The Livingston Film Series presents a free double screening starring Jimmy Buffett and some amazing writers, most with a local connection. *Tarpon* and *All That Is Sacred* play at 7pm on Thursday, November 9th at the Shane Lalani Center for the Arts.

The first of the modern sport fishing films, *Tarpon* was created by Guy De La Valdene and Christian Odasso in the wild panorama of 1970s Key West. Full of colorful scenes and set against a backdrop of treasure hunters, smugglers, hippies and eccentrics, the film also features stunning cinematography and thrilling tarpon fishing. Legendary authors Richard Brautigan, Thomas

McGuane and Jim Harrison join with famous flats guides Woody Sexton, Gil Drake and Steve Huff to pose questions about life, art, nature and catch-and-release fishing. Original music by Jimmy Buffett. Voice-over by Jim Harrison.

All That Is Sacred, a new short film by Scott Ballew about the Key West scene 50 years ago, focuses on the idea that a remote island city at the tip of America incubated one of last great counterculture arts scenes. Starring Tom McGuane and Jimmy Buffett, All That Is Sacred premiered at the Telluride Film Festival in August. In the late 60s a group of poets, writers and musicians descended upon Key West to pursue

their love of literature and fishing (and mind-altering drugs). McGuane is joined by friends Jim Harrison, Richard Brautigan, Russell Chatham and others – a crew that created some of the finest art of their generation.

Bozeman's Ellen Theatre on Wednesday and Thursday, November 8th and 9th. Both shows start at 6:40pm and feature the same presenters.

PechaKucha Night at Downtown

John Reins will describe how one seemingly innocuous design change precipitated the collapse of the atrium walkway at the Hyatt Regency Hotel on July 17, 1981, killing 114 people and injuring another 216.

More than 5,000 fire lookouts



have been built in the US, evolving from tree houses to cozy mountain cabins. Justin Barth looks at their future in a world of drones, artificial intelligence and remote camera fire

Mark Egge, a Bozeman-based

advocate for affordable housing, will explain the "missing middle," one of the hottest concepts in city planning. These multiple units, intermixed with single-family housing, were a favorite of Bozeman architect Fred Willson, but zoning restrictions have caused them to disappear over the past 60-70 years.

Kat Rolin, a graduate student at MSU, will describe her efforts to "save the hides" by parlaying her commitment to sustainability into an

effort to start a commercial tannery in Livingston. Beautiful, durable hides are now being wasted, Rolin says, with 100 percent of hides from a Montana processing facility being composted.

Patrick Sievert of Rock Creek Trail Llamas will highlight the advantages of llamas over mules and horses for your backcountry experience; Terry Cunningham will detail how a local nonprofit created seven highly successful, off-leash dog parks; and Carol Orlandini will tell us about the missing minutes deleted from the mythic 1939 movie, *The Wizard of Oz.* 

Local realtor, life coach, painter and single mom Elyn Messner will describe her efforts to create a new nonprofit, The Single Bell, which will help single parents creatively engage with each other around the holidays; Jennifer Gueguen will offer ideas on how to creatively engage with the stories we tell ourselves: Derek Leonard will talk about the spiritual quality of his Nepal trek with two world-renowned genetic scientists; and Rachael Dodier will discuss "the dichotomy of motherhood" and the challenge of raising a child with a rare chromosomal Tickets are available at

Immerse yourself in a world of laughter, love and supernatural shenanigans. The local cast will transport audiences to a realm of wit and whimsy, filled with mischievous ghosts and hilarious misunderstandings.

Blithe Spirit is set at the house of writer Charles Condomine and his wife, Ruth. One evening, Charles invites local eccentric medium Madame Arcati to hold a séance at his house. He asks along his friends, Dr. and Mrs. Bradman, intending to gather character inspiration from Madame Arcati for his latest book. Despite initially thinking the séance has been a failure, it soon becomes

clear that Madame Arcati has unwittingly brought back Charles' first wife, Elvira, to haunt him. Once in his house, Elvira is unable to leave and, as she cannot be seen or heard by Ruth, she causes all kinds of mischievous trouble between the married couple.

When Elvira unwittingly causes Ruth's death in her attempts to bring Charles over to be with her, Charles becomes haunted by both of his now-deceased wives. Frustrated by their odd situation, the threesome call on Madame Arcati once more to send Elvira and Ruth back to the other side. Intensely funny and character-driven, Blithe Spirit combines farce, emotion, and wit to great effect [Stage Agent].





## Argentina ballet star to dance in YBC's The Nutcracker

Lucas Segovia stars in Yellowstone Ballet Co.'s 32nd annual production of Tchaikovsky's holiday classic *The Nutcracker* on Sunday, December 10th. He will perform the roles of the Nutcracker Prince and the Cavalier. Performances will be held at 1pm and 4:30pm at the Willson Auditorium in Bozeman.

Originally from Buenos Aires, Segovia joined Ballet Argentina as a soloist under Julio Bocca's direction. He was promoted to Principal Dancer shortly after and was the only dancer performing a solo piece in Bocca's farewell performance for over 300,000 people and broadcasted on national TV.

As for knowing when he wanted

to dance, Segovia said, "It caught me by surprise. It was a matter of luck. I didn't start dancing until I was 16 after a female friend (who was a jazz dancer) convinced me to watch some dancing." Watching the dancing, Segovia realized something, "It wasn't a girly thing. There were a lot of guys taking classes, and the teacher was a man. I thought, 'Why not? I'll give it a try.' In countries where cultures are not so stimulated it's hard to say, 'I want to be a dancer' and make a living doing it. But I was able to do it."

When asked what dance means to him, Segovia said, "Passion. The reason that I'm in this country and far away from my family is passion. It's a way for me to express myself; it's the best way to say what I want to say." This passion has taken

Segovia to major theaters in the United States, Spain, France, Italy, Greece, Russia and Cuba, among other places.

