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## Farmers’ markets return to whet local appetites

It’s become a bit of a tradition for us to announce the region’s summer markets – and the time has come once again! Farmers’ market season kicks off this month in Bozeman and the surrounding communities. Here’s a look at the local markets where you can find garden-fresh produce, awesome food, novelty items, live entertainment, family fun, and so, *so* much more!

**Bogert Farmers’ Market** – voted 2018’s ‘Best Local Event’ – will run Tuesdays, June 5th through September 25th. Market hours are from 5–8pm under the pavilion in Bogert Park on S Church Ave. in Bozeman. Bogert Farmers’ Market is dedicated to the promotion of local growers, artisans, crafters, musicians, nonprofits, small businesses, and culinary artists. The Bogert Farmers’ Market is a place for families and friends to gather, socialize, support local, and

share in a fun-filled community environment! It features fresh produce from local farmers, arts & crafts, nonprofit booths, live music, children’s activities, and a plethora of dinner options. Grab some groceries, get that gift made locally for your friend’s upcoming birthday, learn something new about one of the amazing nonprofits in town, and hang out with friends and family – all without having to cook dinner!

Western Sustainability Exchange’s **Livingston Farmers Market** continues to be held Wednesdays, June 6th through September 19th from 4:30–7:30pm in Miles Band Shell Park. This destination event will have locally grown produce and meat, baked goods, prepared foods, beer, and local arts, crafts, and jewelry. It’s a great place to come for dinner and socialize, stock up on locally grown foods, shop from local artisans, learn about community resources, or just relax and

enjoy the view of the Yellowstone River and the Absaroka Mountain Range while listening to live music. As always, admission is free.

Kicking off its 10th anniversary season, the **Big Sky Farmers Market** will be held Wednesdays, June 6th through September 26th at Town Center’s Fire Pit Park from 5–8pm. Come see 90 vendors featuring fresh produce, herbs, plants, flowers, baked goods, art, jewelry, and clothing, as well as Montana Made products like antler art, woodworking, and so much more.

The original **Gallatin Valley Farmers’ Market** will be held Saturdays, June 16th through September 8th from 9am–12pm at the Gallatin County Fairgrounds in Bozeman. Serving the community for more than four decades, the Gallatin Valley Farmers’ Market provides an opportunity and location for hundreds of local vendors of homemade food, handmade crafts, and

locally grown produce to market, display and sell their goods to promote economic well-being and support the development of home-based businesses. *Please note: there will be no market on July 21st during the Big Sky Country State Fair.*

And last but certainly not least, the **Belgrade Community Market** returns to Lewis & Clark Park for its second annual summer series, Thursdays, July 5th through September 6th from 4–7pm. The region’s newest market provides a venue for home-made, handmade, and homegrown vendors to sell their local products. The weekly event, expanded for 2018, will also provide the community with a fun, family friendly setting to buy produce and local goods from their neighbors.

# Livingston Depot hosts Barbara Van Cleve artist's reception & book signing

The Livingston Depot Museum will host a FREE public reception Friday, June 15th at 5:30pm in connection with its special exhibit, **“Pure Quill: The Photographs of Barbara Van Cleve.”** Van Cleve will speak about her photography and sign books, and light refreshments will be served.

“Barbara’s works are not just well-taken photos but a captivating insight into a rich Montana legacy and the Western experience,” said Depot Museum Director Laura McCarthy Cota.

The expression “pure quill,” in the language of the West, means “authentic; real, through and through,” and Van Cleve’s photos lend the expression a vivid authenticity that spans years. Born and raised on a working cattle and horse ranch in Montana’s Crazy Mountains, Van Cleve has focused her lens across decades on the land, people, and animals that animate it. In bold compositions and captivating textures, her photographs give

the viewer a sense of the West’s vibrant personalities and real spirit. The *Pure Quill* exhibition was generated by the Sweet Grass Arts Alliance in Big Timber, under the auspices of the Montana Art Gallery Directors Association, and will tour participating Montana galleries through next year.

The Depot will also host other events during the summer including the Festival of the Arts, July 2nd–4th, and the Roundhouse Roundup on Thursday, July 19th.

This year, the Depot Museum exhibits are open through September 23rd. The Depot’s popular ongoing main exhibit *“Rails Across the Rockies: A Century of People and Places”* introduces visitors to the rich history of railroading in Montana. It pays special attention to the Northern Pacific and its central role in the opening of Yellowstone, America’s first national park, through Livingston beginning in the 1880s. In addition to its main and special exhibit, the museum also

presents *“The Livingston Depot in History and Architecture,” “Film in Montana: Moviemaking under the Big Sky,”* and *“Dude Ranches & Romancing the West,”* examining how the national park contributed to early ecotourism and how dude ranching romanticizes, reflects, and shapes the region.

Operated by the Livingston Depot Foundation and located at 200 West Park, the Depot is open Monday through Saturday from 10am–5pm and Sunday from 1–5pm. There is a nominal admission, and group visits are also welcome by special arrangement. ## Downtown Art Walks reconvene in Bozeman & Livingston

The Downtown Bozeman Association, downtown art galleries and retailers, and the Emerson Center for the Arts & Culture are proud to present this summer’s **Downtown Bozeman Art Walks**. The Art Walks occur on the second Friday of the month from 6–8pm, June through September, and again in December for the “Winter” Art Walk. Upcoming dates are June 8th, July 13th, August 10th, September 14th, and December 14th.

Participating businesses and galleries generally feature artists’ openings and receptions during the event and often provide complimentary hors d’oeuvres and refreshments. While you stroll from place to place, you will also be able to enjoy live jazz and rock music played by young musicians from the area. You can find these artists, ensembles, and bands at rotating locations including

First Security Bank, US Bank, Soroptimist Park and the Emerson.

# BZN International Film Festival rocks sports!

Join James Redford and Jeff Bridges for BZN's inaugural International Film Festival, June 7th–10th in Bozeman. Enjoy 63 fabulous films and provocative Festival Conversations with 33 attending filmmakers. Participate in a pitching seminar with nationally recognized indie filmmaking platform Seed & Spark. Passholder discounts are offered at many hotels, restaurants and shops.

