What is the real story behind the animosities that eventually led to the catastrophe of the Jewish Revolt against Rome? Why would a small population without military capabilities or political allies dare to challenge a ruling power of such might? New archaeological evidence reveals a growing cultural divide beginning about two generations before the Revolt broke out, and sheds new light on the prehistory of this explosive event. This lecture will start with the constructions of Herod the Great and his sons, with a focus on the places that he built to impress his patrons. The appearance and character of some of those buildings created the conditions that led Jews throughout the land to band together more intensively and eventually persuade some to organize

Both events are free and open to the general public.


The poetry workshop will be held form 6-8pm in the conference room of the Big Sky Water and Sewer Building, located at 561 Little Coyote Rd. Each participant is asked to bring one original poem. The event is free but advance registration is required as only a limited number of spaces are available. Please call the ACBS office at (406) 995-2742 to register for the class. This workshop is for high schoolers through adults.

"Everyone can sing, everyone can dance, everyone can paint, and everyone can write poems," Jaeger says. "Poetry, like any art, is a mode of human expression. Sure, some of us are more accomplished than others, but all of us have a right to give it a go. I love best of all to witness writers in my

workshops surprising themselves."

The community reading will take place at 6:30pm at the Warren Miller Performing Arts Center. No advance tickets are required and seating is on a first come, first served basis. At Jaeger's readings, expect humor, expect serious reflection, and expect to examine the "human condition" in all its marvelous complexity. He enjoys interacting with audiences and sharing the stage with other Montana poets. In between reading from his own work, he often recites from memory the poems of Robert Frost, Donald Hall, and Richard Wilbur, among others.

Lowell Jaeger, the Montana Poet Laureate for 2017-19, is a nationally recognized poet who for the past 30 years in Montana has delighted diverse audiences with readings, lectures, discussions, radio shows and poetry workshops. During this time he has also served on an array of arts and humanities initiatives from Montana School Districts. Glacier Institute, Elderhostel, Montana Arts Council, Humanities Montana, American Library Association and the National Endowments for the Arts





### Mathematics & human nature intersect in Blue Slipper's Proof

The Blue Slipper Theatre's production of **Proof** by David Auburn continues with remaining performances on Friday and Saturday, October 19th-20th at 8pm, and a closing matinee on Sunday, October 21st at 3pm. Doors open 30 minutes before curtain time. Winner of the Pulitzer Prize for

Drama and the Tony Award for Best Play, Proof is a passionate and sharply witty play about the nature of genius and madness, father/daughter relationships and the risks and redemption of love. It examines the dual meaning of "proof" both as mathematical formula and the search for a basis of belief – in family, in lovers, and mostly, in one's own mind and heart.

In a review of its Broadway premiere, Thomas Burke calls Proof, 'a play you'll remember, which will haunt you forever."

Marc Beaudin returns to the Blue Slipper for his sixth production as director. He has worked in theatre professionally for 20 years as a director, scenic designer and technical director at venues ranging from unheated warehouses, historic opera houses and art galleries to a 1500-seat, state-of-the-art theatre. Directing favorites include Macbeth (with The 303), Amadeus (with Pit & Balcony Theatre Co.), Dying City (with Caldera Theatre Co.) and the Blue Slipper's productions of Dracula; Frankenstein, Inc.; Lion in Winter and Chekov's Squirtgun.

"The Blue Slipper's intimate space is the perfect venue for this intimate play," says Beaudin. "The pathos, nuance and humor of Auburn's words, in the hands of this immensely talented cast, come alive in a way that would be diffused by the distances of a

larger theatre."

The cast of *Proof* features Todd Hoberecht as "Robert," a genius mathematician who suffers a debilitating mental illness; Finn Ferguson as "Catherine," his daughter who may have inherited his genius, but worries she has inherited his psychotic disorder as well; Jesse Lagos as "Hal," Robert's adoring former student who hopes to discover a final mathematical proof in one of Robert's 103 notebooks; and Aya Rordam as "Claire," the older sister of Catherine who arrives from New York to make sure Catherine gets the help Claire believes she desperately needs.

Oscar Wilde's brilliantly clever comedic masterpiece was once called by critic W.H. Auden, "the only pure verbal opera in English." Earnest tells the story of two young gentlemen in London, who each live a double-life, creating elaborate deceptions to find some balance in their lives. John Worthing escapes the burdens of responsibility to have an exciting life in the city. pretending to be his fictitious younger brother Ernest. Algernon Moncrieff, meanwhile, has invented a convenient invalid, Bunbury, whom he uses as an excuse to gallivant off to the country whenever he pleases. When John falls in love with Algernon's cousin, Gwendolen, he is determined to come clean, but when Gwendolen reveals she can only love a man named Ernest, it somewhat complicates things. When Algernon

discovers John's secret and decides to visit John's pretty little ward in the country, posing as the debauched "Ernest," the situation gets entirely more complicated! Hijinks ensue, and the two gentlemen and their ladies are in for more than they ever anticipated when formidable Lady Bracknell, Gwendolen's mother, begins sleuthing around to uncover the far-fetched truth.

### Sicario: Day of the Soldado is a pretty good, if improbable, sequel

Sicario (2015) was something very like a masterpiece, an ambitious tale of crime on the borderlands that sometimes felt like the progeny of a bloody-minded Western and an ethical inquiry disguised as a horror film, didn't seem like it needed a sequel. Its various threads were all resolved – or left conspicuously unresolved to make a point about its world of violently

amoral men – by the film's queasy but inevitable conclusion. And the film's protagonist, the DEA agent portrayed by Emily Blunt, has realized that she desperately needs to get away from this world of weak men and toxic violence.

