

Historic chair exhibit opens at Yellowstone Gateway Museum

The Yellowstone Gateway Museum has announced the opening of Pull Up a Chair: Tales from the Seats of History, an exhibit of twenty-eight chairs from the museum's collection on display in the Pioneer Room. Also included are local stories and photographs of people and chairs. A reception is set for Saturday, June 23rd from 10am-5pm. Cookies will be provided. This event is free and open to

the public.

Inspired by the great number and variety of chairs in the museum's collection, Museum Registrar Karen Reinhart and volunteers Rosamond Stanton, Sara Chaney, BJ Earle, and Mariah Henry selected chairs and began conducting research about each chair's local history over the past year. A fainting couch, grinding bench, hand-forged dining room chair, sidesaddle, oxhide ranch chair, potty chair, convertible stroller/highchair, a mangle's chair, 63 Ranch rocker, barber chair, railroad-related chairs, and others are included. Each chair is identified with a short label while its

full history is interpreted in note-

books that accompany the exhibit. Several photographs of people in chairs are displayed on exhibit walls as well as in the notebooks.

Visitors will have the opportunity to vote on their favorite chair and story - results will be posted and periodically updated on the museum's Facebook page.

Researchers revealed inspiring and sometimes surprising stories of local people or businesses. For example, an 1869 ox-hide chair may have supported members of early Yellowstone expeditions staying at a Paradise Valley Ranch; the career and life of a woman who was once a Vaudeville actress and owned a fainting couch; a rancher who made a highchair with found branches during the Great Depression; a Northern Pacific Railway folding chair enjoyed by Yellowstone Park Branch line passengers; a sidesaddle used while a woman lived in the Main Boulder Ranger Station from about 1910-1940; an elk-legged stool made by a local hunter; and a Mountain Bell switchboard operator's chair that generated a lot of local stories as people remembered

their or their parents' careers.

Businesses and individuals were given the opportunity to sponsor a chair for the duration of the exhibit, which is at least two years; their names will be included in the exhibit. 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

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PB Davidson Watermark exhibit opens at Helen E. Copeland

The Helen E. Copeland Gallery and the School of Art at Montana State University is pleased to announce the opening of *Ghosts: Selections from the PB Davidson Watermark Collection*, currently on exhibit until Wednesday, July 25th. On view will be watermarks, old letters, scientific research papers, and historical documents collected by paper chemist, PB Davidson.

In 2016, while going through the archives that had not been properly scoured since 1986, HECG Gallery Director, Ella Watson, came across an old cardboard box donning decades of dust, full of files with vague labels such as "States," and "Animals." With that, she stepped into the hidden genius of PB Davidson, retired paper chemist and collector. As she spent an afternoon going through watermarks, currency, and old letters, she was stunned by their beauty and historical value. For the next semester, Watson catalogued the 460+ pieces of paper in the PB Davidson Watermark Collection. About 100 of those pieces of paper are on view at Helen E. Copeland.

The title *Ghosts* references several aspects of the exhibit from the lost art of letter writing, to the historical documents, to the dying craft of the watermark. Watermarks themselves were a once celebrated art form that are rarely used in everyday transactions, except for currency. However, in their heyday, watermarks were once used as a protection against counterfeit money and documents, as well as personal marks of businesses, countries, and families.

PB Davidson himself was one of those rare types of human being, in whom science and art merge seamlessly. His appreciation of his craft and chemical expertise overlapped with his appreciation for a craft that has since begun to die. In his lifetime, he amassed an amazing collection of historical documents, letters, watermarks, and paper – to the extent that his enthusiasm for the material became public knowledge and associates would send him watermarks of their own.

The walls of the front gallery of the HECG are adorned with old currency and letters, heralding back to a time when correspondence was an art, before emails urged us towards brevity and shorthand. There are references to the war effort of WWII and the rationing of paper; the invention of neoprene; and even the eerie solace of knowing that the DMV was

Davidson, who while receiving the Industrial Research Fellowship at Mellon Institute of Industrial Research, in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, funded by the Strathmore Paper Company in late 1920s, developed much of the watercolor paper that is used today.

Finally, suspended like specters of a dying craft, watermarks hang from

the ceiling so viewers can gaze at their translucent magnificence.

Viewers are cordially invited to take time with this collection: come once, come again. Bring your tea and savor a time when the written letter was an art form taught from grade school, before emails and "the cloud" forced us to share our deepest sentiments and memories in bytes and pixels. You're urged to take time with this collection as Dr. Davidson did, and readdress the ephemera of your own life, before your computer crashes and all these important pieces of your own life, your own era, get wiped away, vanish, and become Ghosts.

