Indiana Jones and The Last Crusade returns to the silver screen on Saturday, March 16th at 7:30pm. Following Thursday, March 28th is the **Galla-Bash: A Fundraiser for KGVM**. The Gallatin Valley's new community, entirely listener-supported radio station (95.9) presents this "variety show," intended to showcase some of the broad assortment of programming, with a focus on local content, that the station makes available. A silent auction will kick off the evening in the ballroom at 6pm, followed by a unique slate of performances at 7pm.

Entertainment will include local musicians Larry Kiff (who performs his classic country show on the station once a month), folk singer/songwriter Chris Cunningham, and country rock band Peter King and the Dead Yellers. There will also be a reading by author Al Kesselheim, a fascinating presentation on neuro-biology by Professor Emeritus John Miller, acrobatics by aerial performer Michael O'Reilly, humor by a group of local comedians, and Latin music with DJ Big Lou (who has a weekly show on KGVM called 'Big Lou's Latin Experience'), spinning tunes for a salsa dance demo. Penultimate Brews, Extreme History of the Apsáalooke at MOR

A destination for the Gallatin Valley's curious minds, the Museum of the Rockies is never in short supply of public events to accompany its many exhibits. Here's a look at some upcoming happenings at your neighborhood museum.

Museum of the Rockies' popular series Brews & the Big Sky: Montana Made, Montana Brewed continues with Silver City to the Copper Kingdom featuring Muddy Creek Brewery and Pizza Campania on Tuesday, March 26th from 5:30-7:30pm. There is a \$12 admission including beer tasting, gallery talks, exhibits, and light appetizers for those 21 and older.

The story of Butte, Montana is a classic tale of booms and busts, flourishing immigrant communities, and tragic disasters. This tough and determined community, created by determined prospectors and wily Copper kings, perseveres under the shadow of the headframes and smelters that powered the technological revolution in the United States.

All good things must come to

an end. The Brews season will close with Crow Fair featuring Thirsty Street Brewing Co. and the Mint Cafe on April 30th.

MOR has supported the Extreme History Project Lecture Series since 2012 with the goal to encourage public understanding of the way our history has shaped our present. Speakers take a fresh look at interesting historical topics.

"Exploring the Apsáalooke People & Stories of Crow Fair -The Tipi Capital of the World" with Shane Doyle and John Zumpano is next up on Thursday, March 28th at 6pm. The lecture will be held in Hager Auditorium and is open to the public.

For over a hundred years the Apsáalooke people have celebrated Crow Fair at Crow Agency, Montana. Originally started by a government agent as an agricultural fair, it slowly was transformed by the tribe into something more to their

liking; a giant, week-long reunion of friends, family and visitors. Milelong daily horseback parades, day



and night dancing contests, thrilling rodeos, Native veteran color guards, rousing drum groups, a vast tipi camp and a cornucopia of tribal regalia present a fascinating immersion in the lifestyle and traditions of Crow people. The presentation will explore this celebration of Northern Plains

Children's Museum announces new name as Montana Science Center

On March 14th, 2019, the Children's Museum of Bozeman became the Montana Science Center and released their new logo. This name change comes as the next phase to develop a center where families in the community come together to learn and play in science and technology.

Since 2001, the Montana Science Center, then as the Children's Museum of Bozeman, has brought hands-on play, learning and collaboration to the greater Bozeman community. In 2016, the Museum opened the STEAMlab, founded by Richard Harjes, which is a high-tech maker space focusing in self-directed high tech learning in coding, robotics, 3D design, mechanical engineering and more. Growth in STEAMlab programs has elevated the ways families interact with the Science Center and drove the Children's Museum to create more elaborate and extensive exhibits focused in technology

and science.

The Montana Science Center will continue to offer unique experiences for full family engagement in play, with an increased focus in areas of science, technology, engineering and a more distinct focus on local women in STEM careers.

