This year marks the 60th annual Madrigal Dinner, produced by the MSU School of Music, and the 27th year the production has traveled to Big Sky.

On Thursday, December 5th, at the Emerson Center for the Arts & Culture, the Bozeman Doc Series continues with the Montana premiere of the critically-acclaimed new documentary, Separated. The film screens at 7pm.

Academy Award-winning filmmaker Errol Morris' deeply unsettling exposé reveals the machinations behind the U.S. Department of Justice's "zero tolerance" program, resulting in the separation of sons and daughters from their mothers and fathers, with the goal of deterring immigrants from crossing the southern border.

Based on NBC News Political and National Correspondent Jacob Soboroff's book, Separated: Inside an American Tragedy, Morris merges bombshell interviews with government officials and artful narrative vignettes tracing one migrant family's plight. Together they show that the cruelty at the heart of this policy was its very purpose. The most heartbreaking of Morris' films to date, Separated is a masterwork of moral clarity and emotional potency.

Errol Morris' films have won many awards, including an Oscar for The Fog of War, the Grand Jury Prize at the Sundance Film Festival for A Brief History of Time, the Silver Bear at the Berlin International Film Festival for Standard Operating Procedure, and the Edgar from the Mystery Writers of America for The Thin Blue Line. Separated world-premiered at the Venice International Film Festival this summer to widespread critical

BFS screens family dramedy, Yellowstone wolf doc

Bozeman Film Society continues its latest season with a screening of the critically acclaimed family dramedy, *Goodrich*. The event will be held at Downtown Bozeman's Ellen Theatre on Friday, December 27th. Directed by Haley Meyers-Shyler, the film will screen at 7pm.

Andy Goodrich's (Michael Keaton) life is upended when his wife and mother of their nine-year-old twins enters a 90-day rehab program, leaving him on his own with their young kids. Thrust into the world of modern parenthood, Goodrich leans on his daughter from his first marriage, Grace (Mila Kunis), as he ultimately evolves into the father Grace always wanted. The film is Rated R with a run time of 111 minutes.

Following on Wednesday, January 8th is the Montana premiere of documentary *Mollie's Pack*, nearly 30 years to the day of the wolves' return to Yellowstone. The film screens at 7pm at the Ellen and will include a special panel with wolf biologists Doug Smith and Mike Phillips, editor Avela Grenier, plus Emmy Award-winning filmmaker, Grizzly Creek Films founder, direc-

tor/producer Thomas Winston.

On January 12, 1995, wolves returned to Yellowstone, 50 years after their extirpation. Mollie Beattie, director of the US Fish & Wildlife Service, carried the first Canadian-born wolf into the Park's experimental acclimation enclosure, Alpha Female Wolf No. 5. From that day forward, their lives would be forever connected. This is the true story of Mollie's Pack.

Mollie's Pack is a gripping feature documentary told with primary 16mm film footage that was thought to be forever lost, alongside in-depth interviews with the key players at the center of the historic Yellowstone Wolf reintroduction. The narrative follows the interconnected stories of Mollie Beattie and Wolf No.5 - the alpha female of the Mollie's Pack. It's a modern American epic that has never been told - and Grizzly Creek Films has exclusive access to the people and the footage to bring it to life on screen. Not Rated, the film runs 90 minutes.

Step back in time with live holiday radio shows

For one festive week only, Small Batch Arts presents stage production *A Montana Radio Holiday 1955* at Reynolds Recital Hall on the Montana State University campus. Performances will take place December 18th–22nd at 7pm each night. Two matinee performances will also take place on Dec. 21st and 23rd at 3pm.

In 2019, "A Bozeman Radio Christmas 1939" looked at the year Bozeman got its first commercial radio station. It featured stories of pioneer holidays in the Gallatin Valley and popular holiday swing tunes as sung by the fabulous Gallatin Gals (The GGs).
Following the success of that program, the decision was made to research and develop additional

holiday programs set in a time significant to Montana history.

