Fair features night shows, family activities, critters & ride-induced jitters

The **Big Sky Country State Fair** returns to the Gallatin County Fairgrounds July 17th–21st for another round of food, fun, music, and so much more! Here's a look at this year's performers and some other highlights.

Popular country artist **Jo Dee Messina** is first to perform on Wednesday, July 17th. Jumpstarting her career, Messina's breakout "Heads Carolina, Tails California" made her a household name. Following the success of her debut, she posted nine No. 1 hits, sixteen Top 40 songs, sold over five million albums worldwide, and was honored by the ACM Awards, CMA Awards, and GRAMMYS.

Resurrection – A Journey Tribute follows on Thursday, July 18th. Setting out to create the most authentic Journey experience anyone has ever witnessed, the Nashville-based group spent countless hours discussing the look, sound, production, and FEEL needed for this tribute to deliver a live experience that would resonate on the highest level with the most

avid Journey fan.

On Friday, July 19th, **The Cadillac Three** take the stage. Also from Nashville, the high energy trio is known to fuse classic Southern rock with the sounds of outlaw country on songs like "Party Like You," "White Lightning" and "The South," which featured guest appearances by Dierks Bentley, Florida Georgia Line and Eli Young. Their latest full-length, *Legacy*, and new single "Crackin' Cold Ones with the Boys" are available now.

All night shows are held in Anderson Arena. Main stage acts are included with fair admission. Special seating and ticket packages also available. The Pit Pass will be offered again this year at just \$29. A limited number will be sold per show and the deal will include stage-side viewing, a private bartender, and private restroom facilities.

Also at the Fair, nightly live music by local bands on the Montana Treasure stage. Acts include the **Kelly Nicholson Band** on July 17th, **www.TWANG** on July 18th, **Clostr to Toast** on July 19th, and **Tsunami Funk** on July 20th. All perform at 7pm and 9:30pm.

Celebrating its 100th Anniversary, the **Bozeman Roundup Ranch Rodeo** will take place Saturday, July 20th at Anderson Arena. Performances will kick off at 1pm and 7pm. The rodeo reflects today's true working cowboy from the big open, with events packed full of excitement representing work done on the ranch: Wild Cow Milking, Team Branding, Trailer Loading, Team Sorting, Ranch Bronc Riding, Team Doctoring, and Hide Race.

Master hypnotist **Tyzen** brings his spectacular talents to the Fair with daily show times at 1:30pm, 4:30pm and 8pm on the Montana Treasure stage. Coupled with a generous dose of stand-up comedy, the hypnotist and magician's shows are a unique, high octane experience for audiences of all ages. Tyzen is known for his diverse, spontaneous act described as a hypnotic show erupting into a rock concert-like event.

Kids and thrill-seekers: don't forget the rides! The **Carnival** is open from 1–11pm daily (closing at 8pm on July 21st). North Star Amusements returns with super spectacular rides Vertigo and G-Force, kiddie rides, and traditional favorites. Single-day wristbands are \$30

and grant entry to unlimited rides. Ride coupons are also available for \$1 each or ten for \$9.

Additional Fair highlights include Bugology, Extreme Dog Show, Freckle Farm Petting Zoo, Kids' Pedal Tractor Pull, Farmer Phil Comedy Show, Extreme Motocross, Mud Bog, Barnyard Brawl, Wife Carrying Championship, Warrior Run, Agriculture in Montana: Critter Viewing, indoor and outdoor markets, competitive exhibits and workshops, local food and beverage vendors, plus so much more!

ALL grounds entertainment included with Fair admission. On-site admission is \$12 for adults, \$5 for youth 6–12, free for those 5 and under, and \$8 for seniors 62+. Carnival wristbands and coupons sold separately. Packages and discounted advance tickets available through the Fair website. NEW for 2019, Sunday is 'Heroes Day' – free one-day use adult admission for all first responders, veterans and military personnel with valid ID. SLAM live music slate offers something for every sonic palate

The summer **SLAM Festival**, which stands for **Support Local Artists and Musicians**, will be bringing some of Montana's best artists, craftsmen, musicians, and chefs to Bogert Park on Friday and Saturday, August 3rd and 4th. Admission is absolutely free, so there's no excuse not to attend the whole lineup of performances, and let us tell you, the 2019 SLAM music lineup is a multi-layered ice cream treat with sprinkles featuring scoops of musical flavors that range from Classical and assorted variations on Jazz and Blues, layers of folk, country, Americana and bluegrass, whole slabs of indie, punk and rock and roll topped with a smidgeon of world music. Any of these flavors individually are enough to make anybody do Eddie Murphy's "Ice-Cream Dance," but eat the whole thing and you'll feel you've won a prize – and all without the brain freeze.

 Classical (11 – 11:55am)
Emma & The Ledge
 Rock (noon – 12:55pm)

Emma and The Ledge are sixth generation Gallatin Valley sisters who are making a name of their own in the Montana music scene. Despite their youthful age, this duo wows the crowds with musical talent far exceeding their years.

Emma is a soulful powerhouse with a voice and range that is both inspiring and moving. Artfully crafting lyrics to the band's independent feel and sound, her music is expressive, visual and meaningful. Abby ("The Ledge") has a unique ability for sculpting the perfect sound through her intricate guitar effects and patterns in every composition. Together, they skillfully create a sound that is luminous and atmospheric, yet energizing enough to send an audience to their feet.

In addition to writing and performing original songs, they offer an eclectic mix of covers from Stevie Ray Vaughan, Jack White, and U2 (whom they are greatly inspired by). Their music is not limited to one genre: blues, alternative, rock, folk and independent styles are woven together utilizing a mix of acoustic and electric guitars. The sisters can often be spotted playing on the sidewalks of Downtown Bozeman, local hot spots, farmer's markets, battles of the bands, talent shows, and several music festivals throughout Montana.

