

Thanksgiving tradition races thru Bozeman in benefit of Food Bank

It's *already* almost 2019 and many of us are not quite sure what to do with ourselves. But before another year can properly wrap up, we have to make it through the busy holiday season unscathed. With so much to love about Thanksgiving – the feasting! the football! the family drama! – it's important to ensure our friends and neighbors have continued access to the sustenance they need. Set for Thursday, November 22nd, the 12th Annual **Huffing For Stuffing** Thanksgiving Day Run comes to the streets of Bozeman in benefit of HRDC's Gallatin Valley Food Bank, directly supporting those members of our community. Thanks to local generosity

and participation, the race raised roughly \$75,000 in 2017. Over the last eleven years, the events have provided over \$437,000 in funding to the Food Bank. Huffing For Stuffing courses include a 10k, 5k and Kids' Run. All start and finish near the Museum of the Rockies. Participants of all abilities are welcome. The morning races kick off with the Kids' Run at 8am. Advance registration is \$28 for the 10k and both 5k (timed/untimed) races. The Kids' Run is free but preregistration is required. Packet pick-up will be offered the day prior to the race, Wednesday, Nov. 21st, at the Gallatin County Fairgrounds, Building 1, from 7am-7pm. Price increases on the day of

the race. Packet pick-up will also be available from 7-9am at the Museum of the Rockies on the day of. Huffing For Stuffing has set a goal of 5,000 participants for its 2018 race – so, let's lace up, hit the pavement and really earn our Thanksgiving dinners! Local organizations aim to improve early literacy w/ program launch

Greater Gallatin United Way and Bozeman Noon Rotary have announced the local launch of **Dolly Parton's Imagination Library** to help improve early

literacy and grade-level reading for children. Upon entering 4th grade, they need the necessary reading skills to learn subject content. Without grade-level reading skills, they fall more and more behind every year.



As expressed by Rob Watson, Bozeman School District Superintendent, too many children are entering kindergarten without the necessary early literacy skills to achieve grade-level reading by the end of 3rd grade, a critical milestone. From pre-K through 3rd grade, children are learning to read.

Greater Gallatin United Way and Bozeman School District knows this can change, but the entire community needs to rally around this issue. Launching Dolly Parton's Imagination Library is just one strategy Greater Gallatin United Way is taking to improve literacy, narrow the achievement gap and ensure all children can succeed in school, work and life.

Dolly Parton's Imagination Library is a book gifting program that mails free, high-quality books to children from birth until they begin school. The first five years of a child's life are vitally important to their development. From zero to three years, 90 percent of a child's brain is developed.

The program is funded entirely by donations. Generous startup funds were donated by local



champions including Mark and Betsy Sullivan, who established a \$15,000 Annual Matching Gift Incentive, Bozeman Noon Rotary, The Dairy Keep Project and Joan and Dean McSweeney.

The kickoff event and initial enrollment will take place on Friday, November 16th from 12-1pm at Bozeman Public Library. The program will initially be available for residents in zip codes 59715 and 59718. Within 5 years, Greater Gallatin United Way aspires to enroll 2,000 children annually in the program. With community support, they hope to grow and expand the program to neighborhood communities in Gallatin, Park, Meagher and Madison Counties.

BAT's Tooth of Crime is a musical riff on fleeting power & fame

Sam Shepard, the great playwright who passed away in 2017, built a career as the voice of the lonely American West. But the haunted landscape in **Tooth of Crime**, the next play presented this season by Bozeman Actors Theatre, opening November 23rd, is like no other he ever created.

This America has gone off the rails long ago. What's left is a poetic cross of the traditional Western film, complete with its high-noon gunfighter showdown, and a nihilistic Sex Pistols concert. Music and violent verse fly like bullets, and no one is left unscathed.

"This really is a unique play in American drama," said Gordon Carpenter, artistic director for Bozeman Actors Theatre and director of the play. "The language and imagery are so different that it's like Shakespeare for audiences – a little challenging at first, but slowly the meaning washes over you and you're hit with the full power of the story."

That story, told over several musical numbers and intense bursts of dialogue, is a thrilling rock-and-roll epic of power and fame, Carpenter said. In a celebrity-obsessed America, an aging rock idol named Hoss, played by Mark Kuntz, and his ragtag entourage struggle desperately to stay on top with challengers at every turn. When an upstart rival known as Crow, played by Tonya Andrews, comes on the scene breaking all the rules, only one can emerge the victor in a duel to the death – a duel where words and music have become the weapons of choice.

"Shepard is really unsparing in his view here that pursuit of fame will haunt you and

ultimately destroy you," said Carpenter, who also directed Shepard's *Fool for Love* for BAT last season.

Shepard wrote the play in 1972 but revised it for a complete reboot that premiered in Greenwich Village in 1996. That version, featuring a score by T Bone Burnett, will be performed live in the BAT production by The Keepers, a rock band under the musical direction of Lee Dickerson. The cast of BAT veterans includes Kuntz (*The Realistic Joneses*), Andrews (*Copenhagen*), Will

Dickerson (*Fool for Love*), Sydney Madill (*Life of Galileo*), and Claire McGinty (*The Realistic Joneses*).

