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Record Store Day Drops #3 is Saturday, Oct. 24th!

As those who have been following the Record Store Day news know, the 2020 Record Store Day celebration (like most events) was cancelled due to Covid-19. Still, something had to be done to get titles from the list of limited-edition vinyl and CD releases into the hands of music lovers' hands. And with the economic uncertainties that has accompanied Covid, Record Store Day's goal of supporting independent Record Stores might be more important than ever.

To do this, while maintaining social distancing standards, the fine folks at Record Store Day divided the list of these releases into 3, and scheduled 3 "Drops" dates on which 1/3 of the releases were scheduled to be released over the course of 3 dates during the months of August, September and October.

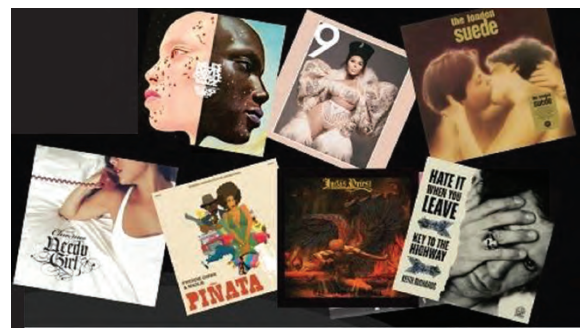
October's **Record Store Day Drops** is Saturday October 24th.

Releases for October come from the Allman Brothers, Beck, Blitzen Trapper, Booker T and the MGs, Neal Casal, Johnny Cash, Clutch, Alice Cooper, The Dandy Warhols, Miles Davis, Eminem, Freddie Gibbs with Madlib, Dexter Gordon, The Grateful Dead, Judas Priest, Bob Mould, The Rolling Stones, Tony Joe White, Young Fresh Fellows, Frank Zappa and a slew of others. A complete list of these can be found at www.recordstoreday.com.

Cactus Records will be offering limited quantities of most of these while following strict social distancing guidelines. The number of customers allowed in the store will be limited to 12 at a time, and a 10-minute shopping limit will be enforced when there is a line of customers outside. Cactus also requests that customers do their best to maintain a 6-foot distance between one another, both in the line

outside and while inside the store. Following these social distancing measures worked really well for the August Drops date (September's Drops hadn't happened yet as of this writing, but the same is expected), so don't be too concerned about the line or the opportunity to get the many of the titles you're looking for, or – most importantly – risking your health.

KVGM 95.9 FM Radio will be broadcasting live from within the store, and a limited quantity of refreshments from Dean's Zesty Booch will be available. Absent from this year's Record Store Day celebrations are the live music, free beer, and other celebratory aspects typically associated with the day, but the spirit of independent record



stores and getting great music to their customers remains.

Cactus Records & Gifts, located at 29 W. Main St. in Downtown Bozeman, will open their doors at 9am (as they do every Saturday) and look forward to seeing everyone. •

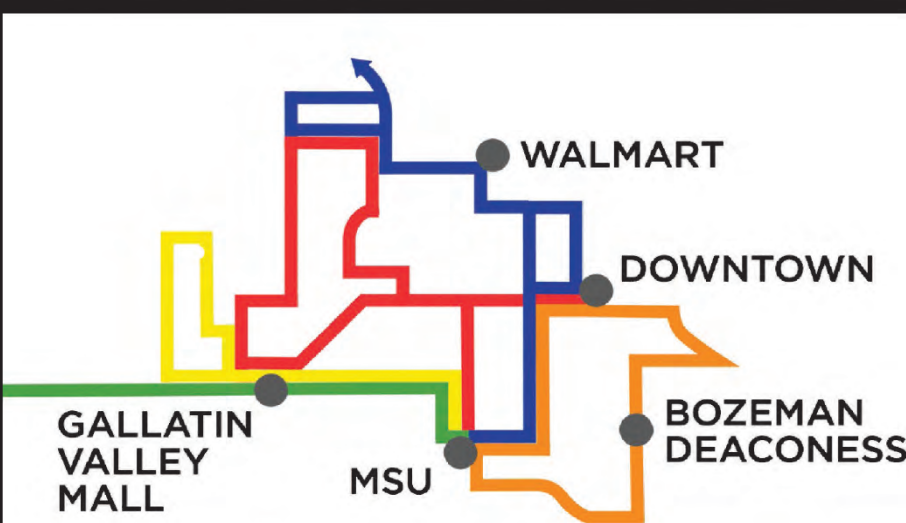

Book review: My Own Words by RBG

Please and Thank You.