She must have done just that because in Sicario: Day of the Soldado she's nowhere to be found. Which means that there's no-one to check the consciences of Benicio Del Toro's Alejandro and Josh Brolin's Matt Graver, who are now largely allowed to their own violent, amoral devices. This time around, Alejandro, fresh off his last revenge but evidently not having achieved satisfaction, is called to foment war between the cartels, a task he completes with vicious but sad-eyed relish but which is not without complications. Brolin and crew must fake the kidnapping of a cartel leader's daughter, contend with federales loyal to the crime families, and defend their violent, amoral devices from their boss (Catherine Keener), whose rote disapproval of the proceedings serves less as a plot point than a plot necessity.

So yes, there's plenty of, for lack of a better phrase, toxic

masculinity – including the often unpleasant combination of bravado and violence. But where Sicario 2 succeeds is where it hews close to its predecessor: the tone. The film is stil gorgeously photographed, with Darius Wolski filling the shoes of the original Sicario's Roger Deakins quite admirably. And the score by Hildur Guðnadóttir (taking over for the late Johann Johannsson) is still

pure dread, all ominous strings and strange, arrythmic drums over atmospheric soundscapes that evoke a feeling somewhere between grand guignol and profound foreboding.

And, ultimately,

as the film nears its conclusion, it does get more interested in the ethical questions that occupied its predecessor. The film's best sequences see the usually unflappable Alejandro having to perform the task of illegally entering the United States with a group of desperate asylum seekers. Not only is it a chastening moment for Del Toro's hitman character, it's a chastening moment for its American audience, who are reminded what some of those asylum seekers are escaping from, and what some of them are hoping

to find in our country. While it doesn't achieve the same heights as the first *Sicario*, the sequel does suggest interesting opportunities for the series going forward. And I, for one, can be counted to be in the opening weekend audience of Sicario 3 whenever it materializes.

### **Bozeman Doc's next title spotlights** wildfires & those who fight them

On Sunday, October 21st, at the Emerson Center for the Arts & Culture, the Bozeman Doc Series presents the Montana premiere of the new documentary, Wildland, beginning at 7pm.

Every summer the American West burns. Forest and wildland fires are growing larger, more frequent, and deadlier every year, threatening millions of acres and thousands of lives as they do. Inside every one of these fires are small crews who work to contain the fire by hand - using shovels, pickaxes and methods that haven't changed in sixty years.

Both epic and intimate, Wildland tells the story of one firefighting crew as they struggle with fear, loyalty, love and defeat all over the course of a single fire season. Each member of this motley crew has come to this dangerous and unglamorous work for personal reasons – for some, it's a need to test themselves, a desire for adventure and purpose; for others, it may be the job of last resort after time in prison or a lifetime of addiction. What emerges is a story of a small group of working-class men, their exterior world, their interior lives, and the fire that lies between.

Directed by award-winning filmmakers Kahlil Hudson and Alex Jablonski, Wildland world-premiered in September 2018 at the Camden International Film Festival. Hudson is a Native Tlingit Alaskan and currently a professor of film at Santa Fe's Institute of American

Indian Arts. Jablonski created the documentary project Sparrow Songs in which he made one short documentary a month, every month for a year. The project developed a worldwide following and he was named to Filmmaker Magazine's list of the 25 New Faces of Independent Film. Jablonski and Hudson's first feature, Low & Clear,

premiered at South by Southwest, where it won the Audience Award, and went on to screen at numerous festivals including True/False, HotDocs, and IDFA.

Both Hudson and Jablonski went through firefighting training with those featured in the film, and not only embedded with the crew, but worked

alongside their subjects throughout the season. "Immersive... a tone poem



### Renowned immunologist to discuss cancer treatment, gene editing at next Café Scientifique

An internationally renowned immunologist, cancer researcher and physician, Dr. John (J.J.) Cohen, will be the featured speaker at Montana State University's second Café Scientifique event this fall.

Cohen will present "Stranger than Science Fiction: The frontier of cancer treatment possibilities and the futuristic-sounding biomedical technologies that could change everything" at 6pm Wednesday, October 24th, at The Baxter in Downtown Bozeman. The event is organized by MSU's Montana INBRE and COBRE programs and is free and open to the public.

Cohen, a professor of immunology, microbiology and medicine at the University of Colorado, Denver, plans to discuss how recent insights into the immune system are upending the cancer research landscape.

"Researchers have suspected for a long time that the immune system played a role in keeping us cancerfree, but all attempts to explain it failed until recently," he said. "We just didn't know enough about how to intervene in an orderly way, and researchers eventually gave up on this avenue."

All of that is changing, Cohen said, thanks to new understandings about how the immune system works and cutting edge biomedical technologies that allow for more precise interventions.

"One potential magic bullet for

cancer that's available now involves synthesizing billions of monoclonal antibodies, or cloned antibodies derived from a single cell," he said. "If there's something on a cancer cell that distinguishes it from a normal cell, you can attack it with these types of antibodies, and in some cases it's proving miraculous."

Another new and promising therapy, says Cohen, is called checkpoint inhibition immunotherapy.

"When I first heard of this idea, I thought, 'that's never going to work,' but it's turning out to have a lot of promise," he said. "The immune system's job is to destroy cells and tissues that pose threats, so it stands to reason that a system that can do so much damage must have an off switch or a checkpoint."