Films include documentary features and narratives, shorts, animations and experimental work. On the docket is a film from Venezuela, ***Nos Lllaman Guerreras***. In a country torn apart by political and economic upheaval, a team of young women finds refuge in a sport that rises above their personal poverty and gendered social status. ***Moksha*** follows three Nepali women who have dedicated their lives to spreading the joy that mountain biking can bring to women across the Himalayas. The short documentary ***7 Emirates in 24 Hours*** documents five cyclists from five different countries, including one female, who took upon the challenge of cycling all over the 7 Emirates of UAE in less than 24 hours.

***Kim Swims*** tells the inspiring story of an accomplished open water swimmer's attempt to become the first woman to swim 30 miles through a stretch of cold, rough and shark-inhabited waters off the San Francisco coast. As tradition and modernity collide high on the Tibetan plateau, the nomads of ***Ritoma*** have a new passion – basketball. Leaving their old way of life behind, they battle to keep their culture alive while embracing the modern world. ***Montana Vets, Montana Waters*** took 24 Veterans on an all-inclusive fly fishing trip on Montana's Big Hole River with The Complete Fly Fisher lodge; they created this film to help

raise awareness for local Veterans. Ken Burns' ***Not for Ourselves Alone*** (the story of Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Susan B. Anthony) will screen at the Procrastinator Theater on the Montana State University campus Friday, June 8th. No pass is required for this Emmy Award-winning documentary, nor for ***The Long Shadow***, in which filmmaker Frances Causey investigates the roots of racism.

Be sure to check out the **Free Family Night** (Saturday, June 9th). Young children will enjoy ***Kidflix***, a curated film block from the New York City International Children's Film

a dynamic post-film discussion with filmmaker and activist (and Bozemanite) Christi Cooper.

Festival Conversations will examine a variety of subjects tied to the films presented. Topics include discussions of sexuality and gender identity, familial relationships, and worldwide and local environmental efforts. The Conversations will also spotlight female entrepreneurs in Bozeman, and will invite filmmakers and festival-goers to participate in a pitching seminar sponsored by nationally recognized independent filmmaking platform Seed & Spark.

Films will screen at multiple MSU venues, in the Museum of the Rockies' Hager Auditorium, and downtown at the newly renovated Rialto Bozeman, the Emerson Center's Crawford Theatre, the Ellen Theatre and the Willson Auditorium.

Passes are now on sale at [www.bozeman-filmcelebration.com](http://www.bozeman-filmcelebration.com). Three tiers – Bridger Peak, Hyalite Peak, and Gallatin Peak – offer passholders a variety of events throughout the Festival and guarantee entry to all screenings, depending upon space. Bozeman residents can purchase passes at a discount at Old Main Gallery. Passes and

tickets for single screenings (\$12) will be available for pick-up the week of the Festival at

Adelson is an avid historian of American western expansion and the Indian Wars in the American West. He is about to begin his eight season as a Park Ranger Interpreter at Little Bighorn Battlefield National Monument. 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# BFS June titles: *The Leisure Seeker*, Andy Irons doc & more

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Flip the on Switch

Stellar cast performs in ballet classic Giselle

How did a quaint tale of wronged peasants, dastardly noblemen and jilted ghosts become one of the greatest ballet classics of the 19th century?

It was a period when Europe was immersed in ballet-mania. Middle-class audiences delighted in the fashionable Romantic art form and electrified fans argued over rival claims of leading ballerinas. Female dancers were portrayed as exotic concubines, big-eyed gypsies and adorably sweet peasant girls. Most seductively, they appeared as ghosts and sylphs, seemingly floating across the stage aided by their new-found skill of dancing on the tips of their toes and the supernatural effects of recently installed theater gas lighting.

After *Giselle* debuted in 1841, the character of Giselle became so popular that clothing, hats, and souvenirs were named after her. And Carlotta Grisi, the Italian ballerina who first played the part, became one of the highest-paid dancers of her time.

There was such demand for the production that clones of *Giselle* were created in theatres all over Europe and North America. But unlike other nineteenth century hits that withered away, *Giselle* survived to join the classical canon. Credit for its longevity goes to its precise synchronized choreography by ballet master Perrot-Coralli, an atmospheric musical score by Adolphe Adam, and a heart-wrenching libretto of Slavic legend by Gautier.

It tells of a young village girl who falls for the charms of a duplicitous nobleman disguised as a peasant. When Giselle discovers Albrecht’s true rank (and, worse, the existence of his aristocratic fiancée, Bathilde), she goes

mad with grief (in the famous “mad scene”) and dies. Then she joins the ranks of the Wilis (the spirits of other jilted women), who take their revenge on faithless men by forcing them to dance to their deaths in the middle of the night. Giselle is delegated to finish off the penitent Albrecht, but she manages to keep him alive until dawn, when the sun’s rays force the Wilis to slink back to the darkness of their graves.

Pivotal to its plot is the barriers of class distinction, as an aristocrat and a peasant fall in love. But there is an equally profound conflict at work between male and female loyalties, with the Wilis Spirits claiming Giselle as a warrior against faithless men and forcing her to vacillate helplessly between her love for Albrecht and her duty to her sex.

The role of Giselle has been called “the ballerina’s Hamlet” and is regarded as one of the most difficult in ballet due to the intensely dramatic nature and technical skills required. French ballerina Mathilde Froustey, a Varna gold medalist, Paris Opera Ballet Sujet (soloist) and San Francisco Ballet principal dancer, performs the title role in Yellowstone Ballet Company’s *Giselle*. Mathilde won an Isadora Duncan Dance Award for her performances of *Giselle* with Tiit Helimets in 2015. The *San Francisco Chronicle* sums up her dancing: “She has brought a quicksilver technique, a pliant torso, witty musicality, pinpoint articulation and sheer élan to everything she has danced, from the 19th century classics to Artistic Director Helgi Tomasson’s newest work. Froustey looks delicate, but hers is the strength of spun steel.”

Nikita Kusurgashev, former soloist with the Bolshoi Ballet plays Giselle’s rejected suitor, Hans; Parsifal Pittendorfer of Texas Ballet Theatre, dances the nobleman Albrecht; Maya Moody of Bozeman dances the Queen of the Wilis and Erin Lane and Michelle Kolodin perform the Wilis lieutenants with a corps de ballet from Raison D’etre Dance, Yellowstone Ballet Company, and School of Classical Ballet, Billings.