Green Door announces Stephanie Campbell reception, two Calls for Art

Green Door Gallery will host an artist reception with Stephanie Campbell for her exhibit "Mask Artistry: Faces of the Elements" during the first Livingston Art Walk on Friday, June 22nd from 5:30–8pm.

Of her work, Campbell says, "This collection of masks honors the elemental composition of who we are: earth, air, fire, water, stone, shell, bone, etc. Each mask represents some counterpart aspect of the elements: physical/emotional/mental/spiritual, individually or in

combination with our own personal chosen masks and personas. Each mask is made with only natural materials and has a backstory explanation of title, background, interpretation, and materials used.

Stephanie Campbell is an artist, actress and theatre arts professor. She gathered African masks on her research and teaching assignments in Kenya, Botswana and South Africa. As a professor at Montana State University, she uses theatre mask performance work to call her students to self-awareness through the use of

mask characterization. That work now extends to the mask artistry that she creates as a visual artist.

Queen of tHE ARTS seeks 54 artists to produce artwork for a deck of playing cards. There are 52 cards in a deck and two jokers. Each artist will be assigned a card to design (Jack of Hearts, two of diamonds, etc.) The identity of the card must be readily visible although it may also be a part of the art design itself. Most media is welcome and must be conducive to being photographed for production of the pack of cards.

Submissions must be sized in a ratio of 2.5 x 3.5. For instance: 5x7, 7.5x10.5 or 10x14. Each piece must be ready to hang according to gallery standards. Stop by Wheatgrass Saloon between 11am and 5pm, Tuesday through Saturday, to claim the card you'd like to design! All work must be turned in by July 15th.

All 54 works will be exhibited at Green Door Gallery from October 26th through November 16th with an artist reception to open the exhibit. Each of the 54 works of art will be photographed and made into a deck of playing cards. The decks of cards will be sold as a fundraiser for the Livingston Gallery Association.

Through sales of the cards,

Green Door Gallery will cover costs incurred for the production and promotion of the decks of cards.
Remaining proceeds will go to the Livingston Gallery Association.

#MeToo will exhibit voices heard through images. Over a decade ago, Tarana Burke created the "Me Too" movement to raise awareness of the pervasiveness of sexual abuse and assault in society. The movement was popularized by actress Alyssa Milano in the fall of 2017 when she encouraged women to tweet it to "give people a sense of the magnitude of the problem." Since then, the hashtag has spread virally and the phrase has been posted online millions of times, often with an accompanying personal story of sexual harassment or assault.

What began as a relatively straightforward movement in which newly empowered women were outing men, #MeToo has come to involve all genders as it looks at the prevalence of the abuse of power in the context of gender, class and race. To what extent can our voices come together and work toward a collective truth and toward a holistic approach to health in community? The hope is to create an exchange of telling and listening that is helpful in the move toward awareness, change, healing and prevention.

The exhibit will be held July 27th through August 17th, with an artist reception during the July 27th Livingston Art Walk. The exhibition is open to artists of all genders and ages. All media is welcome. Art must be delivered, ready to hang according to Green Door standards by July 25th and all paperwork emailed by July 18th.

Review: The Death of Stalin

The Death of Stalin sheds some darkly domedic light on a tumultuous period in Soviet history

by Joseph Shelton Let us take this moment in American history, marked as it is by internecine conflicts on both parties and the bellicosity possessed by certain strongmen of the "only I can save us" persuasion, to consider that

history is irreconcilable. We'll never know what is really happening behind closed doors, not because of what has been described over and over in the media as our sudden emergence into a "post-truth" world, as if the truth were a non-renewable resource which we have failed to conserve and have simply run out, but because history is something from which no one escapes. Everybody dies, and nobody lives to tell the tale.

Or such would seem to be the moral of The Death of Stalin, the latest pitch-black political satire from Armando Iannucci, the creator and writer of In the Loop, Veep and The Thick of It. Adapted from a French language graphic novel, the film attempts a reasonably believable reconstruction of the reshuffling of power following the death of Josef Stalin as various ministers, lackies and military men engage in some heavy-duty

One is Nikita Kruschev (unexpectedly, and compellingly, played by Steve Buscemi as a comparatively sensible but neurotic force for some self-serving reform), who sees the rolling back of Stalin-era abuses as a way to curry favor with the proletariat. Beria (Simon Russell Beale), the chief of the secret police apparatus, who the film is careful to remind us has overseen, or often, personally performed, the murder, rape, torture of thousands of Soviet citizens, is pursuing the same tact in an effort to blame the excesses of his cruelty on Stalinist politics and make himself look like a progressive. Then there's Georgy Valenkov, Stalin's deputy and the obvious choice for to ascend to the Premiership (Jeffrey Tambor), the highly decorated general Marshall Zukhov (Jason Isaacs) and old guard politicians like Molotov (the great Michael Palin) waiting in the wings for their turn.