Alex Robilotta & The SLAM Allstars
 Jazz (1 – 1:55pm)

Alex Robilotta & The Slam Allstars will feature some of Bozeman's finest and funkier musicians, playing new quintet arrangements of funky soulful jazz that will get people dancing in the sun. Orin Gunderson, trumpet, John Swendsen, sax, Eddie T, bass, Alex

Michelle Manzo Quartet
 (2 – 2:55pm)

The Michelle Manzo Quartet is an acoustic jazz band founded upon a shared passion for irresistible music. An acclaimed vocalist dedicated to jazz, Michelle Manzo Cobb puts her heart in everything she sings. She believes improvisation is not just a technique but a way of life. Originally from Miami, she moved to New York to further her music studies and began performing with Les Paul, Gene Bertocini, Ray Santos and Victor Jones. Among the countless music endeavors she embraced there, she also dazzled audiences in the far East. She has performed in Japan, Thailand, Malaysia, Taiwan, Vietnam, and Cambodia. Now based in Bozeman, she looks forward to exploring all the music it has to offer.

The Love Darts
 (3 – 3:55pm)

The Love Darts are high-energy rock and roll guaranteed to knock your socks off!

SloJoe & the Noshows
 (4 – 4:55pm)

A veteran of the Montana music scene, for well over a decade Joe Knapp has been writing, performing and recording an eclectic mix of guitar-driven American roots music.

Depending on the band or the billing, you can expect anything from Depression-era folk songs to honky tonk classics to soulful psychedelia. His ever-expanding repertoire of originals and covers offers a little something for everyone.

In 2016, Joe made his theatrical debut, composing the original soundtrack to *Freak Out!* The Musical, a rock and roll horror comedy written by Ryan Cassavaugh. Joe was voted Best Local Solo Musician in 2015, 2016, 2017 and 2018.

Sam Platts & the Great Plainsmen
 Country/Honky-Tonk
 (5 – 5:55pm)

Southwest Montana's Sam Platts and the Great Plainsmen play honky-tonk music meant to be danced to.

Songs range from originals written by Platts to traditional country staples, led by his vocals and guitar. The group calls the small mountain town of Pony, Montana, home, but has played across the country, and even as far away as France. Each member of the band spends the time they aren't playing music working in agriculture, including Platts who can often be found working or feeding cows. The group has a passion for traditional country music that few young people have today.

Wes Urbaniak & the Mountain Folk
 (11 – 11:55am)

The Mountain Folk have been emulsifying Urbaniak's genre expressions into their more creative forms, so that the tempo fusions hit when the strings hammer down. Some conscious music got snuck in, and Urbaniak made sure the beatboxing dissolved backward into the mix, too. Over the past year, the group has begun to form a catchphrase while playing that audiences pick up on right away and love. After coming into a hard break, Urbaniak will lean over to the group and yell out, "Bluegrass it!" From here, they play crazy fast, and that beautiful stomp comes full on. It's about the best speedboat ride in the ocean you'll get.

Urbaniak has been touring the country for years, and now that the Mountain Folk has joined up, the group has been touring the nation with him sharing that Montana music they play. Plus, they've been playing all this music on custom Montana made instruments from Urbaniak's shop. Nothing quite like it anywhere, and no better place for it to have come from.

Singer/Songwriter Power Block
 (noon – 2pm)

Chelsea Hunt & Jim Averitt
 Chelsea Hunt and Jim Averitt are a musically diverse and dynamic vocal, acoustic guitar and violin duo drawing from jazz, Americana, singer-songwriter, and blues influences. Both Jim and Chelsea are fixtures in the local music scene, and have performed in the Gallatin Valley and beyond for decades. The duo's new album, *Music in My Coffee*, features vibrant and creative original instrumental tunes. The guitar and violin music is both carefully crafted and freely improvisational and is at times playful, poignant, melancholy and joyful.

Amber Ikeman
 Amber Ikeman's spirited, earthy folk songs carry audiences across the open spaces of the American West and into the depths of their souls. With soaring vocals ranging from a husky chest voice to a bell-clear soprano, her powerful and intimate songs tell stories of self-discovery, resilience and wildness.

Inspired by her solo journey from her Florida hometown to live and work in Yellowstone National Park, her debut album, *Free*, recorded by Chris Cunningham at Bozeman's Basecamp Studio, was named one of Southwest Montana's top local albums of 2015. Amber's engaging performances earned the 2017 Vic Heyman Songwriting Award and the 2018 John O'Hara Outstanding Folk Song Award. She recently completed a cross-country tour with her second album, *Rise*.

Jessica Eve
 Jessica Eve, a singer/songwriter from Billings, has all the gears behind her vocal engine. She can pull the smooth, slow, long notes with ease right into amazing highs that is beautifully controlled power. She has stepped into music performance as a singer/songwriter and entertainer

full-time, and you'll pick up immediately that she has the spirit, drive, and talent sitting well upon her shoulders. Her songs are a mix of Folk, Country and Blues.

Eve's self-titled EP, *Jessica Eve Lechner*, consisting of six original songs, is a recording of her voice and her guitar just as you would hear it live. Her newest release, *Next Train Home*, is a full-length album with lyrics that reflect her life experiences, and the highs and lows of the road.

Jessica Eve has been named Best Female Vocalist at the Magic City music awards three years in a row. She has opened for acts such as Blackhawk, Restless Heart, Colt Ford, Dan + Shay, Larry Gatlin and the Gatlin brothers, Davina and the Vagabonds, as well as many others.

Steve Squared
 Bozeman locals Steve Squared is comprised of Steve Reida and Steve Schwab, a duo who have enjoyed a musical collaboration together for over 30 years. Their focus is on writing, arranging and recording original songs that vary from acoustic to electric, folk to blues to rock. In addition, mandolin and a variety of percussion rounds out their sound.

Steve Squared have recorded two full length albums, *The Soul Tree Sessions* and *Out West*, as well as an EP, *Decade*. Steve Squared will be joined by guest musicians for their SLAM performance.