Yellowstone Ballet Company’s production of *Giselle* comes to Bozeman’s Willson Auditorium on Thursday, June 14th at 6:30pm and Friday, June 15th at 7:30pm. Tickets are available at Eckroth Music and [www.yellowstoneballet.info](http://www.yellowstoneballet.info). Tickets range \$25–\$75 and will also be available at the door for an additional \$2. •



Shakespeare in the Parks to perform ‘Othello’ and ‘Love’s Labour’s Lost’ in its 46th season

**Montana Shakespeare in the Parks**, one of the oldest touring Shakespeare companies in the United States, will launch its 46th season in June with performances of Shakespeare’s *Othello* and *Love’s Labour’s Lost*.

The company will travel nearly 7,000 miles during the season, running from June 13th through Sept. 4th, performing in 61 communities in five states, including Montana, North Dakota, Wyoming, Idaho and Washington. All performances are offered free to the audience in local parks and public spaces, making them accessible to all.

Kevin Asselin, executive artistic director, will direct *Othello* while Steve Cardamone, professor of acting at the University of Minnesota Guthrie Theatre Actor Training Program, will direct *Love’s Labour’s Lost*. The 10 professional actors that will tour with the company were chosen from a highly compet-

itive pool of applicants at auditions in Bozeman, Chicago, Minneapolis and Houston.

This season marks the first time the summer tour has presented *Othello*. Audiences will find relevance in the themes of jealousy and mistrust.

“The thing about Iago is that he feels like you and I do,” Asselin said. “If you were passed over for a job because they said you were too old, you’d feel upset too. The difference is that Iago takes his jealousy and responds in extremely cruel ways.”

*Love’s Labour’s Lost* will bring a balance of comedy and romance to the season.

“I think the play is hysterically funny,” Cardamone said. “Shakespeare’s not taking himself too seriously here.”

Montana Shakespeare in the Parks is an outreach program of Montana State University’s College of Arts and Architecture. Grants, corporate sponsorships

and hundreds of individual donors support the free performances.

Gardiner’s Arch Park on July 13th at 6pm; *Othello* in Townsend’s Heritage Park on July 20th at 6pm; *Love’s Labour’s Lost* at the West Yellowstone School Football Field on July 22nd at 6pm; *Love’s Labour’s Lost* on the main lawn at Chico Hot Springs on July 30th at 6pm, then again the following evening, July 31st, in Big Sky’s Town Center Park at 5:30pm; in Lindley Park during the Sweet Pea Festival – *Othello* on Aug. 3rd at 3:45pm and *Love’s Labour’s Lost* on Aug. 5th at 5pm; *Othello* in Livingston’s Shane Lalani Center’s parking lot on Sept. 1st at 6pm; *Love’s Labour’s Lost* at MSU Family/Grad Housing on Sept. 2nd at 6pm, then again in Belgrade’s Lewis & Clark Park on Sept. 3rd at 3:30pm; and *Othello* closing out the summer tour in Altenbrand Park, Manhattan, on Sept. 4th at 6pm.

Summer is Yellowstone's most popular season. Expect busy facilities and destinations, as well as delayed travel times due to heavy traffic and wildlife jams. Arrive early or stay late and avoid main attractions during peak hours (like Old Faithful, Grand Prismatic Spring, the Grand Canyon of the Yellowstone, and Norris Geyser Basin).

– Check current park conditions for information on road construction, temporary road closures, a nightly closure between Norris and Mammoth, and the backcountry situation report.

– Receive Yellowstone road alerts on your mobile phone. Text "82190" to 888-777 (an automatic text reply will confirm receipt and provide instructions).

– Reserve space in a campground or hotel – these facilities fill far in advance.

– Expect very limited access to cellular phone service and WiFi.

– Download Yellowstone's app before you arrive.

While you are here:  
– Attend a ranger program or stop at a visitor center.



– Stay on boardwalks and trails in thermal areas.

– Maintain safe distances from wildlife (practice safe selfies).

– Practice bear safety. Carry bear spray. Know how to use it. Be alert. Make noise. Hike in groups. Do not run from a bear.

As part of ongoing efforts to monitor the population of grizzly bears and black bears in the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem, Yellowstone National Park and the USGS would like to inform the public that biologists with the National Park Service and Interagency Grizzly Bear Study Team (IGBST) will be conducting **scientific grizzly bear and black bear research operations**

ter. Potential access points will also be posted with warning signs for the closure area. Backcountry users who come upon any of these posted areas need to heed the warnings and stay out of the area.

The Interagency Grizzly Bear Study Team was established in 1973 to collaboratively monitor and manage ecosystem bears on an interagency basis. The gathering of critical data on bears is part of a long-term research and monitoring effort to help wildlife managers devise and implement programs to support the

Once trapped, the bears are anesthetized to allow wildlife biologists to radio-collar and collect scientific samples for study. None of the trap sites in the park will be located near any established hiking trails or backcountry campsites, and all trap sites will have posted warnings for the closure perimeter.

# Virginia City Treaty of 1868 subject of doc screening at Elling House

On Saturday, June 9th, the public is invited to a sneak preview of new documentary ***In Good Faith*** at the Elling House Arts & Humanities Center in Virginia City. There will be two showings, 2pm and 7pm, with RSVPs requested.

*In Good Faith* is centered around the work of Dr. Orlan Svingen, professor of history at Washington State University (WSU), and his ongoing work with the Mixed Bands of Shoshone, Bannock and Sheepeater Indians at the Fort Hall reservation in Pocatello, Idaho. Through his decades of work with Indian tribes across the U.S., Dr. Svingen has developed strong relationships at Fort Hall and forged the creation of Indian history field schools that are conducted in Central Idaho and Southwestern Montana.