Tooth of Crime is the second play in Bozeman Actors Theatre's 2018-19 season, its 10th, dedicated to its late co-founder Dee Dee Van Zyl, who passed away earlier this year. Shows will be held in the Eagles Lodge Ballroom, located at 316 E. Main, Friday and Saturday evenings, November 23rd through December 8th beginning promptly at 7:30pm.

Tooth of Crime tickets are \$20 for general admission or \$10 for students (with ID) and are available in advance at bozeman-actorstheatre.org/tickets or at the door. All ages welcome, but parental guidance is suggested (profanity, drug use, and stage violence).



Christopher Robin urges you to just chill out and love the Pooh

Somewhere on the other side of the Disney universe from Thanos and his galactic genocide, far from the patricide and limb removal of the *Star Wars* series, lies a quiet little corner called the Hundred Acre Wood. In gentler times, when most of Disney’s output was still G, or PG if they were really getting freaky, the House of Mouse acquired the rights to noted toy bear Winnie the Pooh. It was inevitable, therefore, that we get a new live action update of the property.

The mind reels when it considers what this movie might have turned out to be. Imagine the possibilities: a gritty, R-rated reboot in which Christopher Robin and Owl conspire to have Pooh killed by a psychotic Piglet; or maybe something where Eeyore starts to self-medicate for his depression, and develops a taste for horse... and of course the most obvious thing to do would be to use the first movie to set up an epic trilogy that ends with some sort of giant battle sequence. It could have been awful.

But instead, *Christopher Robin* is for the most part a pastoral, quiet movie that focuses mostly on the relatively low-stakes adventures of a man who works too hard, and the bear who teaches him to chill out. Think “How Christopher Robin Got His


Groove Back” with less steamy sex and more heffalumps.

Christopher Robin, now all grown up after having served in WWII and subsequently gotten married and having a family, works too hard. He puts in so many hours working for a luggage company overseen by his priggish boss (Mark Gatiss) that he hardly sees his family, including his wife (Hayley Atwell) and daughter. He rarely allows himself or his family any fun – the bedtime story he reads “his child is from a textbook on English history.

All the better for him, then, that he gets tangled up with Winnie the Pooh, his erstwhile imaginary friend who turns out to be real. Winnie, with his nonsensical aphorisms about how the best thing to do is nothing, is something like Big Lebowski’s Dude except even more zen, with a less complicated life.

Watch *Christopher Robin* when you feel like watching something pleasant, leisurely paced, and cute. Careful not to overstep its bounds, it’s good, but not too good, because showing off is very un-Pooh.



Additionally, viewers will find a MontanaPBS’ Kids channel (9.2),

MontanaPBS Create (9.3), MontanaPBS World (9.4) and the Montana Public Affairs Network MPAN (9.5).

“We are very pleased with the improved signal coverage across the southwestern Montana,” said Dean Lawler, Director of Technology for MontanaPBS, “our translator on the Continental Divide, just above Butte, reaches a surprising number of communities and I encourage viewers watching with an antenna to rescan for our MontanaPBS channels”.



MSU's Norm Asbjornson Hall receives national recognition as LEED 'Platinum' building

When it opens in December, Montana State University's newest building will get much of its energy from the sun and will use the surrounding earth to assist with its heating and cooling needs, significantly reducing operating costs.

That's the simple explanation of cutting-edge building technologies that helped **Norm Asbjornson Hall** become one of only 10 buildings in Montana certified as LEED Platinum, the U.S. Green Building Council's highest certification.

"We're very proud to provide a building this efficient for the state and for our university system," said Brett Gunnink, dean of MSU's Norm Asbjornson College of Engineering, which will occupy the building along with MSU's Honors College.

According to Dan Stevenson, MSU's associate vice president for university services, Norm Asbjornson Hall will use roughly half the energy per square foot as many other buildings on MSU's campus, despite machine shops, laboratory vent hoods and other equipment with significant energy requirements contained within the building.

"This building is about pushing the envelope of energy-efficient design and integrating that into our students' learning experience," Stevenson said. Built-in data-gathering systems will allow students to analyze the building's energy performance, and parts of the heating and cooling system are prominently displayed and accessible for teaching.

he explained.

The public will be able to tour Norm Asbjornson Hall during its grand opening on Friday, December 14th with a ribbon-cutting kickoff at 10am. Norm Asbjornson Hall is located on the southwest corner of Seventh Avenue and Grant Street.

As a result of design features that contributed to the LEED designation, the building's classrooms, workshops, research labs and offices will also be exceptionally well-ventilated and full of natural daylight, creating an ideal working and learning environment, Stevenson said.

The building marks a major step forward for MSU's use of energy-efficient technologies for heating and cooling campus buildings, Stevenson noted. For instance, the building's south face features multiple solar walls, which consist of a heat-absorbing, perforated surface. Air drawn through the solar walls is warmed and then used for ventilation. The technology, first installed at MSU on a smaller scale on Jabs Hall in 2016, "has proven to be even more effective than we thought it would be," Stevenson said. Solar walls cost only slightly more than a conventional wall surface and quickly pay for themselves with energy savings, he said.

