

Big Sky's Bravo! Festival features gypsy jazz, Beethoven & more

The Arts Council of Big Sky is pleased to present the 11th annual Bravo! Big Sky Music Festival Friday and Saturday, August 5th-6th. The festival, formerly called the Big Sky Classical Music Festival, brings some of the best classical and crossover musicians to Big Sky for two nights of world-class performances.

The festival kicks off with a double-header ticketed concert at the Warren Miller Performing Arts Center on Friday, with a 4pm performance from the two-time Grammy-winning choir, The Crossing. Conducted by Donald Nally, the group has performed at Lincoln Center and the Kennedy Center, among dozens of others, and has performed over 100 commissioned world premieres of music by contemporary composers. For this concert, the group will present work by vocalist and composer Shara Nova of My Brightest Diamond, who has previously performed with David Byrne and the Decemberists.

Immediately following this performance will be a reception with food and drink, followed by an Artist Panel & Conversation on the WMPAC stage. Moderated by WMPAC Artistic Director John Zirkle, the panel will feature Donald Nally, Shara Nova, Big Sky Festival Orchestra conductor Peter Bay and violinist Angella Ahn.

After the discussion, renowned harpist Abigail Kent & Friends will take the stage at 7:30pm. This allstar ensemble will feature solo harp pieces, along with selections from Debussy and Ravel. In addition to Kent, the group features Angella Ahn (violin), Eugena Chang (cello), Alexandra Osborne (violin), Chi-Chi Bestmann (viola), and Immanuel Davis (flute), and Chris Kirkpatrick (clarinet). Tickets for both Friday shows are now on sale and can be purchased through the Warren Miller website. The Reception and discussion is included with either ticket purchase, and there is a discount for purchasing tickets for both concerts.

"This is a world-class group of musicians that were assembled just for this concert," said Brian Hurlbut, ACBS Executive Director. "As an added treat we are thrilled to part-



ner with the WMPAC to offer a special performance with the Crossing and Shara Nova. It's bound to be a magical night of music."

On Saturday there will be a free concert in Len Hill Park in the Big Sky Town Center. First up will be a performance from the Big Sky Festival String Orchestra, playing pieces from Ralph Vaugh Williams and Eric Funk, along with Germaine Tailleferre's Concertino for Harp with guest soloist Abigail Kent. The second half of the performance will feature Beethoven's spectacular Symphony No. 7, with its stunning second movement. The orchestra will once again be conducted by Peter Bay, who is the Music Director and Conductor of the Austin Symphony Orchestra. Maestro Bay has appeared with over 80 different orchestras all over the world. In 1994, he was one of two con-

ductors selected to participate in the Leonard Bernstein American Conductors Program. He was the first prize winner of the 1980 Baltimore Symphony Orchestra Young Conductors Competition and a prize winner of the 1987 Leopold Stokowski Competition sponsored by the American Symphony Orchestra. He was inducted into the Austin Arts Hall of Fame in May 2016.

Closing the Saturday evening performance will be Gypsy jazz sensations the Rhythm Future Quartet. This acoustic jazz ensemble has a straightforward agenda: to keep the spirit of Gypsy jazz alive and expanding in today's musical universe. The virtuosic foursome, named for a Django Reinhardt tune, offers up a newly minted sound, influenced by the classic Hot Club of France, yet wholly contemporary. Led by violinist Jason Anick and guitarist Olli Soikkeli, the quartet performs dynamic and lyrical arrangements of both Gypsy jazz standards and original compositions that draw upon diverse international rhythms and musical idioms. With Max O'Rourke on second guitar and bassist Greg Loughman, Rhythm Future is dedicated to expanding the boundaries of a vital musical genre.

Len Hill park will open at 5pm on Saturday, and the orchestra will start at 6pm followed by the Rhythm Future Quartet at 8pm. Admission is free, and there will be food and beverage vendors on site.







Support creation of urban transportation district

From the UTD Steering Committee Growing pains and how to relieve them. Sometimes it seems like that's the only thing we talk about here in the Gallatin Valley.

And it makes sense. Given our rapid population growth in recent years, all of these conversations about affordable housing, zoning, better-paying jobs and adapting for the future are important. But let's not forget about public transportation. It's a vital part of this discussion, too, and benefits us all.

For 16 years now, HRDC's Streamline program has worked to provide people with a zero-fare way to get around our valley, and we all benefit as a result, especially as our community grows.

More people on the bus helps reduce traffic congestion, eases demand for parking and helps reduce air pollution. Streamline helps employees get to work and MSU students to class, and improves access to healthcare for seniors and community members of all ages. The bus also provides mobility to

those who can't drive, those who don't have a car, and families that have only one car.

The bus is good for business, too. According to the American Public Transportation Association, every \$1 invested in public transportation generates \$4 in economic returns, with 87% of public transportation trips having a direct impact on the local economy.

Now, our community's growth has brought Streamline to an important juncture. According to 2020 U.S. Census numbers, Bozeman's population now exceeds 53,000 people, which means we are no longer considered rural by the U.S. Federal Transportation Administration. We will soon be classified as a "small urbanized area."

Because of this updated classification, a new funding structure is needed in order for Streamline to continue receiving federal transit funds. Only a city or county government, or an urban transportation district (UTD) can receive this federal support.

Fortunately, HRDC has been

planning for this day. In its Redesign Streamline 2020 Transit Development Plan," the agency asked a wide range of Gallatin Valley stakeholders about how best to structure the bus system once we hit the "urban" threshold. The overwhelming answer was that we should create a UTD.

A UTD focused on the operation and success of Streamline will ensure that the Gallatin Valley's transportation needs are addressed now and in the years to come. As the valley continues to grow, the UTD will be able to stay at the forefront of public transportation planning and coordination and will serve as the foundation for a more regional transportation system in the future.

Community stakeholders and Streamline advocates like ourselves are committed to seeing this happen. That is why we've joined a UTD steering committee which, on July 12th, submitted a petition for approval from the Gallatin County Elections Office to circulate a petition in support of forming a Gallatin County Urban Transportation District.

Montana State law outlines the necessary steps for District formation. Placing the UTD on the May 2023 Special District election ballot requires us to get the signatures of 20% of all registered voters living within the proposed district, which would include all of Bozeman, Belgrade, and many county residents living near those com-

munities. That's nearly 10,000 people.

You'll be seeing signature gatherers around the Gallatin Valley over the coming weeks. We hope that you will stop and add your name. Sustaining Streamline and its development is a way we can support responsible growth and ease community growing pains. Let's make this



investment in our future.

The UTD Steering Committee is composed of a group a key community stakeholders, including HRDC, City of Bozeman, City of Belgrade, Gallatin County, Downtown Bozeman Partnership, Bozeman Health, Community Health Partners, Montana State University, Gallatin Valley Land Trust, Western Transportation Institute, Belgrade Community Coalition, and more. •

Bring out your fishnets and sequins for this Rocky Horrorthemed bout! Costumed attendees aged 18+ get first crack at limited


trackside seating (aka the Danger Zone). This family friendly event features a food truck, no-host bar by the American Legion, raffles, games and prizes.


The walk traditionally begins at First Interstate Bank, located at Grand Avenue and Main Street,