Since 2010, Dr. Svingen and his students have researched The Virginia City Treaty of 1868, negotiated and signed almost 150 years ago by Chief Tendoy. It was signed, in good faith, by the US government and tribal members, but never ratified. Though never ratified, the US took all that was promised to them and, in return, granted the tribe an Executive Order reserva-

tion, a far cry from the terms of the treaty. Dr. Svingen, researching National Archives microfilm, found the “Holy Grail.” It was the signed and sealed Cession Document that clearly laid out the parameters of the treaty and the boundaries of the lands the tribe gave up – over 12,000 square miles of territory in Wyoming and Montana. With these findings, the Mixed Bands have started the legal process to right the wrong and proceed *In Good Faith*. The film is narrated by Forrest Goodluck, Native American actor seen in *The Revenant*, the original

composers Jason Hausman (Hot Sake) and Fred Story (Concentrix Music & Sound Design) and also features original artwork by Derek No-Sun Brown (War Medicine Art).

# Strike offers customized farm share boxes

*As the local food marketplace changes, Strike Farms introduces innovative new model – one customized farm share box at a time*

CSA farms, or farms that sell seasonal farm box subscriptions to local consumers, have struggled to attract and retain customers in recent years due to increased competition and changing consumer demands.

According to Ryan Galt at the University of California in a study of 1,454 current and former farm share / CSA members, the top four reasons that members leave are all due to lack of choice in the share.

This season, Strike Farms is introducing a partnership with Harvie, an **online farm share platform**, to help overcome this limitation and better serve our local consumers.

“In the past, we’ve packed a standard box of produce for each member regardless of personal preferences but we know that some people hate beets and some people can’t get enough, and that CSAs can feel unapproachable if you have a food allergy or picky eater in your household,” says farm owner Dylan Strike of Bozeman. “Harvie allows our members to customize each box

so we make sure each person gets what they want. This makes our program accessible to many that may have shied away from something similar before.”

Using this system allows each share member to set preferences of what products they like and what products they don’t. Then each week, Strike Farms enters of a list of all crops that are ready for harvest and the software’s algorithm matches the harvest to each member’s preferences to give each member a perfect box for that week’s harvest. The member has 24-48 hours to make any changes to their box and order extra items. Strike Farms then finalizes each member’s custom box and prepares for packing and delivery to each pick-up location.

In addition, each week members will receive cooking tips, recipes, and videos based on the contents of each box so members can be sure they will have lots of information when the question comes up, “What’s for dinner?”

Red Star and some of his friends in their graduation class continued their studies at the San

Francisco Art Institute before embarking on their careers. They attracted immediate notice in New York and Paris, as well as established art centers throughout the United States. They went on to change the face of modern Indian art.

Above and beyond accuracy, Kevin Red Star’s deep experience is expressed in the color and composition of image after image. Each one is a complete statement in itself; each remains in the mind’s eye long after viewing it. Tipis cluster in close community, their long, graceful poles fanning out to catch the stars and sunbeams. Women gather for ceremonies in richly ornamented clothing. Warriors go forth on proud Appaloosa ponies, their bows and shields at the ready to protect their encampments. In every painting, the subject springs vividly to life, reflecting the mastery of style and technique he has gained over the course of the years.

*What the honeybees are up to...* June is bustling with activity in the Bozeman beehive. Flowers are typically blooming all over town. This strong “nectar flow” means the foragers are bringing back a lot of food to support the surging population, as the queen has now put her egg-laying into fifth gear.

Occasionally, the foragers do not get an enthusiastic reception when returning home. Instead of getting help upon their return, they are left standing at the door with heavy grocery bags of honey while others just walk by. The foragers can take a hint. The cupboards are packed, the house is cramped, and it is time to move on – time to swarm!

Swarming as a result of tight quarters is Mother Nature’s way of splitting one productive colony into two. Before departing, the queen lays eggs in numerous “swarm

about half of her worker bees to rest at a temporary location – the swarm – until the scout bees find a new home.

The process of house-hunting is extremely democratic. The former foragers, who know the territory the best, become the scout bees. Each scout researches possible sites and communicates to the swarm the location and suitability of that site. How do they do that, you ask? Via dancing, of course! The positioning of a scout bee’s “waggle dance” indicates direction of the candidate site, its duration signifies distance, and its liveliness indicates enthusiasm level. This dance party continues until the scout bees come to consensus – literally, until they are all dancing to the same tune. It can take hours to days for the scout bees to compare and contrast the various options before coming to consensus. Imagine if our government used dancing to come to consensus – CSPAN sure would be a lot more interesting!

*What the beekeepers are up to...* Checking that Her Majesty is laying eggs like there is no tomorrow. Making sure the foragers are finding plenty of nectar and pollen. Looking for signs of swarming. Inspecting for pests and disease. Treating for mites. Adding honey boxes. June is a busy month for the servants!

*What the non-beekeepers can do...* June is the peak of swarm season

call? SwarmBusters! Call Tom Braccini at (360) 798-4024 for swarms from Big Sky to Belgrade and west, or call Lynn at (808) 753-4752 for Bozeman to Livingston and Paradise Valley, and a club member on our swarm team will then collect and relocate the swarm. Take a photo and text us with the location so we know what equipment to bring.

We will provide rent-free housing and complimentary servants (beekeepers) for the collected swarm and prevent them from choosing an undesirable location, like the attic of your house. It is win-win for both humans and honey bees.

Note the honeybee swarms are extremely gentle. The bees have no food or brood to defend, as they are focused instead on house-hunting. Enjoy the moment.

Please only call for honeybee swarms. Approximately 4 out of 5 of the calls received are a false alarm – yellow jackets, hornets, wasps, etc. Know your bees and please do not take their name in vain at picnics – they are not the ones interested in your food!

# Dandelions? Just eat 'em this summer!

I just finished lunch – dandelion salad – and it was pretty good. Right tasty, I'd say. I made it, wilted salad fashion with hot butter, diced hard boiled eggs, and seasoned with lemon pepper.

For most of us, the peskiest of all weeds is perhaps the **Dandelion**. Everywhere – garden, yard, back forty – we see these golden yellow blossoms. I say, don't spray – eat 'em! Or dig and add them to the compost. Get all the root, or they'll grow back.

Dandelions do have their place in our environment. The blossoms are excellent bee food, providing nectar that is converted into honey. Bees, of course, are very good pollinators as well. The early blossoms provide food, keeping

bees alive and healthy until garden flowers appear.

As people food, dandelion greens are said to be a spring tonic. They contain antioxidants, vitamins A and C as well as iron. They contain more calcium than spinach. In salad they add a zesty taste. The leaves may be cooked and eaten like spinach, sprinkled with salt and vinegar. Boiling tends to reduce the bitterness. The blossoms may be picked, dipped in butter and fried – tastes just like mushrooms!

