**Human impact on environment** explored with Shakespearean Story Mill performance

Dr. Gretchen Minton, professor of English at Montana State University, has announced a free community performance of Timon of Anaconda will take place Saturday, September 7th, at "The Silos" at Story Mill in Bozeman. Adapted from Shakespeare's Timon of Athens, the afternoon show begins at 3pm and is open to the public. Please bring your own chairs.

This outdoor performance uses site-specific classical drama as a way of addressing the challenges of human impact on our ecosystems. The performance venue - The Silos at Story Mill - was chosen because the site was formerly an industrial area that has been reclaimed as a space for public artistic projects.

Timon of Athens has become popular recently due to its topics of greed, friendship, loyalty, economic disaster, and environmental degradation. Minton is setting this 75-minute adaptation in 1960s-70s Butte, Montana. The play tells the story of a mining mogul who loses everything and is abandoned by his



friends. He then attempts to retreat to the wilderness, only to find that there is no place that does not have the mark of human activity.

Under Minton's direction, Timon of Anaconda stars Mark Kuntz, Tonya Andrews, Riley O'Toole, Keegan Grady, Lizzy Bennett, Aaron Schuerr, and Claire McGinty.

The events will include art, refreshments, home tours and talks by Dr. Sharon Beehler (literature), Dr. Eric Funk (music),

The salons are inspired by the Parisian salon of Gertrude Stein and Alice B. Toklas at 27 Rue de Fleurus in Paris, which was host to some of the greatest artists and intellectuals of the 1920s. Stein's salon is the setting of IOB's fall opera, Ricky Ian Gordon's 27, with performances set for Oct. 11th and 13th at the Willson Auditorium.

#### An adventure around the globe highlights PechaKucha's Ellen return

Their 4-month trip included 17,000-foot glaciers in Nepal, tea plantations in Sri Lanka, orangutans in Borneo, sailing pirate infested waters of the Sulu Sea, living local in the Philippines and finally a visit with grandma in Shanghai.

Their story highlights the next PechaKucha Night(s) at Downtown Bozeman's Ellen Theatre, Wednesday and Thursday, September 11th and 12th. The shows start at 6:40pm each night.

Spencer and Camden, the Miller Brothers, take family adventures in another direction. The aspiring engineer and filmmaker took off on a 3month van trip across America after their parents' separation and liked it so much that they now live side-byside in their vans, working on a documentary about their travels.

John Bluefeather, a wilderness wanderer and photographer, will give PK audiences a wonderful

glimpse into his world, including images of his month-long solo canoe trip into the wilderness of Atlan Lake, British Columbia. And,

keeping with the adventure theme, Maury Irvine will tell his story of searching for dinosaurs and Genghis Khan with Jack Horner.



Also presenting both nights is historian and USAF veteran August Uhl, who will describe his efforts to preserve veterans' stories through a

> magazine that is part graphic novel and part military history magazine. On a related theme, Lynn Kinnaman will talk about our vanishing personal history, why it matters and what we can do about it.

Other speakers include Cindy Christin on the history of Little Golden Books; Michael Fox on his 30-year battle with type 1 diabetes and the app he has developed to help people find the right diet for them; Dezri Rochin on "Not anonymous: Things I've learned since I got sober"; Collette Brooks-Hops, with her amusing, but serious "confessions of a wayward daughter"; and Lisa Downing

Her work has been exhibited all over the world, including at The Institute of Contemporary Art in

Philadelphia, Nashville's Frist Center for the Arts, and many others.

Her latest book is a stunning and engaging visual memoir produced in



collaboration with her son, artist and designer Alex Kalman. Sara Berman's Closet is a tribute to her mother Alex's grandmother - that "is filled

with the Kalmans' family photographs and correspondence, Maira Kalman's iconic paintings, and a handwritten text that relates the story of a remarkable woman while celebrating her individuality, resilience, and self-rediscovery." Alex Kalman is a

creative director, curator, and inventor who owns What Studio?, a New York-based gallery devoted to "curiosity, humanism, humor, optimism, and originality.' His work has been exhibited at The Museum of Modern Art, and the Victoria and Albert Museum, among others. He's also the founder of Mmuseumm, a traveling installation that displays illuminating objects from around the world in very small spaces, including an elevator shaft in lower Manhattan. 