According to Cohen, checkpoint inhibition involves artificially blocking that off switch so that immune system cells are more likely to detect and destroy cancer cells.

"Tumors that persist have figured out how to paralyze a person's normal immune response," he said. "Once researchers understood that, the idea became, 'let's hide the off switch from the tumor and allow the immune system a chance to do its thing.'

"This is a highly promising mechanism we can use to interfere with tumor growth that's not based on radiation or chemicals," he added.

The "newest and weirdest"

cancer therapy Cohen plans to discuss at the café involves genetically modifying a patient's own T Cells and deploying them like a Trojan Horse to smuggle more cancerfighting capacity into the body.

"About 10 years ago, someone came up with the idea of taking a T Cell out of a cancer patient, implanting it with anti-cancer antibodies and other genes and creating enhanced T Cells that could bind better to cancer cells," he said.

"Now we can grow these special modified T Cells, called CAR-T Cells, in a lab and take, say, 10,000 original cells and turn them into several billion super T Cells with enhanced cancer-seeking receptors."

Cohen added that this type of therapy is most effective when deployed using so-called Killer T Cells – a specific kind of T Cell that has the ability to bind to any cell in the human body and convince it to self-destruct.

"Killer T Cells are really incredible, like something out of a spy movie," he said. "It takes only about four seconds of contact to get that message across, and the other cell goes into a death spiral over the course of the next minute.

"There's no drug that is that effective or has anywhere near that potential," he added.

Cohen was born in Montreal, Canada, and attended McGill University for his bachelor's, master's, doctoral and medical degrees. He completed a residency at the Royal Victoria Hospital in Montreal, followed by postdoctoral fellowships at

University of Colorado Medical School in Denver and at Mill Hill in London, England. As a professor at the University of Colorado, Denver, he has earned the Excellence in Teaching

Bozeman.



### Four to speak on conservation at fall fundraising event for **Montana State University Library**

Four individuals noted for their work in conservation and science will participate in "An Evening of Conservation and

Conversation," an event to be held as a fundraiser for the Montana State University Library. Hosted by the Friends of MSU Library, the free event will be held at 6pm Tuesday, October 23rd, in the Museum of the Rockies' Hager Auditorium.

As part of the event, Mike Clark, Jim Posewitz, Rick Reese and Cathy Whitlock will discuss their careers, as well as current environmental challenges facing the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem. Todd Wilkinson, journalist, author and Mountain Journal founder, will pose questions and lead the conversation.

The event will also include a question and answer session with the audience. A reception featuring information and resources from local organizations will be held in the museum's lobby following the conversation. The event is free with a suggested donation of \$5 to \$25. Doors will open at 5:30pm.

Clark, Posewitz, Reese and Whitlock were invited to participate in the event because of their vision, legacy and national impact within the conservation and science communities, according to Kenning Arlitsch, dean of the MSU Library.

Arlitsch said each panelist has a special relationship with the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem and played a pivotal role in historical conservation efforts and/or scientific research throughout the region.

Clark served as executive director of the Greater Yellowstone Coalition from 1994 to 2001 and again from 2009 to 2013. Under his leadership, the organization led opposition to a 1989 bid by Crown Butte Mines to build a gold mine in the mountains near Cooke City, just northeast of Yellowstone National Park. Environmentalists feared that toxic mine runoff would harm nearby rivers and streams and that the mine would irrevocably damage Yellowstone. The effort drew national attention and a visit to the mine site from then-President Bill Clinton. Ultimately, in 1996, Clinton arranged a federal buyout of the company's interest in the mine - a deal Clark has been widely credited for brokering.

Posewitz, whom Wilkinson has called "a modern manifestation of Teddy Roosevelt and Aldo Leopold," had a 40-year career at Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks before founding Orion, the Hunter's Institute, a group promoting hunting ethics and education. Posewitz is the author of a book on hunting ethics, "Beyond Fair Chase." He also led a successful fight in the

1970s against 42 dams that were proposed for the Yellowstone River.

Reese became involved in issues surrounding the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem in 1980, when he and his wife were hired to run the Yellowstone Institute. He went on to become principal founder and three-term president of the Greater Yellowstone Coalition in 1983. Reese is also a noted alpinist who took part in a rescue on the Grand Teton in 1967, which was later featured in the documentary "The Grand Rescue."

Whitlock is a professor of Earth sciences at MSU who earlier this year was elected to the National Academy of Sciences, one of the highest honors a scientist can receive. She is the first scientist from a Montana institution to earn the distinction. Over her nearly 40-year career, Whitlock has produced groundbreaking research and has been recognized for her scholarship and leadership in the field of past climate and environmental change.

She was lead author of the 2017 Montana Climate Assessment, a report released by the Montana Institute on Ecosystems that focuses on climate trends and their consequences for Montana's water,

forests and agriculture.

Jason Clark, head of MSU Library's Special Collections and Archival Informatics, said that Mike Clark and Rick Reese have donated notes, correspondence and documents pertaining to their careers to MSU Library's Special Collections and Archival Informatics, which holds more than 800 collections relating to agriculture, Montana history, Yellowstone National Park and the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem, Native Americans in Montana, trout and salmonids and other topics.

"Special Collections capture the artifacts and stories that preserve history and help shape the future," he said. "By donating their papers, Mike and Rick are sharing the legacy of their professional expertise in conservation and are providing a foundation in primary source research for current and future students, historians and conservationists."

