YGM series 'People & Place' sets new virtual dates

Yellowstone Gateway Museum has announced its "People & Place" virtual speaker series will begin April 7th and continue Wednesday evenings through the month.

"We postponed our popular in-person programs last spring so we are excited to offer virtual programs this year, hoping to expand our reach far beyond the borders of Big Sky Country," said Museum curator Karen Reinhart. "Each program highlights the stories of Montanans but we suspect there are a lot of people who would enjoy these programs no matter where they live.

Award-winning author and storyteller Chris LaTray presents the series' inaugural program on at 7pm on April 7th, with "The Day That Finally Came," a program

about the Little Shell Chippewa Tribe. He relays stories to help program attendees understand who the Little Shell people are and their part in the history of North America. Montana's Little Shell Tribe of Chippewa Indians recently became the 574th Indian tribe to be recognized by the United States government, after nearly 150 years of trying. La Tray is Chippewa-Cree Métis, an enrolled member of the Little Shell Tribe of Chippewa Indians, and grew up in Missoula.

Author, YGM Curator, and native Montanan Karen Reinhart presents "Montana Women: Making Do and Making a Difference" on April 14th at 7pm, following the Friends of the YGM Annual Meeting. She includes stories of

extraordinary Montana women: wives and mothers who served in traditional and nontraditional roles, as well as trailblazers. Images are from the museum's collections. Participants can join the meeting at 6:30pm or

at the start of the program. Author and historian Kelly Hartman presents "A Brief History of Cooke City" on April 21st at 7pm. Hartman recounts stories from her book of the same title, exploring the stories of this mountain berg's full-time residents. For more than sixty years, Cooke City residents waited for rail until a new economy took hold – tourism. Hartman grew up in Silver Gate and was director of the Cooke City Montana Museum before her current work as curator at the Gallatin History

Museum.

Paul Shea presents "Livingston & Park County: The Early Years" on April 28th at 7pm. He explores the success story of Livingston, and the county as a whole, which rose from a sleepy agricultural area that was once part of Gallatin County to a bustling railroad center and gateway to the world's first national park. Shea uses historic photos from the Gateway Museum's collection in his program. He retired last spring as the museum's director.

During the public process to develop the Triangle Community Plan, led by the Planning Coordinating Committee including representatives from Gallatin County, Belgrade and Bozeman, the community shared that they wanted to see high quality, connected, accessible and safe trails in the Triangle Area as it develops. Because of available infrastructure and proximity to population centers, the Triangle Area between Bozeman, Belgrade and Four Corners is likely to see high density residential development in the coming years.

After considerable public com-

ment, the Triangle Community Plan identified a need for a Triangle Area Trail Plan, a vision that could ensure connectivity ahead of development. Gallatin County showed their commitment to this vision immediately and entered into an agreement with the Gallatin Valley Land Trust to financially support the creation of a trail plan for the area. The Triangle Trail Plan, still in progress, shows the community that Gallatin County shares the value of trails and is ensuring that a trail system grows alongside future development in the area.

Gallatin County has also shown leadership in their work at the Gallatin Regional Park, 100 acres on

the west side of Bozeman. Their partnership with Run Dog Run has made that dog park one of the most widely used in town and a true community center for neighborhoods in the west side of Bozeman. The County also led efforts to create and groom cross country ski trails on the southwest corner of the Regional Park. These Nordic trails are the only groomed trails on the west side of town and a welcomed addition during a year where people are eager for outdoor physical activity near home.

Online talk discusses role of leadership in the time of climate change

From MSU News Service Tickets are now available for "Leadership and Climate Justice," a live Montana State University virtual event featuring Mary Robinson, a former president of Ireland and leading climate justice advocate. The event is set for 11am, Thursday, April 8th. Tickets are available to students for free and to the public on a pay-what-youcan basis.

Robinson's talk will focus on leadership, education and advocacy for the poor and disempowered in the world, who are disproportionately threatened by climate change. Following Robinson's remarks, an interactive audience Q&A will be led by MSU President Waded Cruzado.

Robinson is known as a champion for climate justice, human rights, gender equality and corporate responsibility. She served as Ireland's first female president from 1990 to 1997. In addition, she led the Mary Robinson Foundation Climate Justice, served as the United Nation's secretary-general's special envoy on climate justice, and authored the book Climate Justice: Hope, Resilience, and the Fight for a Sustainable Future. She also served as U.N. high commissioner for human rights from 1997 to 2002 and cofounded the Council of Women World Leaders.