Tom Catmull's Last Resort
 (3 – 3:55pm)

Tom Catmull's Last Resort is an exercise in musical evolution. Yes, that's a little vague and mysterious. Try this out. At a show, the sound you will hear is that of a veteran singer/songwriter amplified, elevated and occasionally made more sinister, by the creative musical syndicate of Jaime Rogers, Travis Yost and Aaron Jennings. Over the past year, this band has continued to round a stylistic corner, regularly trading in its roots-inspired inclinations for the seductive impulse of a sleeker American rock sound.

Tom Catmull has been featured on Montana PBS's *11th & Grant* in a stripped-down acoustic showcasing of his most recent release, *Words and Malady*. With an extremely loyal following, he has been voted "Best Musician" in the Missoula Independent's annual "Best Of" issue for over a dozen years in a row. This summer already has the band slated to

cover Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Wyoming and Montana for festivals, private events and the occasional gas tank-filling honky-tonk show. Two slightly questionable foreign cars will be loaded with acoustic and electric guitars, upright and/or electric bass, drums, keyboards, iPads, harmonicas, melodicas and any other noisemakers that happen to fit between the seats.

Long story short, The Last Resort has found itself in the arc of transition, and that is by design. New songs, new sounds. Don't miss it!

Cole & the Thornes
 (4 – 5pm)

Mountain-reggae gypsy-infused soul band, Cole & The Thornes of Bozeman, began with an infectious restlessness, a ukulele, and a heart engraved with longing adventure. This funky eclectic group is known for their playful horn melodies, islandy ukulele, and sultry, empowering vocals.

In 2013 the music started out with Cole Thorne singing her songs on the uke, and Jordan Rodenbiker on the bass. After Cole's first tour to Maui and a freight train music tour across the country, the band grew into a fully bloomed six-piece group in the summer of 2016. They added members Andy Gavin on drums, Aaron Banfield on jazz guitar, Daniel Wood on the pocket trumpet, and Matt Sloan on the saxophone.

After a successful Kickstarter campaign, Cole & The Thornes released their debut album *Map Maker* to a sold out crowd at the Rialto in March of 2018. Since then, the Thornes have performed throughout the state, playing with popular reggae bands HIRIE, Solseed, and Treehouse. They have shut down the streets for Music on Main, jammed out the Brew Fest in Big Sky, and have performed at various music festivals such as The Original Festival, Silver Cloud Campout, Harvest Fusion, Groovin On, and SLAM. The group plans to tour around the country in the spring and summer of 2019, while working on writing their second album.

So head on down to Bogert Park on August 3rd and 4th! Check out some local art, listen to some live tunes and devour some absolutely divine culinary creations. SLAM has something for everyone!

With a 'Flourish' – Jim Zimpel sculpture installed in Bozeman's new Story Mill Park

A sculpture by Montana State University art professor **Jim Zimpel** that was inspired by Bozeman's natural, cultural, commercial and recreational history has been installed in the city's new Story Mill Community Park located in the historic Story Mill and Cannery District off Griffin Lane. Called "**Flourish**," Zimpel's work is one of two sculptures selected for the park by a design committee organized by the non-profit Trust for Public Land. A sculpture by Arizona artist Stephen Fairfield has also been installed. Both pieces of public art are located in the nature sanctuary in the southern section of the 60-acre city park. "It's a really great opportunity to bring to Bozeman something different to the public sculptures that exist in the community," said Zimpel, who is a professor in the School of Art in the MSU College of Arts and Architecture. Styled as a whimsical boat frame, Zimpel's powder-coated, welded steel sculpture rises 25 feet. Its design references industrial windmills and the frames of boats. He said its crossed paddles that move kinetically in the wind recall traditional paddles from various cultures; the birds in the park's wildlife refuge, which include nesting sand-

hill cranes; and agricultural wheat. The boat frame is silver blue, which will allow it to blend into the surroundings in some light and appear to float, and the paddles are orange. He said the sculpture addresses the historic uses of the area from the era of nomadic foraging through industrialization, urban housing (part of the site was once a mobile home park) and now leisure. "The site has a rich history, including use by indigenous populations. It is a public space for all people, and I think (the piece) represents that." Maddy Pope, project manager for the Trust for Public Land, which has coordinated development of the park, said a five-member selection committee with members from the trust, the city and the local art community chose the two pieces of public art from more than 50 applications submitted by artists from throughout the country. Pope said Zimpel's sculpture is particularly aligned with its location in the nature preserve southern section of the park, which has been left in a more natural state and is the site of nests for birds and other wildlife. Fairchild's piece, which is of a large sandhill crane constructed of corrugated iron, is also thematic. Pope said that the funds for the public art came from a \$100,000



selection committee included Crystal Alegria of the Extreme History Project, curator Caleb Fey, artist Jim Madden and Jamie Saitta from the city of Bozeman. Dean Adams, acting dean of the MSU College of Arts and Architecture, said he believes "Flourish" is an excellent addition to the public art in the community. "Zimpel's work connects space to both ideas and questions about what it means to be human and our relationships to people and the land," Adams said. "(He) exemplifies the great work being done by Montana State University faculty who teach from a place of having a professional practice." The sculptures were installed June 27th. Pope points out that the nature preserve is closed to dogs; however, the park features a dog park in another area. In addition, the park also features trails, a playground, a community garden, an amphitheater, a sledding hill, a fishing area on the East Gallatin River and a community center located at the former Boys and Girls Club off Griffin Drive. Pope said the park will open to the public on Saturday, July 20th, with an all-day celebration. •

National Endowment for the Arts grant that the Trust for Public Land matched through fundraising. "The committee was very taken with Jim's concept that combines the idea of both the industrial history of the site – which was not always pristine and included a mill, stock yard and rendering plant and railroad – but also speaks to the natural elements of the area," Pope said. Vaughan Judge, director of the School of Art and a member of the

park's selection committee, said "Flourish" embraces in a creative way the history of the usage of the land while being an active piece that will react to wind, snow and sun. "His sculpture reminds us that nothing stays the same, that human time is different from botanical or geological time," Judge said. "It's a window to remind us that this space we walk today, enjoy today, was very different in the not so recent past." In addition to Judge and Pope, other members of the design