Those were The Magic Words you learned at your mother's knee, the ones that opened doors and gained favors. That was also when you learned something important, as you'll see in *My Own Words* by Ruth Bader Ginsburg (with Mary Hartnett and Wendy W. Williams): letters, when properly collected, can move mountains.

Born in working-class Brooklyn in 1933, Joan Ruth Bader was her parents' second daughter; sadly, their eldest died of meningitis just fourteen months later.

Theirs was a close-knit neighborhood, and the family had many of the luxuries of the day. Bader attended public school a block from her home; there, because of other girls in her class who shared her first name, she started using her middle name "for more official purposes." She was raised to be independent and was an avid reader, a notably talented storyteller, and she loved gymnastics but "was not... especially fond of math." And since she grew up in the shadow of World War II and was Jewish, she was fully aware of anti-Semitism.

Even as a child, in fact, young Bader chafed at inequality and "hypocritical rules." She was also eloquent in her writing and was first published (in a Jewish Center newsletter) at age 13. Her leadership skills apparent, she entered Cornell University the fall after graduation from high school; there, she was greatly influenced by two teachers, novelist and European lit professor Vladimir Nabokov, and constitutional scholar Robert E. Cushman. The latter man "encouraged Ruth to go to law school."

In mid-2003, co-authors Williams and Hartnett approached Bader Ginsburg and

pointed out that it was time for her to tell her story, before someone else did. She had known both Williams and Hartnett for years through mutual interests and similar work, so "Without hesitation, I said yes to their proposal."

In her preface, author and Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg says that *My Own Words* was meant to be written after a planned biography but her co-authors "thought it best" to wait on the biography until her "Court years neared completion." They "flipped the projected publication order..."

You might wish they hadn't.

You'll hang onto every word of Ginsburg's life story. It's everything you'd expect from her, and it surely won't disappoint readers. What will, though, is that *My Own Words* aren't always her own words. Yes, you'll read transcripts of speeches by Ginsburg, legal briefs, bench announcements, introductions, and wisdom inside law review articles. Yes, you'll see her fierce strength in that which she firmly believed. But a good amount of this book consists of various-length essays, speeches, and articles written by others about Ginsburg, including things written by her co-authors. That could be a disappointment; the written speeches and judgments are okay, but a biography...? Wait for it.

This Is. Not. A bad book. It's just not what you might expect, so be warned. If you want more biography, fewer essays, be patient; it's likely to be coming. In the meantime, *My Own Words* will please you.

MOR houses fall exhibits of the wild & wondrous

With the autumnal equinox behind us, Museum of the Rockies is giving members and visitors reason to head inside with a pair of new exhibits.

Experience the natural world through the lens of famed photographer **Thomas D. Mangelsen** with *A Life in the Wild*. Now open, the showcase takes viewers on a journey into the haunts of iconic species whose struggles for survival are metaphorical fulcrums for reflection in the 21st century.

Every single image in Mangelsen's portfolio has been taken in the wild under natural conditions; the result of him waiting for the "picture perfect moment" across decades and often in hostile conditions. Such a body of work can only be achieved by having a heightened sense of animal behavior, an uncanny feel for being able to read changing atmospherics in the environment, and patience.

The exhibition includes Mangelsen's 'Catch of the Day,' one of the most widely circulated wildlife photographs in history, showing the exact moment that a spawning salmon, trying to leap over a small waterfall along Alaska's

Brooks River, soars right into the awaiting jaws of a massive brown bear.