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#### School year begins w/ MORe lectures, Genghis Khan Family Day

Museum of the Rockies is welcoming the new academic year with a full calendar of its own! The famed exhibitor also hosts a bevy of special events to accompany its many historical displays. Here's a look at some upcoming happenings at our neighborhood museum.

The Gallatin History Museum Lecture

Series returns with "Rediscovering Wonderland: How the Great Depression Shaped Yellowstone National Park" on Wednesday, September 4th in Hager Auditorium at 6pm. Dr. Bruce Gourley will present. He is the founder and editor of Yellowstone History Journal, the first journal devoted exclusively to the history of Yellowstone, and the author of eight history books. The event is

open to the public.

Amid economic boom times that produced great wealth inequality, on the cusp of the Great
Depression the future of Yellowstone remained murky. Historically a tourist destination for persons of wealth, the coming of age of the

automobile placed Yellowstone within reach of many middle-class families. Even so, the great red doors of Old Faithful Inn remained closed to all except paying lodgers, while the park's roads were not yet paved. Some powerful voices yet envisioned Yellowstone as a European-like luxury resort; other, newer voices called for the primacy of nature. Even as wolves disappeared, victims of antipredatory administrative policies, and bears begged food from tourists and gorged on human food in park service bear feeding grounds as spectators watched from nearby log benches, a few forward-thinkers cautiously questioned the damage done by unnatural management of wildlife.

At this critical moment in Yellowstone's history America was suddenly plunged into the greatest economic downturn in the nation's history. The volume is the story of how the Yellowstone we know today paradoxically emerged during the catastrophe of Great

Depression. Many of the pillars of 21st-century Yellowstone – including professional ranger naturalists, scientifically-based decision-making, holistic ecosystem management, interpretive museums, visitor accessibility, visitor infrastructure, marketing practices and modern tourism – trace their beginnings to the most unlikeliest of eras in American history.

In 1989, the Tinsley House was relocated to Museum of the Rockies, and the history of Montana's homesteading era was recreated at MOR's **Living History Farm**, closing for

the summer season on Sunday, September 8th. Skilled

## MSU celebrates beginning of work to repurpose Romney Hall with public event

Montana State University will welcome students, staff, faculty, alumni, community members and special guests to an event celebrating the beginning of work to repurpose the university's iconic **Romney Hall**.

The kick-off event will take place from 3–5pm on Friday, September 6th, at the Romney Oval on campus and will include remarks from MSU representatives and

state government. The event will end with a reception.

During its 2019 session, the Montana Legislature and Governor Steve Bullock approved \$25 million in state funds and authority to use \$7 million in other funds for the repurposing of Romney Hall, a project MSU had sought legislative funding for since 2010. The work inside Romney – which was constructed in 1922 as MSU's original

state-funded physical education building — will transform it from a space with four classrooms seating only 141 students at a time to a modern academic facility with 19 classrooms seating 1,000 students. Included in the work will be space for new centers for veterans, disabilities services, math and writing — high-impact programs with a demonstrated record of helping students stay in school and graduate.

Speakers at the event will include MSU

President Waded Cruzado, Montana Lt. Gov. Mike Cooney, Associated Students of MSU president Taylor Blossom, MSU Veteran Services Director Joe Schumacher and others. A reception will follow the remarks at 4pm with refreshments and live music.



#### 55 male bison transferred from Yellowstone to Fort Peck Tribes

Partners celebrate historic step for bison conservation

Yellowstone National Park recently completed the first transfer of bison to the Assiniboine and Sioux Tribes of the Fort Peck Indian Reservation in Poplar,

Montana under the new **operational quarantine program**. Fifty-five male bison completed Phases I & II of the brucellosis quarantine protocol at Yellowstone and will finish assurance testing (Phase III) at Fort Peck (see information below for details about the protocol).