Dandelions, native to Africa, Asia and Europe, were brought to the United States by the early settlers. They must have known the value, not realizing the potential of their spreading ability.

Weeds are simply plants out of place. Considering the Dandelion as a weed, we could be missing out on a good deal of delicious food and useful remedies. Some are even grown commercially and used as an herb for medicinal purposes. The milky liquid is said to remove warts. In Canada, the root is registered and sold as a diuretic. Dandelion roots can also be roasted, ground and used as a coffee substitute.

I seem to have an abundant supply of these colorful flowers. Trying as I do, to use what I have on hand, eating them is a good solution. •

One Montana miner said, "Many's the miner who'd never wash his face or comb his hair, if it wasn't for thinkin' of the sportin' girls he might meet in the saloon." On Saturday, June 16th, the Bale of Hay Saloon in Virginia City will present its annual **Brothel Days**, a tribute to these working women – both prostitutes and hurdy-gurdy girls.

Ellen Baumler, historian for the Montana Historical Society, will present "Virginia City's Silent Sisters: The Oldest Profession from the 1860s to 1930s" beginning at 1pm.

Bed races will commence at 4pm. Each team must have a person dressed in "proper attire" on the bed and race up the street against another team. Get your five person teams together and join the fun! Prizes for best team name and fastest bed.

Then, lace up your corsets and put on your finest for the costume party at 9:30pm. Bale of Hay hosts the dance in honor of the hurdy-gurdy houses and hurdy-gurdy girls, or "hur-

dies" as they were known.

Hurdy-gurdy houses, as described by Seagraves, "had a bar on one side and dance floor on the other, as well as a hallway with several small rooms in the rear. These rooms were rented to the customers who wanted more than a dance, and to the hurdy-gurdy girls who chose to entertain a man after, or during working hours. Not all of these girls were prostitutes; most earned a good salary from dancing and serving drinks." The dancing itself was free, but the customer was required to pay a dollar for a drink for himself and his partner after each dance.

For the Bale of Hay dance, you can dress



as a hurdy-gurdy girl or more risqué as a "working girl." Buying a drink for yourself and your partner is optional! There will be prizes for best dressed participants. Ennis-based Fools Gold will be on hand with musical entertainment for the costume dance. Their music spans three decades and includes country, blues, and classic rock. This dance

band will have the floor filled all night!

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# Walking Sideways: An Insider's Guide to The Rialto

Allow me to introduce myself. My name is Dalton Brink and I'm the Artistic Director of The Rialto.

Between us, this new addition to the BoZone is not meant to be an advertisement, but a friend-to-friend recommendation as if we were belly up to the Burn Box bar and you had just asked me what events I'm most excited about. So, let me be your guide through the acts which pique my eclectic tastes and the reasons why we've invited them to Bozeman.

June 1 – **VICE Motherboard's "The Most Unknown"**

In the current atmosphere of our political and social climate, where everything that can possibly be used as a political weapon *is* being used as a political weapon, where something as pure and simple as science is being used as a tool of manipulation, it seems more important now than ever to revisit the basics of what science is and who the folks are who

dedicate their lives to enlightening the rest of us.

When my good pal Dr. Luke McKay told me about his inclusion in VICE's "The Most Unknown" and showed me the trailer, I immediately knew it was something I wanted to host at The Rialto. Following a group of scientists from around the world, the film dives into some of life's deepest mysteries and asks the scientists why they study what they do. 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# The Interview

## Texan quintet brings locally-assisted evening of ‘MERICAna to Bozeman

At some point between Lubbock and Midland, the land shifts from endless cotton rows and rich farmland into pump jacks and mesquite tree filled pastures. Lubbock roots-country outfit **Flatland Cavalry** straddles that line between the Panhandle and the badlands of West Texas with their bright, earthy country ballads and gritty folk ramblers. Vocalist and chief songwriter Cleto Cordero’s honest, smooth songwriting revolves around the vernacular world of West Texas that he’s constructed with dusty, sun-soaked character sketches, brooding self-evaluations, and candid love songs that all have the ability to turn into singalong anthems.

Formed in the fall of 2012, the quintet was rounded up by Cordero after stretches of acoustic outings around the Panhandle town of Lubbock. Guitarist Reid Dillon, fiddler Laura Jane, bassist Jonathan Saenz, and drummer Jason Albers join Cordero, Flatland’s frontman and guitarist.

In anticipation of the upcoming Bozeman and other Montana performances, The Rolling Zone got Cleto (pronounced “Cletto”) on the horn to talk the band’s Southern influences and maturing sound.

**RZ:** Flatland Cavalry is leaving the confines of its home state of Texas for a Northwest tour of sorts, coming to Bozeman’s Rialto in a few short weeks. What can concertgoers expect to experience at the June 14th show?

**CC:** Good stories, a good night of songwriting and a little bit of storytelling in between the music. We have the live show [here], but it’s fun to get out of state and be able to talk about the songs to fans and others who’ve never heard us. It should be a welcoming kind of vibe – at least from us. [laughs]

**RZ:** The word “‘MERICAna” has been thrown around to describe the genre to which Flatland contributes. How would you describe the band’s sound?

**CC:** It’s country-based Americana, but you can’t really put your thumb on it – some of the songs are groovy and some are little bit more rockin’. I tell people as simply as possible, it’s “easy on the ears, heavy on the heart.” If you like good, easy listening music and lyrics, we might be for you.

**RZ:** Flatland got its start and is still based in the Lone Star State, where you’ve toured extensively, but the band has also had the opportunity to showcase its music elsewhere. How do you compare the Texas music scene with some of the other places you’ve visited?

**CC:** There’s a lot of places to play here and everyone’s really supportive of the music. We’re starting all over at shows outside of Texas – the crowds might be a little bit smaller and the shows are a bit more intimate, but the people gravitate toward the need for music. There are venues like that here in Texas, but there’s also a lot of beer drinkin’, honky-tonk stuff. There seem to be more clubs and venues up there with people really listening to the lyrics. I’d say that’s the biggest difference.