Helen E. Copeland exhibit centers on human-nature relationship

The School of Art at Montana State University is pleased to host **Branching Existence: Jessica Mongeon** at the Helen E. Copeland Gallery this summer. The show will be on display into early August. An artist's reception will be held from 6–8pm on Thursday, July 25th. The evening is free and open to the public. Hors d'oeuvres will be served. In *Branching Existence*, new work by MSU alum Jessica Mongeon discusses the relationship between humans and nature; highlighting the similarities between human brain neurons, natural organisms, and geographical features. Mongeon's atmospheric, eerily whimsical landscapes are painted with acrylic on tree-free eco-friendly paper. They are inspired by walks in the damp forests of Wisconsin and Arkansas, which contrast with the vast landscapes of the Great Plains where she lived for over 25 years. By using unexpected and sometimes jarring color combinations, she creates a visceral or intuitive response, similar to how humans experience the environment. By juxtaposing human neuron

paths and entities like lichen and fractals, while also experimenting with the scale of these microscopic formations, Mongeon's work has a harmonizing analysis of human interplay with the environment. According to Mongeon, "Neurons symbolize consciousness, an awareness of one's surroundings. They show a connection between humans and nature because of their tree-like branching quality [...] Neurons must connect and communicate to keep the mind and body alive. Similarly, lichen is made of a fungus, an alga and sometimes a yeast that work in symbiosis. By acknowledging our embodiment of nature, perhaps we can care for the ecosystems that sustain us as much as we care for our own bodies." However, negative human impacts on nature inform her work as well, adding to the slightly uncanny feeling in her prismatic compositions. "The nobler qualities of humanity are explored, as well as destructive tendencies. For example, I depict the destruction at Joshua Tree National Park that took place during the government shutdown," states Mongeon. There is a palpable

Brother's Grimm feel to the work – an unsettling playfulness that is both haunting and alluring as her pieces seem to grow from a black ground: a possible indictment of humans environmental violations, or an entrancing symbiotic relationship, depending on what the viewer brings to the work. Jessica Mongeon was born in Rolette, North Dakota and now resides in Arkansas, where she is an Assistant Professor of Art at Arkansas Tech University. Mongeon has exhibited nationally and internationally, including juried group exhibitions at the Painting Center in New York City and 203 Art Gallery in Shanghai, China. She received a MFA in Painting from Montana State University, and a BFA from the University of North Dakota. 

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BFS doc transports viewers to Bozeman's early punk rock scene

Bozeman Film Society presents a special presentation of music documentary *...So Good I Can't Take It*. The screening will be held at the newly renovated Ellen Theatre beginning at 7:30pm.

The film is a rowdy, jubilant tour of the new wave/punk music scene of Montana from the late 1970s into the early 1990s. Rare film footage (including an actual 1982 gig at The Ellen!), photos, and interviews with many of the underground scene's participants capture Montana's forgotten musical frontier.

Focused mainly on Bozeman and Missoula, director Kirk LeClaire stitches together a fascinating story of musical rebels and energetic youth playing "weird" music that wasn't always appreciated by listeners, but that allowed many to hone their craft. Early Bozeman bands were also fortunate to have supportive adults, like high school teacher Lynne Merrick, who spent time mentoring and documenting performances. Musicians and artists that had their roots in this early Montana music scene include Pearl Jam's Jeff Ament from Big Sandy; Steve Albini, recording engineer for Nirvana, The Pixies and more, from Missoula; John Dahl (member of early Bozeman band The Pugs) who went on to direct *Rounders* and numerous TV shows; and the late

Joe Skyward, who played and promoted underground rock in Bozeman, and was a member Posies and Sunny Day Real Estate after moving from Southwest Montana.

Director Kirk LeClaire, an art instructor at Cal State University, will attend the screening. The film will be followed by a live music set by The Love Darts and special guests. The event is sponsored by KGLT.

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
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
Ellen presents *Damn Yankees*, return of cowboy film classics series

The play





Athletic complex fundraising nearing goal

The dream of a state-of-the-art athletic complex at Bobcat Stadium is getting closer to reality as the Montana State Athletic Department announced fundraising totals recently. The new complex proposed for the north endzone of Bobcat Stadium reportedly will cost 18 million dollars to complete Phase I, and so far Bobcat Athletics has secured an estimated 16.5 million dollars of that goal. The 40,000-square foot building that was announced as part of Montana State's Athletics Facilities Master Plan in 2017 will enclose the north end of Bobcat Stadium and include study spaces, locker rooms, team meeting rooms, training, health and rehabilitation facilities, as well as the coaching offices of the Bobcat football program. "This addition to Bobcat Stadium will not only be a focal point for visitors entering our university but will also be an important resource for student-

athlete success both on the field and in the classroom," said Jeff Choate, MSU's head football coach. With the Bobcat football program vacating their space inside Brick Breeden Fieldhouse upon completion of the Bobcat Athletic Complex, MSU will transform the space into a tutoring, advising and study area to be used by all of Montana State's student-athletes. "The impact of the Bobcat Athletic Complex and Academic Excellence Center is going to be felt by every program and student-athlete, while benefiting our fans, our supporters and the entire campus and community," said MSU Director of Athletics Leon Costello. "This complex supports our vision to develop champions in the classroom, competition and life. We owe it to our student-athletes and coaches to get this started as quickly as we can." Montana State will ask the state Board of Regents for permission to spend up to \$18 million dollars in

non-state funds to cover the construction of the project, while the university will contribute \$3 million dollars that will be repaid with athletic revenues. No taxpayer money will be used to fund the project. The MSU Alumni Foundation hopes to complete fundraising for the project this fall and are in the process of making a final contribution push to cover the remaining \$1.5 million dollars so Phase I can begin. "We can't break ground until we meet our fundraising goal," MSU Alumni Foundation President and CEO Chris Murray said. "We're on the 1-yard line, and we need everyone's help to get the ball over the goal line." 1985 that erupted in the alley behind the Wrangler and the



Gallatin Range deserves wilderness protection

The **Gallatin Range** south of Bozeman is the largest unprotected wild area in the northern Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem (GYE). The GYE is the only intact temperate ecosystem left in the world, as such, as we have a great responsibility to maintain its ecological integrity.