None of which sounds very funny, but it very definitely is. But its comedy exists alongside a thick, black vein of darkness and violence the lives of the Russian citizenry, colleagues and even their wives are all mutable in the fight for power, any of them subject at any moment to being chewed up and spit out in the power struggle. Many people are simply shot point blank. The film, for all its nihilistic laughs, never lets us forget the human cost of so much powermongering.



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

At that time, Congress passed the Wilderness Study Area (WSA) Act, directing the United States Forest Service to "maintain existing wilderness characteristics for the potential of inclusion into the Wilderness preservation system," the criteria and characteristics which were established under the

As a result, we have a WSA which stretches from the lofty 8,331 feet summit of Mount Ellis, just south of Bozeman, to the countless nine and ten thousand-foot peaks and ridges in the Gallatin Range. This area contains 100 square miles of roadless areas running south along the mountain crest divide. This magnificent mountain range is the last potential for wilderness

within the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem, the only remaining area that has not received congressional protection. Unsurpassed in natural scenic beauty, it is a haven for native fish and wildlife and a place to experience solitude, freedom and develop skills for self-reliance in a roadless mountain environment.

Wildlife in the range includes deer, elk, moose, bighorn, goat, bear and mountain lion. These species require roadless areas for part of their life cycle. It is one of the highest elk producing ranges in Montana primarily because of its natural optimum ratio of feed (with adequate key winter range) to the potential of escape due to backcountry cover.

It is an essential wildlife and raptor migration corridor linking the Northern Continental Divide Ecosystem (including Glacier Park and the Canadian ecosystems) to the Yellowstone Ecosystem. This migration corridor is essential in order to maintain the survival of our endangered species and to provide genetic viability for all species.

User groups abound in their shared use of this roadless area. The Gallatin Range provides clean air and is essential for protection of our domestic watersheds, watershed protection which provides protection for both water quality and water quantity. Backcountry Wildlife Conservation Areas and Natural Protection Areas surround the proposed Wilderness boundary and share countless miles of trails and logging roads, enabling travel for snowmobiles, motorcycles, all

terrain vehicles and mountain bikes. The Gallatin Range is one of the last areas in Montana that has potential for a great Rocky Mountain Wilderness – providing it with wilderness protection is a step in the right direction. We still have the opportunity to do it right.

The June 28th talk will study the wilderness alternatives in the Custer Gallatin Forest Plan. Our focus will be on wilderness and wildlife - and why wildlife needs wilderness. The Forest Service has released a set of wilderness alternatives, and only Alternative D meets the needs of wildlife. Come and find out why.

Rapid snowmelt causes record-breaking streamflows across the state of Montana

From the U.S. Department of Agriculture
On May 11th, 2018, the Clark
Fork River above Missoula reached
33,250 cubic feet per second (cfs),
the highest flow recorded since the
river reached 48,000 cfs on June 1st,
1908. This year's peak flow was
driven almost purely by the rapid
snowmelt from the abundant and
anomalous snowpack across the
basin, unlike other big peak years
(1964 and 1975) when there was a
significant rain event in addition to
already occurring snowmelt.

"This year will stand out in history as one of the biggest years on record for purely **snowmelt-driven flows** in rivers across the state," said Lucas Zukiewicz, USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) water supply specialist for Montana. "The flows we experienced during May were a direct result of the well above normal to record-breaking snowpack in place before snowmelt began along with above average temperatures and abundant sunshine."

While most rivers didn't set new records for peak flows with regards to an instantaneous flow measurement (cfs), 52 streamgages along rivers and streams set new records for May monthly flows, and 12 additional sites were the second highest on record. "Monthly flow refers to the total volume of water to move through the river during the month, and what we experienced during May was record-setting," said Zukiewicz. Records at some streamgage locations go back 90 years. It wasn't just in northwest Montana where new records were set. "Records for May flows span the entire state. Almost two-thirds of the gauges we forecast set new records, both east and west of the Divide," said Zukiewicz.

The impacts of the rapid snowmelt may be felt later in the summer season. Ideally, the slow release of mountain snowpack provides long-duration flows in the rivers and streams across the state. This year, snowpack peaked well above normal in many basins, but once it peaked it came out at an accelerated rate. "Snowmelt rates this May were well above average throughout the month, and it took its toll on the snowpack," said Zukiewicz.

Snowpack as of June 1st remains near to above normal at many high elevation snowpack monitoring locations, but most midelevations are below normal for this date, and low elevations have melted during the early half of May. "Based on the predominant weather patterns that we experienced this winter, cool and wet, this is not what we were expecting. It's almost like we skipped spring altogether this year and went straight into summer. The snowpack is moving out quickly, and early, this year," said Zukiewicz. Snowmelt-driven peak flows have likely occurred on many river basins across the state, but higher elevation driven river basins in south-central Montana could still see additional peaks.