Founded in 1994, the Friends of Montana State University Library helps develop the library's collections, environment and programs in an effort to enable learning and research for students, faculty and all Montanans.

Kallenbach first came to Montana in 1996 as an instructor for the Outward Bound program based in Red Lodge and Dillon, and has happily lived in Montana ever since.

### Composting 101 – give back to the soil!

What is **composting**? Why do we do it? What benefits are there in doing all that work? These are some questions that arise when speaking of composting, compost piles and tending to that pile of leftover garden material.

First, we need to examine the soil. Made up of small particles of rock, organic matter, water, and myriads of tiny organisms, our soils are a precious commodity. It grows our food, flowers, trees, and millions of plants around the globe. The soil is what keeps humanity going. If not for soil, good garden earth, we would not be here.

Organic materials of all kinds are an essential part of what makes up this most precious earth that we walk on every day. That is why composting is important. It is the way we put back into the soil what is taken from it. In the forests and rangelands, this is done automati-

cally. Leaves, grasses, plants, and fungi fall to earth, decompose and become soil once again.

In our gardens, all too often this material is gathered up and sent off to the landfill, as if it were trash. A better way is to save it, allow it to decay, and reconnect it with the soil in our flowerbeds or vegetable garden. It is the natural way that garden gods have orchestrated for eons of time.

So how and where do I make this marvelous thing happen? First, decide that it is indeed a good idea. That replenishing the soil is the right thing to do. Then find a corner of the yard, build a bin of sorts and begin saving all that refuse. Flower stalks, spent leaves, flowers, small branches, kitchen scraps (no grease or meat) can all be cast into this bin, or on a pile.

This decayed material - compost - replaces the harsh chemicals that are used all too often. Organic matter nourishes the soil, feeding all those creatures that are reconstructing the very foundation of our gardens. In those fertilizers that contain minerals - Miracle-Gro – are also the harsh chemicals that break down these minerals into useable plant food. That is the problem with them. When more plant food is needed, the best thing to do is to find organic materials that are pure, without the added harsh chemicals.

I've found that the use of compost - either homemade or purchased – is all that I need in my garden. Using Blood Meal – a rich source of nitrogen - from to time to time is helpful in keeping the plants green.

Our Earth is calling for protection, nourishment, and tender loving care. Making and using compost – from our 'waste' products is certainly a good way to go. •

### **Words from the Hive: Bee** prepared for winter

by Christine Hrenya, Ph.D. Engineering What the honeybees are up to...

Like their human counterparts, the Bozeman honeybees spend much of October readying their home for the long winter ahead.

On one hand, it is important to have ventilation in the hive in order to keep the humidity levels down. Like us, when honeybees breathe, they produce CO2 and H20. For every 40 lbs of honey the colony consumes (typical winter consumption is 60-90 lbs in Montana), approximately 12 L of water is produced! Humidity levels which are too high cause problems. Extremely high levels can lead to "raining" in the hive when the moist, warm air hits the cold roof and condenses. Imagine having a hole in your room during a non-stop rainstorm - you would not survive long, and neither do the bees. And even without such raining, high humidity levels foster the growth of diseases, fungi, and mold.

On the other hand, too much ventilation may result in unnecessary heat loss. The bees generate heat needed to keep the hive warm in winter by shaking. The more they shake, the more honey they need to eat. And if they run out of honey, the hive gets too cold and the colony

perishes. So during the month of October, the bees are busy caulking all of the gaps in the hive in order to make it less drafty. And what do they use for caulk, you ask? They make their own caulk, known as propolis, from tree sap! Back in the hive, the HVAC bees mix the tree sap with honey, wax, and enzymes from their stomachs. The resulting super-sticky mixture is then used to seal any openings in the hive except the entrance.

What the beekeepers are up to...

Doing their part to help the bees ensure good ventilation and insulation. Ensuring adequate honey stores for the months ahead. Double- and triple-checking the bearproofing, as honey is a tasty, calorie-loaded treat for bears getting ready to hibernate.

What the non-beekeepers can do...

Do your best to keep the bears out of the neighborhood. Make trash cans inaccessible - keep them indoors or use bear-proof containers. Harvest fruit and vegetables as they ripen. Do not add meat, fish or bones to the compost pile. Clean your grill. Store pet food inside. Do not store food in your car. And share these tips with your neighbors - it takes a village! •

### Missed the voter registration deadline? It's not too late!

Election Day is Tuesday, November 6th – which every person reading this already knew because they were registered to vote before this year's regular deadline of Oct. 9th, right?

If you're not sure and would like to find out the status of your voter record, log on to www.votinginmontana.com and click 'My Voter Page' at the top of the screen. You'll be rerouted to the Montana Secretary of State's voter information service. By simply entering your first and last name with your date of birth, you can see if you're registered to vote, whether you're an active or inactive voter, whether you're signed up to vote absentee, and the location of your polling place. You can also view or download a sample ballot.

Do you still want the opportunity to vote but aren't yet registered? Maybe you just relocated to Southwest Montana and haven't had the chance to update your current registration. The few who didn't quite make the initial deadline needn't fret! The **Late Registration period** is now in effect, continuing through noon on Nov. 5th and resuming again

on Election Day from 7am-8pm.

During the final weeks leading up to Nov. 6th, these prospective voters MUST visit the Election Office in person. Please bring your driver's license and/or social security number if you plan to register during this period. If neither are available, you may still be eligible using alternative forms of identification. Stop by the office or call (406) 582-3060 in these cases.