One of the best ways to do that is by designating 230,000 acres or so of the remaining roadless lands of the Gallatin Range as wilderness under the 1964 Wilderness Act. Wilderness is the “Gold



Standard” for land protection. Any other designation provides less protection.

It is particularly important that the Buffalohorn-Porcupine drainages be protected under the

Wilderness Act. These low elevation lands, adjacent to Yellowstone Park, are a major elk migration route, elk winter range, important grizzly bear habitat, and utilized by bighorn sheep, mountain goat, moose, deer, wolverine, wolf, and numerous other smaller mammals.

Currently, the Custer Gallatin National Forest is finalizing its forest plan that will guide management for the next 10-15 years. In its final recommendation, I hope the agency will recognize that it has a moral responsibility to recommend management of these wildlands for potential inclusions within the National Wilderness System.

Fishes of Montana app brings field guide to mobile devices

If you were to catch a lake trout or a bull trout in Montana waters, would you know which is which? A new app may be able to help.

“It’s harder than most people think to identify fish correctly,” said Tom McMahon, a professor in the Fish and Wildlife Ecology and Management Program within the Department of Ecology in the College of Letters and Science at Montana State University. “There are a lot of fish that kind of look alike.”

In 1971, long before the university became known as Trout U, MSU published “Fishes of Montana” by C.J.D. Brown, and the field guide has since remained a vital resource for identifying species in the field. It includes 80 varieties of fish in the state, with histories, distribution maps and characteristics, but in nearly half a century, the book has never been updated.

For years, McMahon and ecology department colleagues Alexander Zale and Christopher Guy, leader and assistant leader of the U.S. Geological Survey Montana Cooperative Fishery Research Unit, banded the idea of a new edition of the book. However, a different opportunity presented itself when Guy met Whitney Tilt, a Bozeman conservationist whose previous collaborations with Matt Lavin, a professor in the Department of Plant Sciences and Plant Pathology in MSU’s College of Agriculture, led to two field identification smartphone apps, Montana Grasses and Flora of the Yellowstone Region.

Rather than revise and reprint “Fishes of Montana,” the book has been given a 21st century update with the release of its namesake **Fishes of Montana app**. The app, now available for Android and iOS devices, includes information on 90 native and introduced species. The app is free to download, funded by a \$10,000 grant from retailer Patagonia that was awarded to the Department of Ecology to promote the restoration of native fish populations as part of the Trout and Cold Water Fisheries Initiative.

The app includes a comprehensive species list for quick reference, which includes the common and scientific names. It tells whether the fish is native or introduced, threatened or a game fish. Fishes of Montana also contains a glossary, a map of major drainages in Montana, diagrams on fish anatomy and links to more resources.

To develop the app, the MSU team enlisted Tilt as project manager and Katie Gibson of the Bozeman company MountainWorks as the developer. They then called on Montana Fish Wildlife and Parks, partners in the Cooperative Fishery Research Unit, to provide expertise.

“This partnership is really neat,” Guy said. “It allows us to bring it all together and develop a product with the best resources available in the state.”

Printed guides have been important for those doing field work in places without an internet connection. The new app is equally portable; Fishes of Montana does not require cellular coverage or a

wireless connection for basic identification. The app’s information draws from both books and FWP’s online field guide, FishMT.

“The app is now the most current resource for contemporary taxonomy,” said David Schmetterling, a fisheries research coordinator with FWP who was part of the development team.

It also relies on the knowledge base of the fisheries community, FWP and the university.

“The faculty at Montana State University are the best ichthyologists we have in the state,” Schmetterling said. “For generations, MSU has been looked at for those skills and that knowledge.”

Making correct identifications is important. FWP’s fishing regulations center around being able to identify the species. For example, Guy said lake trout are considered at risk of becoming endangered due to declining populations in their native waters, but invasive when introduced elsewhere. Bull trout are listed as a threatened species by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Daily limits, or fishing bans, reflect these designations.

“Lake trout we want gone in many waters,” Guy said. “Bull trout must stay. But they look similar.”

Lake trout have more spots than bull trout and their tail fins have deeper forks, according to Fishes of Montana. Bull trout’s spots are a pale yellow on their back and red or orange going down the side. Lake trout have light gray spots, never red or orange.

McMahon teaches an ichthyology class each spring. His students

learn to identify fish species using a dichotomous key, which gives a couplet, or pair, of statements and asks the user to pick one of the two choices leading them to another couplet. Those choices become increasingly specific until a match is found. Students learn the key, but often don’t rely on it in the field.

The broader approach of Fishes of Montana “might actually fit better,” Zale said.

The app invites users to identify fish species through a polyclave key, which uses a process of elimination based on observed characteristics. Choose the location within the state, the shape of the tail or if an adipose fin is present. If you don’t know what an adipose fin is, a graphic with an arrow points to its location (between the main back fin and the tail). The app then provides a list of fish meeting the specified characteristics.


“The polyclave approach is user friendly,” Tilt said. “It encourages the user to explore and not worry about making a mistake.”

McMahon plans on using the app in his next ichthyology class.

Aside from students and scientists, the app is useful for anglers of all ages. According to Schmetterling, one FWP employee took a beta version on a Missouri River fishing trip and his 10- and 13-year-old children were able to identify the six or seven different species.

“The unique thing about this app is it serves many different purposes to different audiences,” he said.