BFS presents Oscar Shorts, illuminating docs in April

It's officially spring but that often brings about more indoor days than Montanans would like. Bozeman Film Society continues to virtually stream independent titles for movie lovers. Watch safely at home with new titles added weekly. Streaming sales directly support BFS. Here's a look at a few upcoming options.

Feast your eyes on the visual wonders of **M.C. Escher: Journey** to **Infinity** through April 8th. The story of world famous Dutch graphic artist is equal parts history, psychology and psychedelia. Robin Lutz's entertaining, eye-opening portrait gives us the man through his own words and images: diary musings, excerpts from lectures, correspondence and more are voiced by British actor Stephen Fry, while Escher's woodcuts, lithographs and other print works appear in both original and playfully altered form refugees, women's empowerment, sexual abuse and LGBTQ+ rights, the pandemic, border walls and many more, this documentary takes audiences on a worldwide journey to spotlight the incredible empathy displayed by a leader who continues to inspire hope during an extraordinary moment in our lifetime. It runs 116 minutes.

Rose Plays Julie streams through April 15th. In this shivery, pysch thriller, an adopted young woman seeks out her birth mother, inadvertently triggering a string of events which change both their lives. Beneath the eerily calm surfaces of Christine Molloy and Joe Lawlor's terrific film lies a blistering and modern exploration of identity, trauma and power. Not Rated with a run time of 100 minutes.

Make new discoveries with Amundsen: The Greatest mind, and even the fabric of his reality. Rated PG-13 with a run time of 97 minutes.

Typically held at the Ellen every awards season, presentation of the popular **Oscar-Nominated Shorts** moves online. Catch the animated, live action and documentary shorts between April 2nd and 24th – just ahead of the big event. Run times range from 94–125 minutes.

Searing psychological thriller **Every Breath You Take** opens April 2nd and is available through the 22nd. A psychiatrist's (Casey Affleck) career is thrown into jeopardy when his patient takes her own life. When he invites his patient's surviving brother (Sam Claflin) into his home to meet his wife (Michelle Monaghan) and daughter, his family life is suddenly torn apart. The film is Rated R

Symphony finishes season with vibrant virtual concert

The Bozeman Symphony returns to the Willson Auditorium for its final free livestream concert of the season, **"Montgomery, Mendelssohn & Bach"** on April 17th, featuring its very own principal flute **Sue Makeever** and the string section of the orchestra. To

close a remarkable season of challenges and triumphs, the Symphony presents a thrilling array of music – from classical to contemporary – showcasing the talent of leading female composer Jessie Montgomery, the wildly celebrated J.S. Bach, and the genius of a young Felix Mendelssohn.

Opening this exciting program is acclaimed New York-based composer, violinist and educator Jessie Montgomery's contemporary work Strum, a piece that the *Washington Post* described as "...wildly colorful and exploding with life." Principal flute Sue Makeever follows with her



interpretation of J.S. Bach's Orchestral Suite No. 2, playing seven movements building to an epic finale with one of Bach's greatest orchestra works. The concert finishes with Felix Mendelssohn's Sinfonia No. 7, one of twelve string symphonies he wrote between 1821-1822.

April Friday Forum talks health implications of legalized marijuana

The Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at Montana State University will present **"Public Health Effects of Legalizing Marijuana"** for its next Friday Forum on April 9th. The virtual forum will take place from noon to 1:30pm and is free and open to the public.

Mark Anderson, an associate professor in the Department of Agricultural Economics and Economics in the College of Agriculture at MSU, will discuss the impacts to public health associated with the legalization of recreational marijuana, which occurred in Montana in November 2020. Topics that will be covered include teen marijuana use; the use of other substances such as alcohol and opioids; traffic fatalities; and mental health.

Anderson is an applied economist with research interests in health economics and economic history. His research has appeared in leading scholarly publications, such as the *Journal of Political Economy, American Economic Journal: Applied Economics* and *Review of Economics and Statistics*, as well as public health journals such as the *American Journal for Public Health, American Journal of Preventative Medicine* and the *Journal of the* American Medical Association Pediatrics. Anderson's work has been discussed in national and international press outlets such as *Time*, *The Wall Street Journal*, *The New York Times*, *Forbes*, CNN, NBC, ABC and the BBC.

In addition to his work on marijuana legalization, Anderson is currently studying the effects of hospital desegregation during the Civil Rights era on the black-white infant mortality gap and the effectiveness of public health interventions at the turn of the 20th century.

