to recreate itself and grows in popularity with each passing year.

LF: It's amazing. This is actually ten years. There's three original members left - myself, Dustin Tucker (guitar), and Joe Kirchner (keyboard). The three of us have been in it now ten years. I can't believe it's gone on this long and continues to be this popular. Who knew.

RZ: Based on the catalog it borrows from, it seems like there'd be limitations to what this long-standing tribute can offer its audiences.

LF: Of course. We seem to kind of redo it and put our own spin on it. We did a show down in Jackson Hole and one of the guys helping set up the show was a pyrotechnics guy for Brit Floyd. He said he really weren't afraid to play the music. Other tribute bands are so worried about hitting it note-for-note, spoton - sounds, lights, visuals - almost recreating that Pink Floyd experience to a T. We get to have some fun with it, take a few liberties, and aren't afraid to give it our own flavor. I think that's a big thing that people really like. Not only do we play Pink Floyd's good music, but we





New faces and new places highlight Spring Football for 'Cats

Spring is a time of growth and

change. For the **Montana State Bobcat football team**, that belief is most certainly true this year, as several players and coaches have taken on new roles during the team's annual spring practices.

For starters, on the coaching side, the biggest shakeup in the staff is the shifting of former quarterbacks coach, DeNarius McGhee, to the running backs room, while new passing game coordinator, Bob Cole, will also assume the duty of coaching the quarterbacks. Cole is no stranger to the Big Sky Conference having served as an assistant at both Portland State and Montana. One other coaching move involves Joe Dunning moving to the defensive side of the ball to fill the defensive intern position vacated by last season's intern, Kendrick Van Ackeren, who left to take a graduate position

at Oregon State, while Patrick Carroll, a former offensive lineman, will take over the offensive intern role, in addition to assisting offensive and staff try and find a way to best utilize the plethora of skill players at their disposal. The most notable change involves star sophomore



line coach Joshua Taufalele.

Plenty of change is taking place for the players as coach Jeff Choate Troy Andersen, who will give up his running back duties to focus solely on the linebacker position. "We

made a commitment to have him train as a linebacker. [...] Because the linebacker position is not as instinctual, there's more fitting into the scheme and understanding how you fit into the other 10 guys you're out there with. He needs that time to sync in on that," MSU head coach Jeff Choate said. "I think he can be a really special player for us on defense."

Another notable change involves a pair offensive weapons who have been used sparingly, thus far, in their Bobcat careers as Karl Tucker II will move to the backfield from his receiver position, and running back Tyrel Burgess will move to the slot receiver position. "Tyrel Burgess might be a good fit in the slot, and Karl has the physical attributes you look for in a running back," Choate

said. "We experimented with that during his first season when Chad (Newell) and Gunnar (Brekke) were injured and it might be a more natural fit for him.

"When you have good players you have to figure out where they fit in the two-deep and where they can impact a game a little bit more," Choate said in regards to Tucker and Burgess' new roles. "You're always looking to build depth in positions where you may be lacking and provide opportunities to players who might be buried in the depth chart at one position but show ability."

No word on other major position changes, but depth and attrition both could play a part in further shifting of the roster come fall camp. •

MSU's Engineers Without Borders hosts 5k fundraising run

On Friday, April 20th, Montana State University's chapter of Engineers Without Borders will host a 5-kilometer run to raise funds for clean water and sanitation projects in Kenya.

The third annual **Bozeman**Without Borders 5k will take place at Burke Park (Peets Hill) starting at 6pm and will be followed by an after-party at the Lindley Center with live music by local band The Blue Canoe, food provided by the El Rodeo Taco Truck, and Montana beer. The race will be professionally timed.

Registration is available online and is discounted until April 6th with a cost of \$15 for students, children and individuals on teams of four or more, and \$20 for other adults. Participants can also register the day of the race beginning at 4:30pm at the starting line at the Lindley Center.

"The race is one of our biggest fundraisers," said MSU sophomore Emma Annand with MSU's studentled Engineers Without Borders. She plans to visit Kenya for the first time this summer along with seven other MSU students. The group will work with Kenyan collaborators to drill a

drinking water well at a school.

MSŪ's Engineers Without Borders has been active for 13 years, and has completed more than 30 projects in the Khwisero region of Kenya, including 14 water well projects, 15 sanitation projects, a water pipeline and two rainwater catchment systems. According to the organization, an estimated 100,000 people have benefited from the projects.

According to Annand, about 170 people participated in the 5k run last year. "Our goal is to have even more than that this year," she said.

The funds that the group raises could help expand the scope of its work, Annand said. "We're looking into what it would take to build more classrooms at the schools, maybe even a library."

The group is a chapter of Engineers Without Borders USA, a nonprofit that harnesses the skills of engineers to tackle the challenges that keep the world's poorest people from living healthy, productive lives.





HRDC offers **FREE** tax prep & filing thru April 12th

Still need help filing your 2017 taxes? You're in luck! HRDC is offering FREE tax preparation by IRS-trained preparers at several locations throughout the greater Bozeman area through early April.

Offered by way of the VITA program, this assistance will help interested parties with both their Federal and State taxes. VITA is available to people who earn \$54,000 or less, persons with disabilities, the elderly, and limited English-speaking taxpayers who need assistance in preparing their tax returns. IRS-certified volunteers provide free basic income tax return preparation with electronic filing to qualified individuals. These trained volunteers can help with earned income credit, child tax credit, education credits, and

homeowner/renter credit. Last year. HRDC's VITA program brought nearly 1 million dollars back into the pockets of our community members!

Here's a look at where you can get help with your 2017 taxes.

Social Security cards and birth dates for each member of the family (MUST HAVE)

W-2 forms for all jobs worked in 2017

All 1099s for other income in 2017, if applicable

Forms 1095-A, B or C, Affordable Health Care Statements, or health insurance exemption certificates

Other tax-related documents such as: interest statements, federal loan documents, retirement statements, list of organizations to which you made charitable donations, etc.

Childcare provider name. address, and tax ID number, and amount paid in 2017 Banking or credit union

account information Voided check and/or savings

deposit slip for direct deposit

Copy of last year's tax return, if you have it

Please note: if married and filing jointly, both parties MUST be present to sign the tax return.