Fishes of Montana users could



also lend insight into changes in distribution or the presence of fish species, including aquatic invasive species. For this reason, the app has information on 10 species the State of Montana hopes never to see in Montana waters, such as the snakehead, round goby and bighead carp. If a user is unable to identify a species or wants to share information, the app contains a direct email link to Schmetterling inviting the user to attach a photo.

“What I especially like about the way Fishes of Montana was developed is it promotes communication from people using the app to us,” he said.



Mountain lion encounter prompts reminder for wildlife safety tips

A brief encounter involving a mountain biker and a family group of mountain lions on a forested trail system north of Whitefish highlights the need to be aware of possible wildlife encounters in the outdoors and to follow safety precautions.

On the afternoon of June 28th, an adult male riding a mountain bike reported encountering a group of 3-4 mountain lions on the Whitefish Trail system near Haskill Lake. The biker said the lions briefly followed him down the trail before losing sight of them. The lions did not make physical contact with the biker at any time. Based on the description of the encounter, it does not appear that the lions displayed predatory behavior. FWP determined that no management action is needed.

“Trail users are advised to be aware of possible encounters with wildlife and review our recommended safety tips for avoiding conflicts,” said Chad White, FWP Region 1 bear and lion technician.

Most wildlife, including bears

and mountain lions, will try to avoid a confrontation. Recreationists should give wildlife at least 100 yards of space. Mountain lions and bears are most active at dusk and dawn when their prey is active, but they do travel at any time of the day or night.

FWP offers some tips on how to prevent encounters with lions or how to react if you see one:

What to Do If You Encounter a Mountain Lion

– Do Not Approach a Lion: Most mountain lions will try to avoid a confrontation. Give them a way to escape.

– Do Not Run from a Lion: Running may stimulate a mountain lion’s instinct to chase. Instead, stand and face the animal. Do not turn your back. Make eye contact. If there are small children nearby, pick them up if possible so they don’t panic and run. Although it may be awkward, pick them up without bending over or turning away from the mountain lion.

– Do Not Crouch Down or Bend Over: A person squatting or bending over looks a lot like a 4-

legged prey animal. When in mountain lion country, avoid squatting, crouching or bending over, even when picking up children.

– Appear Larger: Raise your arms. Open your jacket if you are wearing one. Again, pick up small children. Throw stones, branches, or whatever you can reach without crouching or turning your back. Wave your arms slowly and speak firmly in a loud voice. The idea is to convince the mountain lion that you are not prey and that you may be a danger to it.

– Be Vocal: Talk calmly and regularly.

– Teach Others How to Behave: One who starts running could initiate an attack.

What to Do If You Encounter a Bear

– Carry Bear Spray: Make certain you have bear spray at the ready and know how to use it. If a grizzly bear charges your first option is to remain standing and direct your spray at the charging bear. The bear may “bluff charge” or run past you.

– Never Approach: Slowly back



away, if possible. Do not run from a bear. Keep a distance of at least 100 yards.

– Stay calm: Don’t panic and run. Behave in a non-threatening manner. Do not attempt to frighten away or haze a grizzly bear that is near or feeding on a carcass.

– Stay Together as a Group: Immediately pick up small children.

– Be Vocal: Speak softly. Do not make eye contact.

Boaters: Remember to “clean, drain, dry” this summer

The summer boating season in Montana has begun, and more than 24,000 watercraft have already been inspected at aquatic invasive species inspection stations around the state. Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks and partner organizations operate more than 30 watercraft inspection stations to ensure boats launching on Montana waters are free of aquatic invasive species like zebra and quagga mussels.

Boaters transporting motorized or non-motorized watercraft are required to stop at stations they encounter, as directed by signs. In addition, boaters must seek out an inspection prior to launching if they are coming into Montana from out of state, traveling west over the Continental Divide into

western Montana, coming off Tiber or Canyon Ferry reservoirs, or launching anywhere within the Flathead Basin with a watercraft that last launched on waters outside of the Basin.

Boat owners transporting watercraft with ballast tanks or bladders must also undergo additional decontamination at watercraft inspection stations to prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species.

To date, 11 boats with invasive mussels have been intercepted coming into Montana. In June a boat with mussels was intercepted at the Dillon inspection station, coming from Lake Mead heading to Cutbank.

“With the recent discovery of adult mussels in a North Dakota lake, our mission to keep Montana’s waters free of mussels is more

important than ever,” said FWP’s AIS Bureau Chief Thomas Woolf.

“Boat owners and anglers need to do their part and make sure their watercraft and gear are clean, drained and dry and to get inspected as required by law.”

Boat owners and anglers should follow the principles of clean, drain, dry to help protect our waters:

– Clean all mud and debris from the watercraft, trailer, waders and fishing equipment

– Pull drain plugs and make sure all compartments, bilges and ballasts are drained

– Dry out watercraft, including dry wells, storage areas and compartments

Yellowstone day ride permit program enters third year

Yellowstone National Park will continue issuing **free day ride permits** to individuals who take stock on park trails this summer. Launched in 2017, the free permit system helps park managers understand where, when, and how many stock users visit the park. Rangers may ask to see people’s permits during rides on trails.

Stock users can obtain their free permits on the park’s website, by calling the central backcountry office at (307) 344-2160, or at any of Yellowstone’s backcountry offices.

Yellowstone’s stock packing regulations remain in effect:

– Overnight stock use is not allowed until July 1st. Check the backcountry situation report to see what trails are open for day use.

– Stock users who plan

overnight trips must obtain a backcountry permit.

– Stock users must possess certification of a negative Coggins Test performed within the last 12 months for all equine stock entering Yellowstone.

Yellowstone is not limiting the number of individual stock users on trails.

Traveling in Yellowstone’s backcountry with stock is an exciting way to see the park. The free day ride permits provide an opportunity for park staff to assist riders in planning safe, enjoyable, and low-impact trips.

