

Doc Series examines African relics' return home

The Bozeman Doc Series continues on Thursday, January 9th, at the Emerson Center for the Arts & Culture with the Alternating images of nocturnal melancholy and debates among students at Benin's University of Abomey-Calavi

The African kingdom of Dahomey, which ruled over its region at the west of the continent until the turn of the 20th century, saw hundreds of its splendid royal artifacts plundered by

French colonial troops in its waning days. Now, as 26 of these treasures are set to return to their homeland – now within the Republic of Benin – filmmaker Mati Diop documents their voyage back.

As with her layered, supernaturally tinged Atlantics, Diop takes a singular approach to contemporary questions around belonging in our postcolonial world, transforming this rich subject matter into a multifaction.

eted examination of ownership and exhibition, and employing multiple points of view, including – most strikingly – those of the artifacts themselves as they sail in darkness over the ocean to their rightful home. about what should be done with the objects, *Dahomey* brilliantly negotiates a lost past and an unsure present. Winner of the Golden Bear at the 2024 Berlin Film Festival.

YBC showcases dancer's streets-to-stage journey

Get in the mood for Valentine's Day and experience different shades of love through song, dance and the epic journey of Frederick Davis' From the Streets to the Stage in Yellowstone Ballet Company's "Songs & Dances of Love" at 7:30pm on Saturday, February 8th, at Downtown Bozeman's Willson Auditorium.

"From the Streets to the Stage: The Journey of Fredrick Davis is the story of an African American child who overcame tremendous odds to achieve his dream of dancing. "My experience growing up as a kid was one of living in poverty on the streets of Chattanooga. I had many dreams. I wanted to be a lawyer, businessman, firefighter, wrestler, football player. I couldn't afford to try out for the football team and the dance auditions were free, so that was where it all started."

His exposure to dance at age 11 changed his life; he found inspiration, love and the support he needed from Ballet Tennessee, his church family, his grandmother and a caring community to become a principal dancer with the Harlem

Ballet. After training on scholarship at Ballet Tennessee, "I was offered a full scholarship to the Joffrey Ballet School in New York City and then joined Dance Theatre of Harlem" said Davis.

Dance Theatre of Harlem Artistic Director, Virginia Johnson, said, "One could anticipate that the stardom of having danced as a Principal with the legendary Dance Theatre of Harlem could easily go to one's head, but this is farthest from the truth with Fred. His hard work and humble beginnings reflect who he is today."

"After leaving Dance Theatre of Harlem, Davis participated in a Dance for America tour and danced at the Kennedy Center Honors in Washington, D.C. As a sought-after performer, Fredrick has served as a guest artist for Dallas Black Dance Theatre, Ballet Tucson, Dance Theatre of Harlem, San Jose Dance Theatre, New Jersey Ballet Company, and Connecticut Ballet. He also has been a guest choreographer for Neville Dance Theatre.

"I am in the process of opening

a non-profit dance school and company in Tennessee. My goal is to build a bridge going forward for the African American and underprivileged community." To quote Stan Lee Davis says, "don't listen to the naysayers. If you really want to do something, do it. Don't look for a job or career. Find your purpose in life and goals and go for it. Nothing is ever certain in life. You can never be ready when the time is right, you can only be ready enough to take the chance. Be the best that you can be."

Along with Davis and his partner Gabriela Escalona from Venezuela performing *Le Corsaire* and *The Lark Ascending*, the mélange includes excerpts from: *Swan Lake* and *Romeo & Juliet* with Molly Groesch and Lucas Segovia, and love songs sung by Ciara Walace.

Montana paint artist Ophelia Easton unveils *Made for These Times* in the Jessie Wilber Gallery.

This body of work is about how it feels to be a young woman, born in the windblown plains of North Central Montana, facing an era of great change and pressure from all sides.

"These pieces are about survival, saying 'hell no,' and standing up for what I love. Growing up in Montana, most of the art I have seen is rooted in desire, fantasy, and possession: a wild horse that would soon be broken, a life of camping under the moonlit sky, a group of stereotypically picturesque American Indians. Though easy on the eyes, these pictures never felt like an echo of home to me.

"Sure, I've spent days fishing a clear creek, making camp in the backcountry, hunting for game in the hills. But Montana has always had another side to it, rooted in poverty, addiction, violence and exploitation. The Montana I grew

up in didn't have remote jobs, Teslas, or fashionable workwear. It had \$1.39 lg. fountain pop, 4 inch blades in pants' side pockets, and piles of sawdust to catch the blood of the elk carcass hanging in the garage.

"Since the great influx of pandemic Yellowbellies playing cowboy, the subsequent housing crisis, and amplified political division, life in Montana has changed for everyone. My home, my family, and my body, things I used to feel free with, have become something I now feel the need to defend. Montana women have a reputation for being fiercely independent and self-made. Now, more than ever, we all need to apply our strength to togetherness, clarity of vision, and radical joy."

The event will be held at Downtown Bozeman's Ellen Theatre on Wednesday, January 8th. The film screens at 7pm and will include a special panel with wolf biologists Doug Smith and Mike Phillips, editor Avela Grenier, plus Emmy Award-winning filmmaker, Grizzly Creek Films founder, director/producer Thomas Winston.