Opening October 3rd is *Seven Masters: 20th-Century Japanese Woodblock Prints*. As the once-isolated nation of Japan entered the 20th century and began to assimilate a new, Westernized culture, demand for certain traditional handicrafts fell off significantly — among them, the iconic woodblock prints known in the West as ukiyo-e. Publishers and artists slowed production and created fewer new designs. Yet what seemed at first to be the death-knell of a unique art form without parallel in the world turned out to be the dawning of another, as the path was cleared for a new kind of print: shin hanga.

Seven Masters focuses on as many artists who played a significant role in the development of the new



print, and whose works boldly exemplify the movement. The exhibition features the spectacular beauty portraits of the artists Hashiguchi Goyo (1880-1921), Ito Shinsui (1898-1972), Yamakawa Shuho (1898-1944), and Torii Kotondo (1900-1976); striking images of kabuki actors by Yamamura Koka (Toyonari) (1886-1942) and Natori Shunsen (1886-1960); as well as the evocative landscapes of Kawase Hasui (1883-1957).

Also at MOR, Taylor

Planetarium continues to host showings in a limited capacity.

Sunstruck and *Flight Adventures* are now playing multiple times daily.

Displayed on a 40-foot dome, this state of the art projection system allows visitors to experience our universe and world in vivid colors, dramatic motion and brilliant displays of light.

Taylor Planetarium shows are included with Museum admission. Seating is limited and available on a first-come, first-served basis.

Finally, get in the fall spirit with MOR's **Chilling Campfire Tours**. The outdoor live show incorporates storytelling and sculpture to bring Montana's darker history and folklore to life. The 45-minute, size-limited tours will take place October 17th, 23rd and 24th from 6-8:45pm. Member cost is \$12 for adults and \$8 for

kids, or \$14/\$10 for the public. Recommended for those age 7 and up. Face-coverings required. Tours are weather dependent.

Please note: Because admittance is limited, MOR encourages visitors to make advance reservations. Walk-ins admitted if availability allows. Face-coverings are required for entry into the Museum and Planetarium.

Familial connection, responsibility highlight new BFS titles

Large gatherings are still on hold for the time being, but Bozeman

Film Society continues to virtually stream independent titles for cinephiles. Watch safely at home with new films added weekly. Streaming sales directly support BFS. Here's a look at a few autumn options.

Polish dramedy *From the Vine* is available through October 8th. A downtrodden CEO (Joe Pantoliano) experiences a moral crisis and travels back to Italy to re-calibrate his moral compass. He discovers new life by reviving his grandfather's old vineyard, and tries to reconnect with his wife and daughter. Adapted from Ken Cancellara's novel, *Finding Marco*, Sean Cisterna directs a screenplay by Willem Wennekers. *From the Vine* is Not Rated with a runtime of 94 minutes.

Another title available through Oct. 8th, critically acclaimed *Song Without a Name* takes viewers into the Peruvian conflict of the late 1980s. Based on harrowing true events, the film tells the story of Georgina, an indigenous Andean woman whose newborn baby is whisked away moments after its birth in a downtown Lima clinic — and never returned. Stonewalled by a byzantine and indifferent legal system, Georgina approaches journalist Pedro Campas, who uncovers a web of fake clinics and abductions — suggesting a rotting corruption deep within Peruvian society.

Set in 1988, in a Peru wracked by political violence and turmoil, director Melina León's heart-wrenching first feature renders Georgina's story in gorgeous, shad-

owy black-and-white cinematography, "styled like the most beautiful of bad dreams" —

Variety. The originally titled *Canción sin nombre* is Not Rated with a runtime of 97 minutes.

American drama *The Artist's Wife* will be available October 2nd through October 15th. Claire (Lena Olin) lives a domestic life in the Hamptons as the wife of celebrated artist Richard Smythson (Bruce Dern). Once a promising painter herself, Claire now lives in the shadow of her husband's illustrious career. While preparing work for his final show, Richard's moods become increasingly erratic, and he is diagnosed with dementia. As his memory and behavior deteriorate, she shields his condition from the art community while trying to reconnect him with his estranged daughter and grandson from a previous marriage. Challenged by the loss of her world as she knew it, Claire must now decide whether to stand with Richard on the sidelines or step into the spotlight herself. Directed by Tom Dolby (*Last Weekend*), executive producer of *Call Me by Your Name*, *The Artist's Wife* runs 94 minutes and is Rated R.