Since 1916, the National Park Service has been entrusted with the care of America’s more than 400 national parks. With the help of volunteers and partners, NPS safeguards these special places and share their stories with millions of people every year. •

The brew story involves mad scientist beer geekery at its best: Bozeman Brewing Co. owner/founder Todd Scott, general manager Tucker Kalberg, and head brewer Bill Hyland spent last winter with Faris and Ale Works Bar Manager Brad Harris debating the profile of the Mainline – hop choices, malts, and brewing processes – until a consensus was reached.

In late May, brewmaster Hyland took over, running around the brewery for 12 hours nonstop, mixing the specially chosen malts in clear Montana water, filtering and transferring the mash from tank to tank, adding bittering hops and yeast, and closely monitoring PH, temperatures, and platos, before leaving the Mainline to develop. The team reconvened weeks later for the dry hop before leaving the brew to mature into the IPA now being

poured at Ale Works.

“It was a no-brainer,” says Kalberg of the decision to partner with Ale Works. “We couldn't be happier to find a way to further foster our long-standing relationship,

hop varieties to set it apart, but also give it our mark, and broad IPA appeal.”

“A huge shout-out to our friends at Bozeman Brewing who went out of their way to make time and space

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Red Ants returns to White Sulphur for down-home music fest

The highly anticipated **Red Ants Pants Music Festival** has arrived, but there's still time to secure your passes! The annual festival is held in a working cow pasture on the Jackson Ranch just outside of White Sulphur Springs, set this year for July 25th-28th. Here's a closer look at the 2019 lineup.

Headlining this year is GRAMMY-winner **Patty Griffin**. The acclaimed artist's tenth studio recording and first-ever eponymous LP released in March. *Patty Griffin* represents an extraordinary new chapter for the famed singer/songwriter and immediately stands among the most deeply personal recordings of her remarkable two-decade career. The album collects songs written during and in the aftermath of profound personal crisis, several years in which she battled – and ultimately defeated – cancer just as a similar and equally insidious disease metastasized into the American body politic. Yet as always, like very few others, Griffin's power lies in how she can express the strikingly intimate while never making it about herself, all wrapped in sparse arrangements that breathe an incomparable force and import into her songcraft.

Rose-Garcia, most affectionately known as **Shakey Graves**, is also set for a Red Ants performance. After getting his start as a one-man band, he went on to win an Americana Music Awards for "Emerging Artist of the Year" following his breakout full-length album, *And the War Came*. Now armed with a full band, Rose-Garcia leaves behind much of that stripped-down, folk-y sound. His latest release, *Can't Wake Up*, takes his songwriting in a "decidedly bigger direction" full of "lush indie compositions" (*Consequence of Sound*), drawing on another set of his musical influences, ranging from the Beatles and Harry Nilsson to Elliott Smith, Broken Social Scene, Built to Spill and other '90s indie rock bands. With a road-tested group of musicians and a hand-built stage set up complete with psychedelic lighting and props, Shakey Graves' live show is something to behold.

Canadian artist **Colter Wall** will also visit the White Sulphur stage. Drawing on the stories of Saskatchewan, the young songwriter's corner of the world takes shape throughout his second full-length album, *Songs of the Plains*. The project combines striking original folk songs, well-chosen

outside cuts, and a couple of traditional songs that reflect his roots growing up in the small city of Swift Current. Wall captures the spacious-



ness of the Canadian plains by relying on minimal production and his resonant baritone, which he's strengthened into a mighty instrument in its own right. It's a deep and knowing voice you wouldn't expect of a man in only his mid-twenties.

This year's main stage lineup will

also feature performances by Country Music Hall of Fame inductee **Bobby Bare**, **Valerie June**, **Suzy Bogguss**, **The White**

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The Interview

Golden State stringsters deliver their brand of 'Mericana roots-rock to Southwest Montana

Soon to celebrate ten years since its inception, California-based **Dead Winter Carpenters** has built a reputation for steadfast touring, heartfelt performances and authentic Americana.

Reminiscent of genre-benders like Jack White, Chris Thile, and Sam Bush, the Carpenters harmoniously blend refined musical ability with a scarcely restrained tendency to let it all hang out. The result is a controlled burn, a riveting sound, and a connection with fans that sells out shows and has the band sharing stages with the likes of Jason Isbell, Greensky Bluegrass, and Hard Working Americans.

In anticipation of their Montana performances, the Rolling Zone spoke with guitarist/vocalist **Jesse Dunn** about the band's original music, live show and taking up the stringed torch.

Rolling Zone: Dead Winter Carpenters will bring a string of performances to Montana toward month's end, including for one of Bozeman's most popular events, 'Music on Main.' Can you give those who haven't had the opportunity to see this band perform a preview of the live show?

Jesse Dunn: We try to bring a high energy dance party with a bluegrass, country/rock format. Some fiery fiddle, some rippin' Telecaster guitar and hopefully some good songs.

RZ: The outdoor setting an added bonus.

JD: The outdoor environment is the ultimate place to perform our style of music – under the sun, hopefully. Get people groovin'.

RZ: Like some of your other upcoming performances, the Pine Creek show was intended to be in support of the late Jeff Austin. May I ask you to reflect on this loss, as a musician and/or friend of his?

JD: I grew up watching him as a pillar of the scene we're a part of today. That was really the sound everybody was looking for in the 2000s and later on, too. Yonder Mountain String Band, and Jeff Austin's influence in particular runs extremely deep through this scene. More recently,

Dead Winter Carpenters had the honor and opportunity to go on a couple runs and play with the Jeff Austin Band and got to know him as a human being, as well as his bandmates. We'll all cherish those experiences. It hit pretty close to home once the news broke. It's just super sad, especially for his family, but also his fans and friends. The ripple effect will go on for a while. He's left an incredible catalog that we can all look up to.

RZ: Are there plans to pay tribute at Pine Creek and some of these other shows?

JD: Absolutely. He sat in with us at Winter WonderGrass in Tahoe just a couple months ago. Then back in the fall we did some Colorado shows and a Reno show together, so we collaborated on a few different cover tunes that we'll probably play. He also pulls strongly from the John Hartford catalogs, so we'll probably do at least a song or two of Hartford's that Jeff did, and hopefully an original song or two from Yonder Mountain String Band that we really respect and like to play. We definitely have some plans to throw some tribute tunes in where we can.