Since 2016, the Science Center has focused on revitalizing the current exhibits to represent areas of STEM. These areas of activity focus in topics such as insects, physics, electricity, building, makeractivities and more. Imaginative play still forms a critical role throughout the Science Center as a way to incorporate activities for the youngest visitors.

Additionally, programming has been added to provide learning opportunities for students of all ages, visiting from throughout Southwest Montana. In order to provide access to all families in our community, the Montana Science Center partners

with several other service organizations such as Thrive, Youth Dynamics and AWARE to provide free or reduced admission. The Museums for All program allows anyone with an EBT card and ID to gain a reduced admission as well.

The Montana Science Center welcomed several community members to the Center on March 14th, to celebrate Pi Day, and to release the new brand identity, completed by Prime, Inc. As Executive Director, Abby Turner, stated, "We have seen a significant increase in the focus in STEM activities in our community and schools over the past several years, and we have found a desire from our community of visitors to elevate our exhibits and programs. Therefore, we are very excited to bring even more family collaboration in science and technology to our community." The staff at the Science Center have worked to expand their programs and offerings in order to meet the

community's growth.

In addition to the name change, the Science Center is actively

finalized, but a move will happen within the year. The current location is open Monday through Saturday



looking for a new location. With this new location, they expect to add significant space to their exhibits, classrooms and STEAMlab in order to meet the growing demand for activities in STEM. The location of this new space has not been

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Movie Lovers

The Clovehitch Killer is an unexpectedly clever horror film debut

The Clovehitch Killer could have been a sort of dumb comedy, and its tale of a 16 year old boy

who begins to suspect that his father (the local Boy Scout troupe leader) is an infamous serial killer could have been exploited for cheap, if blackhumored. laughs. But

The Clovehitch
Killer is a
different kind of slow-burn
horror film, one that entirely
favors plot and characterdevelopment over gruesome
murders, and which marks a very
auspicious debut for first-time
feature director Duncan Skiles.

Charlie Plummer (The Rider and All the Money in the World) is Tyler Burnside, a good kid who's concerned about his advancement in the Boy Scouts and whose worst trait is that he sneaks out to meet a girl from church. "Borrowing" his dad's truck, he takes her to a parking lot, where he's too shy to make the first move, beginning a chaste tryst that ends with the discovery of something in his Dad's truck, something that doesn't much impress the kids at church and which earns him a reputation for being a "perv.'

But it's not his truck, is it? It's his dad's, played by Dylan McDermott, and the nature of the found object is such that Tyler doesn't feel comfortable asking his father about it. And then, small clues begin to pile up — what does Tyler's dad do in his garden shed where, as his mother says, his dad

"has his own hobbies?" Could it be that his father is connected in some way to the Clovehitch killer, the serial killer who terrorized his

small town 10 years before? And what does the troubled local girl who is obsessed with the serial killer know?

While that might sound like a pretty familiar setup for a horror film (and I guess it is – see Bob Balaban's Parents for a

more outright comedic take on the premise), what makes The Clovehitch Killer so well is an admirable sense of restraint. Though its subject matter is disturbing, the film doesn't throw hardly any blood at you, favoring instead a slow-burn approach that emphasizes small textural details, like the lived-in feel of the film's locations, and the clever double meanings behind the increasingly cat-and-mouse dialogue between Tyler and his dad. The film even pulls the neat trick of fracturing its narrative at one point, following the father first and then the son in a sequence which is genuinely thrilling, not the least for being honest-to-god clever.

You should see this movie even if you're not a devotee of horror. The Clovehitch Killer is a thriller worth enjoying for its strong performances and clever approach to what could have been overly familiar material. Scout's honor.





Astronaut Scott Kelly discusses year in space, our journey to Mars at Brick

Capt. Scott Kelly, a history-making U.S. astronaut who spent a year in space, will speak at 7:30pm on Thursday, April 4th at Brick Breeden Fieldhouse.