On January 12, 1995, wolves

returned to Yellowstone, 50 years after their extirpation. Mollie Beattie, director of the US Fish & Wildlife Service, carried the first Canadian-born wolf into the Park's experimental acclimation enclosure, Alpha Female Wolf No. 5. From that day forward, their lives would be forever connected. This is the true story of Mollie's Pack.

Mollie's Pack is a gripping feature documentary told with primary 16mm film footage that was thought to be forever lost, alongside in-depth interviews with the key players at the center of the historic

Yellowstone Wolf reintroduction. The narrative follows the interconnected stories of Mollie Beattie and Wolf No.5 – the alpha female of the Mollie's Pack. It's a modern American epic that has never been told – and Grizzly Creek Films has exclusive access to the people and the footage to bring it to life on screen. Not Rated, the film runs 90 minutes.

Yellowstone winter season begins – what to know before you go

The winter season in Yellowstone National Park is underway. Annually from mid-December until mid-March, visitors can travel most of the park's roads from the West, South, East and North entrances by approved commercially guided snowmobiles and snowcoaches and via the non-commercially guided

snowmobile access program.

Currently, the accumulation of snowfall on roads varies across the park. This means that visitors will be able to travel in the park, however, the type of transportation used on park roads by commercially guided snowmobile or snowcoach tour companies will depend on road conditions. Throughout the winter season, park staff will work closely with all operators and provide updates as

conditions change.

Winter travel ends in mid-March when plowing crews begin to clear a winter's worth of snow. Roads will start to re-open to automobiles beginning in mid-April.

Top Things to Know in Winter Most Park Roads are Closed to

The only roads open year-round are between the North Entrance in Gardiner, Montana, and the Northeast Entrance in Cooke City/Silver Gate, Montana (via Mammoth Hot Springs, Tower Junction and Lamar Valley). Anticipate possible road closures due to quickly changing weather and dangerous driving conditions. Check the road status map before you arrive. Drive cautiously and give plenty of space to snow plows. Do

not stop, stand, or walk in the road. Use a turnout if you need to stop for any reason.

Winter temperatures range from zero to 20°F (-20°C to -5°C) throughout the day. Sub-zero temperatures are common, especially at night and at higher elevations. Check current weather conditions. pack proper clothing and equipment and review winter safety tips.

Do Not Approach or Feed Wildlife Animals have the right of way. Expect to encounter bison and other wildlife on park roads. Slow down or pull over until they pass or move off the road. Stay 100 yards (91 m) from bears and wolves and 25 yards (23 m) from all other wildlife. The safest way to view wildlife is through a telephoto lens, a spotting scope or a pair of binoculars. Store food properly and be aware that in some

Stay on Boardwalks

People have been severely injured or killed by breaking through thin ground in thermal basins or falling into hot springs. Exercise caution and wear traction aids over footwear when navigating snowy or icy board-

For the second time in four seasons, the Montana State Bobcats will play for a national football championship. The Football Championship Subdivision title game will kick off at 5pm Mountain time on Monday, January 6th, at Toyota Stadium in Frisco, Texas.

MSU enters the contest against the North Dakota State University Bison with the top national seed and its first-ever undefeated season. As Big Sky Conference championås, the Bobcats earned a first-round playoff bye before defeating the University of Tennessee, Martin and the University of Idaho. On Dec. 21st, they beat the

University of South Dakota by a score of 31-17 to lock in their spot in the championship game.

The Bison beat South Dakota State in the other semifinal game, 28-21. MSU and NDSU last met on Dec. 2nd, 2023 in the second round of the playoffs - a game the Bison won by a single point, 35-34. Broadcasts and Tickets

Gallatin Valley Earth Day kicks off its annual event series preceding the spring festival with a presentation by environmental journalist and author Ben Goldfarb, "Dam It: Partnering with Beavers to Heal the Planet" is set for Thursday, January 16th, at 7pm. It will be held at the Emerson Center for the Arts & Culture with a book signing and reception one hour prior.

In his book Eager: The Surprising, Secret Life of Beavers and Why They Matter, Goldfarb reveals that our modern conception of a healthy ecosystem is wrong, distorted by the fur trade that once eliminated millions of beavers from North America's waterways. The consequences of losing beavers were profound: ponds drained, wetlands dried up, and species from salmon to swans lost vital habitat.

Today, a growing coalition of "Beaver Believers" - including scientists, farmers, and passionate citizens recognizes that ecosystems with beavers are far healthier than those without them. From the Nevada deserts to the Scottish highlands, Believers are hard at work restoring these industrious rodents to their for-

mer haunts. In his talk, Goldfarb will discuss the history and biology of this world-changing species; how beavers can help us fight drought, flooding, wildfire, and climate change; and how we can coexist with this challenging but vital rodent.

A panel discussion with Q&A will follow the presentation. Panelists include Goldfarb, Connor Parrish from Trout Unlimited, Kurt Imhoff of the Greater Yellowstone Coalition and panel MC Leah Thayer from the World Wildlife Fund.