"The transfer of these bison is the culmination of years of work by the NPS, the Tribes, the State of Montana, and APHIS," said Superintendent Cam Sholly. "Quarantine is a critical component in bison management and the NPS is committed to expand and sustain this program."

"Yellowstone buffalo are important to Tribes because they are the genetically pure descendants of the buffalo our ancestors lived with," said Tribal Chairman Floyd Azure. "The return of the buffalo is a return of our culture. Fort Peck is committed to expanding quarantine and sharing these animals with other Tribes across the country."

The purpose of the quarantine program is to augment or establish new conservation and cultural herds of plains bison, enhance cultural and nutritional opportunities for Native Americans, and reduce shipments of Yellowstone bison to slaughter facilities. Since it is against Montana state law to move wild bison exposed to brucellosis anywhere except to meat processing

and research facilities within state, the quarantine program is critical to getting brucellosis-free animals out of Yellowstone and onto a larger landscape.

The bison that moved this week were captured at Stephens Creek in the northwest corner of Yellowstone National Park in March 2018. There are currently 3 males and 21 females still in the quarantine program at Stephens Creek, which were captured at the same time. Since the testing protocol is longer for females, the earliest that this group will complete Phase II is during 2021. The park intends to capture a new cohort of bison this winter to continue the quarantine program.

While this transfer is an excellent start, substantial work remains to continue building a sustainable quarantine program.

Background information about quarantine:

Quarantine was identified as a possible tactic for bison management back in 2001 when the Interagency Bison Management Plan (IBMP) was signed by the Secretaries of Interior and Agriculture and the Governor of Montana. The National Park Service formally pursued a quarantine program in 2014 by initiating a public planning process. The operational quarantine program was approved in May 2018.

The Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) and the Montana Department of Livestock (DOL) established the final structural specifications and biosecurity requirements for quarantine facilities in June 2017. The only facilities that currently

APHIS developed the quarantine protocols in October 2003 and validated them during 2005-2010. Quarantine has three phases:

 Phase I: Managers capture bison in or near the park during

meet those specifications are located at Stephens Creek in Yellowstone National Park, Corwin Springs in Montana, and the Fort Peck Reservation.

quarantine based on initial negative tests for brucellosis are isolated in double-fenced quarantine pastures and tested every 30-45 days until all

winter. Bison considered suitable for

bison test negative for two consecutive testing periods.

Phase II: Bison in these individual test groups undergo brucellosis testing by age and sex requirements described in the 2003 Brucellosis Eradication: Uniform Methods and Rules (APHIS 91–45–013) and are certified as brucellosis-free.

Phase III: Managers can transfer bison to other fenced pastures. In the new location, brucellosis tests are conducted at six and 12 months to provide additional assurance. Managers keep these bison separate from other animals at least until the 6-month test is completed. Thereafter, managers can release these bison on public or tribal lands for conservation and cultural purposes.

Since 1916, the National Park

The Fort Peck Reservation is home to two separate Native American nations, the Sioux and the Assimboine, each composed of numerous bands and divisions. The Reservation is located in the extreme northeast corner of Montana, on the north side of the Missouri River.

# MSU College of Agriculture and Extension to host horticulture events



The Montana State University College of Agriculture and MSU Extension will partner to host three horticulture-related workshops in September on the MSU campus, at the Bozeman Horticulture Farm and at the Gallatin County Extension Office.

The first event will be a 1.5-day **Turf to Trees workshop** focused

and the cost to attend is \$30 for the Sept. 10 session, \$100 for the Sept. 11 session or \$130 for both days.