Norm Asbjornson Hall also features a closed-loop geothermal system that circulates water through pipes to a depth of 500 feet below the ground's surface to either help cool or warm the building.

Lights that automatically adjust according to daylight levels and special windows that change tint to reduce glare and unwanted heat

from the sun are among the other features that helped tally 82 points on LEED's 109-point scale. Other achievements that contributed to the LEED Platinum certification included:

- Low-flow indoor fixtures resulting in water use reduction of 41 percent
- Diversion of 96 percent of construction waste from landfill
- Ease in public transportation access
- Stormwater management system that includes vegetated retention ponds and an underground storage facility, reducing use of the city's stormwater system and resulting in increased water quality
- Selection of materials containing recycled content and sourced regionally; wood was sustainably harvested
- Selection of paints, coatings, adhesives, sealants and floor coverings with low or no emission of volatile chemicals

According to building consultant Kath Williams, whose Bozeman firm guided MSU's team through the certification process, the size and complexity of Norm Asbjornson Hall added an extra challenge for earning LEED Platinum - other LEED Platinum buildings in Montana are significantly smaller. "MSU's commitment to doing this was overwhelming," she said.

Construction of the building was funded largely by a \$50 million private gift from Norm Asbjornson, an MSU engineering alumnus and Montana native from the small town of Winifred. Asbjornson, who announced the gift in 2014, is the founder and president of AAO, a

NASDAQ-traded heating, ventilation and air conditioning manufacturer based Tulsa, Oklahoma. AAO equipment is used throughout the building, and Asbjornson was involved in the design of the building. No taxpayer dollars have been used in the construction of the building.

stands for Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design program. MSU's Cooley Laboratory, which opened in 2012 after a renovation, earned LEED Gold certification. A renovated Gaines Hall received LEED Silver in 2011, and Gallatin Hall, a suite-style residence hall, received LEED Gold in 2015. In



Project architects for the building are A&E Architects and ZGF Architects, LLP. Martel Construction is the general contractor. Associated Construction Engineering, Inc. is the engineering consultant, and Kath Williams + Associates is LEED consultant.

Norm Asbjornson Hall is the eighth building on the MSU campus certified as LEED, which

MSU student finds a greater purpose in helping fellow veterans

When **Sean Rogers** came to Montana State University in 2015, he had spent more than 11 years of his life on a ship or at a shore facility maintaining communication with ships operating around the Hawaiian Islands.

For roughly six of those years, stationed at Pearl Harbor, the 2003 graduate of Helena High School had an everyday view of the memorial commemorating the 1,177 crew members who died on the USS Arizona during the Japanese attack that drew America into its deadliest war.

And for much of his time serving in the U.S. Navy, after finding that he had a knack for troubleshooting radar, satellite communications and other electronic naval systems, Rogers had the idea that he would one day go to college to study electrical engineering.

"I knew I wanted more, and I felt like electrical engineering would be a perfect fit," Rogers said. "MSU has provided what I was looking for."

Scheduled to graduate with his bachelor's degree this spring, Rogers has excelled academically. But more than that, he said, he has found "a

greater purpose" helping fellow veterans at MSU.

"It's meaningful work, and I see tangible results," said Rogers, who works part-time at MSU's Veteran Support Center. There, among other things, he assists the roughly 500 MSU students who receive educational benefits from U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs in exchange for their service. He also works as a math tutor.

The calling to help others is something that Joseph Schumacher, director of MSU Veteran Services, recognizes in veteran students he interacts with every day.

"There's a mentality that service and giving back don't stop when you take the uniform off," said Schumacher, who served in the U.S. Army for 11 years. "I think about that a lot with Sean," who separated from the Navy as a first class petty officer - a rank considered the leadership backbone of the Navy, Schumacher noted.

For Rogers, what sparked a visit to Schumacher's office in 2016 was recognizing his own struggles during his first year of college. He grappled with math he hadn't seen in more than a decade and was learning to manage his own schedule rather than follow a regimented routine. "I knew a lot of other people were

having a similar experience with transitioning to civilian life," he said.

Rogers began working the next semester at the Veteran Support Center, which provides a study and social space in addition to helping students access a range of MSU services such as advising and counseling, as well as other community resources. Shortly thereafter, Rogers also began tutoring math, which he is minoring in at MSU.

"He's an excellent tutor,"

Schumacher said of Rogers. "He combines his expertise with empathy and can take a complex subject and break it down. He understands the challenges that some of our students face."

According to Schumacher, Rogers also exemplifies the strengths that veterans gain from their military experience but don't always recognize in themselves: resilience, a strong work ethic and life experience that helps them focus on their studies. Rogers said his time in the Navy also helped him learn how to work with a

diverse group of people.

As he begins to look beyond graduation this spring, Rogers said he's considering graduate school at MSU or a job with the Naval Sea Systems Command, which provides engineering and technical support for the Navy.

For now, when he explains a math concept to a student or helps someone submit their paperwork to get their tuition credit from the VA, "that's enough reward for me," Rogers said.

"By giving of himself, without expectation of anything in return," Schumacher said, "Sean inspires others to give back themselves." •

I remember one Thanksgiving in particular when all of us gathered at their Park City home – they had both begun teaching as second careers. It was quite a houseful with my brother, two sisters, and myself, along with our spouses and children.

