

Israel-Palestine conflict subject of next **Doc screening**

On Thursday, November 7th, at the Emerson Center for the Arts & Culture, the Bozeman Doc Series continues with the Montana premiere of the award-winning new documentary, **No Other Land**. The film screens at 7pm.

Basel Adra, a young Palestinian activist from Masafer Yatta, has been fighting his community's mass expulsion by the Israeli occupation since childhood. Basel documents the gradual erasure of the villages in his region of the West Bank, as soldiers systematically destroy the homes of his friends and family. He crosses paths with Yuval, an Israeli journalist who joins his struggle, and for over half a decade they fight side by side. Their complex bond is haunted by the extreme inequality between them: Basel, living under a brutal military occupation, and Yuval, unrestricted and free. Together they search for a path towards equality and justice.

The film was made by a Palestinian-Israeli collective of four young activists as an act of creative resistance. No Other Land world-premiered at the prestigious Berlin Film Festival where it won the Panorama Audience Award for Best Documentary

Film. The film has screened at major festivals around the world and been one of the most critically acclaimed documentaries of

After a career managing wilderness for the USDA Forest Service, Jonathan Klein concluded that what passes for wilderness in the lower 48 states isn't truly wild. In search of the real thing, he embarked on a 700-mile solo canoe trip from Saskatchewan to Hudson Bay.

Jonathan is one of 10 presenters at the next PechaKucha Night(s). The events will be held at Downtown Bozeman's Ellen Theatre on Wednesday and Thursday, November 6th and 7th. Both shows begin at 6:40pm and feature the same lineup of speakers both

The cowboy is an archetype – the tough, grizzled, macho loner on a horse - represents the American West. Liv Hart, a multi-disciplinary artist and designer takes a critical look at that myth in her PK on deconstructing the American cowboy. Another archetype of the American West took a hit

retired MSU employee, will tell of a 1967 weekend camping trip in the desert of Baja California that went wrong. The bus her family was traveling in got hopelessly mired in the mud miles from the nearest town. Lost for three days, they were taken in, fed and sheltered by a Mexican farmer and his family.

The world is increasingly filled with warning signs and labels, and ominous words of caution. John Reins, a retired forensic engineer, will reflect upon whether the pursuit of unattainable goals of zero risk and absolute safety may be diminishing the virtues of self-reliance and self-sufficiency in our society. Ironically, many folks would rather take their chances

Your vote, your voice as **Election Day arrives**

It's finally here... **Election Day** is Tuesday, November 5th with Gallatin Valley residents ready to descend on local polling places in substantial numbers. The patriotism is in the air and we're all anxiously awaiting the end result of yet another exhaustive

Do you still want the opportunity to vote but aren't yet registered? The few who didn't quite make the initial deadline aren't out of luck. The Late Registration period is now in effect, continuing through noon on Nov. 4th and resuming again on Election Day from 7am-8pm.

Prospective voters need only meet three simple qualifications to cast their ballots: they are a United States citizen, are 18 years or older, and have been a Montana resident for a minimum of 30 days before Election Day. That's it. We all should vote - it's our civic duty and gives us the right to complain!

Leading up to Nov. 5th, those who still need to register MUST visit the Election Office in person. Please bring your driver's license and/or social security number with you. The office can be found in Room 210 of the Gallatin County Courthouse, located at 311 W Main in Bozeman. ALL ballots must be returned to the Election

Office or official polling place by 8pm on Election Day. A drive-by tent will also be set up in front of the Courthouse on Nov. 5th to collect ballots. Stop by the office or call (406) 582-3060 with additional questions.

Note for absentee voters: please ensure your ballots are mailed in time to be counted and remember to SIGN the affidavit on the back of the envelope. If there's any doubt, please drop them off at the Election Office in person. Those received late or in unsigned envelopes will not be counted.

If you're not sure and would like to find out the status of your voter record, log on to www.votemt.gov and click 'My Ballot Info' after the jump. You'll be rerouted to the Montana Secretary of State's voter information service. By simply entering your first and last name with your date of birth, you can see if you're registered to vote, whether you're an active or inactive voter, whether you're signed up to vote absentee, and the location of your polling place. You can also view or download a sample ballot.

Election Day is Tuesday, November 5th with local polling places open from 7am-8pm. Don't let political fatigue keep you from exercising your inalienable right and civic duty to get out and vote! •

Scholar presents on history of mythic creatures

As part of the Elise R. Donahue Lectures on the American West series comes the Mythic Creatures Folklore Speaker Series on Friday, November 15th. "Mythic Creatures: Origin Stories" will be held at the Museum of the Rockies' Hager Auditorium beginning at 5:30pm. Dr. Marie Nicole Pareja will present.

For thousands of years, humans around the world have brought mythic creatures to life in stories. music and works of art. Uncover the origins and significance of legendary creatures of the air, land and water, such as dragons, mermaids and Bigfoot, through the lenses of distinguished speakers in their fields. A meet-and-greet and light reception will follow the talks in the museum's main lobby.

Join Dr. Pareja to explore the ancient origins and enduring significance of mythical creatures such as dragons, unicorns and mermaids. These beings appear in Bronze Age art, suggesting they were part of early oral traditions even before

written records. As civilizations like Mesopotamia, Greece and the Indus Valley developed, these creatures were incorporated into their mythologies, reflecting societal values and ideals.

Through archaeology, art history and anthropology, we uncover the earliest depictions and understand how these creatures symbolized concepts of power, heroism and the supernatural. Importantly, the lecture examines how these mythical beings continue to influence contemporary culture, evolving in their symbolism and narratives over millennia, offering insights into human values, identities and connections across time.