Another doc, this one musicbased, is also ready to stream through April 8th. Long Live Rock... Celebrate the Chaos is a deep dive into the culture of hard rock. The genre, beloved by its millions of fans, is often misunderstood and maligned by media and the music industry. In intimate interviews, the leading titans of rock discuss the genre and the special relationship they have with their audience. Featuring members of Metallica, Guns N' Roses, Slipknot, Korn, Avenged Sevenfold, Rob Zombie, Five Finger Death Punch, Rage Against the Machine, Greta Van Fleet, Halestorm and more, the film runs 83 minutes.

Head into the backcountry with **Cowboys** through April 8th. In this tender revisionist Western, Steve Zahn plays a troubled but wellintentioned father who has recently separated from his wife. After his wife (Jillian Bell) refuses to let their trans child, Jo, live as his authentic self, he takes his son on the run into the Montana wilderness. Not Rated with a run time of 85 minutes.

Available through April 15th is Oscar hopeful **Minari**. A tender and sweeping story about what roots us, the film follows a Korean-American family that moves to a tiny Arkansas farm in search of their own American Dream. The family home changes completely with the arrival of their sly, foul-mouthed, but incredibly loving grandmother. Amidst the instability and challenges of this new life in the rugged Ozarks, Minari shows the undeniable resilience of family and what really makes a home. The film is Rated PG-13 and runs 115 minutes.

Meet the man behind the papal robe in *Francesco*, streaming through April 15th. Filmmakers were given unprecedented access to His Holiness Pope Francis, providing an intimate look at a global leader who approaches challenging and complex issues with tremendous humility, wisdom and generosity towards all. Spanning issues such as climate change, migration and **Expedition** through April 15th. Roald Amundsen's dream of reaching the North Pole haunts him throughout his life. He is obsessed with the idea of discovering the last unchartered lands of the world. While he wins the race against Robert Scott to becomes the first man ever to conquer the South Pole, Amundsen will sacrifice everything to be the first to explore the icy wastelands of the North Pole. As the units are knocked back – with some of the participants see improvement, while others go off the rails – it becomes increasingly clear that while alcohol may have fueled great results in world history, some bold acts carry consequences. Not Rated with a run time of 117 minutes.

Family drama **The Father** will be available through the month. A mischievous 80 year-old (Anthony Hopkins) defiantly refuses all assistance from his daughter as he ages. As he tries to make sense of his changing circumstances, he begins to doubt his loved ones, his own with a run time of 105 minutes.

Also available beginning April 2nd is *The Marijuana Conspiracy*. In 1972, young women looking for a fresh start in life endure isolated captivity in a true 98-day human experiment studying the effects of marijuana on females. Based on a true story, this film centers around five young women who shared a common goal: to make some money and have fun. Not Rated with a run time of 124 minutes.

Looking for a Lady with Fangs and a Moustache opens April 9th and can be streamed through the month. Tenzin, a modern Tibetan entrepreneur, utterly skeptical of ancient, mystical beliefs, is suddenly haunted by frightening dreams and hallucinations. A sage tells him those are omens of his imminent death. Filmed in a mesmerizing and magical Kathmandu, Tenzin will have seven days to save his life: a most unconventional, sacred journey into feminine energy. The film runs 113 minutes.

Library forum examines intersection of people & wildlife

Live Music



As we know, conserving wildlife – in the Gallatin Valley, the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem, and in public and private landscapes across Montana and throughout the West – contributes to our lives and livelihoods in many

ways, some beyond imagining even 30 or 40 years ago. The central issue of wildlife conservation is coexistence, which is only being magnified by the numbers of people moving into our region.

To help understand how wildlife and people, conservation and coexistence fit together, the Bozeman Public Library Community Forum welcomes **Mike Phillips**, director of the Turner Endangered Species Fund, and **Lisa Upson**, director of People & Carnivores, for a virtual discussion.

"People and Wildlife: Conservation and Coexistence" will take place from noon–1pm on Wednesday, April 21st. It will be broadcasted via Zoom and no advanced registration is needed. How do we conserve wildlife and promote biodiversity across large landscapes? What are local examples of projects that conserve wildlife on ranches, farms, and public lands? If coexistence with wildlife is a primary focus of conservation, how does it work? How is it working?

Phillips will provide an overview of conserving biodiversity, and Upson will talk about how her nonprofit works with private landowners and public land managers to prevent conflicts with big carnivores – grizzly bears, wolves, and mountain lions.

Join to hear from these two experts who get their boots muddy walking the land, talking with the folks who live there, and developing strategies for people and wildlife to thrive together.