Like tree rings, holidays provide a telling record of the good years, the lean years, and the years marked by significant events. In their 2021 production, "A Montana Radio Holiday 1944," the performances looked back at the years when gas was rationed and car tires were impossible to find. Audiences traveled the rails of the Jawbone Line through the heart of Montana on the Milwaukee Railroad's magnificent passenger train, the Olympian. This year, the talented troupe of storytellers brings us forward to 1955 with more stories, jingles and holiday swing tunes from the era sung by the fabulous Gallatin Gals.

Directed by Joel Jahnke, the production features a script by M. Douglas MacIntyre and Maggie Petersen, Music Director Jake Fleming and composed/arranged by Erik Pearson.

Blue Slipper play puts spin on beloved Dickens classic

Livingston's Blue Slipper Theatre plays host to a special holiday run of *Jacob Marley's Christmas Carol* this month. Performances are set for December 6th–22nd. Friday and Saturday shows will begin at 8pm, with Sunday matinees to follow at 3pm.

Jacob Marley was Scrooge's business partner in life, and the closest thing he had to a friend. In death, he returns to issue Scrooge a warning, serving as a manifestation of the consequences of greed. He has earned his punishment due to the sins he committed in life and explains that Scrooge can expect the same, unless he changes his ways.

Marley's presence kick starts a

series of events that lead to Scrooge's transformation, and it also instills into the story a sense of urgency right from the beginning as Marley explains the depth of his suffering. He is weighed down by the chain of his sins - the links are forged of cashboxes, padlocks, ledgers and steel purses, things the greedy businessman valued most highly when he was alive and which now constitute a fitting sort of eternal comeuppance. Marley informs Scrooge that he too has fashioned himself a chain, though his is invisible, and consists of an additional seven years' worth of greed.

Part of Marley's punishment has been to watch Scrooge make the same mistakes he did, unable to warn him, and although Marley is granted no means of escaping his own fate, he capitalizes on the opportunity to warn his only friend.

From Tom Mula, the play was inspired by his desire to rehab *A Christmas Carol*, the annual theatrical standby, after performing the role of Scrooge on Chicago stages for nearly a decade. Katie Mangett directs the local production, who helmed last year's hit *Tiny Beautiful Things*.


musical hit Wicked. National tours

Yellowstone Ballet Company's 33rd annual production of Tchaikovsky's holiday classic *The Nutcracker* stars Lucas Segovia in a second performance on Sunday, December 1st, at 2pm at the Willson Auditorium. He will perform the roles of the Nutcracker Prince and the Cavalier.

Originally from Buenos Aires, Segovia joined Ballet Argentina as a soloist under Julio Bocca's direction. He was promoted to Principal Dancer shortly after and was the only dancer performing a solo piece in Bocca's farewell performance for over 300,000 people and broadcasted on national TV.

As for knowing when he wanted to dance, Segovia said, "It caught me by surprise. It was a matter of luck. I didn't start dancing until I was 16 after a female friend convinced me to watch some dancing." Watching the dancing, Segovia realized something. "It wasn't a girly thing. There were a lot of guys taking classes, and the teacher was a man. I thought, 'Why not? I'll give it a try.' In countries where cultures are not so stimulated it's hard to say, 'I want to be a dancer' and make a living doing it. But I was able to do it."

When asked what dance means

to him, Segovia said, "Passion. The reason that I'm in this country and far away from my family is passion. It's a way for me to express myself." This passion has taken Segovia to major theaters in the United States, Spain, France, Italy, Greece, Russia and Cuba, among other places.

Segovia has also danced with The Joffrey Ballet for six seasons, performing in virtually the entire repertoire of the company as a soloist or principal dancer. He has danced works by Balanchine, Robbins, Twyla Tharp, Mark Morris, Christopher Wheeldon, Wayne McGregor, Alexei Ratmansky, William Forstyhe and Annabelle Lopez Ochoa, among many others.