Marie Nicole Pareja is a Consulting Scholar for the University of Pennsylvania Museum of Archaeology and Anthropology and Assistant Professor at Salisbury University. She serves as plasters specialist for the archaeological sites of Sissi, Mochlos, and Gournia, on Crete, and for Stelida, a peak sanctuary site on Naxos. She is the

founder and director of the Plasters Analysis Project at the University of Pennsylvania, as well as a founder and a director of Indus-Aegean Bronze Age Research Network at the University of Oxford in the UK.

Her most recent research projects include Bronze Age mythologies (particularly goddesses and magic), Afro-Eurasian exchange, iconography and medicines. Outside of academia proper, she founded and directs a non-profit, the Aegean Bronze Age Study Initiative (ABASI), to support the much-needed diversification of Bronze Age archaeology by funding overseas fieldwork and research experiences for undergraduates. When she isn't conducting fieldwork or teaching university classes, she is engaged in outreach with various public libraries, museums and grade





Fringe country group brings encore show to Armory

Back by popular demand,
Bozeman's Armory Music Hall welcomes the return of alt-country band
American Aquarium to its modern space this month. The Raleighbased group's tour comes to the
Gallatin Valley in support of their
latest release, *The Fear of Standing Still*.
The all-ages show is set for Tuesday,
November 12th, with opening support from Blaine Bailey. Presented in
cooperation with Deco Music Group,
the music begins at 7:30pm.

For nearly two decades, American Aquarium have pushed toward that rare form of rock-and-roll that's revelatory in every sense. "For us the sweet spot is when you've got a rock band that makes you scream along to every word, and it's not until you're coming down at three a.m. that you realize those words are saying something real about your life," says frontman BJ Barham. "That's what made us fall in love with music in the first place, and that's the goal in everything we do." On their new album The Fear of Standing Still, the North Carolina-bred band embody that dynamic with more intensity than ever before, endlessly matching their gritty breed of country-rock with Barham's bravest and most incisive songwriting to date. As he reflects on

matters both personal and sociocultural – e.g., the complexity of Southern identity, the intersection of generational trauma and the dismantling of reproductive rights – American Aquarium instill every moment of *The Fear of Standing Still* with equal parts unbridled spirit and illuminating empathy.

Recorded live at the legendary Sunset Sound in Los Angeles, The Fear of Standing Still marks American Aquarium's second outing with producer Shooter Jennings - a threetime Grammy winner who also helmed production on 2020's critically lauded Lamentations, as well as albums from the likes of Brandi Carlile and Tanya Tucker. In a departure from the stripped-down subtlety of 2022's Chicamacomico (a largely acoustic rumination on grief), the band's tenth studio LP piles on plenty of explosive riffs and hardcharging rhythms, bringing a visceral energy to the most nuanced and poetic of lyrics. "In our live show the band's like a freight train that never lets up, and for this record I really wanted to showcase how big and anthemic we can be," notes Barham, whose bandmates include guitarist Shane Boeker, pedal-steel guitarist Neil Jones, keyboardist Rhett

Huffman, drummer Ryan Van Fleet, and bassist Alden Hedges.

Mixed by four-time Grammy winner Trina Shoemaker (Queens of the Stone Age, Emmylou Harris), The Fear of Standing Still shares its title with one of the first songs Barham wrote for the album – a soul-baring look at how raising a family has radically altered his priorities and perspective. In the process of creating what he refers to as "a record about growing up and growing older,' Barham also found his songwriting closely informed by his ten years of sobriety, as well as his ever-deepening connection with American Aquarium's community of fans. "Whenever someone tells me that one of our songs helped them in some way, it encourages me to be more and more open - almost like peeling a layer off an onion," he says. "This album is a writer 18 years into his career, peeling away the next layer and seeing just how human we can make this thing."



In countries where cultures are not so stimulated it's hard to say, 'I want to be a dancer' and make a living doing it. But I

When asked what dance means to him, Segovia said, "Passion. The reason that I'm in this country and far away from my family is passion. It's a way for me to express myself."

This passion has taken Segovia to major theaters in the United States, Spain, France, Italy, Greece, Russia and Cuba, among other places.

Segovia has also danced with The Joffrey Ballet for six seasons, performing in virtually the entire repertoire of the company as a soloist or principal dancer. He has danced works by Balanchine, Robbins, Twyla Tharp, Mark Morris, Christopher Wheeldon, Wayne McGregor, Alexei Ratmansky, William Forstyhe and Annabelle Lopez Ochoa, among

Throughout his career Segovia has danced in more than 400 cities around the globe, performing in some of the most important venues for dance in the world and has been awarded with the Premio Clarin, the most prestigious recognition for the Arts in Argentina.

UNBLEMISHED 'CATS ROLL INTO NOYEMBER - THE 2024 BOBCAT UPDATE -

As the calendar officially turns to November, the Montana State Bobcats look to maintain their perfect record and earn the program's first outright Big Sky Conference championship since 2011. MSU, the current FCS No. 2 ranked team, sits atop the conference standings at 4-0 (8-0 overall), with four games remaining, including a pivotal road test at UC Davis on November 16th, and are in line for a top two seed in the expanded FCS playoffs if they maintain their standing.

Nothing on the field has suggested that the 'Cats will lose their grip on the conference lead after a dominant first two months of the season, including a 38-7 drubbing of Idaho before a live national audience that was supposed to be a battle between two of the conference's top teams. MSU has beat down its opponents on both sides of the ball, using a more balanced offensive attack, combined with a more aggressive defensive approach to wreak havoc on opposing coordinators.

Coming into the season,

Vigen knew he needed to lessen the