Segovia has been a part of The Washington Ballet and of Morphoses/The Wheeldon Company, directed by Christopher Wheeldon. He has also danced with The Joffrey Ballet for six seasons, performing in virtually the entire repertoire of the company as a soloist or principal dancer. Lucas has danced works by choreographers like Balanchine, Robbins, Twyla Tharp, Mark Morris, Christopher Wheeldon, Wayne McGregor, Alexei Ratmansky, William Forstyhe and Annabelle Lopez Ochoa, among many others.

Throughout his career Segovia has danced in more than 400 cities around the globe, performing in some of the most important venues for dance in the world and has been awarded with the Premio Clarin, the most prestigious recognition for the Arts in Argentina.

Joining Segovia is Bozeman native Molly Groeschl. She trained with Main Street Dance Theater under the direction of Dana Sorg. Molly went on to train at Pacific Northwest Ballet, American Ballet Theater NYC, Orlando Ballet, Pittsburgh Ballet Theatre and Ballet West. 

#### 2023 BOBCAT UPDATE: BOBCATS SIT ATOP CONFERENCE FOLLOWING BRUTAL FIRST HALF

Coming into the 2023 season both critics and supporters alike pointed to the difficulty of Montana State's schedule as a major obstacle in returning to the national championship game in Frisco, TX come January. However, despite sporting one of the most challenging schedules in the FCS, the Bobcats have managed to stay atop the Big Sky Conference heading into the pivotal month of November. MSU has played near flawless football for the better part of the first two months, and only a

controversial last-second loss at FCS #1 South Dakota State and head-scratching defeat at Idaho have blemished their record.

Heading into the final month of the season, here is a recap of what has gone right for the Bobcats and areas of improvement for claiming the Big Sky

The Good

Most prominent on the list of good things for Montana averaging just over 300 yards per State has been the continued

Bobcat ranks in the Top 10 for rushing yards, three 'Cats have rushed for at least 500 yards on the season, led by senior quarterback Sean Chambers who has churned

> Although the production numbers don't jump off the page for any one Bobcat rusher, the most impressive stat has been the depth at which MSU has been able to put on the field. At least six different Bobcats have scored a rushing touchdown on the season and is part of the reason why the Bobcats boast the No. 2 scoring offense in the FCS at 42 points per game, and No. 2 overall offense, averaging 482.8 yards per game.

While managing the game on the ground has been the staple of the Bobcat offense for the better part of the past decade, an improved passing attack has helped open running lanes for MSU's stable of running backs. Both Bobcat quarterbacks, Tommy Mellott and Sean Chambers, have improved

their passing efficiency through the first 8 games of the season, and continued growth in the passing game will be needed for MSU to make another deep playoff run in December as teams begin to stack the box and dare the 'Cats to throw. Montana State currently averages just over 180 yards per

game through the air with the 15th best passing efficiency rating in the FCS. So, while MSU may not sling it all over the field, they are making the most of the minimal opportu-

The receiving game has been led by the emergence of Treyton Pickering from his tight end spot as he

leads the team in receiving yards with 291 on the year. Senior Clevan Thomas Jr. is second on the team with 275 receiving yards, and Tyler McCullouch ranks No. 3 with 205 yards after missing the first four games due to injury. Mc-Cullouch adds a much needed deep threat to keep offenses from keying on the run and short underneath routes that have been a major part of the 'Cat attack.

Defensively, Montana State has been efficient across the board, boasting the 17th ranked overall defense in the FCS. MSU's defensive line has taken a major step in the right direction towards becoming a dominant unit, notching 25 sacks on the season, led by Brody Grebe with six on the year. MSU has also collected 51 tackles for loss and forced eleven turnovers for the As a unit, the Bobcats are hold-

ing opponents to just 19 points per game, with an average of 315 yards of offense. The rush defense has been much more prolific, holding opponents to a collective 982 yards of rushing on the season, while giving up 1,543 yards through the air. Linebackers Nolan Askelson and McCade O'Reilly have led the team in tackles through eight games, with Askelson notching 52 and O'Reilly garnering another 51 in his first year as a regular in the rotation.

On the back end, junior Rylan Ortt has led the way with 50 tack-



has been a game changer in his ability to flip the field with booming punts, his inconsistency on field goal tries has been a source of frustration for 'Cat fans all season, highlighted by his badly missed game-tying attempt versus Idaho on October 28th. Hall is currently 6-12 on the season, which has many in the Bobcat faithful calling for another Butte hero, Casey Kautzman, to get his shot at kicking duties heading into the **Looking Ahead** 

After being on the road the last two weeks of October, Montana State returns home for two ultra important conference games versus Northern Arizona and Eastern Washington. While both games are winnable, neither should be taken for granted, as Northern Arizona knocked off Montana earlier this fall in Flagstaff, and Eastern Washing-

ton always brings an explosive brand of football to Bozeman. It would be easy for MSU to look past either of those two opponents as a monumental matchup with Montana awaits in Missoula on November 18th. This year's version of the Brawl of the Wild will be filled with playoff implications for both teams.

The Bobcats may have lost their shot at winning the Big Sky Conference championship outright with their loss to Idaho, but they may still be able to sneak back into the Top 2 seeds for the FCS playoffs and gain home field advantage, but they will need to win their remaining three games, and most likely in dominant fashion, to enter that conversation. As it stands, Idaho seems to have the best shot at earning the Big Sky's auto-bid and would be in contention for a Top 4 seed if they can close out the season without another defeat. Overall, MSU should very much be in the hunt for the national championship when the FCS playoffs begin later this month, and with a few bounces their



way, the 'Cats could be bringing