On Sept. 14, MSU Extension will host a **home apple orchard workshop and cider tour** from 1 to 5pm at the MSU Horticulture Farm, 2730 W Garfield St. Katrina Mendrey of the Montana Agricultural Experiment Station's



on applied urban integrated pest management, which will feature Raymond Cloyd, a professor and horticultural entomology specialist at Kansas State University. MSU Extension hosted a similar event in 2017 that was well-received. Topics for the workshop will

include pest management for greenhouses, biocontrol options, tree-related pest management, insect diagnosis, weed identification and more. Tim Seipel, an MSU assistant research professor and plant ecologist in the land resources and environmental science department, and Eva Grimme, a plant disease diagnostician in the Schutter Diagnostic Laboratory in plant sciences and plant pathology, will also present during the workshop. Seipel and Grimme are also MSU Extension specialists. The sessions will run from noon to 3:15pm Sept. 10 and from 8am to 4pm on Sept. 11. Both will be held on the MSU campus in the Plant BioScience Building, Room 108.

Attendees of the Turf to Trees workshops will earn credit toward an Urban IPM Certification and can earn continuing education credits. Attendance is limited to 35, Western Agricultural Research
Center will share information for
people interested in growing their
own apple trees, along with MSU
Plant Growth Center manager
David Baumbauer and assistant
professor and small farms
specialist Mac Burgess. The
workshop will end with a tour and
cider tasting of Lockhorn Cider in
Downtown Bozeman. This event
has a limit of 35 attendees.
The third event will be an

apple preservation class hosted by MSU Extension nutrition specialist Brianna Routh at the Gallatin County Extension Office, 903 N Black Ave. The class will focus on safely preparing apples for canning and preservation, and attendees with gain hands-on practice by making their own apple butter. The class is limited to 25 participants and attendance cost is \$5.

#### Venture to the Antarctic w/ Audubon talk

Sacajawea Audubon Society will host researcher and wildlife biologist **John Carlson** for a public talk centered on his extensive studies of the Antarctic region. The presentation will take place on a special Thursday night, September 12th at Hope Lutheran Church, located at 2152 W Graf in Bozeman. The evening begins with a social at 6:30pm, followed by the program at 7pm. *Please note the date change from the usual second Monday*.

Carlson will share photographs and stories from 25 years of travels to the southern oceans, Sub-Antarctic islands, and the Antarctic Peninsula. His discussion will range from penguin biology and biological inventories, to tourism and climate change in Antarctica and the Sub-Antarctic islands of South Georgia and the Falklands. The information presented will be a combination of personal anecdotes, research findings,

and direct observations of these overwhelmingly wild places. The trajectory of his presentation will follow a route of a typical ship based tour to the Antarctic Peninsula with be illustrated with photos he has taken along the way.

Carlson first set foot in Antarctica in 1994 as a general laborer at Palmer Station. He's spent the last 25 years figuring out ways to continue to return. This has included stints researching Adelie Penguins at two locations on the Peninsula, conducting biological inventories throughout the peninsula, and as a guide/naturalist on many expeditions to Antarctica as well as South Georgia and the Falklands. When he isn't traveling south, he's a Wildlife Biologist for the Bureau of Land Management in Billings. His main duties are now centered on Greater Sage-Grouse management.

Born and raised in northeastern

Montana, Carlson has had a strong interest in wildlife in general, and birds specifically, for as long as he can remember. He obtained his BA in Zoology from the University of Montana and MS in Zoology and Physiology from the University of Wyoming. In addition to his Antarctic work, he has conducted research on a wide variety of animal species from one end of the world to another, including seabird research in the Bering Sea, and northern Baffin Bay.

Sacajawea Audubon Society programs are free and open to the public. The events feature a special guest speaker the second Monday of each month, September through May, at Hope Lutheran. The organization's mission is to build on an interest in birds to promote the conservation of our natural environment through enjoyment, education and action. 

## Kopriva lecture will focus on how gut bacteria change over time

Doctoral student Jonathan Martinson will give a free public lecture about changes in the microbiome of the human digestive system at Montana State University on Tuesday, September 3rd. Martinson, a doctoral candidate

in the Department of Microbiology and Immunology and the recipient of a Kopriva Graduate Fellowship, will present "How Does Your **Gut Microbiome Change** 

Through Time? at 5:15pm in the Byker Auditorium in the Chemistry and Biochemistry Building. A reception will follow.

Over the past two decades, tremendous progress has been made in identifying the microbial species that inhabit the human gut, as well as their overall effect on

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human health. However, little is known about how the gut microbiome varies over time and what factors precipitate changes to bacterial strains.