Kelly, who is also a bestselling

author, is expected to discuss his space travel experiences, share lessons on leadership, reflect on his commitment to discovery and tell stories of perseverance.

Kelly's achievements during his two-decade career earned him the coveted position as America's first year-round astronaut. On his mission that began in March 2015 and ended in March 2016, Kelly and Russian cosmonaut Mikhail Kornienko conducted experiments, reconfigured station modules and captivated millions with live interviews and never-seen-before photos from the International Space Station.

The historic mission also included NASA's groundbreaking Twins Study, in which Kelly's identical twin brother, retired NASA astronaut Capt. Mark Kelly, served on the ground as the control in an experiment to understand how space affects the human body. Mark Kelly retired in 2016.

Kelly's New York Times bestselling memoir, "Endurance: My Year in Space and Our Journey to Mars," was published in 2017 and has been optioned as a Hollywood film by Sony Pictures. "Infinite Wonder," a book of photographs that Kelly took from space, will be published in October.

Tickets to the MSU lecture are \$10 for students and \$20 for members of the public. There will also be \$50 VIP seats, which will be located on the first three rows of the floor. 



2019 American Indian Council Powwow returns to MSU

The 44th annual American Indian Council Powwow at Montana State

University will be held March 29th-30th at the Brick Breeden Fieldhouse. The powwow is free and open to all. This year's powwow will be will be dedicated to missing and murdered indigenous women and girls.

"Our indigenous students at MSU care deeply about this issue, and we want to feel safe in our communities, and we want our children to grow up not having to look over their shoulders," said Allison Longtimesleeping Reyos, an MSU student who is co-president of the MSU American Indian Council. "This MMIWG (murdered and missing indigenous women and girls) powwow dedication is also a way to remember and honor those who have passed on or who are still missing. They need to know we care."

The MSU American Indian Council Powwow is one of the largest in Montana. The powwow weekend events will begin this year at 3pm Friday, March 29th, with a ground blessing ceremony for the planned MSU American Indian Hall to be held at the building's planned location, south of Hannon Hall. The powwow will begin at 6pm Friday, with a grand entry. There will also be grand entries at noon and 6pm Saturday, March 31st. Dance and drum competitions with cash prizes are offered.

The host drum group will be The Boyz of St. Paul, Minnesota. The head woman dancer is Wozek Chandler (A'aniinen White Clay of Fort Belknap). Head man dancer is Kasey Nicholson (Aaahniinin and Pikuni Nation from

Fort Belknap Indian Community). The masters of ceremonies will be Kenneth Helgeson (Nakoda, from Lodge Pole) and Don

Racine (Aaniiih, White Clay from Hays). The arena directors are Francis Sherwood, a member of the Arikara, Hidatsa and Navajo tribes, of Denver, and Kyle Felsman (Confederated Salish and Kootenai Tribe of Arlee). The head dance judge is Ron

Lodgepole (Chippewa, of Gilbert, Arizona). Head singing judge is Zach Felsman (Confederated Salish and Kootenai Tribe of

Arlee). Tiny Tots dancers, up to 5 years of age, will be given an opportunity to dance and will receive small prizes during each of the three powwow sessions.

Booths located in the Brick Breeden Fieldhouse will offer a variety of artisan work for sale, and nonprofit and government organizations also will share information. Concessions will be available for purchase.

Indigenous food, including bison sliders, bison stew served in a squash bowl, an elk chili and fry bread with wojape (traditional berry sauce), among other items, will be available for purchase from the Fork in the Road food service that will be served in the south side upper

concessions of the Brick Breeden Fieldhouse.

Powwow organizers are seeking volunteers from the MSU and greater community to help with the event. Volunteers may volunteer at the south entrance of the fieldhouse during the powwow. Also, the American Indian

Council has organized a silent auction with proceeds going to help fund the powwow.

The American Indian Council Powwow Fun Run, with 5K, mile and walking categories, will be held March 30th, beginning at the Brick Breeden Fieldhouse parking lot. Registration begins at 8am the day of the race with the race starting at 9am. The walk category will begin at 9:05am. There is a \$20 registration fee, which includes a race T-shirt.



