

TEDx at MSU returns with annual event

TEDxMontanaStateUniversity event on Wednesday, November 5th.

The event will be held from 6 to 8pm at Inspiration Hall inside Norm Asbiornson Hall on MSU's campus and will conclude with a small reception. Student tickets are \$5, and general public tickets are \$15. Both are available for purchase online.

TEDxMontanaStateUniversity is a spin-off of the nationally acclaimed TED Talks program, where influential speakers share educational and innovative ideas with an audience in short talks often under 15 minutes. Notable people who have delivered TED Talks include Bill Gates, Al Gore and Temple Grandin, among many others.

At MSU, this year's event theme is "Forging New Paths." Below is a list of the five speakers.

- Trent Berg: MSU graduate and

founder of Blackmore Sensors and Analytics, which has now been acquired by Aurora. Berg serves as the director of lidar engineering at Aurora, a company responsible for some of the country's leading automotive vehicle technology.

Bri Daniels: MSU alumna and a two-time childhood cancer survivor, amputee, and advocate for disability rights. After losing her leg to bone cancer at 18, Daniels discovered adaptive sports and the transformative power of community. Through her work in adaptive sports, expanding prosthetic access, and inclusive health care design, Bri invites audiences to reimagine mobility not just as a physical ability, but as a universal human right and a source of joy, freedom, and connection.

Brian Gilman: After 26 years in the Marines, Gilman left his active-duty role as chief of staff of the Marine Forces Special Operations Command in 2020 to

serve veterans in a new way: becoming the CEO of Warriors and Quiet Waters Foundation in Bozeman. This organization connects post-9/11 veterans with outdoor resources near Bozeman and evidence-based programs that foster growth, discovery, connection and community.

Quinn Holland: An MSU engineering and business alumnus who co-founded the company Nutrax. This business aims to progress regenerative agriculture by connecting large food companies with agricultural producers to help increase sustainability.

- Sarah Nell Harp: Current MSU student studying graphic design and marketing. She works to change the dialogue around failure by pushing herself to try new things and accepting the occasional defeat.

In "Beyond the Veil: A Journey of SelfRevelation," Ally Leadbetter, describes how these moments can bring "the uncomfortable shedding of who we thought we were." These "descents" are often framed as breakdowns, yet well-known myths reveal that they are actually break-

Yet another way to play an important role in your local community is to participate in government and educate citizens about how it works. EJ Porth and Jackie Haines, two of seven elected officials on the Gallatin County Local Government Study Commission, will use historical photographs and humor to tell the story of how Montana developed "the most beautiful and progressive constitution in the United

Shane stage rings the bell in 15th century Paris

Venture back to another place and time at Livingston's Shane Lalani Center for the Arts as their community theatre season continues. Dress accordingly for *The* Hunchback of Notre Dame with performances running through November 9th.

What makes a monster and what makes a man? This is the central theme of The Hunchback of Notre Dame, a sweeping, grand-scale musical. Based on the 1996 Disney film and Victor Hugo's 1831 novel, the play tells the story of Quasimodo, the hunchbacked bell-ringer of Notre Dame, and his desire to one day be a part of the outside world.

When he summons the courage to attend the Feast of Fools, he meets Esmeralda, a compassionate gypsy who protects him from an angry mob. But at the same time, Quasimodo's master, the archdeacon Dom Claude Frollo, and the new captain of the guard, Phoebus de Martin, fall in love with the beautiful girl.

Adding to Quasimodo's struggle is his punishment and derision from Frollo, following years of psychological abuse, and the danger posed by the gypsies, who are willing to kill any outsiders who venture into their secret hideout. But before Paris is burned to the ground, will Quasimodo be able to save Esmeralda from Frollo's lust and anger? Will she return Quasimodo's affection? Who is the true monster of Notre Dame? Blue Slipper stages contemplative character study

The stage is set as Livingston's Blue Slipper Theatre presents the first production of its new season with Pulitzer Prize-winning playwright Annie Baker's The Aliens this month. Performances are set for November 14th-23rd. Friday and Saturday shows will begin at 7:30pm, with Sunday matinees to follow at 3pm. The local production is directed by Sarah Sherman.

The Aliens is a quiet, contemplative play about friendship, loss and the search for meaning. Set behind a small coffee shop in Vermont, it follows two thirty-something dropouts

KJ and Jasper - who spend their days hanging out, talking about poetry, music, and their dreams that never quite came true. When Evan, a shy teenage employee, begins to

interact with them, the unlikely trio forms a fragile bond that's both funny and deeply human.

The play is known for its minimalist dialogue, long silences, and naturalistic pacing - hallmarks of Baker's style. It explores themes of loneliness, mentorship and artistic failure, offering a tender look at the connections that form on society's fringes. Despite its quietness, The Aliens delivers a powerful emotional impact through small moments and unspoken truths.