To address this knowledge gap, Martinson collaborated in a research project in associate professor Seth Walk's MSU laboratory that analyzed stool samples from eight healthy adults over two years. He examined bacteria belonging to the Enterobacteriaceae family, which reside in virtually all people. By investigating the factors that allow Enterobacteriaceae strains to reside in the human gut for long periods, Martinson hopes to improve microbiome-directed therapies.

Martinson's lecture is presented by the Kopriva Science

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Seminar Series, which is funded through an endowment created by Phil Kopriva, a 1957 microbiology graduate from MSU who died in 2002. Kopriva also created an endowment to fund the Kopriva Graduate Fellowship Program, which provides support and opportunities for graduate students in the College of Letters and Science, particularly in the biomedical sciences. The series features seminars by MSU graduate students, faculty members and guest speakers.

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## KGLT expands listening area with Big Sky translator

The studios of **KGLT** are tucked into the third floor of Montana State University's Strand Union Building, but the station's growing reach extends well beyond campus.

In the last few years, the station brought in new listeners in the Big Timber area and strengthened its signal around Helena. This summer, the station expanded to Big Sky.

"At KGLT, we're primarily focused on delivering this alternative, free-format radio to our listeners," said KGLT General Manager Craig Clark. "We want to provide as much access as possible."

A new translator in Big Sky has

been on the station's wish list for years. Service in the area was spotty and depended on how the main signal broadcasting from near Logan bounced through Gallatin Canyon. But at the end of July, KGLT installed the new translator on Andesite Mountain, near the top of Big Sky Resort's Ramcharger and Thunder Wolf lifts. The 20-

watt translator broadcasts, like the main KGLT transmitter, at 91.9 FM. The signal is fed over the internet to a facility at the top of the mountain, where it is translated into radio waves that cover Big Sky Town Center and Meadow Village.

Clark said an informal car radio test of the new signal showed drastically improved reception. And though mountainous topography still cuts off the signal in some areas, Clark said he was satisfied the translator would open up a new community of listeners.

"We're providing more opportunities for people to listen wherever they go in the Gallatin County and eager to make connections in the Big Sky community," he said.

KGLT has been working to acquire a translator in the area for about a year and a half, spearheaded by former station manager Ellen King-Rogers. Aside from the costs of equipment, frequencies are only available by license through the Federal Communications Commission and infrequently. The

station was able to secure a license, then applied for a permit to change the frequency to 91.9 FM.

"It's rare to have a translator at the same frequency," Clark said, adding that it will help create seamless listening for those commuting between Big Sky and Bozeman.

Ron Craighead, marketing and underwriting director for the station, sees potential for creating greater connection between Bozeman and Big Sky over the airwaves. He and Clark are looking into partnerships with existing underwriters in Big Sky as well as ways to represent area nonprofit organizations through the station's public service announcements.

"We're just excited to welcome Big Sky into the KGLT family and look forward to serving the Big Sky community," Craighead said.

KGLT began as a student station in 1968 and is still a program of the Associated Students of Montana State University. The station's DJs include students, faculty and staff of the university as well as community

members. Students also fill roles in production and support staff, such as the chief announcer and assistant music director.

"ASMSU is proud to support KGLT, our community radio station," said Sophia Elias, ASMSU vice president. "We're thrilled the





#### Dishwashers, unite! Hometown heroes front back-to-back Pine Creek shows

Bozeman-born progressive bluegrass outfit Kitchen Dwellers are returning to their home state ahead of a national tour in support of their anticipated new

album, Muir Maid. In the near decade they've been together, the four-piece - comprised

of Joe Funk (bass), Shawn Swain (mandolin), Torrin Daniels (banjo) and Max Davies (guitar) – has performed for thousands at Red Rocks, shared bills with the likes of Railroad Earth, The Infamous Stringdusters and

Twiddle, and graced festival stages from Northwest String Summit to WinterWonderGrass. The group has transcended traditional genre boundaries, blending virtuosic bluegrass wizardry with ecstatic rock and roll energy and adventurous psychedelia. With Muir Maid, the group has come fully into their own, seamlessly blending the past, present and future of string band music to create their most daring and

**Rolling Zone:** With the band rooted in Bozeman, Kitchen Dwellers are rightfully kicking off their fall tour right here in Southwest Montana. How do you guys feel about kicking off a national tour from your home base?