Dinner that day consisted of the usual turkey, dressing, potatoes and all the trimmings, as well as mincemeat pie. I never like mincemeat, but that was the best I had ever tasted. And of course, asked for the recipe.

Apparently, a neighbor had given her the neck of a deer. She probably had asked about it and was told it would be thrown away.

"Thrown away? Never!" My Mother would have replied, and thus fell heir to the appendage, along with other scrap meat and bones. She cooked the neck in a large kettle, salvaged the meat, and made mincemeat. Not a smidgen was wasted, we can be sure of that, with the excess frozen or canned.

Here's the recipe she gave me. The amounts and additional comments are in parentheses, which I got with further questioning.

Mincemeat Pie

- Equal parts venison and apples (about 4 cups each, and chop the apples; these apples were windfalls)
- Vinegar to taste (or use the vinegar-sugar mixture from the sweet pickles)
- 1 cup raisins (or currants or

prunes, or whatever you have on hand)

- 1 cup meat broth (or cider)
 - Brown sugar to taste
 - Equal parts pumpkin pie spice (about 1 tsp each)
 - Currant jelly or molasses (whatever is left over in the almost empty jars)
 - Cook until done (simmer about 2 hours to allow the flavors to develop)
 - Make into pies and bake until done (scoop the mincemeat mixture into unbaked pie shells and bake at 400 degrees for about 45 minutes)
- Scrumptious eating to say the least! To this day, I've never been able to make a mincemeat pie as good as I remember that

particular pie.

My daughter called just the other day and wanted my recipe for mincemeat. Someone had given her some wild meat and she felt that she just had to use it! I gave her the recipe from the *Farm Journal's Country Cookbook* as well as Mother's recipe. Perhaps she'll combine the two, use what she has on hand and find her own way with mincemeat. Apples don't fall far from the tree!

Whatever your Thanksgiving Dinner looks like, remember that the leftovers are usually better the next day!

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Montana State Parks seeks comment on several proposals

Montana State Parks is seeking public comment on several proposals, including extension of the **Smith River Biennial Fee Rule, East Gallatin Management Agreement, and Lands Transfer Policy Revisions**. Public comments will be accepted through Friday, November 30th at 5pm.

Each proposal received tentative approval from the Montana Parks & Recreation Board at their October 2018 meeting. Details for each item are provided below. To view full proposals, visit stateparks.mt.gov and click on “Public Comments”. You may also contact the Parks Division of Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks at (406) 444-3750.

A public comment period for each proposal will be open for 30 days. Comments may be submitted online at stateparks.mt.gov and click on “Public Comments” or by email to cfurthmyre@mt.gov. Comments may also be submitted by mail to Montana State Parks Public Comment, Attn: Colecen Furthmyre, PO Box 200701, Helena, MT 59620-0701

Smith River Biennial Fee Rule Extension

Montana State Parks is seeking public input on a proposal to extend the current Smith River Biennial Fee Rule for the next biennium, until December 2020. The Smith River Biennial Rule sets fees, permit requirements and guidelines for private,

commercial, and landowner float trips on the popular Smith River. The only changes to the current rule update the distribution of commercial launch dates to approved outfitters. The current fee rule was approved by the Montana State Parks & Recreation Board in February 2017 and is scheduled to expire in December 2018.

East Gallatin 50-Year Management Agreement

The Division is proposing new 50-year management agreement with the City of Bozeman for management of the East Gallatin State Recreation Area site. The site has been managed and developed by the City of Bozeman and the local Sunrise Rotary Club and is known locally as Glen Lake Rotary Park. Since 1991, a management agreement has been in place with the City with a 5-year automatic renewal clause. The 50-year no-cost management agreement is a continuation of past practice and provides long-term assurance for continued investment to be made at the site under the City’s management.

Lands Transfer Policy Revisions

The Montana Parks & Recreation Board has proposed revisions to the Lands Transfer Policy. In 2015, the Parks & Recreation Board adopted its first Lands Policy to establish criteria and conditions needed for

state park lands projects to be considered. The consideration of new park lands was tied to the Montana State Parks Strategic Plan criteria that state parks must have Significance, Relevance, and Accessibility. The policy was updated in 2017 to add language indicating that “it shall be the policy and intent of the Board not to close any existing state parks or recreational and historic areas.”

A Legislative Performance Audit concluded that the 2017 amendment language conflicted with the criteria in the original policy. The proposed changes address the audit recommendations by eliminating the conflicting language, while

also providing general updates and revisions to the policy for clarity and consistency.

A division of Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks, the mission of Montana State Parks is to “preserve and protect our state’s heritage and the natural beauty of our public lands for the benefit of our families, communities,

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
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Nearly all Yellowstone entrances, roads close – park & visitors prepare for winter

From Yellowstone Public Affairs

Visitors have had their last chance to drive to many iconic locations in **Yellowstone National Park**. The West, South, and East Entrances and all roads, with one exception, closed to vehicle travel on November 5th, so the park can prepare them for the winter season and snowmobile and snowcoach travel, which will begin Saturday, December 15th.