Gallatin Range deserves protection as wilderness

As a former Gallatin National Forest employee, and a skier, hunter, and climber, I've spent decades exploring the wildlands of the Gallatin Range.

The Gallatins contain the last major roadless area in the northern Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem and priceless wildlands. For decades, conservationists have advocated for wilderness designation for the range under the 1964 Wilderness Act. We achieved partial protection with the 1977 designation of the 155,000acre Hyalite Porcupine Buffalo Horn Wilderness Study Area.

We came close to achieving wilderness status for the Gallatins in 1983 when much of the roadless terrain was part of the proposal for a Lee Metcalf Wilderness.

However, private checkerboard ownership within led to the elimination of the Gallatin Range from the final boundaries of the Lee Metcalf Wilderness.

Since 1983, land trades and purchases have removed the checkerboard ownership. Today, we have an opportunity to finally fully protect the Gallatin Range by designating the bulk of its 250,000 acres of the roadless country as wilderness under the 1964 Wilderness Act.

Numerous scientific studies have documented the extraordinary wildlife and ecological values of the



Gallatin Range. The greatest threat to the ongoing ecological integrity comes from increasing recreational usage from mechanical machines, particularly mountain biking.

Wilderness designation, particularly in the Buffalo Horn-Porcupine drainages, will safeguard the extraordinary wildlife values of

these lower elevation valleys. Wilderness designation in the northern portion of the Gallatin Range, including the West Pine, South Cottonwood, and parts of the Hyalite drainage will preserve wildlife corridors and ecological integrity of the whole range.

With the planned release of the

Custer Gallatin National Forest Management Plan, citizens will have a chance to support the Montanans for Gallatin Range Wilderness proposal, which advocates wilderness designation for the bulk of the 250,000 roadless acres of the range. We may not have another opportunity.

Author Henry Hughes presents playful, scholarly evening 'The Sensual Fish'



Proper designation will protect wildlands

The Gallatin Forest Partnership (GFP) proposal for the **Gallatin** Range promoted in a Feb. 9 letter by recreation advocacy groups like the Greater Yellowstone Coalition falls short in providing the best protection for the range.

Wilderness designation is the "gold standard" for land protection, yet the bulk of the Gallatin Range, including portions of the Hyalite-Porcupine-Buffalo Horn Wilderness Study Area would receive lesser protections under the GFP proposal.

The GFP "rocks and ice" proposal for 102,000 acres of designated wilderness in the Gallatin Range leaves some of the best lower elevation terrain such as the Buffalo Horn and Porcupine drainages (BHP) out of wilderness designation. The BHP area is only one of many parts of the Gallatin Range's

250,000 or so roadless acres that should be promoted for wilderness designation under the Wilderness Act.

Although the authors of GFP commentary suggest they used the "best science" to formulate their proposal, it is not clear they used ecological research to create their proposal. Independent ecological studies by Dr. Lance Craighead and biologist Steve Gehman document the superlative wildlife habitat of the BHP area and Gallatin Range as a whole.

A recent paper, "Trends in vital signs for Greater Yellowstone: application of a Wildland Health Index," by MSU ecologists Andrew Hansen and Linda Philips concluded that six out of nine vital signs were stable or even improving in wilderness areas and national parks, demonstrating that wilderness designation provides exceptional protection for ecological integrity.

We need to put wildlife and wildlands value as the top priority for the Gallatin Range, and protecting all or most of the 250,000 acres of roadless lands that could qualify as designated wilderness is by far the best way to achieve those goals. •

The shot heard 'round Montana

The fourth time is the charm.
At least in the case of the
Bozeman Hawk boys'
basketball team it is.

After making their fourth consecutive appearance in the Class AA state championship title game, the Bozeman Hawks took home the title for the first time since 2011, defeating Missoula Hellgate 55-53 in overtime. And they did it in improbable fashion thanks to the heroics of an improbable player.