As of [early June], many reservoirs are full or are reaching capacity from the abundant runoff, which will help to sustain flows in many river basins later this summer. Summer streamflow forecasts issued by the USDA-NRCS Montana Snow Survey generally remain near to above average for the June 1st – September 30th period, but summer precipitation, especially in June, will play a critical role in determining the long-term water supply.

YNP Superintendent Dan Wenk announces retirement in 2019

Yellowstone National Park Superintendent **Dan Wenk** recently announced his decision to retire on March 30th, 2019. At that time, Wenk will have more than 43 years of public service dedicated to the national park system.

"I've had an amazing career with the National Park Service," said Superintendent Wenk. "It is an honor and a privilege to preserve national park resources and provide incredible visitor experiences, and I'm not done yet. I'm in the midst of several important projects that I will finish before I depart to ensure the smoothest transition for Yellowstone."

Over Wenk's remaining tenure, his areas of focus will be: implementing the bison quarantine program by sending live animals to the tribes at Fort Peck; collecting data and developing community support for the long-term visitor use management planning effort; negotiating concessions contracts; managing transboundary wildlife issues; and working with park staff to improve workplace culture.

As the current Superintendent of Yellowstone National Park since 2011, Wenk manages more than 2.2 million acres, a staff of 800, and an annual budget of more than \$60 million.

Wenk served as Deputy Director of Operations for the National Park Service in Washington D.C. from 2007 through 2011. He served as Acting Director of the National Park Service for nine months in 2009. In these national roles, Wenk received the Department of the Interior Secretary's Executive Leadership Award and the Presidential Rank Award.

Wenk's career with the National Park Service began in 1975 as a landscape architect. He was named Superintendent of Mount Rushmore National Memorial in 1985 where he served for 16 years. In 2001, he was appointed the Director of the Denver Service Center, which is the National Park Service's central office with responsibility for planning, design and construction.

Since 1916, the National Park Service has been entrusted with the care of America's more than 400 national parks. With the help of volunteers and partners, NPS safeguards these special places and share their stories with millions of people every year.




Cunningham decided to remix and release his 11th & Grant performance after receiving an overwhelming positive response following the episode debut and its subsequent airings.

MontanaPBS releases trailer for 2019 documentary highlighting search for new weight standard

In celebration of World Metrology Day in late May, MontanaPBS released the trailer for *The Last Artifact*, a new feature-length documentary about the international race to redefine the standard for the kilogram and reboot the international measurement system.

World Metrology Day is an annual celebration of the signature of the Metre Convention between seventeen nations on May 20th, 1875, which set the framework for international collaboration on the science of measurement and its modern applications in business, industry, and commerce.

The Last Artifact will document the work going on behind the scenes to modernize the measurement system upon which all of modern life depends. Since the French Revolution, the way we weigh the world has been based on a small metallic cylinder about the diameter of golf ball, located just outside of Paris inside a high-tech vault. Encased within three vacuum-sealed bell jars, it may not look like much, but it is one of the most important objects on the planet. It affects every aspect of our lives from the moment we are born, to the food we eat, the cars we drive, and the medicines we take. This object has helped send men to the moon, and satellites into space. It is an object unlike any other, the last of its kind. It is a literal constant in an everchanging world, and the weight by which all others are measured.

But in 2018, all this will change. This remarkable object will be resigned to history.

It will be redefined. *The Last Artifact* tells the story about how this artifact came to be, how

whom are graduates of Montana State University's Master of Fine Arts program in



it came to pass, and what the future holds.

Montana State University, in collaboration with MontanaPBS, received a \$500,000 grant from the National Institute of Standards and Technology to support the making of the film. *The Last Artifact* is being co-produced and directed by Emmy Award-winning filmmakers Jaime Jacobsen and Ed Watkins, both of

Science and Natural History Filmmaking.

The film's production team is composed of an array of MSU film graduates, including Rick Smith, Director of Photography; Parker Brown, Sound; and Stefanie Watkins, Editor. In addition, MSU graduate and MontanaPBS' Director of Production Scott Sterling will serve as the film's Colorist and

Coince and National History Eilers alice

Online Editor; and Aaron Pruitt, another MSU graduate who is the interim Director and General Manager at MontanaPBS, will serve as the film's Executive Producer.

Jacobsen, Watkins, and team are spending two years following teams of scientists from around the world as they seek to establish a new definition, weaving together a tale of historical ingenuity, international competition, and dogged determination. "If past experience is any judge, the implications for the future will be compelling. The last big revision in the definition of just one measurement unit, time, enabled the development of GPS, the Internet, and interstellar navigation," said Watkins.