The one exception is the road from the park’s North Entrance at Gardiner, Montana, through Mammoth Hot Springs to the park’s Northeast Entrance and the communities of Cooke City and Silver Gate, Montana. This road is open all year, weather permitting. Travel east of Cooke City (via the Beartooth Highway) is not possible from late fall to late spring.

If you plan to drive to and in the park during the fall and winter, please have flexible travel plans and prepare for changing weather conditions. Temporary travel restrictions or closures can occur at any time without notice. Visit the Park Roads page for the status of Yellowstone

roads. Receive Yellowstone road alerts on your mobile phone, text “82190” to 888-777 (an automatic text reply will confirm receipt and provide instructions).

Extensive information for planning a winter visit in Yellowstone, including information about lodging, camping, services, and activities, is available on the park’s website at www.nps.gov/yell.

All communities near Yellowstone are open year-round, with local businesses offering a wide range of fall and winter recreation opportunities. For information about communities in Montana (Gardiner, West Yellowstone, Cooke City, and Silver Gate), visit visitmt.com. For information about Wyoming communities (Cody and Jackson), visit wyomingtourism.org. And if your travel plans to the park take you through Idaho, visit visitidaho.org.

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
Cole & the Thornes bring *Map Maker* to Bridger Brewing

Charlie Parr, Willie Watson co-headline Rialto show late this month



Celebrated songsmith **Jeffrey Foucault** performs on Thursday, November 15th with indie duo **Dusty Heart** opening at 8:30pm. Tickets to this 21+ show are \$23. Doors at 7:30pm.

In two decades on the road Foucault has become one of the most distinctive voices in American music, refining a sound instantly recognizable for its simplicity and emotional power, a decidedly Midwestern amalgam of blues, country, rock 'n' roll, and folk. He's built a brick-and-mortar international touring career on multiple studio albums, countless miles, and general critical acclaim, being lauded for "Stark, literate songs that are as wide open as the landscape of his native Midwest" (*The New Yorker*), and described as "Quietly brilliant" (*The Irish Times*), while catching the ear of everyone from Van Dyke Parks to Greil Marcus, to Don Henley, who regularly covers Foucault in his live set. Touring in support of his recently released album, *Blood Brothers* is the sixth collection of original songs in a career remarkable for an unrelenting dedication to craft, and independence from trend.

Fans who have been following Charlie Parr through his previous 13 full-length albums and decades of nonstop touring already know that the Duluth-based songwriter has a way of carving a path straight to the gut. In *Dog*, his latest release, Charlie turns from contemplating his inner struggles to examining his connection to other living creatures. The album's title track and the blistering "Another Dog" were inspired by some of the lessons he's learned from his own pet, and wondering about the way dogs interact with humans and the outside world.

"I have a dog, her name is Ruby but I call her Ruben, and we go for these long, crazy, chaotic walks," Charlie says. "Because I decided a long time ago that I get along really well with this dog, and I was taking her for walks, and she wanted to go

this way, and I wanted to go that way. And then I thought, why are we going to go this way and not that way? Maybe I should be the one getting walked. Maybe I'll learn something. So I follow the dog."

Despite the album's darker moments, the listener is left hearing Charlie in a more optimistic and defiant headspace, reflecting on how far he's come – and how content he is to accept that some things are simply unknowable.

For nearly two decades, Willie Watson has made modern folk music rooted in older traditions. He's a folksinger in the classic sense: a singer, storyteller, and traveller, with a catalog of songs that bridge the gap between the past and present. On *Folksinger Vol. 2*, his latest album, he acts as a modern interpreter of older songs, passing along his own version of the music that came long before him.

Southern gospel. Railroad songs. Delta blues. Irish fiddle tunes. Appalachian music. *Folksinger Vol. 2* makes room for it all. The album carries on a rich tradition in folk music: the sharing and swapping of old songs. Long ago, the 11 compositions that appear on *Folksinger Vol. 2* were popularized by artists like Leadbelly, Reverend Gary Davis, Furry Lewis, and Bascom Lamar Lunsford. The songs don't actually belong to those artists, though. They don't belong to anyone. Instead, they're part of the folk canon, passed from generation to generation by singers like Watson.

She's been involved in many recording projects including an album recorded in France entitled *The MJ Williams Paris Project*. Early in her career she performed at the Universal Jazz Coalition in New York City, as well as the Bellevue Jazz Festival near Seattle. In 2013, Williams wrote a score for Mary Ellen Strom's two channel video installation at the Longhouse Projects Gallery in New York. Band of Southerners bring night of 'artisanal' rock n' roll to Bozeman's Filler

Somewhere on a dusty road or a well-traveled interstate, right at this very moment, a rock n' roll band is pounding the rock. They're probably wearing the same clothes they had on yesterday and reminiscing about last night's gig. Inspired by a guitar lick that cuts to the bone or a melody that lingers on refrain, this band is following a path forged by countless other musicians who've lived and died in dive bars or 'made it' with their posters taped to bedroom walls. What makes this band of brothers any different? This band is **The Artisanals**.

