
Shane teens presents some 'Greased Lightning'

It's a leather jacket affair at Livingston's Shane Lalani Center for the Arts as their community theatre season continues. Dress accordingly for *Grease: The Musical* with perform-

It's 1959, and Rydell High School's senior class is in rare form. The toocool-for-school "Burger Palace Boys" are stealing hub-caps and acting tough and their gumsnapping, chain-smoking "Pink Ladies" are looking hot in bobby sox and pedal pushers. The 1950s high school dream is about to explode in this rollicking musical that is both an homage to the idealism of the fifties and a satire of high schoolers' age-old desire to be rebellious, provocative and rebellious.

At the heart of the story is the romance between hot-rodding gangster Danny Zuko and the sweet new girl in town, Sandy



Dumbrowski. They had a secret romance in summer, but now back in the context of school, peer-pressure and cliques make their love a bit more complicated. Can Danny maintain his cool dude status and still get make demure Sandy his girl?

The whole gang sings and dances around Danny and Sandy's romance, through such hit songs as "Greased Lightnin'", "We Go Together" and "Mooning," recalling the music of Buddy Holly, Little Richard and Elvis Presley that became the soundtrack of a generation. Starting off with an eight-year Broadway run, *Grease* is among the world's most popular musicals and has a cult-like following, especially among teens [*Stage Agent*].



In one of the most unique stories to come out of a mall, the film follows the story of 8 young Rhode Island artists who secretly built a fully functioning apartment inside one of the country's busiest mall as a political-motivated prank – and ended up living there 4 years, filming everything along the way.

Far more than just a wild prank, the secret mall apartment became an incredibly meaningful act for all the participants, at once an act of defiance against local gentrification, a boundary-pushing work of public/private art, and a 750 square foot space that sticks it to the man. Jerry Workman directs alongside executive producer Jesse Eisenberg. Rated PG-13, the film runs 91 minutes.





BIG community donor drive kicks off month

The largest single giving day in Montana to raise critical funds for nonprofits in Gallatin County

On May 1st and 2nd from 6pm to 6pm, One Valley Community Foundation will host the 11th annual Give Big Gallatin Valley initiative. Give Big is a 24-hour celebration that raises critical funds for nonprofits located in or serving Gallatin County. The initiative is designed to connect donors to the nonprofits they care most about to raise unrestricted funding to support their work. Over the past ten years, our community has come together to raise \$17.4 million through 88,621 gifts for hundreds of local nonprofits during Give Big. Last year alone, 6,018 generous donors raised north of \$3.13 million for 272 nonprofits.

OLLI forum talks Bozeman water supply

From MSU News Service The Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at Montana State University will host a virtual Friday Forum on May 9th. The event, called "City of Bozeman Long Term Water Supply Planning," will be held online via Zoom from noon to 1:30pm and is free and open to the public.

The forum will feature a presentation and analysis of Bozeman's long-term water supply and related planning efforts. A short overview of the city's current water supply sources will be followed by recommendations for future use and sus-

The featured speaker will be Shawn Kohtz, utilities director for the city of Bozeman. Kohtz is responsible for managing the city's water supply system, distribution and conservation programs.

Kohtz will explain where Bozeman's water comes from, break down the city's usage and projected needs, and discuss how existing and proposed management strategies and studies feed into future needs. He will also discuss the city's wastewater treatment processes.

In 2013, the Bozeman City Commission adopted an Integrated Water Resources Plan, which recommended water supply policies to ensure Bozeman has adequate supplies available to meet future demands. Since that time, city officials have worked to implement many of the recommendations and are now initiating an update to

It is important to continue to have a clear plan for development of future city water supplies and celebrate the demand reduction achieved through effective water conservation programming, Kohtz