RZ: Let's talk a little bit about Dead Winter Carpenters' originals. The latest full-length is *Washoe*, packed with unique arrangements and insightful lyrics. What were your initial goals for what would become your fourth studio release?

JD: Going into that recording

process, we were really just trying to do something a little bit different that was closer to our sound at the time. I think we accomplished that through some different techniques in the studio; we brought in some auxiliary instrumentation, some pedal steel and some piano, and some really great musicians joined us on that record. It has a little bit more toward alt-country and some more rock influence, which is kind of the way our sound has morphed over the years, even more so now.

RZ: Do you think your sound has evolved since making those songs to what you're maybe working on now?

JD: It's continued to evolve even more – we pull strongly from bluegrass and classic country, even a bit of grunge rock. We're all kind of fans of that era and grew up during that era. Record rock n' roll combined with classic country and bluegrass instrumentation, throw the drums in there and it opens the spectrum a little more to different genres.

RZ: "Love Amongst Thieves" and "North Wind" were a few that caught my ear on *Washoe*, but is there a track or two you find yourself partial to performing?

JD: I'd assume that's similar to asking which one of your kids is your favorite [laughs]. We're coming up on ten years as a group and generally play tunes that've spanned our whole career, and we have a stash we

haven't recorded. We try to make every show a little bit different and switch up the covers we're playing. Last summer we released a single called "Roller Coaster" that our friend Jackie Greene played some organ on, that tune has been a lot of fun to play live. Some of the funkier improv stuff is what we go to, really just working on some segues and different things to switch up the setlist. To be honest, we have a lot of fun playing most of our tunes, including a lot of the ones on the *Washoe* record.

RZ: Dead Winter Carpenters' records feel very *live*, like you could turn them up really loud at home and simulate the live show. Is there intention behind that, production-wise?

JD: That's always a question when you're going in to record. How do you toe that line between making it similar enough to the live show to where you get a good idea of what the band's about and what you're going to see, but also keeping it different enough as a studio recording where you can add some bells and whistles, some ear candy here and there. Our goal, with that said, has been to try and hold some live roots to recording. We try to track as many things as we can in a live take and then build off that. And each song ends up being a different animal, but we definitely try to hold true to the live feel as much as we can.

RZ: Dead Winter Carpenters draw inspiration by many, but genre is feeling less and less definable these days. Do you think one borrowing from another, blurring the lines is helping create string music for a new generation?

JD: Yonder Mountain String Band was one of the first acts to do that kind of stuff, along with New Grass Revival and you name it. Obviously a lot of these groups pull from the Grateful Dead and Phish, but Yonder Mountain really brought in some high energy stuff and a lot of different covers, whether it be the Talking Heads or John Hartford. That exposed audiences to new things they may not have known about, or they gave [the songs] a unique spin that made it cool and accessible. So the short of it would be yes, I do think that different takes on different styles of music, incorporating different covers opens new audiences to different music and just a different vibe. Delving into different genres does open things up for the string

band revolution, as it were, which has been going on for a while now.

RZ: You're doing your part, for sure. You did put out "Roller Coaster" last spring, but are Dead Winter Carpenters cooking up anything for a potential new album?

JD: That's definitely the plan and it's kind of the million-dollar question in the group right now, how to strategically approach getting out the next record. Logistics get extremely chaotic in the summertime, flying around for different shows. We're just trying to rehearse and work on new ideas and stay focused on the gigs at hand, but also not lose sight of what we're trying to get at down the line, as far as recording goes and getting some new material out there. That's extremely important to us. The goal is to record sometime this fall, if not early winter. It's just a matter of deciding the approach, but absolutely. It's been a little while so we're kind of chomping at the bit to get something new out.

RZ: We're looking forward to the shows! Do you have a parting message?

JD: We're thrilled to get back to Montana. We have a great appreciation for the people out there, the music fans, and just the area. We love Montana, I don't know how you couldn't. We're just excited to get back and have a star on the calendar for the 'Music on Main' series, as well as Pine Creek Lodge. Just really looking forward to it.

Dead Winter Carpenters visit Pine Creek Lodge on Wednesday, July 24th. The venue is just outside Livingston with the music set to begin at 7pm. Advance tickets to this all-ages event are \$10 at pinecreeklodgemontana.com. Day of show tickets will also be available at the door for \$15, depending on availability.

Opening a new month on Thursday, August 1st, the group will front Downtown Bozeman's 'Music on Main' at 7pm. The summer music series is free of admission and open to all ages. Additional details can be found at downtownbozeman.org.



Downtown Bozeman’s Rialto Theater features loads of fantastic live entertainment for music-lovers this and every month. Here’s a look at just a few of the upcoming happenings.

Check out a **Local Rock Showcase** on Friday, July 19th. The evening will include sets by **Panther Car**, **Modern Sons** and **Steady Trees** with the music beginning at 9pm. Tickets to this all ages show are \$10. Doors at 8pm.

Panther Car comes in the shape of a traditional rock band yet sounds far from it. Their amorphous brand of pop music teeters between the radiant iridescence of psychedelia and the murky darkness of dreams. Every moment is a door that opens into a new room. Songs progress through tangential wormholes as in an ecstatic conversation; music that is equal parts meditation and celebration.

With a wall of sound so thick, the Modern Sons can’t help but captivate their listeners. Each of the four members bring their own layer to a ubiquitously sonic ambience in an attempt to cultivate something organic and new. The band’s influences include Pink Floyd, Spoon, The Vines, The Black Keys, 311, Band of Horses, and Silversun Pickups. Lyrically, they cover a wide range of themes with one more recent caveat which is writing music about sustainability, social responsibility, consciousness, and living in the moment.

Steady Trees is an indie rock band inspired by the changing rock n’ roll styles of the ‘70s