Cost and rental period vary per title. Public film screenings at the Ellen will resume when large gatherings can be safely scheduled. Stay tuned for details.

Bozeman Symphony announces plans for new season

The Bozeman Symphony announces important changes to its much anticipated **53rd concert season** with new Music Director Norman Huynh. As the Coronavirus pandemic evolves, the Symphony's Covid-19 Task Force has continued to monitor information and guidelines made available at the local, state, and national levels. With the health and well-being of the Symphony's entire community at the forefront, the organization will postpone the fall season. It remains the Symphony's intention to present six concert programs during the spring and summer of 2021, with repertoire modifications to what has been announced previously.

As part of the initial response to the pandemic, the Bozeman Symphony formed a Task Force consisting of administrative staff, board members, community representation, and musicians. The Task Force has been exploring a variety of strategies and alternative venues that would allow for the safe continuation of live performances throughout 2020-2021 with musician and audience safety a top priority. In navigating the pandemic, the Symphony engaged with hundreds of individuals who participated in an audience survey providing critical insights related to performance expectations for the remainder of this year. From the survey, two main themes emerged: patrons' willingness to support the Symphony, despite what performance offerings may look like, and the safety and

health of the musicians.

"Bozeman is an exceptional community that loves the arts and loves their Symphony. The community is ensuring the vitality of the orchestra and choir, which is incredibly motivating during this difficult and surreal time. It challenges us to be innovators, to reinvent in a multitude of ways what the concert experience will look like now and in the future," said Emily Paris-Martin, Executive Director.

The Symphony was set to begin the 2020-2021 season in September; however, the challenges and realities of how to make this possible have been overwhelming. Studies about performance during the pandemic are available worldwide, primarily focused on musician safety and aerosol spread through instruments in the orchestra. Along with these studies, considerations related to stage size, capacity, audience safety, and input from the Gallatin County Health Department and community partners are the driving forces in the decision to postpone the fall season.

Principal Flute and Covid-19 Task Force member Sue Makeever is eager to play with her fellow musicians once again. However, Sue wants assurances for the safety of the musicians and patrons. "The Symphony Board, staff, and musicians are saddened to make the difficult decision to postpone the fall season. Trying to manage a concert where orchestra members and audience come together is just not practical at this time," said Makeever.

"Thank you for your patience as we work through this process. We look forward to making music again and seeing our wonderful donors and supporters."

Throughout the fall, the Symphony will provide additional forms of entertainment such as Music Director Norman Huynh's new Vlog series about his adventures in Bozeman (available on the Symphony's YouTube and social media channels) along with digital content featuring the lives of the musicians outside the concert hall and much more. Under new artistic leadership, Board Chair Stephen Schachman shares, "Norman is an exceptional talent and we are fortunate to have someone of his level of expertise help forge the future of the Bozeman Symphony." This holds especially true as the Bozeman Symphony finds itself in a position to offer its artists and audiences a much-needed source of inspiration, optimism, and artistic leadership in navigating Covid-19.

The Symphony wishes to thank David Ross and Risi for their season sponsorship and the season subscribers, donors, and patrons who have provided support through this transition. The Bozeman Symphony is fully committed to serving its community and believes music will move us forward.

For its season opener, enjoy **The Very Best of John Prine** on Saturday, October 3rd. The requiem showcases Prine’s signature wit and wisdom, detailing the stories behind the songs and includes a never-before-aired 1987 performance of his classic “Sam Stone.” Prine’s singular talent was revered by generations of songwriters and the retrospective will feature a heartfelt introduction recorded by Americana star Jason Isbell. The episode airs at 10:10pm.

English country soul artist **Yola** follows on Saturday, October 10th. She will showcase the Grammy-nom-

inated album *Walk Through Fire* in her debut appearance. The episode airs at 11pm.