The Election Office can be found in Room 210 of the Gallatin County Courthouse, located at 311 W Main in Bozeman. Late registrants will be given a ballot with the option to vote then and there or to take it with them to fill-out at home. ALL ballots must be returned to the Election Office or official polling place by 8pm on Election Day. A drive-by tent will also be set up in front of the Courthouse on Nov. 6th to collect ballots.

Note: If you're mailing back an absentee ballot, do so the week before Election Day to ensure it will be received in time to be counted. And please, remember to SIGN the affidavit on the back of the envelope.

Unsigned envelopes will not be

counted.





cle Anthony's heroic fight with multiple Current Principal Trumpet for the Dallas Symphony and former Principal Trumpet for the world

famous Canadian Brass, Ryan **Anthony** joins the Bozeman Symphony to present Concerto for **Hope**. Anthony is known as one of the greatest trumpeters and entertainers in the world today. Having performed many times with Maestro Matthew Savery, he's become much in demand among Bozeman audiences. Concerto for Hope is set for Saturday, October 27th at 7:30pm, and Sunday, Oct. 28th at 2:30pm. Both concerts will be held at Willson Auditorium, located at 404 W Main Street in Downtown Bozeman.

The performances will begin with the grandest of ceremonial fanfare, the vivacious Festive Overture by Dmitri Shostakovich. Then, Anthony will take the stage performing James Stephenson's Concerto for Hope, written specifically to chronicle Anthony's heroic fight with multiple myeloma, proving nothing can stop the human spirit. The radiant joy of Brahms' pastoral 2nd Symphony will conclude each performance.

Concerto for Hope is completely and entirely dedicated to Anthony. Just three years before the creation of this concerto, he had been diagnosed with multiple myeloma, a cancer of the blood and bone marrow that is still incurable. Determined to beat it, he's been on a mission to raise awareness through "Cancer Blows" concerts and establishing the Ryan Anthony Foundation, and telling his story to anyone who will listen. All of this while maintaining an active schedule of performances, clinics, travel, regular treatments, and as a husband and father of two young children. At Anthony's request, this concerto would be about his story: a concerto that would evoke the events that have shaped forever his

view on life, the world, and relationships.

Anthony to perform with Symphony

"[...] emotionally powerful, beauty and heartache but ending with hope; fun and full of rejoicing," Anthony says of the concerto. "My recent life: hearing the news and crying out 'why' and realizing 'what's going on?' Then accepting it and dealing with the reality and possible future. Then surviving and enjoying life.'

The composer, James Stephenson, therefore essentially set Anthony's descriptive paragraph to music. The first movement is full of beauty and fun, with a slight undertone of foreboding. This leads directly (without stoppage) into the

second movement, where disbelief, pain and sadness are most prevalent. At one point, the soloist almost literally screams 'why me?' to the audience, as the orchestra reaches its most climactic point. This is followed by offstage musicians

who carry on seemingly with a joyous life, leaving the soloist temporarily feeling almost indescribably alone. The instrumentation for the offstage players, and for other key moments in the work, involves violin, cello and French horn (and brass), all of which have played a significant role in Anthony's

family and musical life.


Again, the second movement passes almost seamlessly onto the third; as we move from sadness and despair to hope and a rebirth of the joy of life. The music struggles constantly between uplifted spirited music and music with a certain darkness. This is musically represented by a battle between G and Eb Major. G Major finally triumphs in the end, and the piccolo trumpet of the soloist awards the listener with the undeniable belief that life is to be lived to the fullest, and that nothing can stop the human spirit.

Anthony's heroic fight has been ongoing as he is in the middle of tandem stem cell transplants in

October as life-saving treatment of his multiple myeloma. In the first transplant, Anthony received his own stem cells and in the second, he will receive stem cells from a matched donor located through the Be

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### The Interview

### Virtuosic local musician marks live album release w/ Story Mansion celebration

Early last year, Bozeman singer/ songwriter and producer Chris Cunningham gathered a few of the area's most talented players to record an episode of MontanaPBS' 11th & Grant, a popular showcase of regional musicians hosted by local institution Eric Funk. The setlist consisted of "folkgrass" renditions of original songs borrowed from Cunningham's career as an independent artist and

member of folk duo Storyhill.

"Chris Cunningham is a truth teller, every song artfully crafted to capture the feeling tone conjured by his lyrics," Funk said. "You can't second guess Chris musically, his subtle use of jazz-inspired harmonies braided with more traditional chord structures but in non-traditional progressions is his hallmark. But, most importantly, Chris' music is honest, unpretentious, sincere, and direct... just like he is as a person." Cunningham's installment of

11th & Grant now finds new life as a Montana-inspired live compilation, available via Bandcamp. Ahead of next month's celebratory performance, the Rolling Zone sat down with Chris to talk the new release, balancing his passions, and "making it" in Bozeman.

**RZ:** You're bringing a performance to the Story Mansion on November 3rd in celebration of your new live album recorded during 11th & Grant. Tell us a little about the thought behind bundling these versions of your songs to create this collection. **CC:** Eric's invitation to do the

episode was just to me, but I said

'yes' on the condition I could bring in a group. One of the guys I asked first was Tom Murphy, who I've played with a lot. He was a good choice for that sort of bluegrass/folkgrass string-band lineup I wanted. It was really easy to come up with folkgrass versions of stuff I had previously released [or] released with Storyhill, and I also had this pile of unreleased stuff to choose from. My thought was to find tunes that seemed like they'd be a good fit for the band, songs that had enough of a variety, and went from there. I wanted these versions to fit the mood, to be upbeat and lighthearted. There wasn't the same kind of studio production, sonic soundscaping going on. I just ignored all that and let them play their instruments and show off their stuff, to do whatever they wanted. And I couldn't really lose. First of all, they're great players, but I thought it'd be interesting [to see] how that studio-produced stuff with cellos and drums would translate

into these folkgrassy versions.