Brett Clark, a season-long role player for Wes Holmquist's squad, dropped in a team-high 18 points, including the final two with under two seconds to play to secure one of the biggest upsets in the Class AA final in some years.

Clark's final basket was set up by good fortune and preparation. Hellgate made 1 of 2 free throws to knot the score at 53, and a jump ball on the missed second attempt gave Bozeman possession 84 feet away from their own basket with just 4.1 seconds remaining. Senior Ryan Simpson inbounded the ball, attempting to hit teammate Carter Ash around midcourt with the hopes that the junior could make a play. And make a play he did.

Three Missoula Hellgate defenders were able to get their hand on Simpson's long pass, but none of them were able to corral it. Instead, the crafty Ash emerged with the ball and immediately made a

drive to the basket where he found Clark alone under the hoop. Ash dished to Clark, who promptly banked in a soft layup just before the buzzer sending the Butte Civic Center faithful into a frenzy as the Hawk bench spilled onto the floor in celebration.

With the win, Bozeman avoided being the first team in any classification to lose four consecutive state championship games. (Billings Central also was making their fourth consecutive appearance in the Class A title game after losing the previous three. They won this year's title as well.) It was just the second time ever that the Class AA state title game had been decided

in overtime.

Not only did Bozeman win in impressive fashion, they did it against improbable odds. Missoula Hellgate was undefeated versus Montana teams this year, and were the overwhelming favorites to take home their

first championship since 2013. "It's tough to go in the locker room after you lose that one,"

Big Sky returns to Boise

Following a three-year trial run in Reno, NV, the home of former Big Sky Conference member Nevada-Reno, the Big Sky Conference men's and women's league championship is shifting to another former member's hometown in Boise, Idaho.

CenturyLink Arena in downtown Boise, home to the Idaho Steelhead's hockey team, seats 5,000 fans, and has hosted basketball, arena football, indoor soccer, Motocross and gymnastic events in its past. The Big Sky Conference is hoping that it will be a popular draw for the men's and women's conference basketball tournaments too following dismal attendance numbers in Reno over the past three years.

The conference shifted to a new tournament format following the 2015-16 season, one in which all members qualified for the league tournament at a pre-determined site to ease travel difficulties for a conference that spanned as far east as North Dakota, and as far south as Arizona. But Reno proved a difficult travel location, one that not many fans were willing to get to.

With the loss of North Dakota from the Big Sky Conference, Boise is a more centrally located venue for the remaining league members, and CenturyLink Arena will provide a more intimate experience compared to the cavernous convention center in Reno where the tournament was played the last three years.

The conference tournament officially kicks off in Boise on Monday, March 11th, when the bottom six seeds on the women's side open tournament play. The women's quarterfinal matchups will be played on Tuesday, March 12th. The Montana State women open play on March 12th at 2:30pm versus Portland State.

The men's tournament doesn't begin until Wednesday, March 13th, when the bottom six seeds go head to head. The Montana State men will take on the University of Idaho in a first round matchup on March 13th beginning at approximately 2:30pm.

Semi-final matchups for the women are on Wednesday, March 13th, with the final slated for Friday, the 15th, while the men's semi-finals are set for Friday, the 15th with the championship set for Saturday the 16th at 6pm.

Spring is just around the corner in Southwest Montana, and if you can believe it, flowers and green grass will soon(ish) take the place of all the snow and ice. The historic wooden pool at Norris Hot Springs is the perfect vantage point to enjoy the shifting season. And if your visit happens to correspond with a weekend, you can also enjoy the finest in regional acoustic live music every Friday, Saturday and Sunday at 7pm.

Mathias is next up on Friday, March 15th. The Bozeman-based singer/songwriter has been playing music under the big sky for nearly two decades. With powerful vocals and a percussive guitar style, he's known for his dynamic live performances full of acoustic folk, rock, and funk tunes. Mathias recorded his debut album, Walk Alone, with the help of Emmy Award-winning producer Jeremiah Slovarp.