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HRDC’s Fork & Spoon struggling amid pandemic

HRDC’s **Fork & Spoon** – Montana’s only pay-what-you-can restaurant – continues to serve Bozeman, providing take-out meals Sunday through Friday from 5pm to 7pm. In the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, the restaurant halted asking for donations at the door on its eighty to 100 meals served each night, since most patrons were unable to contribute anything for their meal.

Fork & Spoon is a vital part of HRDC’s response to address hunger in the area. Last week, the restaurant served 530 meals or roughly 90 people each night. About a quarter of these meals go



toward feeding individuals in

HRDC emergency housing. Since March, Fork & Spoon has served just over 11,500 free meals to community members experiencing hunger.

Adding to Fork & Spoon’s

challenges, the restaurant’s catering

enterprise has experienced cancellations and a slow-down of profitable business. Before the COVID-19 outbreak, Fork & Spoon Catering was often booked, with proceeds helping to offset the cost of providing free meals at the restaurant. Fork & Spoon now estimates they will lose at least 75,000 dollars or more in gross catering revenue. That number does not account for previously anticipated growth. Moreover, giving is down at Fork & Spoon. Community members are encouraged to support Fork & Spoon by grabbing a meal from the restaurant and paying it forward or by making a donation.

“Prior to the global pandemic, we were serving about the same number of people, but we had a variety of patrons, including folks who were paying it forward. Now, the vast majority of community



members we are serving are in need of a free meal. We simply are not seeing the same number of customers who have the capacity to pay. We are still here to feed our community. Those in need of a meal and those with the ability to pay are welcome to come to Fork & Spoon,” says Rick Hilles, Fork & Spoon’s Program Manager.

Bear spray: carry it, know how to use it

The Interagency Grizzly Bear Committee recommends the use of **bear spray** and urges hunters to learn other **bear-aware safety measures**.

Hunters in bear country need to:

- Stay alert and look for bear sign

- Carry bear spray and know how to use it
- Hunt with a partner, leave detailed plans with someone and check-in periodically
- Pay attention to fresh bear sign. Look for bear tracks, scat, and concentrations of natural foods
- Use caution when hunting areas that have evidence of bear activity or areas with scavenging birds such as magpies, ravens, or crows

Most grizzly bears will leave an area if they sense human presence. Hunters who observe a grizzly bear or suspect a bear is nearby should leave the area. If you do encounter a grizzly, stay calm, don’t run, and assess the situation by trying to determine if the bear is actually aware of you. Is it, for instance, threatening or fleeing? Always keep the bear in sight as you back away, and leave the area.

Here are some guidelines for using bear spray:

When to use bear spray

- Bear spray should be used as a deterrent only in an aggressive or attacking confrontation with a bear

How to use bear spray

- Each person should carry a can of bear spray
- Only purchase bear spray that is registered by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)
- Use the EPA-registered bear spray in accordance with its label instructions
- If a bear is moving toward you from a distance of 30-60 feet, direct the spray downward toward the front of the bear so that the bear spray billows up and creates a cloud that acts as a

barrier between you and the bear

- If the bear is within 30 feet spray continuously at the front of the bear until it breaks off its charge
- Spray additional bursts if the bear continues toward you. Sometimes just the noise of the spray and the appearance of the spray cloud is enough to deter a bear from continuing its charge
- Spray additional bursts if the bear makes additional charges
- A full canister of bear spray is essential for bear encounters. Consider carrying 2 cans
- The expiration date on the spray should be checked annually

Selecting a bear spray

Purchase products that are clearly labeled “for deterring attacks by bears,” and that are registered with the Environmental Protection

Agency.

No deterrent is 100 percent effective, but compared to all others, including firearms, bear spray has demonstrated success in a variety of situations in fending off threatening and attacking bears and preventing injury to the person and animal involved.

Election Day but a month away – make a plan to vote!

It’s now only weeks away and the stakes have never been higher – no, really. Another **Election Day** is almost here, and even though they say it every cycle, this one is proving to be the most crucial.

Decisions made on November 3rd will determine the course of our country long after the terms of featured candidates expire, up and down the ballot. Gone are the days of political off-seasons, but now is not the time to let, albeit justifiable fatigue keep Montanans from fulfilling the civic right and responsibility to cast their vote.