RZ: Along with Tom Murphy, also showcased during this performance were local bluegrass players Mike Parsons and Russell Smith. Obviously their talents were instrumental to the success of this recording, but how would you say their inclusion, then or during any performance, elevates your

CC: Tom adds so much. He just really tunes into the player. He's really versatile, one of those type of players that can be in a rock band or a bluegrass band or go play with the singer/songwriter folk artists. And Mike, he has so many decades of experience that he knows when to play and how little to play. Russell has that same sensibility, too. In my case, I look for people that can add to what I can do but not step on toes. What matters the most is the singing, then everything else is supportive and accenting. It has its time and its place for stepping forward, but the singer/songwriter's worst nightmare is when people start jamming over the top of you. Didn't happen with these guys. I really, really appreciate how tasteful their playing is. These guys, local players, add to whatever you do – and it's so much more fun because you get the interaction and all that extra energy.

**RZ:** Of the previously unreleased songs are "Pillar of Smoke" and "In the End." Are either of these a song you're particularly excited to officially

**CC:** "In the End" is about Alzheimer's, [when] my grandparents went through this 'you're losing your mind, losing your memory, but I love you anyways and I'm going to love you 'til the end and nothing's going to change that.' It's the ultimate love song, really. Say you're living with someone who's going through this initially you may see it as a negative thing, losing your partner, losing your connection with them. But what became clear in my grandparents' case was that my grandmother was accepting of that as best she could. What ramped up was her demonstration of devotion. I know something like that has a meaning for other people, beyond my own experience. I feel like that song's been the most understood and appreciated so far. And then "Pillar of Smoke" is just fun to play [laughs].

**RZ:** You've said the album captures the spirit of the Southwest Montana's Rocky Mountains. As a songwriter and musician here, how much of a role does "locale" play in your artistic identity?

**CC:** The first thing that comes to mind is the [amount] of acoustic players around here, a lot of folks that play traditional bluegrass instruments are available. When I think of this region and the sort of Rocky Mountain sound, it inherently includes banjos. mandolins, acoustic guitars and upright bass - basically things that aren't plugged in. I wasn't trying to invent anything new. And this way I could trust in the players and not have to beg for too much of their time. It's a real natural sound,

and at this stage of the game, I'm just fortunate enough to have them show up when they can | laughs |.

RZ: You've also got a new Storyhill album and tour with Johnny Hermanson on the horizon. That duo is nearing its unofficial 30th anniversary, I believe.

**CC:** It's pretty good stuff. The fact it's been 30 years is mind-blowing. I was just at Peak Recording where Johnny and I did our first tape in 1989. Notice I said tape, a cassette tape. [laughs] But yeah, it's fun. We've been on a break for a few years, a much needed one, to settle down and reprioritize our own lives. I'm also a thousand miles from where Johnny lives in Minnesota, so touring is actually really expensive. We've had our sort of seasons, or as we're calling this album, Stages. Years of heavy touring, releasing albums. We got up to like 15 or 16, and most of them were independent. [This album] is a collection of live captures from those different stages. We've noticed, in our case, it's the live show that matters the most to people. That's what they connect to, and if you dress it up too much, you run the risk of losing that connection. I shouldn't say hands-down, because there's a lot of great studio records we've done, but I'd say the main thread is two guitars, two voices, the harmonies, and the sort of synchronicity we achieve on stage. The album is not as much for us as it is for the audience, those who have been with us for so long. **RZ:** You're the man behind

Basecamp Recording, a studio just on the edge of town. I have to ask - do you have a preference between creating your own music or fostering the talents of others'?

**CC:** They're different hats to wear. I've been running the studio for 15 years, pretty full-on, mixed in with some touring. I

feel pretty comfortable in the

studio, but not necessarily as a

producer, per se. When I think of traditional producers, they're masterminds of the output, but I see myself more as a collaborator. I try to help people put together some arrangements and instrumentation that supports what they do but doesn't, like I said earlier, distract or take away. I don't put a heavy 'producer' stamp on my stuff, unless they ask, but most people are looking for something pretty straightforward. It's an interesting process and I really do enjoy it, but I'm starting to shift into having more time for creating my own stuff again. It kind of goes in its own rhythm. Where my heart is these days is committing myself and my time to writing new stuff, whether it's for Storyhill or on my own. When you have new songs, vou feel like vou have some treasure to give – and it makes you more excited to show up. I've been writing more lately, so we'll see where it leads. But as far as being open for business? Always.

**RZ:** If one of these musicians were to read this and maybe consider utilizing your production talents, what would you tell them you're looking for? What base ingredients are necessary?

**CC:** What I do best is when people have songs they're really excited about, songs that are either finished or don't need a whole lot. You look at a song and it's almost there but needs fine-tuning the chorus or adding the bridge or something. Or we'll look at it and say it needs to be faster and we speed it up. They've [come with] a little bit of pre-production. Instead of like, 'I've got this vision and some music, but I don't have any lyrics.' I can't deal with that [laughs]. What they're ready to do is work with me to develop a list of instrumentation and arrangement, and I'll matchmake players with them. So, I'm usually looking for people who are pretty ready to roll.