Anyone familiar with Scanlan and frequent collaborator Jon Neufeld's unique alchemy on stage will not be surprised by the sense of being taken into the moment – their shows are in themselves a journey of improvisation; the way Neufeld's brilliant innovative guitar playing weaves effortlessly around Scanlan's timeless songwriting is simply magical. This magical alchemy is at play throughout *The River and the Light*, released last fall. The album presents some of her finest writing yet, and what has earned her the loyal cult

following that seems to be steadily growing in spite of, or perhaps because of, her tendency to spend time off the grid rather than on it.

Neufeld's production on the album, his ability to add layers and depth while maintaining the raw vulnerability of everything happening in the moment, is masterful. The addition of haunting old time fiddles and Cajun accordion of celebrated roots musician Dirk Powell and Black Prairie's Annalisa Tornfelt seem to invoke something ancient, something deep in the American psyche in songs that are already layered with the complexity of belonging; this is not only a journey of the soul but a journey of the times we are living in.





#### BOBCATS POISED TO REJOIN THE RANKS OF THE NATION'S ELITE - 2019 BOBCAT PREVIEW

In 2018, the Montana State football team enjoyed their most successful season under current head coach Jeff Choate, but they ended the year hungry for more and enter 2019 with

**2018 Recap** The 2018 season kicked off under the lights on a beautiful August night versus an experienced Western Illinois squad out of the Missouri Valley Conference in MSU's annual Gold Rush game. Head coach Jeff Choate had been hyping the game all offseason as a test to see how his 'Cats stood up against a talented team out of one of the most powerful

Montana State was breaking in a new starting quarterback in sophomore Troy Andersen who had moved from running back to under center after previous starter Chris Murray was ruled ineligible for the 2018 campaign. As expected, the Bobcats got off to a slow start, falling behind by a touchdown at the break, but they would come roaring back in the second half to steal a hard-fought opening night victory, and the season

was under way. Over the course of the next two months, the Bobcat season ebbed and flowed from impressive victories to headscratching defeats, and as the calendar turned to November, MSU's record sat at 4-4, and Bobcats appeared poised to extend their streak of no postseason play to four years.

But in a blink of an eye, the season flipped. The Bobcats suddenly caught fire, reeling off three consecutive victories, including their third in a row over the rival Montana Grizzlies in one of the most exciting and

With the coaching staff retooled and a number of key players returning on both the offensive and defensive sides of the ball, the Montana State Bobcats should be right in the thick of a heated race for the Big Sky Conference title in 2019. The Big Sky Conference was one of the toughest conferences in the nation last season, a year in which four members were invited to the postseason, and one, Eastern Washington, made it all the way to the national championship game.

The league should be just as competitive again in 2019 with several stars returning for co-league champions Weber State, Eastern Washington and UC-Davis, which returns preseason First Team All-American quarterback Jake Maier, who guided UC-Davis to their first FCS quarterfinal berth in program history.

With all of the talent returning, MSU could only muster a preseason prediction of a fourth-place finish in the league, but the Bobcats returned to the preseason FCS poll, earning a No. 14 prediction in the Hero Sports preseason poll. But predictions are just that, and with a talented pool of players of their own, including Mr. Do

balanced offense in 2019 after three straight seasons of run-heavy, smashmouth football. Not that the Bobcats will get away from their bread and butter after boasting one of the most successful running games

in the conference the past three years, but with a more prototypical quarterback under center this season, expect the 'Cats to fling it around more than they have