With sonic influences ranging from the dream-pop work of George Harrison ("Angel 42") and heartland rock of Tom Petty ("Grow With You"), to the stone-cold radio hits of bands like the Killers ("Roll With It") and Ryan Adams ("First Time"), The Artisanals' newly released self-titled LP showcases the group's knack for writing hooks as well as their ear for quality production. The album utilizes everything from a gong, organ, piano, sitar, French horn, trombone, and koto, to a string section sourced from the University of Iowa. Produced by Wolfgang Zimmerman and mastered by Howie Weinberg (Spoon, Ryan Adams, Nirvana), there's no filler on *The Artisanals*. From start to finish, the record is a straight banger.

In anticipation of their Bozeman show, the Rolling Zone hopped on the phone with singer/songwriter and Artisanals frontman **Johnny Delaware** to talk the band's eponymous debut and 'following the feeling' during the creative process.

RZ: Hey Johnny. Looks like I'm catching you in California, just north of one of the fires. Yikes.

JD: We've been swallowed in the smoke. We were in San Fran the last couple days and it was so smoky. We've been driving outside the city for the last couple hours and we're still in it. It's just everywhere.

RZ: It's nuts. How's the road treating you fellas so far on the tour?

JD: It's been amazing, it's been great. Can't ask for more, man. We've been playing to a lot of people that we've met already, fans that we've played for that keep coming back. The numbers keep growing at the clubs and promoters keep asking us to come back. When you're a new band, that's about all you can ask for.

RZ: You'll be in Bozeman on November 17th for a show at the Filling Station, joining local acts The Salamanders and Mad Pattern. What can concert-goers expect from your portion of the evening?

JD: Just really classic songwriting with a high-energy rock

fifth or sixth. We're not having to write through our juvenile tendencies to find our answers. I feel like we've already got to that point. We're a mature-sounding group and, you know, I've delved into psychedelics the last five years and that kind of reinvented the way

worthy of release? What's a *good* song at base?

JD: If it's something we can play live really well. Sometimes you'll write five or six songs, try to play them live, and only two or three are actually served well enough. Generally, by the time I'm

I'm not claiming to be a good songwriter, but that's what good songwriters do. They make you see that kind of stuff, the imagery, like any good writer. You gotta see it. Like Ryan Adams' "La Cienega Just Smiled" or something, you know. What a great song because of the imagery it gives. Townes Van Zandt did that so well. And that's what I love about Neil Young's rock, too, it makes you feel like you're in the Southwest, it's so desert rock.

RZ: So if I had to guess, I'd say you chose the Artisanals as the band's moniker because of its hand-crafted approach to making music. Am I on the right track or totally off-base?

JD: You looked at it in the right way, for sure. [Laughs] We have this band name to be funny. We're called the Artisanals because we thought it was hilarious how everything is artisanal now. Anything can be – pickles, bread, whatever. We're just

kind of picking fun at that. It's not to actually claim ourselves as artisans.

RZ: You guys are still riding the high of this release and have a pretty crazy calendar into next month, but what's next for the Artisanals? What can we expect from you in 2019 and beyond?

JD: Getting ready for another release, really. We'll be in the studio in January and February, then hopefully tour abroad. We're going to be back to play South by Southwest. This is all tentative, you know, but these are the plans. Touring a bunch and kicking ass.

RZ: That's an exciting outlook.

JD: Yeah, it is. We're excited about this new album. I think people are going to dig it.

RZ: Very cool. Well, we can't wait for the Filler show.

JD: We're really excited to be a part of Bozeman, for one night, to put on a hell of a show for you guys and have some fun.

n' roll show. And when we say rock n' roll, we don't mean AC/DC or some corporate rock that seems to be popular on Spotify. We're very class, late '60s, '70s type of rock n' roll, West Coast Americana. We're big fans of good songwriting but also putting on a hell of a show for people to give 'em their money's worth.

RZ: *Glide* has referred to the band as kaleidoscopic. So, for those who are just beginning to familiarize with The Artisanals, who is this band and how are its members' personalities reflected through the music?

JD: Me and Clay [Houle] started the band, he's the lead guitarist. We were in several different projects before we started this, but now that we've been doing it for well over ten years, I feel like we're kind of veterans even though we're in a new band. Even though this is our first album, a lot of people have said it feels like our

I see what I do while I'm alive. I met Clay like four years ago and [he] was born to rock. All he wants to do is ride in a van and play his guitar, and that reflects while he plays. We've got this guy from Alabama playing the drums, Nick [Recio] who's very class with the way he plays. Our bass player Eric [Mixon], he's got a classic look to him and he serves the songs really well. And then our keyboardist, Ian [Klin], he's from Atlanta. We're all just scattered seeds across the South.

RZ: You're touring in support of the recently released full-length debut, *The Artisanals*. The album utilizes a smorgasbord of instrumentals over its 10 tracks and draws influence from a pretty wide range. When you guys decided to craft your official debut, what were your primary motivations?

JD: When we're crafting songs, I'm a big fan of letting them go in the direction they want to. When you're in the studio tracking, you just go off of a feeling. That's all art and music is. As an artist, you have a responsibility to be a conduit for something. When you think too much, I don't think you're actually doing your duty. It feels like it comes from a whole 'nother plane of existence or dimension you can't see. Inspiration – what is it? That's what's so cool about being an artist. Don't think so much and just follow the feeling. Let the songs speak for themselves.

