

Emerson unveils new springtime exhibits

The Emerson Center for the Arts & Culture is pleased to host its newest shows featuring emerging artists from our community.

Michigan-born ceramic artist Nathan Goddard showcases Subduction, an array of his work, in the Jessie Wilber Gallery.

Similar to the strata of earth, Nathan's work is comprised of layers, of daily human observations and the geo-historical knowledge that is held inside of clay. "I see making my work as archived memories deep beyond the surface mantle, the earth survives as physical documentation of recollection and reflection," he says. "The act of utilizing clay and earth from specific places therefore, literally and conceptually connects my work to a place of origin and the layers of nostalgia associated with it. Place is my material and my vehicle for addressing these ideas."

The exhibit is a series of contemporary landscapes of Glacier National Park, incorporating bright and bold abstracted shapes. "Created in the depth of winter and huddled around my space heaters in my studio, I was attracted to the hyper pigmented colors that could be found on those miraculous alpenglow evenings, where the neon brightness reminds you spring is coming soon and it hasn't forgotten

you," she says. "Painting can be a lonely process, particularly up in the Northwest corner of Montana. Peering out my window to see the glacial peaks on bluebird days gave me a sense of hope and wonder-

Birds showing in the Emerson Lobby is an exhibition by paint artist Victoria Daily.

Victoria's paintings, which revolve around a deep passion for nature, explore patterns of migration and seasonal change. "Patterns have always appeared to me in nature," she says. "Patterns of the scales on a butterfly's wing or the feather molting patterns of waterfowl. Patterns of migration along the Mississippi Flyway that I watch from the flooded cypress woods. Patterns in the crystal of a snowflake, each one similar but different. I am obsessed with these things to the point that I structure my year around them, seeking to be where they are as they move and appear with the seasons.'

Gallatin Valley Circle of Compassion invites community members to participate in their annual conference, "Mountains of Courage: Conversations on Death & Dying." The single-day conference is designed to explore the end of life journey by providing a relaxed setting for individuals and caregivers to discover available resources, tools and information.

The conference will be held on Saturday, April 6th, at the Best Western GranTree Inn from 9am-4pm. Early registration is encouraged as space is limited. The registration fee includes lunch. Doors open at 8:30am.

Presenters and panelists will include health professionals, spiritual counselors, social workers, community support services and caregivers. Participants will have the opportunity to explore practical issues, emotions, myths and traditions and learn how to shift the current paradigm. They will learn about practical tools and resources to assist in making informed decisions when faced with end of life

Keynote speaker, Reverend

Bodhi Be, is an ordained interfaith minister whose presentation is entitled "Beginners Guide to Aging, Dying & Death in the 21st Century." Bodhi is a funeral director, an end-of-life and bereavement counselor and educator; a hospice volunteer; a teacher and trainer of death doulas; a speaker and workshop leader. He has trained hundreds of doctors, nurses, hospice staff, social workers, ministers, chaplains, therapists, artists and lay people in the spiritual, psychological, emotional and logistical care of the dying and care of the dead, and for four years has taken dozens through a certification program for death

The host for the conference is Gallatin Valley Circle of Compassion (GVCC), a volunteer group of local community members who are professionally and/or personally touched by the human expe rience of death and dying. Their mission: "Connecting, educating and supporting our community on matters related to death and dying. GVCC's intention for the conference is that participants will feel empowerment, courage, a sense of calm and confidence, and the ultimate realization that one does not have to be alone on this journey.

Conference fees are \$50 with discounted admission for veterans and students. Lunch is included in the cost. CEUs are available. Workshop information, additional conference details, and tickets are available at www.gallatinvalleycircleofcompassion.org. •

LFS scrrens theater-based mockumentary

The Livingston Film Series is delighted to present a screening of mockumentary Theater Camp on Thursday, April 11th. The film begins at 7pm at the Shane Lalani Center for the Arts.

This loving chronicle of the on and offstage shenanigans at a summer drama camp in the Adirondacks is the movie equivalent of a yarn-and-popsicle-stick weaving your kid brought home from crafts class. Theater Camp was codirected and co-written by one of its stars, The Bear's Molly Gordon, based in part on remembrances of her own childhood friendship with co-star Ben Platt. The pair's longtime friend Nick Lieberman co-

wrote and co-directed with Gordon,

while Platt's now-fiancé Noah Galvin plays the key role of an overworked production manager.

All those crisscrossing real-life connections somehow result not in one of those too-many-cooks comedies that feel like a collection of sketches, but in a cohesive and warmhearted 93-minute tribute to arts pedagogy (think School of Rock, but with Sondheim) and to the selfserious drama teen who lives within us all. Yes, the mockumentary-style framing device is overfamiliar and distracting, but it falls away after the first few scenes, and the camp's big end-of-summer production Joan, Still – a deranged original musical with at least two songs I still burst into at random six months later

achieves the rare trick of creating a fictional work-within-the-work that is supposed to be really good, and actually is. Written by Dana Stevens, the film is Rated PG-13 with a runtime of 94 min.

Continuing its latest season of screening independent features, documentaries, local films and vintage classics, doors open at 6:30pm with screenings to follow at 7pm. Doc Series profiles hummingbirds, Grizzly

On Thursday, April 4th, at the Emerson Center for the Arts & Culture, the Bozeman Doc Series continues with the Montana premiere of the critically acclaimed new documentary, *Every Little* **Thing**. The film screens at 7pm.

Amid the glamour of Hollywood, Los Angeles, a woman finds herself on a transformative journey as she nurtures wounded hummingbirds, unraveling a visually captivating and magical tale of love, fragility, healing and the delicate beauty in tiny acts of greatness.

A film of joy and wonder, Every Little Thing offers profound truths in a deceptively simple story. What does it mean to care for another, and what impact does this act have on us? In tending to these fragile yet resilient hummingbirds, Terry Masear finds a sense of healing from her own past. Her diminutive patients – brought into sharp focus through breathtaking, beautifully detailed photography – become memorable protagonists in their own right. The viewer becomes emotionally invested each of them, celebrat-

ing their small victories and lament-

protected status under the Endangered Species Act, a mother bear makes increasingly unexpected and consequential - choices to protect her family.

Science lecture explores the science of light

Illuminate your mind with Gallatin Valley Friends of the Sciences, whose popular lecture series continues with another edition this month. Co-sponsored by Museum of the Rockies and Hopa Mountain, the next talk of the season is set for Wednesday, April 24th. "Telecommunications to Teleportation: Making Light Work" will begin at 6pm. It will be held in MOR's Hager Auditorium.

How do photons – quantum particles of light – enable diverse applications ranging from the well-known to the exotic? Dr. Krishna Rupavatharam, Director of MSU's Spectrum Lab, will address this question in his presentation. He will share his experiences in photonics, the science of light, and how it can be manipulated for applications ranging from remote sensing and holographic imaging to quantum teleportation and communication. He will also provide insights into the growth and evolution of the photonics ecosystem in Montana and innovative research at MSU.

Dr. Rupavatharam holds a Ph.D. in optical physics from the Indian Institute of Science, Bangalore, India. He worked at the

Lund Institute of Technology in Sweden before joining the MSU Spectrum Lab, which he currently directs while developing applications in coherent, microwave and quantum photonics. He has authored numerous technical papers, holds multiple patents in microwave signal processing and coherent lidar, and currently serves as a member of the Board of Directors of the Montana Photonics and Quantum Alli-

The informative talks will be presented in person on select Wednesdays this spring. The presentations are free and open to the public, with seating on a firstcome, first-served basis.
