Fans of JRR Tolkien's Lord of the Rings (LOTR) and the Hobbit epic celebrate September 22 as Hobbit Day. The week containing Hobbit Day is also celebrated as Tolkien Week. Hobbit Day and Tolkien Week first began in 1978 by the proclamation of the American Tolkien Society, an organization whose goal is to further the study and spread the appreciation of the works of JRR Tolkien and his son, Christopher JR Tolkien. September 22 is designated as Hobbit Day because it is the birthdate of two of JRR Tolkien's main characters - Bilbo Baggins and Frodo Baggins. Bilbo Baggins, the protagonist of Tolkien's hugely popular 1937 children's novel, The Hobbit, was born on September 22, Third Age 2890. Frodo Baggins, the central character in the LOTR trilogy, on the other hand, is 78 years younger than Bilbo, having been born in the Third Age year of 2968. There is some debate whether Hobbit Day is on September 22 or September 12, as the LOTR and Hobbit calendar does not synchronize with the Gregorian Calendar.

MOR exhibits to change with fall colors

It's your last chance to experience exhibit ***SUE: The T.rex Experience*** at Bozeman's Museum of the Rockies, set to close with a final viewing day of September 7th. Step into the world of SUE the T. rex to uncover the mysteries about the life of this fearsome fossil.

Come between two titans with full-scale casts of SUE and T. rex's nemesis, Triceratops. Experience a unique multimedia show transporting you to the Cretaceous forest alongside SUE. Learn how the fossil was unearthed, and how scientists continue to make discoveries about SUE, the most complete Tyrannosaurus rex specimen ever discovered.

Use all of your senses to take in SUE's world. Take a whiff of their putrid breath, watch SUE tromp through the Late Cretaceous forest,

feel the texture of dinosaur skin, and hear the subsonic rumble of a T. rex. See the fossils of animals, plants and dinosaurs that lived during the Late Cretaceous period, and come face-to-face with a full-size, fleshed-out replication of a ferocious T. rex battling the duck-billed herbivore, Edmontosaurus.

And opening next month, MOR presents ***Becoming Jane: The Evolution of Dr. Jane Goodall***. The exhibit opens October 3rd.

Dr. Jane Goodall, DBE, founder of the Jane Goodall Institute and UN Messenger of Peace, braved the unknown to give the world a remarkable window into humankind's closest living relatives: chimpanzees.

In this hands-on, transportive multimedia exhibition celebrating

her extraordinary life and work, visitors will explore Dr. Goodall's early years through iconic images and a multiscreen experience and venture on an immersive projection of Tanzania's Gombe Stream National Park where she did her famous behavioral research on chimps.

Visitors will also see a life-size hologram of Dr. Goodall, enter a replica of her research tent, and learn about her current role as a leader in community-centered conservation and youth empowerment. Finally, visitors will find out what they can do today to make a positive impact in the world.

Animals large & small for PechaKucha season premiere

At 5' 4" and 120 pounds, large animal veterinarian Kelsey Martin has had her hands full going up against Montana's finest 2,000-pound beef cattle on a daily basis.

Kelsey combines corny, country-fried comedy with honest, gritty vulnerability to discuss a profession often viewed as noble, but that also has a darker, more complicated side.

Kelsey is one of eleven presenters at the next **PechaKucha Night(s)**. The events will be held at Downtown Bozeman's Ellen Theatre on Wednesday and Thursday, September 10th and 11th. Both shows begin at 6:40pm and feature the same lineup of speakers each night.

Most of us are more familiar with the veterinarians who take care of our dogs and cats. Mary Sadowski, writer, photographer and pet-lover, will describe an epidemic of overcrowded pet shelters – and ways we can make all a difference. There are an estimated 3-5 million dogs, puppies, cats and kittens surrendered or rescued every year.

In keeping with the eclectic nature of PechaKucha, Sandra Oldendorf's presentation is titled "I Went to College and Joined the Circus." A farm girl, Sandra entered Illinois State University in Normal, IL as a math major, but also began nearly four years riding a unicycle and being twirled around on a rope above the university arena.

But you don't have to join a circus to have fun. Katie Dolen, co-founder of State of Play, a play and art space for families, will show us

how early experiences in play and creative expression are the key to building resilient, curious and empathetic humans.

Unfortunately, says Allison Bryan, social connections are now being frayed by digital devices and artificial intelligence. The founder of Physical Space, an interdisciplinary architecture practice, will explore the role of physical space in fostering authentic, in-person relationships, as well as connection with self.

For some, the normal challenges of growing up and negotiating our way through life are made much more challenging. Brianna Daniels lost a limb to cancer as a child, but was able to rebuild her life after moving to Montana and finding Eagle Mount and the adaptive community. The outdoors became her sanctuary and helped her transform personal adversity into purpose.

The challenges we face take many forms. Jelani Mahiri will present on "Blacks in Diving." Mahiri, a springboard diver in college, will describe the history of diving and racial politics around pools and tell us about black divers today.

The news is dominated these days by election controversies and challenges to voting laws. Patti Steinmuller will present on the key role the League of Women Voters plays locally and nationwide in educating voters and promoting voting. The nonpartisan group was founded in 1920 by suffragists.

Gallatin High School senior Ezra Graham notes that ever since frontier days, the Mountain West has

attracted writers and journalists. The young journalist will draw from historical records and his own newspaper collection to shed light on the forgotten stories that have helped shaped rural journalism.

Benjamin Griffin looks back at the Montana of the past to explore the life and legacy of his grandfather, Ed, a Montana legislator and poet. His presentation, "The Absence of Whales," reflects on what remains when someone is gone.