RZ: Sounds like some pretty solid advice.

JD: And I can't stand when you're in the studio and people start comparing your stuff to other artists. That's a huge buzz kill. If it feels good, it feels good. Don't compare it to other things that are happening. All art is borrowed from other people's work. You have to do it respectively, though. You can't just completely steal or hijack somebody else's art and replicate it. But that's a conversation for another time.

RZ: You and Clay, I believe, are responsible for the majority of the band's songwriting. How do you decide you've got a song

done writing the song and I show it to Clay or we get to play it live, it usually means it's going to be on something eventually. For the first album we had eleven or twelve songs we wanted to initially record and they didn't all make it. For this next album, we have a shit ton. It's hard if you want to do a concept album, or if we're going to choose *this* title for an album, [to pick] what songs will fit. Then we're kind of pigeonholing ourselves. There's all these different things – it's like a puzzle. And that's the beautiful thing about albums, too. Certain songs do need to fit, but at the same time they don't. There's no rule. If it feels good, if it's a good song, if it makes you feel something and you think it will resonate with other people, put it out.

RZ: Is there a particular favorite from this album you'd care to share the story behind?

JD: They all have a little story to them. I always enjoy "Grow with You," "Angel 42." It just depends on what people would find interesting. I enjoy "First Time," all of that's really true. It's about this person who I had this romantic week with, then didn't get to see again for a long time. She was very influential in the way I wrote. I cared about her a lot even though I didn't really know her that well. I think it's cool when people can do that to us. When you feel like you know someone, but you've only known them for maybe even a couple of days. It's a unique thing. Is it a past life thing, or is it this energetic thing? We're all *energy*, so maybe it's just that. Geographic locations, people, movies – anything can turn you on to write and make your pen electric. That's what that woman did for me and I think that's beautiful.

RZ: Seems crazy to think what's really impactful enough to write a bunch of songs about.

JD: If you can write and have the lyrical content match the landscape and feel of the sonics of the song, I think that's amazing. I love when songs do that. I wrote the song "Country Roads Town" for my mother. I grew up in South Dakota [and] as soon as the song starts, you can feel and see the



Get your passes – Big Sky’s ski season starts Thanksgiving Day

Here’s something to be thankful for – ski season begins at Big Sky Resort on Turkey Day! Get your mittens on one of two discounted ski passes, on sale through November 30th.

The **Bronze Season Pass** is direct-to-lift, Monday through Thursday, with bonus access every day from Nov. 22nd through Dec. 20th and April 8th–21st (black-out dates: Dec. 22nd to Jan. 1st and Feb. 15th–24th). Bronze passholders also receive \$20 off regular season window rate on non direct-

It’s the Brawl of the Wild 2018

It’s back. No, not Bobby Hauck. The **Brawl of the Wild**, the game MSU has owned the past two seasons, returns for the 2018 version on November 17th in Missoula, and this one should have an extra level of intensity.

Yes, ‘He Who Shall Remain Nameless’ is back to roam the sidelines for the maroon and silver, but there is plenty more at stake than just beating our arch nemesis. Namely, Montana State has the opportunity, albeit a small one, to earn an ‘At-large’ bid to the FCS playoffs with a 7-4 record should they get the win over the Grizzlies, but the ‘Cats would also finish with their best record in the Choate era. It would also be MSU’s first three-game winning streak in the series

since the ‘Cats won three in a row in 1983-85.

As if the Bobcats need any more reason to beat the Grizzlies, the return of the Grizzlies’ former coach certainly has upped the desire thanks to his domination of the Bobcats during his previous tenure. In his first stop in Missoula, Hauck went 5-2 against the ‘Cats, losing two out of his first three games in the rivalry, but he hasn’t lost to MSU since. The Bobcats would like nothing more than to change that when the rivalry gets renewed this weekend.

MSU enters the 2018 brawl on a high note having won its previous two conference games, most recently a 35-7 defeat of Northern Colorado, and the offense has been more productive since the promotion of Matt Miller to offensive coordinator

prior to the Idaho State game.

But the biggest difference in MSU has been its defense’s ability to create turnovers. Over the course of the past four games MSU has caused 10 turnovers after only forcing five in its first six games. That ability to force turnovers has provided excellent field position for an offense that has had a difficult time sustaining long scoring drives. If MSU is to win its third straight versus Montana, they will need to continue that trend while taking care of the ball themselves. The last time the Bobcats lost in Washington-



Grizzly Stadium, the Griz forced seven turnovers in a 34-7 rout.

Both Montana State and Montana like to employ a punishing rushing attack, so the team that is able to dominate the line of scrimmage most likely will dominate this game. The past two seasons that team has been Montana State. Montana’s offensive line has struggled to control the line of scrimmage this season, so the

advantage appears to be with the ‘Cats yet again.

But as the old adage says, you can throw the records out when these two teams play.




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Bobcat School Day sets record

As busload after busload of students began arriving for Montana State's 2nd annual **Bobcat School Day** on November 6th, you could tell the crowd was going to be electric.