Filming will culminate at the General Conference on Weights and Measures at the Palace of Versailles in France in November 2018, when delegates vote to redefine the weight of the world. "It will be a momentous moment not just for an unsung band of scientists, but for the entire world – which will be the better for it in ways we have yet to imagine," said Jacobsen.

The Last Artifact is slated for international release in 2019. The film's distribution plan includes national broadcast on public television and release on secondary platforms including cable, satellite, HD, VOD, mobile and educational forums.



Afro funk & soul ensemble kicks off Music on Main in zestful fashion

One of Bozeman's favorite community events returns to the streets of Downtown later this month as **John Roberts y Pan Blanco** takes the stage for the first in the **2018 Music on Main Summer Concert Series** on Thursday, June 28th. Featuring vocals in Spanish, English and Portuguese, the group melds high-energy Funk, African and Latin grooves with soulful instrumental solos aimed at sharing

Frontman John Roberts began
his musical journey at the age of 5

RZ: Hi John. You have the privilege of opening this year's 'Music on Main' festivities, of Bozeman's most popular events. You'll also perform as part of the Library's 'Music on the Green' series in July. What can residents and those visiting expect from these outdoor summer shows?

JR: They can expect a blend of Cuban, African, and American funk and soul. The thing that ties the music together is that it's all danceable. The band is high-energy, [features] great soloists and Cuban percussion with the sound of African guitar mixed in – even "Charanga," Cuban violin sounds.

RZ: Your music draws influence from numerous genres and world cultures. For those unfamiliar, how would you describe your sound?

JR: It's a different mix. As a musician in Los Angeles, I toured with a lot of salsa and Argentine bands, orchestras, as well as soul, funk, and jazz groups. I wanted to mix it all together when I came to Montana to make sure there was something for everybody. There's a groove and a funk to all of it [and] everybody can appreciate something from another culture. All the music we hear nowadays has roots in Africa, so that's really what ties it all

together to me.

RZ: This ensemble inspires its audiences to dance and enjoy life. Stepping out on stage, what objectives do you have for a performance, large or small? On the flip side, what expectations do you have of your audiences?

JR: I take what we do as artists and musicians very seriously, the responsibility and blessing to get up in front of people and perform for them, or to possibly affect them emotionally. When we step onto the stage, we're having a blast. We want to have fun and convey that energy of positivity to the audience. We have to do that every time we hit the stage. Numerous times, I didn't expect people to be affected the way they were, in certain ways so positively they can't stop thinking or talking about it. It's not necessarily [what] we play, it's the fact they were maybe in a depressed or negative spot and were affected positively. That really is the point of all this music. That's my whole concept of being a musician. If we do it right, the audience responds by dancing or listening or singing, even just tapping their food or moving their shoulder. When they respond one way or another, we respond back. My favorite thing is to be in touch with **RZ:** I can assume you'll play a

few tunes from your latest release, 2016's *Soul y Pimienta*, at these upcoming shows.

JR: Yes! [The title] is a play on words. In Spanish, sal y pimienta means "salt and pepper." Soul y Primenta is like "soul and spice," which is what we play. We'll probably play all of those songs, and I have some new ones I've been working on. [There are] some that aren't quite ready to play yet, but I am working on my next album which will be done partly in Montana, Los Angeles, and Cuba.

RZ: Do you have a favorite track you enjoy performing?

JR: My favorite song from Soul is "Pajarita," which is about my daughter. It was inspired by her dancing to the sounds of a Cuban band as I watched her in my living room. She's just always loved that music. I don't know if she knew why, but I was always playing in those bands and she heard me. And my new favorite composition – and maybe personal anthem – is called "Soul Ain't Got No Color." It's

about acceptance and how people from all cultures are valid, accepting them for who they are.

RZ: You have performed to

Can you share a particular experience that might've genuinely enhanced your craft?

JR: That's a big question. There

Angeles. When I was searching for a name for the group, I didn't want anybody to get the idea that I was discriminatory or anything like that.

I don't think they do because of the music we play. And not everybody in the band is white bread we have a Latino guitar player and sometimes I fly in a Cuban guy to play congas with me. What I really hope is that people perceive us as a fun-loving group that doesn't take itself too seriously. Just by the name "Pan Blanco" in Spanish, we're bringing some respect to Latino cultures. So, it's multifaceted.

RZ: You've got a summer of regional touring ahead, then what? Where do you go from here?

JR: There's a bunch of things. I'm working on my next album -I'm always working on more shows, more music and writing. I've played from Portland to Wisconsin, and it would be nice to get overseas. It's maybe simplistic, but my priority is to reach as many people as I can and to be reached in return. I want to finish the new album, and then I also want to do a soul album based on my experiences in that world – just like pure, old school soul. I have some children's books I'm working on, stories about music. Then of course, keep traveling around the world to learn of other cultures and hopefully affect people positively in return, bringing that back to Montana or to whoever needs it. It always seems like the more you learn, the more you have to learn. The better you get, the better you have to get.

audiences all over the world. How do you compare playing in some of those exotic places to doing so right here in Montana?