The Bobcats will start their fourth different quarterback to open the season after Troy Andersen switched to the defensive side of the ball. Physical specimen, Casey Bauman, a 6'7, 230 lb. behemoth will assume the reins of the Bobcat offense

after beating out Tucker Rovig in a tightly contested competition during Fall Camp. Bauman, a redshirt freshman, has seen

very little action since arriving in Bozeman, but he boasts the physical tools to make the Bobcats more dynamic on offense, with a cannon arm and more than adequate speed. In his senior season of high school, Bauman threw for 27 touchdowns and ran for another 15 more. Although he doesn't bring a lot of experience, he has several weapons around him to take the pressure off his shoulders, starting at the running back position. MSU returns one of the most

electrifying rushers in the league in sophomore Isaiah Ifanse, who recorded one of the most successful freshman seasons in Bobcat history. As a freshman, Ifanse ran for 1025 yards and seven touchdowns, while adding another 106 vards receiving and one touchdown. But as successful as Ifanse was, he's not

the most dangerous ballcarrier the Bobcats boast. That title belongs to junior Troy Andersen. Last season, Andersen rushed for 1,412 yards and 21 scores from the quarterback position. And although he has switched to linebacker entering the 2019 campaign, head coach Jeff Choate has made it known that Andersen will still have a role on offense as well.

On the outside, the Bobcats return ultra-productive receiver Kevin Kassis, the 'Cats leading pass-catcher from a year ago. In 2018, Kassis hauled in 55 passes for 663 vards and three touchdowns. Travis Jonsen switched from quarterback to receiver last season and ended the year on a high note after posting a 100-yard receiving game versus the Grizzlies; he is one of the most explosive athletes on the Bobcat roster and

should see more balls coming his way this season. The Bobcats will also be looking to get more production out of fellow receiver Lance McCutcheon, who is primed for a breakout season.

The offensive line should be strong once again, anchored by senior Mitch



Brott and fellow returnees Lewis Kidd and Taylor Tuiasosopo.

#### **Defense**

With the return of Kane Ioane as defensive coordinator, the Bobcats are hoping to return to their glory days of early 2000s when MSU boasted one of the stingiest defenses in the country. Fortunately for Ioane, he has some studs to make the dream become a reality.

On the defensive line, MSU welcomes Jason Scrempos, a 6'6 299 lb. transfer from the University of Washington. He could partner with fellow Washington transfers Bryce Sterk and Amandre Williams to form a formidable front for the Bobcat defense. Sterk was one of the most productive defensive players in the league last season, and Williams brings FBS ability to the defensive line as well.

Bobcats strongest position group with the return of Josh Hill from an injury-filled 2018 season, as well as the transition of Troy Andersen to the position he was originally recruited to fill. Chad Kanow and Michael Johman also add experience

to the middle of the Bobcat defense, and several younger players are eager to prove themselves at the position

Linebacker could just as easily be the

The back end of the Bobcat defense should be a strength as well. Greg Filer III, Brayden Konkol, Jojo Henderson and Jahque Alleyne all return to anchor the Bobcat secondary. Alleyne led the team in interceptions last season. Tyrel Thomas is also back after making big

seasons in Bozeman.

#### **Special Teams**

Tristan Bailey returns to handle the kicking duties after making 14 of 19 attempts, including a 50-yarder in the Bobcats' season-opening victory over Western Illinois. He will be aided in the kicking game by the return of punter Jerod Padmos. Padmos earned Second Team All-Big Sky in 2017 after averaging 42.5 yards per punt.

The Bobcats got a taste of success in the postseason for the first time under Choate last season, their first tangible proof that his blueprint for the program is coming to fruition, and as they say, success breeds success. With that kind of optimism, Bobcat fans should expect big things from the 'Cats in 2019. •







recovered, he was diagnosed with testicular cancer and underwent chemotherapy along with his physical rehabilitation.

It's something of a mystery as to why some people survive these trials and others may be destroyed. But the film is far from a onedimensional glorification of a survivor. Garcia's background is fascinating and complex. Charged is a survival story built on the foundations of love and forgiveness, but it is about more than just surviving. It is about building stronger relationships and a better life after tragedy. It is about finding your best self so you can live life fully charged.