Everything looks different post-COVID, including the upcoming election. In early August, Governor Steve Bullock directed the expansion of voting by mail and early voting, still requiring in-person voting opportunities whether or not counties opt for increased mail ballots.

“I am in agreement with our bipartisan election administrators – who are the ones on the ground with the first-hand knowledge of how to successfully conduct an election – that we must protect Montanans’ right to vote, while protecting the public’s health,” he said. “Locally elected officials best understand the voting needs of their communities, and taking this action now ensures they will have time to make the right decisions for their localities. With this approach we can protect that fundamental right to vote, while easing crowding and pressure on voting on Election Day.”

Numerous Montana counties, including Gallatin and Park, have since announced their plans to hold mail-ballot elections for the coming general contest. These and other participating counties hope to replicate the success of their June primary elections, which were conducted by mail statewide and saw record turnout.

Voting procedure has always differed from state to state, county to county, but having to constantly improvise our daily lives has made it difficult to keep everything straight. This digest is meant to clear up any lingering confusion about how local voters can ensure their tallies are accounted for come Election Day.

New Voter Registration

An active electorate is fundamental to any democracy. This body of citizens decides who runs things and how they’re run, in the

Registration & Voter Status

If you’re not sure about the status of your voter record, log on to votinginmontana.com and click ‘My Voter Page’ to be rerouted to the Montana Secretary of State’s voter information service. Enter your first and last name with date of birth for registration status, whether you’re an active or inactive voter, sample ballots (available 30 days before

Special Events Center (220 Spooner Rd.) and River Rock Community Center (101 River Rock), the Gallatin Gateway Community Center (145 Mill St.), Manhattan Christian High School (8000 Churchill Rd.), and Bridger Canyon Fire Station (8081 Bridger Canyon) in Bozeman.

These receptacles are as secure as any mailbox, but exclusive to ballots. Please note: Excluding the Gallatin County Election Dept., the above locations are for ballot drop-off only and will not accommodate in-person voting or voter registration.

In-Person Voting & Satellite Offices

Those who wish to vote in person will still be able to do so at the county election department, which expands office hours to 7am–8pm on Election Day. Additionally, plans for date-specific satellite offices in communities around the county have been announced.

These sites will offer access to registration services and voting in person, all from 9am–6pm: City of Belgrade Office (91 E Central) from October 7–8, Three Forks Library (607 S Main) from Oct. 13–14, Town of Manhattan Municipal Offices (207 S Sixth) from Oct. 15–16, Town of West Yellowstone Offices (440 Yellowstone Ave.) from Oct. 20–21, Big Sky Water & Sewer District Office (561 Little Coyote Rd.) from Oct. 22–23, and Campus of Montana State University (West side lobby, Brick Breeden Fieldhouse) from Oct. 27–30.

Excluding the MSU Campus location, this mobile configuration will operate out of an administrative trailer found in the parking lots of listed locations. Public health protocols will be enforced at all official election sites.

Election Service Opportunities

All eyes are on the fast approaching general election and our county offices may need some extra hands. Serve as an election judge to be a part of the process! The State of Montana conducts fair, secure elections with the help of these individuals who staff polling places and counting centers. Those interested must be registered voters 18 years of age or older and residents of the county for which they will serve. Visit sosmt.gov/elections/judge or contact your county election administrator for additional information.