**RZ:** You’ve of course toured in support of your original releases

including the *Come May* EP and 2016’s *Humble Folks*. Seems like it’s about time to add some new Flatland tunes to the collection. Have you guys been working on anything?

**CC:** Absolutely. We’re in the studio right now working on our new album. We haven’t announced a title or release date yet, but it’s definitely a fall record. It’s a little bit more mature with a darker sound and subject matter than the previous ones. You know, growing up and everything. That should be out before the year’s over.

**RZ:** Are we going to hear some of those songs at the Bozeman show?

**CC:** Yeah, we’ll play some full band versions and also take an acoustic section to focus on the songs.

**RZ:** What progression have you noticed in Flatland’s music since its earliest days through the most recent music you’ve been working on? What have you managed to retain?

**CC:** As far as the craft goes, the biggest thing is really diving into not wasting any lines. It’s a little bit more saturated, artistically. The spirit’s always been there – the genuine love for the music and the desire to create, putting everything you have into it, telling the stories. But lyrically, the subject matter is broader, less youthful and a little bit darker. I’m not 19 anymore, or summertime lovin’ as much as I used to, but it’s still stuff people can relate to. You hope you grow up with your music, you know.

**RZ:** You’ve got to be a music fan. What artists influence and inspire your own tunes? What have you been listening to recently?

**CC:** The first concert I ever went to was Randy Rogers. There was a lot of country starting out, Texas and Oklahoma bands like Turnpike Troubadours and Jason Boland & The Stragglers. When you’re growing up, you’re still kind of finding your sound. Lately I’ve been listening to a lot more Americana like Cody Jinks and Paul Cauthen, Sturgill and John Prine. I’m also a huge fan of Jason Isbell, as far as his ability to paint a picture.

**RZ:** There’s a story behind each Flatland song. Is there one you find particularly noteworthy?

**CC:** One’s that’s kind of an anomaly on the record is “Coyote.” Down here, they call people that smuggle people across the border ‘coyotes.’ I was in college, living with my roommate Roy Johnson, and we got drunk one night as college kids do. He put on the cowboy hat I’ve been known to wear, and someone took a picture of him. I missed all the fun, but the next morning we were going through our phones and found that picture. Someone said, “Man, you look like a coyote.” That was what started it – I just thought that was so funny, this suburban kid dressed like a coyote. I skipped class and wrote the song that day. People seem to really like it, at least down here. That song’s like an anthem, which is kind of funny because it was never meant to be anything but a good time.

**RZ:** Musicians are storytellers. During the initial creative stages, when do you decide a story or sub-

ject is song-worthy?

**CC:** I’ve been a lot more lenient lately. I used to be so particular and not waste time on this subject or this song because I didn’t think anyone

wanted to have a ‘Cleto Cordero Band’ – no one would know how to say it. We lived out in Lubbock, and if you’ve ever been to Lubbock or ever get the privilege to, they say you

and Arkansas. I’d like to get out and play all over the place – I’d like to still play in Texas, I just want to spread it everywhere. People are genuinely hungry for music that has

a heart, and everyone’s got their own taste. I’d like to go as far as we can out there. If we play in California and 20 people show up that’ve heard of us, that’s great! I want to play to people that genuinely love the music, love the message. I’ll be grateful if that means stadiums or 200-people rooms all across the country. Spreading the love is what it’s really all about.

Flatland Cavalry takes the Rialto stage on Thursday, June 14th with local help from **Ian Thomas & The Band of Drifters** beginning at 8:30pm.

Based mostly in Montana and Tennessee, the Drifters play modern American roots, keeping the music varied in arrangement, instrumentation, and regional influences. Their sets draw from country, folk and blues traditions with an emphasis on original songs, done in the old style. The band’s latest release, the full-length *Live in 2016*, was recorded throughout Montana with 14 original songs deeply rooted in the classic country and American folk sounds.

Advance tickets to this all-ages ‘Night of Country’ are \$10 at

would want to listen. Now, I’ve grown to love the craft so much, to really dig in and try to figure out as much as I can about songwriting and the English language. Any song’s got a chance, whether you have a hook and write to that and the music comes later, or you’re just sitting there with a guitar and you’re kind of in a trance state feeling what the chords sound like. I think you should just write and whatever’s going to come out of your heart is going to come out naturally.

**RZ:** What’s the significance behind the name of the band, “Flatland Cavalry”?

**CC:** People have mispronounced my name my entire life, so I never

can watch your dog run away for three days. There’s nothing but horizons out there. So, I thought ‘Flatland’ would be cool, ‘Flatland’ something. My buddy was like “how about ‘Cleto & the Texas Cavalry’” and the two just stuck together – “What about Flatland Cavalry?” It didn’t sound cheesy or generic, it just worked.

**RZ:** Flatland has already made a name for itself back at home and is now taking the national stage. Where does this Texan quintet go from here?

**CC:** I think if you just put your heart and soul into it, music is the universal language. It’s bigger than Texas, it’s bigger than Oklahoma

Touring in continued support of their dual albums, *Fern Girl* and *Ice Man* and *Uncertain as It Is Uneven*, the duo features the banjo picking of Kendl Winter and Palmer T. Lee. The new records could be viewed as two windows into the growing and changing world of The Lowest Pair. Uncertain stays the course of their previous releases, being focused on stripped down, intimate arrange-

ments to support their timeless songwriting and haunting vocals. *Fern Girl* is a more moody and adventurous exploration of new sounds, new studio production directions, and what it might sound like for The Lowest Pair to be supported by a full band, while keeping one foot planted in the rootsy aesthetics which drew them together from the beginning.

**Robbie Fulks** follows with a performance on Saturday, June 16th at 9pm. Tickets are \$40 plus fees. Doors at 8pm.

Fulks is a singer, recording artist, instrumentalist, composer, and songwriter. His most recent release, 2016’s *Upland Stories*, earned year’s-best recognition from NPR and Rolling Stone among many others, as well as two Grammy nominations,

for folk album and American roots song (“Alabama at Night”).

Fulks has made countless radio appearances on WSM’s *Grand Ole Opry* and NPR’s *Fresh Air*, *Mountain Stage*, and *World Cafe*. He’s also been seen on PBS’s *Austin City Limits*, as well as NBC’s *Today* and *Late Night with Conan O’Brien*, among many others. Artists who have covered his songs include Sam Bush, Kelly Hogan, Andrew Bird, Mollie O’Brien, Rosie Flores, John Cowan, and Old 97s.