Heather Lingle is back on Saturday, March 16th. She's a Montana-based singer/songwriter. 



The Interview

Something wicked this way strums as Lincoln Durham returns to Bozeman

Armed with old bastardized midcentury guitars, hand-me-down fiddles and banjos, homemade contraptions with just enough tension on a string to be considered an instrument and any random percussive item he can get his hands or feet on, Lincoln Durham is a Southern gothic, psycho-blues, revival-punk one-man-band with a heavy amped edge, preaching the gospel of some new kind of depraved music. With driving guttural beats backboning various growling stringed instruments Durham gives birth to a sound that transcends genres with his dark, poetic and raw writing style telling tales that Edgar Allan Poe would've been proud of.

In anticipation of his Bozeman stop, the Rolling Zone spoke with Durham about his latest album, impassioned live show and how performing is his remedial equivalent to medication.

RZ: We're catching you just ahead of the first few shows of the "2019 Preachin' to the Devil Tour." What do you have planned for this outing?

LD: We're promoting [the record] from late last year and we've worked up some new songs, some new sounds and gadgets and things like that – always trying to keep it fresh and new. I've been around the block a few times, so we're doing the little bits and pieces that hopefully make the show stay interesting.

RZ: Fans of yours know the live show is where it's at. Obviously it's good for spectators to go in knowing a few lyrics, but how does the added dynamic of seeing it *in-person* round out the Lincoln Durham experience?

LD: I've been a one-man band for a lot of years now, and over the course of the years my writing style has evolved into being for that one-man band. I try to write for the live show, for the most part. When you hear it recorded, it's a little different vibe because what I do on stage, if you take away the visual effect, probably isn't as interesting as what you'd hear on the recorded version. The live vibe is what I always write to. It's an aggressive, kind of ragey show I hope people stay interested in.

RZ: Let's talk a little bit about last year's *And into Heaven Came the Night*. Compared to those behind your previous releases, what were the overarching goals for what would become your self-produced fourth album?

LD: I wanted to bridge a little bit of a gap between the old and new stuff. As I've progressed and evolved, the new stuff has gotten harder and more amped up, more straight rock or alt rock. The early stuff was very, I guess what would be considered Americana. Honestly, the trajectory I've been on since the very beginning was leading up to it getting harder and more aggressive. That's always who I was as an artist, but you have to start somewhere. What I wanted to do on this one was to bring in some of the spirit of the older roots [to] meld with the newer stuff and make that my new trajectory. A little bit more of a roadmap as to how we got from

RZ: You've been pretty open about using writing to tackle various afflictions, life changes, what have you. During the creation of this album, was there a particular instance where you felt a sense resolution for something you'd been grappling with?

LD: I don't know that I ever

necessarily get resolution from them,

but what does happen is it eases a bit of the, for lack of a better word, torment I've got going on. It subsides when I write about those topics. It doesn't have to necessarily be the topic that's troubling me, but it is an outlet that's kind of all-encompassing for the things going on in my head. It's a respite from that, a bit of a reconciliation or closure. It's like a medication - it subdues it until the next wave. That's what's always just got me by. In a world where it's difficult, at least for me, to get the medical attention that you need. I'm not real big on

taking the medication. The music and being able to focus your mind on creating something is very therapeutic.

RZ: It also seems like a much more fun way of dealing with stuff, up on stage rather than by having to sit down and talk about it.

LD: It's a lot of fun. Really, I think performing on stage is where it's always leading toward. Recording is fine, but I'm not the guy that looks forward to going into the studio. I don't care one way or another I just know I need to get the new music out. For me, it's all the stage. That's what I love and that's where all the demons, all the problems, all the things like that - it's one of, if not the only place where they truly just melt away and I can be who I am.

RZ: Was there a motivation behind each of the nine tracks being given single-word titles?