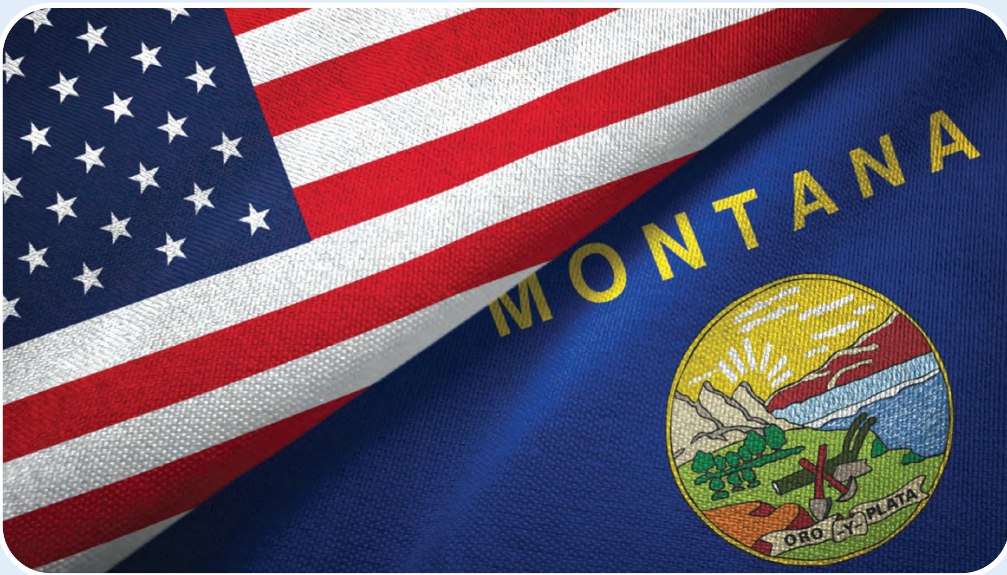
Be Prepared, Vote Early

With the fluid state of affairs and seemingly endless politicization of our institutions, the safest way to guarantee your vote is among those confirmed and counted is by doing so early.

Research the issues. Learn more about each candidate’s platform. Understand the verbiage of proposed measures. These can largely be done *before* ballots are mailed out. Decide where you stand now, so you can grab that blue or black pen and turn it right back around.

Send it through the mail, find a drop-box, or walk the ballot envelope into the election office during regular business hours if you’re looking for that extra sense of security. Bottom line: Do not delay. If we had to pick an overused adage to sum up life in the time of COVID, it would be to expect the unexpected. This is not the time for procrastination or indifference.

The somewhat gradual receipt of completed ballots will ease the burden on our election officials on what will be a hotly contested Nov. 3rd. Political affiliations aside, it’s imperative we make a plan *now* to vote early. •



short and long-term. To contribute with your vote, registration is required through your local election office.

Prospective voters 18 years or older and residents of the Treasure State for at least 30 days prior to the election will need a valid Montana Driver’s License or ID Card, Social Security Number, or accepted alternate identification to register. Montana is one of only a handful of states that allows registration up until the close of polls on Election Day. One caveat: voters must appear in-person after the late registration period has begun. *The deadline for regular voter registration is Oct. 26.*

the election) and ballot tracking. This page also displays absentee status and the location of your polling place during a typical, COVID-free voting year.

Ballot Dispersal

As is routine for absentee voters under normal circumstances, this year’s official ballots will be mailed to ALL registered voters on Oct. 9. Once received, electors will complete their ballot and return in the included security envelope. Postage will be provided. Don’t forget to sign! Ballot envelopes without voter signature will be invalidated.

Ballot Collection

Completed ballots MUST be received by 8pm on Election Day to be included in the official count. Given our transition to a predominantly vote-by-mail election, timeliness will be essential once blank ballots are received.

Gallatin County election officials have worked with the local United States Postal Service offices to eliminate long-distance mail processing in Billings and Great Falls. In the week leading up to the election, ballots will be sorted from other mail and delivered to the local election office directly. That being said, time is of the essence. Returning ballots early is strongly encouraged.

In addition to the Gallatin County Election Office at 311 W Main, officials have announced multiple locations where voters may drop off their ballots once received and completed: Belgrade City Clerk’s Office (91 E Central), Manhattan City Clerk’s Office (207 S 6th), Three Forks City Clerk’s Office (206 N Main), West Yellowstone City Clerk’s Office (440 Yellowstone Ave.), Big Sky Water & Sewer District Office (561 Little Coyote Rd.) and the Office of ASMSU (SUB-221, 751 W Grant) in Bozeman. Interested voters may utilize these offices to return their ballots during regular business hours, through Nov. 3.

On Election Day only, the following locations will also be available to drop-off voters: Gallatin County Fairgrounds (901 N Black) and Hope Lutheran Church (2152 W Graf) in Bozeman, Belgrade’s