Looking ahead, enjoy the talents of **John Fullbright** on Friday, June 22nd at 9pm.

If there’s a recurring motif that jumps out upon first listen to Fullbright’s latest album, *Songs*, it’s the act of writing, which is one he

treats with the utmost respect. “When I discovered Townes Van Zandt, that’s when I went, ‘You know, this is something to be taken pretty damn seriously,’” says Fullbright. “‘This is nothing to do with business, it has to do with art and identity.’ You can write something that’s going to outlast you, and immortality through song is a big draw.” Fullbright inhabits his songs’ narrators completely, his old-soul voice fleshing out complex characters and subtle narratives with a gifted sense of understatement.

The arrangements on *Songs* are stripped down to their cores and free of ornamentation. Fullbright’s guitar and piano anchor the record, while a minimalist rhythm section weaves in and out throughout the album.

That’s not to say these are simple songs; Fullbright possesses a keen ear for memorable melody and a unique approach to harmony, moving through chord progressions far outside the expected confines of traditional folk or Americana. The performances are stark and direct, though, a deliberate approach meant to deliver the songs in their purest and most honest form.

On their fifth full-length, *Watching It All Fall Apart*, Fruition transform pain and heartache into something truly glorious. With their songwriting sharper and more nuanced than ever before — and their sonic palette more daringly expansive — the Portland, Oregon-based band’s full-hearted intensity ultimately gives the album a transcendent power.

From song to song, Fruition display the

dynamic musicality they’ve shown since making their debut with 2008’s *Hawthorne Hoedown*. Through the years, the band has evolved from a rootsy, string-centric outfit to a full-fledged rock act, eventually taking the stage at such major festivals as Bonnaroo and Telluride Bluegrass (a set that inspired *Rolling Stone* to praise their “raucous originals filled with heartfelt lyrics and stadium-worthy energy”).

Trueb’s bright guitar work is tighter than ever throughout, lined with fluttering bits of jazz and improvisation that build upon his subtle interplay with his wife, Mirabai, and Harmon.

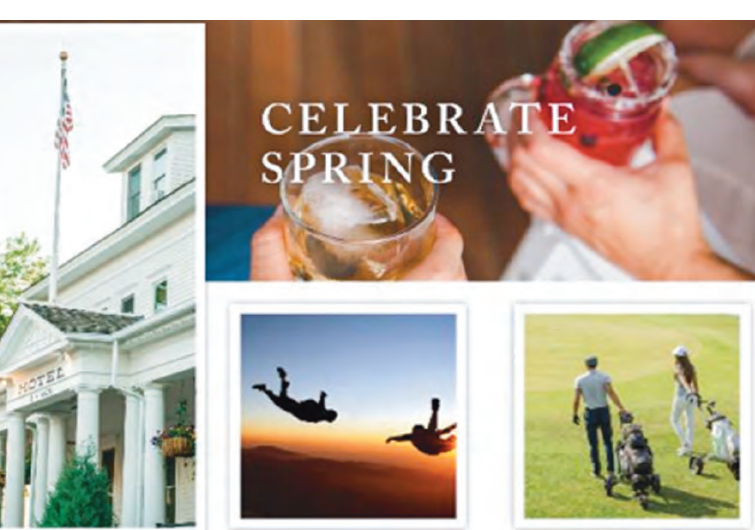

### Hawk Tracksters show out at State AA meet

Good competition brings out the best in competitors, and that certainly was the case for the **Bozeman Hawk boys' and girls' track teams** at the recent 2018 Class AA state track and field meet held in Great Falls.

While neither squad was able to bring home the team title (The girls finished second, while the boys brought home the third-place trophy), several individuals on both teams were able to bring home indi-

vidual honors.

It was the first time in a decade that both the boys and girls claimed a trophy together at the state meet. "It's a pretty special day," head coach Eric Fisher said. "They both had two days of phenomenal performances top to bottom. I'm so proud of this team."

For the girls, there were thoughts of taking home their first team title in the AA classification after leading heading into Saturday's competition, but they were outshined by a

Missoula Sentinel team that amassed 141.5 points to Bozeman's 113. "We were excited to score that many points," Fisher said. "Other years, that could get you first."

The girls received contributions from a number of runners, most notably, senior Camila Noe who totaled 18 points after winning the 3,200 and earning a runner-up finish in the 1,600, in addition to helping the 4X400 relay team to a third-place finish.

Other key contributors included

Delaney Bahn (1st in long jump, 3rd in high jump), Lucy Corbett (3rd in 300 hurdles, 6th in 100 hurdles), and Mayjia Horst (5th in 300 hurdles).

The boys received points from an unlikely source, as senior Robbie Simpson crashed the party by finishing 3rd in the 100-meter dash and 6th in the 200. Entering the state meet, Simpson was seeded eighth in the 100 and wasn't ranked in the Top 10 for the 200.

Latrell McCutcheon took home

first in the long jump, while Duncan Hamilton earned a gold in the 1,600 and a silver in the 3,200.

Dylan Humberger added a 6th place finish in the 1,600, as did Logan Kleinhans in the high jump and Cooper Craig in the 100-meter dash.

Vincent Davison took home a 5th place finish in the pole vault to round out the boy's scoring.

# Montana State Women's Basketball faces the storm

Spring showers may be falling in the Gallatin Valley, but the **Montana State women's basketball coaching staff** was facing a different storm recently, as head coach Tricia Binford and Co. headed to the Emerald City to learn up close from the WNBA's Seattle Storm.

The staff took advantage of an NCAA-mandated dead period, where communication with potential recruits is deemed impermissible, to learn from one of the top teams in the WNBA, led by Dan Hughes, who was a mentor to Binford when she was with the Cleveland Rockers.

"Dan is one of my mentors that I seek out along with June Daugherty, John Stockton and Raegan Pebley," Binford said. "I had the opportunity to do something like this a few years ago when Coach Hughes was with the San Antonio Silver Stars. We also had him out here (Bozeman) when I

was first hired for a coaching clinic. I've always valued his opinion and input on how we're running things."