Over 6,000 school kids from around the state in grades Kindergarten through 8th were treated to a day of activities, teacher dance-offs, and a great showing by the Lady 'Cats, and they helped MSU host its first-ever sold out game in program history during a 64-48 victory over Carroll College of Helena.

"It was a fantastic atmosphere," said MSU 14th-year head coach Tricia Binford "It was super loud and noisy and a lot of fun to compete in."

The experience provided a good early-season test for the Bobcats, not only because of the crowd noise, but also because of the opponent. Carroll College is ranked in the Top 25 in the NAIA national polls and are the defending league champions of the Frontier Conference. The Saints provided MSU with many challenges, but none quite as difficult as the crowd noise created by thousands of screaming school-aged children.

"The biggest thing is communication," said Binford. "We've got to be able to execute

what we want to execute, I thought we let some factors dictate us today. The defense was pretty solid for the most part with communication. On the offensive end, we had way too many turnovers in the first half, we need to clean those up."

"When everyone starts screaming and you can't hear anything, that's what makes it so much fun," said Claire Lundberg, a Seton Hall transfer who scored 25 points in her Bobcat debut. "This day is just something special."

While MSU was happy to host their second Bobcat School Day, they were equally happy to pick up a quality win versus a tough opponent to kick off the 2018-19 season. Things will get decidedly more difficult as MSU hits the road for its next four games as participants in the WNIT. The Lady 'Cats lost their opening-round WNIT matchup with Marquette on November 9th, losing 100-52. They'll next travel to San Marcos, Texas to face Delaware on November 16th. MSU's next home game does not come until November 30th when they play host to Long Beach State.

Bozeman closes out fall sports season

For Bozeman's final two remaining Fall sports teams, the end has finally come. In what began with summer two-a-days in the grueling August heat, the end was probably more painful thanks in part to a runner-up finish in the State AA volleyball tournament, and a semifinal upset in the last game at Van Winkle Stadium.

Hawk Volleyball

The season-ending loss for Bozeman's volleyball team was bittersweet. Certainly, the Lady Hawks were disappointed to come up one victory short of a state title, but there was a great sense of accomplishment for having made it to the final match of the 2018 season. Bozeman was playing in its first state title game since winning it all in 2015, and it was an accomplishment in itself just to be there.

The Lady Hawks fell into the consolation bracket after losing a hard-fought five set thriller on the opening night versus a heavily favored Helena Capital squad.

Bozeman was the only team to win a Bruin on Capital all weekend, as the Bruins swept their opening round and semifinal matches. However, the loss meant the Hawks had to win two matches on Day 2 of the tournament, followed by a consolation final on championship Saturday just to earn a rematch with the Bruins.

The Hawks were game, defeating Missoula Hellgate and Kalispell-Flathead in four sets before sweeping past Billings West in three to set up the rematch. In the final, Bozeman appeared ready to shock the state as they rushed out to a 1-0 leading after winning the first set, but Helena Capital's firepower proved to be too strong, and the Bruins won in convincing fashion, 3 sets to 1.

"The journey was fun," senior outside hitter Mara Lynch said.

Hawk Football

The end for Bozeman's football team was more of a shock.

Head coach Levi Wesche's crew had run roughshod over the AA competition all season, averaging well over 30 points a game, and

rarely being tested by its opponents.

But that all changed in the State AA football playoffs when the Hawks ran into a game Kalispell-Flathead team. The Braves employed a ball-control offense that responded to an early 10-0 hole to take a 14-10 halftime lead, and they responded again in the fourth quarter after falling behind 17-14 by scoring the game's final touchdown late in the fourth quarter to secure their first trip to the state title game since the early 2000s.

For Bozeman, miscues and mistakes derailed a once promising season and left the Hawks thinking what-if. Bozeman was looking to return to the state title game for the first time since last winning it all in 2015.

Not only is the loss the end of the season for Bozeman, it's also the end of an era, as the semifinal loss to Flathead was the final game to be played in Bozeman's Van Winkle Stadium. The Hawks will move across Ruth Thibault Way and into their new stadium in 2019.

The Globetrotters trampoline-dunk team, the Flying Globies, also established a new title for most basketball under the leg slam dunks by a team using a trampoline in one minute with 28.

This marks the fifth straight year the Globetrotters have taken part in Guinness World Records Day, which was launched in 2004, and last year saw more than 600,000 people around the world attempting to secure their place in the Guinness World Records Book.

"It was exciting to have several new records set by the Harlem Globetrotters, and to see first-hand their enthusiasm and dedication to achieving incredible feats," said Guinness World Records Adjudicator, Hannah Ortman. "This experience was especially

monumental since Torch George became the first female Harlem Globetrotter to set a Guinness World Record!"

Bridger Bowl **2018-19 season passes** are on sale now. Skiers and snowboarders can enjoy unlimited slopeside recreation all winter long with the purchase of a season pass.

Here's a look at some rates for the most popular passes: \$840 for adults (ages 25-69), \$790 for young adults (19-24), \$505 for juniors (13-18), and \$245 for children (7-12). Adult Midweek Season Passes (18-69) are also available for \$499. This will grant access to unlimited skiing Monday through Friday all season, with \$43 weekend tickets.