JR: I've been very fortunate to have the experience I've had, and to be honest, way more than I ever thought I would. Touring around the world, I've played with a lot of people. I would never negate that experience - that's what gave me my voice, musical abilities and influences. Everybody has to learn somewhere. When I moved back to Montana five years ago, I was missing this kind of music. I put on a little show in Billings and something like 400 people showed up. I thought, "Whoa. This is kind of crazy." Now every time I do a show, I'm meeting new people from different parts of Montana and people who have transplanted here Cubans and Puerto Ricans and Guatemalans and Mexicans and Hondurans and Panamanians. It's amazing the people that come out to these shows that I would have never met otherwise. The audiences in Montana have been very welcoming and accepting of this music, which, isn't commonplace [here] or the surrounding five or six states. Being in touch with them has been amazing. Playing here is a different experience but I'm doing my music with my voice, based on these experiences with well-known names around the world.

RZ: You've surely got one or two great stories from your many travels.

are a couple groups I've played with, three in particular that really, really affected me. One was Ricardo Lemvo and Makina Loca, [who plays] a blend of Cuban and African music. That was a super important influence on what I do, not to mention meeting the people in the band from these places around the world, understanding where they came from and some of the plights they've dealt with in Africa or Cuba or Puerto Rico or Spain. It was a very cultural mix. I learned a lot about life and these kinds of music in that band.

RZ: You mentioned a couple others.

JR: I got into Bobby Womack's band when I was 25 or 26. He was a world-renowned songwriter and his band was basically a who's who of '70s and '80s soul. That was a crazy experience - and it wasn't always fun. I learned a lot as far as songwriting and soul music goes, but also had to deal with some people who were high or drunk all the time, [who had] certain lifestyles they didn't want to let go of. But when I moved to LA, all I wanted to do was play in a soul and funk cover band. Then two years later, I'm playing with Bobby Womack who helped start soul music in Sam Cooke's band.

RZ: Crazy for sure. **JR:** Then of course Chaka Khan's group was super high-end. I learned a lot there, too. It never ends you just keep learning. Those experiences really helped shape me, as well as going to Africa, to Mexico, to Cuba, going to these poverty-stricken areas around the world. I like to chase down the roots of whatever it is that I'm doing. These are the poorest people in the world, but as soon as that music starts, they just start dancing and enjoying life. In the United States, we try and build music and arts into our culture, but in a lot of African and Latinbased cultures, [theirs are built] around the music and dancing. Everybody dances all the time. The poorest people in the world write the happiest music.

RZ: They really do. Now, I haven't worked on my Spanish since high school, but I believe the group's name translates to "John Roberts and White Bread." Is that correct? How was it decided that's what this band would be known as?

JR: That was my nickname in a lot of bands I played with in Los







Bozeman Hawks named 2018 Montana High School of the Year

With local schools closing their doors on June 7th for summer vacation, the 2017-2018 school year officially came to a close. So, too, did the 2017-18 sports season.

And what a season it was for the **Bozeman Hawks** who were recently named the Underriner Motors 406mtsports.com 'School of the Year.' Bozeman ran away with the title after amassing 28 points over the course of the year, outdistancing runner-up Manhattan Christian (16) by 12 points.

All sports awarded a team trophy by the MHSA counted toward the overall score a school could earn. A first-place finish netted a school three points, second-place was worth two points, and a third-place finish equaled one point. There were also points awarded for a number of unique situations, such as if two teams tied, then both were awarded the appropriate points.

With the scoring system in mind, 28 points is an impressive haul by all accounts.

In total, Bozeman collected 13 team trophies in eight different sports, including four state championships.

For the season,
Bozeman earned
state titles in girls'
golf, boys' and girls'
cross country, and
girls' tennis. The
Hawks earned runner-up finishes in
boys' basketball,
wrestling, boys and
girls swimming,
girls' soccer, boys'
tennis and girls track and field.

Additionally, Bozeman claimed a



pair of consolation titles in girls' basketball and boys track and field. The Hawk girls' golf team

earned their second-consecutive state title back in October at the Bill Roberts Golf Course in Helena, while the Hawk boys' basketball team earned their third consecutive runner-up finish after falling to Great Falls – CMR in the March title match in Billings.

But the most impressive feat of the year is Bozeman's cross-country programs earning their 10th (Boys) and 11th (Girls) consecutive state titles last fall. The girls' performance was especially impressive as all seven of Bozeman's runners finished in the Top 15 to easily crush the opposition. Like Bozeman's other programs, it was total domination.