**RZ:** From the perspective of a local producer who's also a working musician in the digital age, and because the 11th & Grant album was a crowd-funded effort, do you think it's become easier to attempt a career as an independent musician from more rural areas or a place like this?

**CC:** That's a little variable depending on the person's definition, but in general, no. It's probably harder if you're in a place like this. It's paradoxical because some people achieve success and then they can live anywhere. They can be creative in a cabin in the mountains of Colorado, then go out and tour, sell records and be just fine, financially. But to get there, I don't know how you would do that from here other than by putting vourself out there and maybe [bv] knocking on some virtual doors. Most consumers now get their music from streaming on Spotify and stuff like that, so it seems like

you have less control on how you

get discovered. And discovery is relative. You never know who you're going to make happy with a song, whose day you're going to make a difference for. You have to just go ahead and try, get your music on all digital platforms, and hope a curator of some big playlist is going to hear it. **RZ:** There's a leap of

**CC:** That's how one of my clients, Ira Wolf, was discovered. We'd just done her first EP, Honest, and she sounded so great. I told her she was going to get something out of this. Within three months, she was on a Spotify playlist alongside Ray LaMontagne and Damien Rice, a playlist tailored for the whole Eastern Seaboard morning commute. She was racking up millions of plays. So, it worked out well for her. When I asked her how, she had no idea. Her manager just sent the music to different places. It probably didn't hurt that she had management and lives in Nashville. Then there was the talent, and it was the right sound at the right time. The formula for success - if you want to keep it real, make yourself happy with what you do. I enjoy playing for just about anybody, any size. I guess I'm fortunate that way.

**RZ:** You've got these 11th & Grant and Storyhill live releases coming out and you're shifting into performance mode. What does the next year or so look like for Chris Cunningham?

**CC:** My hope is more of the same. I'd love to keep the studio running and have some new, fun projects. I'm working with Jake Fleming on a rock album for a band from Wyoming, and also an acoustic duo from Helena called Hemispheres. I hope to be putting out new songs. Do something new with Storyhill, but I'm not sure what. Maybe do a little more touring, especially with this album. It could just be me and Tom to keep it simple. If we get opportunities to do festivals, I'd be up for that too.

RZ: Sounds like you'll be keeping busy. Any final thoughts?

**CC:** It's cool Bozeman Folklore is sponsoring our show. Along with Eric's invitation [onto 11th & Grant] and the general interest level, it shows that the music matters to more than just me. That's kind of what keeps me going.



Norris is a destination for food, serving hot meals and fresh salads made with care and organic/sustainable ingredients – many from the garden on-site.

And a destination for drink – the wine and beer options are constantly being upgraded so there's an option for every taste, from LaCroix sparkling waters to Dean's Zesty Booch.

A new cooler is arriving soon, which will allow the fine staff at Norris to offer more on tap local brews beyond the current favorites (Cold Smoke, Salmon Fly Honey, Outlaw's Horse Thief and Lockhorn Cider). Drop your vote in the 'vote for beer ' box the next time you have a soak.

And speaking of soaking, Norris is primarily a destination for rejuvenation or stress reduction – a soak in the "Water of the Gods" brings the inherent goodness of natural minerals to your body.

For many years, Norris has also been a destination to enjoy the finest in local and touring acoustic music. Late October is full of great options on Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights at 7pm.



### Bobcat fans encouraged to participate in 'Pack the Place in Pink' event

Montana State University and Bobcat Athletics are encouraging Bobcat fans to participate in the first annual "Pack the Place in Pink" event at the November 3rd Bobcat football game to promote breast cancer awareness and support breast cancer patients.

To participate, individuals are invited to purchase a limited edition shirt and wear it to the game versus Cal Poly. Three shirt styles are available for purchase: a pink short-sleeve shirt, a navy long-sleeve performance shirt and a navy hoodie. The shirts will retail for \$15, \$20 and \$30.

In addition, local businesses are encouraged to decorate their windows in pink the week leading up to the football game to show support for breast cancer awareness.

For each shirt sold, participating retailers will donate a portion of the sale to Pack the Place in Pink, a Billings-based nonprofit that was founded in 2007 by Vicki Heebner Carle, an MSU alumna who is now a teacher and volleyball coach at Skyview High School in Billings. Carle was a standout basketball player for Montana State in the 1980s and was inducted into the Bobcat Hall of Fame in 1996. At 41, she was diagnosed with breast cancer (which is now in remission). Carle started Pack the Place in Pink in 2007; the organization gained nonprofit status in 2013. Funds the organization raises go directly to breast cancer patients in Montana, Carle said. Pack the Place in Pink also supports breast cancer awareness.

"I'm thrilled to partner with Montana State University and Bobcat Athletics through Pack the Place in Pink," Carle said. "These new shirts will allow Bobcat fans to assist fellow Montanans fighting breast cancer. As a cancer survivor, I'm grateful for the support."



In short order they literally and figuratively flip everything on its head.