LD: It's always

iust these different

levels of detail of how I want to present the finished piece, all the way from the lyrics and the melody and the composition of the song, to the packaging and how the photos and even words look on page. This one to me was a bit more of a primal record, a more raw version of me. That was kind of the line of thinking behind it, having the more poetic title and then the song titles being more of a visceral reaction.

RZ: Lyrical content included, you've got this gritty, mischievous aesthetic that still manages to feel pretty inviting, at least in my opinion. How do you reconcile that? **LD:** I think it's a bit of a

balance. When people meet me in person, they're usually shocked at the fact that I'm not quite the persona that they expected, from the music and from the lyrics. The lyrics [are] what's in my head, and the person you meet is more the outside of who I am. I'm a friendly person by nature, but I hate a lot of things [laughs]. I'm bitter about a lot of things, but I'm still a nice guy. I grew up a big Tim Burton fan and I think to me it's a little bit like that sort of a situation where it's dark, but at the same time still whimsical enough that it's inviting and not straight up, 'Oh I gotta stay away from this guy.' And it's just the way it comes out. It's not created that way, but I kind of know where too much is. Usually it's not in my spirit to go quite so aggressive but in times that it is, I know where I need to pull back. It's like comedians. There's humor in pain. I'm not a comedian, but it's like that. You can be dark and scathing, and yet fun and inviting at the same time.

RZ: So, you're a master of the strings, you're a vocalist, you're a lyricist and you've got this pizazz audiences are drawn to. Was there a point after you picked up that first fiddle way back when that you knew you wanted to be this one-man band, jack of all trades sort of performing artist?

LD: That came much later. When I started with the fiddle, that was put in my hands. During my teenage years, I was a product of the '90s, so I was big into Nirvana and Smashing Pumpkins, things like that. I wanted to be a ragey guitar guy at that point. It was about ten years later when I got into some of the

old blues guys that melded with that '90s, depressey kid I was, and it turned into the spark of what I

started to do. But the one-man band thing was originally by necessity. At the time, I didn't have the money to hire a band – and I didn't want one thought [to stick] something under it and it just started to grow from there. At some point, the teeth sunk in. Nowadays I'm not so sure, but at

was keeping time with my foot, so I

until I could afford to pay guys to do what I really wanted them to do. I even tried people out but didn't like any of it. I was doing a lot of [solo] sets, stomping on the floor because my stuff was still kind of punchy even though it was acoustic. It

that point, that's what I got known for. People wanted to see me do it all by myself, so I rode that wave. Now it's a part of the spectacle people want to see. They might dig the music, but then a lot of times they might tell their friends, 'You gotta

see it because he does all that by himself.' And I'm always experimenting on how I can add things, add bells and whistles, and more tone, trick up my feet a little bit and make 'em do fancier things. If I can ever figure that out.

RZ: Are you planning on roadtesting some new songs on this tour? LD: I am. New songs, new gear

- which is not probably exciting whatsoever to a fan, but it's always exciting to me. I'm going to bring back some old stuff people probably haven't heard in quite a while. I kind of got so amped up that some of the old stuff didn't translate very well, in my opinion, to the new hard setup. I developed a new way [to] do those so it kind of goes back to the old style. It'll be a little bit of the old and new this coming year.

R7: So, touring all over the

RZ: So, touring all over the country through spring, then headed overseas toward the end of summer. Beyond the shows, what do you foresee for the Lincoln Durham machine?

LD: I'm writing my next record, probably about halfway through that. At some point in the next year or so there'll be another record coming out. Then we're going to try to do a lot more Europe if the opportunity arises; Germany, some of the Scandinavian countries, building our foothold back as firm as we can in the UK, which we're doing, but returning there on a frequent basis. Get more global.

RZ: Well, we're certainly excited for the Filler show!

LD: Bozeman's been good to us. Looking forward to getting back over there.







John Denver tribute show comes to Emerson Center