But Bozeman isn't resting on its laurels, as several teams are already involved in summer activities in preparation for the 2018-19 sports season, where they hope their domination can continue.

A magazine popular among skiers has called **Montana State University** one of the best colleges for skiers in the Mountain West.

POWDER magazine selected the five best colleges in the Mountain West "that find that perfect balance between getting to ski and earning your degree." The magazine reported that it chose the schools based on a combination of culture, tuition, academics and closeness to the slopes

POWDER noted MSU's easy access to Bridger Bowl Ski Area and Big Sky Resort, as well as its exceptional snow science program.

"For those students that want to

turn being in the snow into a career, MSU's snow science program is second to none," writes reporter Jack Foersterling.

MSU is recognized nationally and internationally for its snow science research. The research, which is performed both on the slopes and in the labs on campus, is anchored in the Department of Civil Engineering and the Department of Earth Sciences. It includes field programs and a one-of-a-kind Subzero Science and Engineering Research Facility. MSU's snow scientists, as well as its Subzero facility, have garnered extensive national attention in the last decade, including a 2009 article that appeared in *The New*



York Times and a 2010 article in Popular Science.

"MSU's snow science program dives heavily into the interactions





Bozeman's Anderson helps Montana sweep Wyoming

Behind a strong pair of performances from former Bozeman High standout and University of Montana commit, Mack Anderson, the

Montana All-Stars once again swept the Midland Roundtable basketball season series versus the Wyoming All-Stars. The contests were played June 8th in Sheridan, WY, and June 9th in Billings.

For Montana, it was the seventh consecutive season in which the boys and girls both won their pair of games in the series. Montana coach Steve Keller, who recently shook up the Frontier Conference by switching from UM-Western to Providence in Great Falls, improved to 14-0 all-time since taking over the boys' coaching duties in 2004, and overall, Montana improved its series lead to 59-27

Anderson led all scorers in the opening game of the double-header in Sheridan when he went off for 16 points. He followed that performance up with a nine-point outing in Billings to close out the weekend

"It's an honor to be in (the game). Super fun playing with all of these different guys instead of competing against them," Anderson said.

Anderson got Montana off to a fast start in the opening game of the weekend series, scoring the first three

baskets of the night, all easy layups, forcing Wyoming to burn a timeout right at the outset of the contest. He continued to be a force down low all night, swatting away shots, collecting rebounds, and putting away the Wyoming All-Stars with an emphatic dunk late. Montana would go on to win by a score of 76-63

"I was kind of aggravated a bit. They were coming back, we weren't playing great," Anderson said. "So I kind of just drop-stepped with a little spin and put it down."

There would be no need for late game heroics on the second night of the series, as Montana raced out to another early lead, and finished off their neighbors from the South by a score of 95-80.

While Anderson's scoring output wasn't the same (He finished with nine points), his presence was still felt, after he contributed a devastating dunk off a lob from former rival now teammate Conner Kieckbusch of Billings Senior.

Following the weekend festivities that are a part of the Montana/Wyoming series, Anderson will now get set to head to Missoula where he will spend the better part of July getting acclimated to his new teammates at the University of Montana and begin off-season workouts. Anderson will redshirt during the 2018-19 season at UM. •

Of course, the same could be said of all college basketball coaches who are scouring the country looking for more diamonds in the rough. But the challenge for Fish has been more complicated this off-season.

After sweating out the better part of two months, following the announcement by Tyler Hall that he was entering the NBA Draft, Fish learned that Hall will be returning to MSU. However, backcourt teammate Devonte Klines announced that he will forgo his eligibility to pursue professional playing opportunities elsewhere, leaving MSU with an open scholarship to fill this summer.

The news of Klines' departure was followed by the announcement that assistant coach Eric Jackson will also not be returning to MSU next season, either. Jackson, who came to MSU from the University of Portland, spent two seasons on Fish's staff, primarily responsible for guard play. Jackson spent 10 seasons at Portland before coming to MSU.

Prior to his time in Portland, Jackson had spent time on the staffs of the late Rick Majerus at Utah, Mike announced he is leaving Montana State to pursue other coaching opportunities.

MSU to offer new bachelor of arts degree in computer science

As computers increasingly become a part of society, a new academic program at Montana State University seeks to open the world of computing to a wider range of student interest and prepare graduates for diverse employment opportunities.

Starting this August, the Gianforte School of Computing in MSU's Norm Asbjornson College of Engineering will offer a bachelor of arts in computer science, a degree that combines computer science courses with concentrated study in areas outside science, technology, engineering and math (or STEM) – such as sociology, music, business or community health.

"The motivation is to enable students with almost any interest to benefit - both personally and professionally – from computing in their lives," said John Paxton, director of the Gianforte School of Computing.