To guarantee attendees a full dose of color and humor, the peripatetic Missy O'Malley, frequent PK emcee, charity auctioneer and media personality will offer her very personal take on the two-dollar bill, and its storied role in her family traditions.

Justin Barth, director of development for Gallatin Valley Land Trust, returns for his third stint as emcee.

BFS indie titles run thematic gamut

Bozeman Film Society continues its latest season with dark horror comedy ***Together*** on Friday, September 5th. The event will be held at Downtown Bozeman's Ellen Theatre at 7:30pm.

Years into their relationship, Tim and Millie (Dave Franco and Alison Brie) find themselves at a crossroads as they move to the country, abandoning all that is familiar in their lives except each other. With tensions already flaring, a nightmarish encounter with a mysterious, unnatural force threatens to corrupt their lives, their love and their flesh.

Written and directed by Michael Shanks, the film is Rated R with a runtime of 102 minutes.

"That the two stars are married in real life is part of the movie's genius and certainly key to why *Together* is as outrageously funny as it is scary." – *The Washington Post*

Following on Saturday, Sept. 13th, catch an Ellen screening of indie standout ***Eddington***. The film begins at 7:30pm.

In May of 2020, a standoff between a small-town sheriff (Joaquin Phoenix) and mayor (Pedro Pascal) sparks a powder keg as neighbor is pitted against neighbor in Eddington, New Mexico. Backed by an unanimously phenomenal cast, *Eddington* captures pandemic-era trauma with mixed results, delivering an unmistakably Ari Aster film: idiosyncratic,

enigmatic, and polarizing.

Also starring Emma Stone, Austin Butler and Luke Grimes. Rated R, the film runs 144 minutes.

And late this month, enjoy music documentary ***It's Never Over, Jeff Buckley*** at the Ellen. The film screens on Wednesday, Sept. 24th, at 7:30pm.

Oscar-nominated filmmaker Amy Berg's moving documentary covers the life Jeff Buckley, the rising young star with an otherworldly voice and boundary-pushing artistry, who left the '90s music world reeling when he died suddenly, at age 30, after the release of his critically acclaimed debut album *Grace*.

Told through never-before-seen footage from Buckley's archives and intimate accounts from his mother, Mary Guibert, former partners Rebecca Moore and Joan Wasser, for-

mer bandmates, and luminaries like Ben Harper and Aimee Mann, It's Never Over, Jeff Buckley illuminates one of modern music's most influential and enigmatic figures. Not Rated, the film runs 108 minutes.

"Most artist documentaries attempt but rarely get to a true and palpable essence of their subjects, but it's this sense of his earnestly tender nature, pieced together from loved ones and old archive interviews of Buckley, that leaves an impression." – *New York Times*

Friday Forum discusses local gov't structures

The Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at Montana State University will host a virtual Friday Forum on September 12th to discuss local government study commissions, as well as city and county government structures.

The forum "**Should We Change Our Local Government Structure?**" will be held from noon to 1:30pm via Zoom. It is free and open to the public.

During the event, representatives from city and county study commissions will report on their progress and explain their plans for engaging the public as they decide whether to recommend changes for voter consideration during a future election. Once every 10 years, voters choose whether to review the structure of their local governments per the Montana constitution.

Faced with historic growth, voters in both Gallatin County and Bozeman decided to create local

government study commissions in May 2024. In November last year, five citizens were elected to the city study commission and seven to the county study commission. Current questions facing the commissions include whether three commissioners are enough to govern the second most populous county in Montana and whether city commissioners should be elected from specific districts or wards rather than at-large selections.

Participants must register before 11am Friday, Sept. 12th. Ahead of the event, attendees will receive an email from Zoom with a link and login instructions.

Friday Forums occur on the second Friday of the month from September through May and are hosted by OLLI at MSU, which is a program of Academic Technology and Outreach. For more information, visit www.montana.edu/olli.

The Helena four-piece lays down all your classic Grateful Dead favorites with every spirited performance. Committed to preserving the legacy of the popular genre-skewing rock band, 710 features a talented group of veteran Montana musicians.

Hot Tuna takes the stage Sept. 14th.

For more than four decades, Hot Tuna has played, toured and recorded some of the best and most memorable acoustic and electric music ever. Lifelong members, Jorma Kaukonen and Jack Casady, formed this spin-off band in the late 60s after performing avidly with Jefferson Airplane. Fusing a variety of rock styles, free rhythmic techniques, and a collected timbre of instruments is what has identified this band over their 40-plus years of playing.

Local H and Sponge warm up the crowd for **Everclear** on Sept. 17th.

One of the leading alternative rock bands to emerge from the ‘90s, the band celebrated their 30th Anniversary in recent years, and founder, vocalist and guitarist Art Alexakis has made it clear that he has no plans to slow down. Since forming in 1992, Everclear has enjoyed a lengthy career by any measure, spanning 11 studio releases, including four that have been certified Gold or Platinum, selling over 6 million records, and achieving 12 Top 40 Hit Singles on Mainstream Rock, Alternative, and Adult Top 40 radio, including “Santa Monica,” “Father of Mine,” “I Will Buy You a New Life,” “Wonderful” and “Everything to Everyone,” as well as numerous videos, thousands of shows, and various other accolades, including a 1998 Grammy nomination.

Delivering back-to-back performances on Sept. 19th and 20th are **Umfrey’s McGee**.

In the twenty-four years since the eclectic improv-rock band formed, their sound has been an amalgamation of genres, moods, and tempos, effortlessly flowing from one feeling to the next throughout an album or concert – or sometimes within a singular song. But with time and repetition comes