Binford and her staff will look to use the newfound knowledge heading into a difficult 2018-19 season, one where MSU recently learned they will participate in the WNIT, one of the premier pre-season tournaments in women's college basketball. MSU will join 15 other teams in the season-opening tournament, a schedule that will include Power 5 schools, such as Auburn, Iowa State, Marquette and Miami. The tournament provides a three-game guarantee, and 2017 WNIT champion, Louisville, reached the Final Four, and WNIT runner-up, Oregon, reached the Elite Eight.

"Playing in the preseason WNIT is an exciting opportunity for us to face some outstanding programs that will provide us with a high-level of competition," said Montana State head coach Tricia Binford. "The

WNIT is a prestigious tournament and to be invited to be part of the 16-team field is a good reflection of our program. We look forward to seeing who and where we will be playing."

MSU coaches will begin implementing new ideas soon as they begin summer workouts with their returning players. Binford's staff will have 6-8 weeks to work with players; during that time they hope to get

everyone on the same page and begin to identify potential leaders for next season's squad.

"We've already started that process," Binford said. "We've talked about what leadership traits look like. We'll ask some kids to stretch themselves and we already have kids that other players respond too. We're identifying strengths in all of our players."

"As a staff, we'll be encouraging them to stay engaged with each other, have positive body language and good communication," Binford stated. "Competitiveness is also something we've been striving for in practice. We want to get kids out of their comfort zone and I think that will encourage some leadership. They'll have to make demands of each other and if they can handle that I think we'll have an exciting season."

However, all was not lost according to first-year manager Garrett Schultz. "I was really happy with the ball-games we put together," Schultz asserted after his side dropped to 16-8. "Vauxhall is a really good program and the arm they threw at us was probably the best we've seen all year.

That's the level of competition you want to play because it makes us better, but I felt like they were the aggressor tonight."

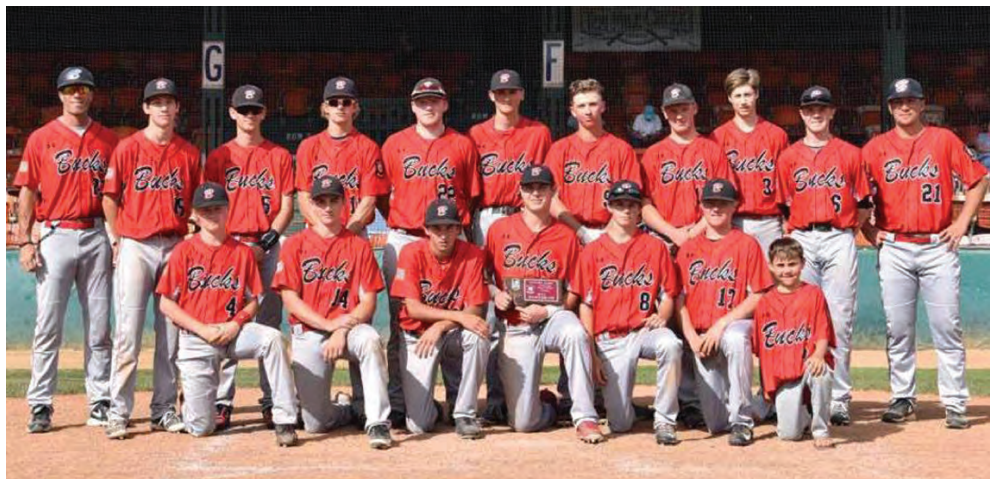
Over the course of the three-day tournament, Bozeman took down the Helena Senators, host Missoula Mavericks, Northern Lakes Mountaineers from Idaho and the Butte Miners.

Bozeman will look to ride the momentum of their strong showing in Missoula as conference play is set to get underway. Bozeman will travel to Helena to take on the Senators again to kick off league play before

a three-game homestand starting with the Gallatin Valley Outlaws on June 4th at Heroes Park in Bozeman.

"We've been talking about our hitters and we knew it would take a little time to get used to this level ... and they're really starting to drive the baseball," he added. "We were at 10 hits or more probably for four or five games in a row, we ran the bases really hard and we had 10 different players on the mound (in Missoula) and increased our depth there. I feel good about where we're at.

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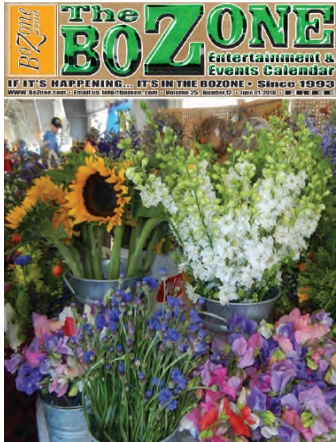

### GAR releases real estate statistics for April 2018

The Gallatin Association of REALTORS® (GAR) recently released its **residential real estate market statistics** for April 2018, revealing increases in units sold and sales prices and a tightening inventory of available homes.

Single-family sales jumped 46.7 percent in April 2018 compared to last year, going from 92 to 135, and the average sales price in the single-family market increased 22.4 percent. Condo/townhouse sales increased 45.3 percent, rising from 53 to 77, and the average sale price in the condo/townhouse market increased 12.7 percent.

"The Gallatin area residential real estate market continues to be extremely competitive," said Steve Candler, CEO of the Gallatin Association of REALTORS®. "Total units sold and average sales prices are up, while the inventory of available homes is down. This points to a seller's market as we move into Summer."

*Single Family Homes – Gallatin County*

The number of new single-family listings in April 2018 decreased slightly from 181 to 167 compared to April 2017, a 7.7 percent drop. The number of pending sales fell only 1.2 percent, from 172 to 170. The number of units sold increased 46.7 percent, from 92 last April to

135 this year. The average number of days on market was 75, the same as last year, while the month's supply of inventory decreased 21.2 percent, from 3.3 to 2.6.

*Condo/Townhouse Market – Gallatin Co.*

The number of new listings in the Gallatin County condo/townhouse market decreased 15.9 percent in April 2018 compared to the same period last year, going from 88 to 74. Pending sales fell 2.5 percent, from 81 to 79, while the number of closed sales increased 45.3 percent, from 53 to 77. The average sale price increased 12.7 percent, from \$340,078 in April 2017 to \$383,302 last month, and the month's supply of inventory fell slightly, from 3.0 to 2.7.