The new, accredited degree eliminates roughly a year's worth of credits in engineering, math and science that are required by the department's bachelor of science degree. Instead, students select from dozens of approved plans that

include earning a second major or minor in the arts, the humanities, business or other non-STEM areas.

"Many computing opportunities in today's world don't require a whole year of advanced math and science," Paxton said.

Those opportunities include combining computing with education to make customized learning tools, with nursing to improve the software used by health care providers, and with political science to improve citizens' access to their elected officials, according to Paxton.

"If we look at any of the significant challenges in the world today, computer scientists will play a role in solving them," Paxton said.

About half of the degree options require students to complete at least one year of a second language, reflecting the increasingly international nature of computing work, said Paxton, who minored in German during college and has since been a visiting professor in Morocco, El Salvador and other countries.

Already, well over a dozen students currently pursuing the department's bachelor of science degree have expressed interest in switching

to the new degree. Paxton said he expects that, going forward, the new degree will also attract many students who wouldn't otherwise have considered studying computer science and who have a wider range of backgrounds.

"Numerous studies show that a diverse set of practitioners solves problems better than a more homogeneous group," Paxton said. "The computing industry is clamoring for a more diverse workforce."

Paxton said the computer science faculty decided in 2015 to create the new degree in response to interest from students as well as from the department's advisory board, which consists of representatives from Oracle, Micron, Workiva and other top computing companies.

Paxton said the degree is also aimed at giving students a wellrounded education that they can use to improve society using computing as a tool.

"It's not enough to make technology for technology's sake,' Paxton said. "We need to understand the world we live in, in order to be able to construct a future that's better. This new degree opens up that opportunity for many students."

Five Things You Should Never Do with Passwords (and Three You Should)

Passwords are the bane of our online lives. Nearly anything you want to do, it seems, calls for a password. As the Internet's reach extends beyond computers and into phones, TVs, appliances, and even toys, we have to enter passwords with increasing frequency and in ever more annoying ways.

To make dealing with passwords easier and more secure, everyone should use a password manager like 1Password or LastPass. Such apps generate random long passwords like kD*SSDcCl7^6FN*F, store those passwords securely, and automatically enter them for you when you need to log in to a website. They are essential in today's world. Sorry, but that's just the way it is.

You'll still need a few passwords you can remember and type manually – for instance, the master password for your password manager

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and your Apple ID password. Make sure those passwords are at least 12 characters, and we recommend going to at least 16 characters.

If you're unsure of the best way to create a strong password, try taking the first letter of each word in a sentence you can remember, and also change a few words to digits. Then "Now is the time for all good men to come to the aid of the party!" becomes a password along the lines of Nitt4agm2c2ta0tp!. So that no eavesdroppers learn your password, avoid saying your sentence out loud whenever you enter it! Or, combine four or five unrelated dictionary words, like correct-horse-battery-staple, that add up to at least 28 characters. (Don't use the examples in this paragraph!)

When possible, take advantage of two-factor authentication on sites like Apple, Google, Dropbox, Facebook, Twitter, and more.

Accounts protected by two-factor authentication essentially require that you enter a second, time-expiring password as part of the login process. You'll get that second password via text message, authenticator app, or other notification method when you log in.

on here is what you should NOT do with passwords. Follow these tips to avoid making mistakes that can undermine even the security provided by a password manager.

But what we really want to focus

1. Don't use the same password twice. This is key, because if the bad guys get your password - no matter how strong – for one site, they'll try it on other sites.

2. Don't share passwords with anyone you don't completely trust. That's especially true of passwords to accounts that contain sensitive information or that can be used to impersonate you, like email and social media. However, sometimes you have to share a password, such as to a club blog with multiple authors. In that case...

3. Don't send passwords to shared sites via email or text message. If someone hacks into your recipient's email or steals their phone, the password could be compromised. Instead, use a site like One-Time Secret to share a link that shows the password only once, after which the recipient should put the password into their password

manager. 4. Don't write your passwords on sticky notes. Yeah, it's a cliché, but people still do it. Similarly, don't put all your passwords in a text file on your computer. That's what password managers are for - if someone steals your computer, they can't break into your password manager, whereas they could open that text file easily.

5. Don't change passwords regularly if you don't have to. As long as every site has a strong, unique password, changing a password is a waste of time, especially if doing so makes you write down the password or communicate it insecurely. If you do have to update a password regularly, a password manager makes the task much easier.

Sure, it's tempting to take the easy road and share a password with a friend via email or write a particularly gnarly one on a sticky note. But today's easy road leads directly to identity theft and is paved with insecure password habits. You might think no one would pay attention to little old you, but times have changed, and organized crime is interested in any Internet account that can be cracked.