This film is made by hockey lovers for hockey lovers. It's a hyperbolic snapshot in time of what life was like in minor league hockey. Today's hockey



### Bobcats Begin Stretch Run for Conference Title - 2018 Bobcat Update

With the bye week behind them, the Montana State **Bobcats** head into the thick of Big Sky Conference play with three important conference games in the month of October that could determine if the 'Cats can stay in the thick of the league race as the calendar turns to November. MSU got things off on the right foot, beginning the month by narrowly escaping the Idaho Vandals, 24-23, in UI's first visit to

Bozeman since leaving the Big Sky in 1995. It was also the Bobcats first victory over the Vandals since that 1995 season. MSU's victory came on a weekend that saw two league-leaders knocked from the ranks

of the unbeaten, putting the Bobcats in a five-way tie for second place in the conference behind UC Davis, who leads

Up next for the 'Cats is a trip to Weber State to face the returning league champion from 2017, but the Wildcats have struggled early in the season, suffering a 41-10 drubbing by the University of Utah, and most recently being upset by Northern Arizona on the road, 28-24, in the Walkup Skydome in Flagstaff.

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Wildcats were able to get winning ways by defeating previously ınbeaten Eastern Washington in a defensive

struggle, 14-6 in Ogden, meaning MSU will be facing a hungry and rejuvenated club fresh off an upset of the No. 3 team in the country when they visit the Wildcats on October twentieth. If facing a stiff road challenge at

Weber State wasn't enough to test the Bobcats' mettle, MSU has the misfortune of making another trip down I-15 one week later to Pocatello to face a surprising Idaho State team. Idaho State came into the season picked to finish 12th in the 13team conference by the league coaches. Yet, six games into the season, ISU is 4-2 overall and 3-1 in league play, sharing second-place honors with MSU and three other teams. Idaho State was a missed 27yard field goal away from being alone atop

the league standings. The Bengals would go on to lose 44-37 in overtime to current league-leader UC Davis, but they have made a major statement that their current record is no fluke. The Bengals were once considered a sure win on most Big Sky Conference teams' schedules, but a trip to Pocatello has now become a treacherous adventure that could ruin any chance of the Bobcats winning the league crown and earning a coveted postseason berth come November.

If the Bobcats can survive the rigors of their October schedule, they'll be rewarded with two winnable games at home versus Cal Poly and Northern Colorado before finishing up the season with a visit to Washington-Grizzly Stadium to take on the rival Grizzlies. The game against the Griz could very well determine if either of the bitter rivals make the FCS playoffs once again. MSU's victory over UM last November ended the reign of former coach Bob Stitt after his club missed the playoffs for the second time in three years.

As has been the case so far this season, the Bobcats' future success will ride on the shoulders of an inconsistent offense, as MSU continues to

search for an identity that begins with the quarterback position. Few fans around the state would debate

whether Troy Andersen is MSU's most

talented player. The more hotly debated topic is whether Andersen is MSU's most talented quarterback. While it is true that Andersen is just one big play away every time he touches the ball, the reality is that his limited ability in the passing game makes Montana State a one-dimensional team, allowing opponents to focus on the run game and forcing MSU to beat them with the pass. Against lesser opponents, such as Portland State, the Bobcats ability to own the line of scrimmage trumps the



opponent's ability to load the box against the run and negate rushing yards. A deeper analysis of the statistics from the PSU game highlights the one-dimensional aspect of MSU's offense. While the

Bobcats did gain 491 yards of offense, 323 of them were in the running game. Of MSU's 25 first downs, 17 came on the ground. And while Andersen did throw for 107 yards and a touchdown, 53 came on one play. That single-minded offensive



play-calling worked against the Bobcats one week later when a more talented Eastern Washington squad dedicated their defensive strategy to stopping MSU's vaunted running game, effectively handcuffing any chance of MSU making a comeback in a 34-17 Eastern victory.

In the Bobcats' loss to Eastern, they rushed for a 155 yards, with 123 coming from Andersen, but they only threw for 205 yards and no touchdowns. It makes it difficult for a team to come back from an early deficit when they are not able to move the ball in large chunks through the air, as was the case against EWU. However, against UI, MSU showed the ability to overcome a 10-point second-half deficit by

> mixing in big pass plays to compliment a successful rushing attack that was once again led by Andersen. Through the

first five games of the season, MSU was averaging just under 370 yards of offense a game, but just 185 through the air with only five touchdown passes. The Bobcats rank 12th in the league in total offense, and 11th in passing

offense, and have gained the second least amount of first downs, while giving up the second most. Additionally, MSU is the 4th most penalized team in the league, but a bright spot has the 'Cats as the most efficient team in the league when it comes to red zone scoring; if the Bobcats can get it inside the 20 chances are they are going to come away with points, but MSU has only had 16 opportunities inside the 20 which is the second

fewest in the conference.

Developing a consistent attack on offense that allows Andersen to mix in big shot plays down the field, while still allowing him the freedom to use his legs when necessary seems to be the recipe for MSU's success heading down the stretch. MSU came into the season with questions aplenty about its defense and their ability

quarterback and create turnovers. The Bobcat defense has made huge strides in both departments, but offensive woes have become the focal point of a Bobcat team that came into the season with such high expectations. If MSU cannot find the answers to its uninspiring offensive performances, Choate will be 3-for-3 in missing the

playoffs in his three years in Bozeman, and the cushy throne he has resided on, in large part due to his successes on the recruiting trail, will begin to get a little more uncomfortable

as the MSU faithful begin clamoring for greater success.





Don't forget to pick up a Motorized Vehicle Use Maps (MVUMs) before heading out. These maps outline designated road and trail systems and are free at any of the Custer Gallatin Forest Ranger District Offices or online at www.fs.usda.gov/main/custergallatin/maps-pubs. In addition, there are a few roads and trail closures that go into effect during the spring and fall seasons so please check the MVUM or with your local Ranger District Office before heading out.