Throughout his career Segovia has danced in more than 400 cities around the globe, performing in some of the most important venues for dance in the world and has been awarded with the Premio Clarin, the most prestigious recognition for the Arts in Argentina.

Joining Segovia is Bozeman native Molly Groeschl. Enhancing the production is a large cast from Yellowstone Ballet Academy, Raison d'etre Dance Project, the School of Classical Ballet Company, Billings, and Circus Center of Bozeman 406CIRQUE.



Hunt for Christmas tree with friends & family

With the holiday season in full swing, locating the family tree is a great opportunity to enhance the communal spirit. Christmas tree **permits** are available for purchase for those who neglect to erect theirs the day after Thanksgiving.

Those with a permit may cut a Christmas tree anywhere on the Custer Gallatin National Forest except at cabins, campgrounds, picnic areas, trailheads, wilderness or riparian areas, natural landmarks,

timber sales and areas where trees have been planted for reforestation

General guidelines for cutting a tree include:

- Stump height: 6 inches maximum (lower the better)
- Do not remove the top of the tree; cut down the entire tree
- · No cutting of five-needle pines (i.e.
- 5 needles in one cluster)
- · Limber Pine and White Bark Pine trees are NOT permitted; If unsure,
- please check with your local ranger district about tree species identification and restrictions
- If snow is on the ground, remove it from around the stump so you can accurately measure the stump and tree height
- · Be Alert! There are many dead and dying trees that could fall at the slightest disturbance
- Trees help protect watersheds, provide habitat for wildlife, and contribute to beautiful scenery; keep
- these values in mind when selecting
- · After cutting your tree, attach the purchased permit to a lower limb near the trunk for transporting home
- · A permit can also be purchased for gathering personal-use boughs, but no cutting from Hemlock or Cedars. Permits, maps, forest road access updates and more are available through the website
- When preparing for the day, dress in layers for changing weather condi-

tions, grab a snack and water, always let another know where you are headed and enjoy spending time outdoors with friends and family

MSU wins Can the annual Griz/Cats in support of food bank pantry

by Anne Cantrell, MSU News Service Montana State University and Gallatin Valley communities donated the equivalent of 652,876 pounds of food this holiday season to the Gallatin Valley Food Bank and MSU's Bounty of the Bridgers food pantry as part of the 25th annual Can the Griz food drive.

Can the Griz – and the corresponding Can the 'Cats food drive in Missoula - is an off-field competition between MSU and the University of Montana to see which school can collect the most donations for its local food bank. This year, MSU and the Gallatin Valley community won the contest. MSU and the Gallatin Valley

community donated 234,866

pounds of food and \$418,010, according to Kim Cleary in the MSU Office of Student Engagement, which coordinates Can the Griz. Each dollar donated is counted as one pound of food for the contest, resulting in a total this year of 652,876 pounds for the Gallatin Valley community. The Can the 'Cats food drive in Missoula brought in the equivalent of 649,278 pounds of food for the Missoula Food Bank, Cleary said.

"We are so grateful to the community for supporting Can the Griz," Cleary said. "At its core, this

competition is about getting food on the tables of people in our community, and it has done just that; so many individuals and families will be fed thanks to the generosity of others. We offer our deepest thanks to all who contributed.'

Last year, MSU and Bobcat supporters donated the equivalent of 596,877 pounds of food to the Gallatin Valley Food Bank for the community, the result of combining pounds and dollars together for the contest, though Cleary noted it wasn't enough to top UM's corresponding food drive, which brought in 870,192 pounds. MSU and the Gallatin Valley community have won the competition 20 out of the 25 years it has been held.

Donations to Can the Griz help the Gallatin Valley Food Bank, as well as MSU's Bounty of the Bridgers food pantry, year-round. The Gallatin Valley Food Bank is one of the HDRC Food and Nutrition Programs' initiatives. Bounty of the Bridgers, housed in MSU's Student Wellness Center, is a student-driven initiative to combat food insecurity for students, faculty and staff.