Natchez captures an unsettling clash between history and memory in a small Mississippi town; a layered mosaic of people contending with the weight of the past in a place

where it is always present. Equal parts amusing and disturbing, we journey through an antebellum tourist destination at a crossroads as it grapples with a deeply troubled history that is so thoroughly ingrained in its present, we're left to wonder if it's actually past at all.

The Emerson Center for the Art & Culture is pleased to host its newest shows featuring emerging artists from our community.

Interdisciplinary artist Russell Brausch unveils *Not So Far Away* in the Jessie Wilber Gallery. The exhibit explores America's complex relationship with fire through painting, burning, drawing and textiles.

"A century of fire suppression, the loss of Indigenous cultural burning, and climate change have created today's wildfire crisis. It is not a matter of if a fire will come, but when. Federal land employees work tirelessly with little progress, caught between containing fires and restoring damaged landscapes," Brausch writes.

"As hotter, drier climates push fire back into the land through both destruction and controlled burns, my creative process seeks to illuminate this complex history. Through painting, burning, drawing, and textiles, I open different entry points into the wildfire conversation. My research expands on acknowledging and redefining America's relationship with fire."

Montana paint artist Emma Bergman showcases *The Quiet Mundane* in the Lobby and Weaver Room galleries. The exhibit celebrates the beauty of everyday life, elevating small moments, ordinary routines and familiar scenes into something precious and worth cherishing

"The Quiet Mundane captures everyday moments, creatures, and

people from my life. My process is as much an approach to living as it is a body of work. Rather than viewing my life as a series of monumental moments, I am learning to appreciate the mundane, the repetitive, and the beauty of small things. Rather than letting the mundane slip by, I am attempting to bring the viewer's focus to the little corner of the world that I inhabit. I believe by observing this, sit-ting with it for hours, and translating it into paint, I am elevating the mundane to something of importance, as some-thing precious to be savored," reads an excerpt from Bergman's artist statement.

"Through painting, I am grounded in my observance of the small and the ordinary while the world is at each other's throats. *The Quiet Mundane* is universal. While my neighbors live different lives, with different people, events, and beliefs than my own, they might still find a surprising familiarity in my work. They might find that we share many mundane moments, if not in actuality, then in spirit. In the larger world we are all different, but in many small ways, we are the same. For me,

that is quite monumental."

BFS screens pair of endearing indies

Bozeman Film Society continues its latest season with *New York Times* Critic's Pick *Griffin in Summer* on Wednesday, November 12th. The event will be held at Downtown Bozeman's Ellen Theatre at 7pm.

Bozeman actor and Ellen Theatre stage alumni, Everett Blunck, shines in this coming-of-age film. At just 13, he landed the role of Griffin Nafly, an ambitious young playwright navigating friendship, first crushes and the trials of adolescence. His performance has been called confident, charming and award-worthy. Other films include *The Plague* with Joel Edgerton (coming soon), *Blood for Dust, Outlaw Posse, Rust,* plus limited series *Bring on the Dancing Horses*.

Griffin Nafly (Blunck) is the most ambitious playwright of his generation. He's also fourteen years old and living with his parents in a humdrum suburb while dreaming of moving to New York City. When his mom (Melanie Lynskey) hires a handsome 25-year-old handyman (Owen Teague), Griffin's life and his new play take an inspired turn. Written and Directed by Nicholas Colia, the film also stars Kathryn Newton and Abby Ryder Fortson. Rated R, the film runs 93 minutes.

Bozeman's homegrown ballerina, Molly Groeschl, who is at the top of her performance skills having danced with Colorado Ballet, Ballet West and Milwaukee Ballet, and as a soloist and principal dancer with Tucson Ballet and Madison Ballet, performs the demanding role of the Sugar Plum Fairy.

The illustrious Lucas Segovia performs the roles of the Nutcracker Prince and the Cavalier. Lucas joined Ballet Argentina as a soloist under Julio Bocca's direction and was promoted to principal dancer shortly after. He has been awarded with the Premio Clarin, the most prestigious recognition for the Arts in Argentina. Lucas has performed in over 400 cities around the globe along with performing in some of the most famous dance venues in Spain, France, Italy, Greece, Russia, the United States and Cuba. He has also been a part of The Washington Ballet and of Morphoses/The Wheeldon Company, directed by Christopher Wheeldon and has

danced with The Joffrey Ballet, performing in virtually the entire repertoire of the company as a soloist or principal dancer.

Molly and Lucas have been dancing together for many years, not only in guest appearances of The Nutcracker throughout the U.S. but also in Balanchine's Rubies with Madison Ballet and excerpts from Swan Lake and Romeo & Juliet in YBC's Songs & Dances of Love. Although they are not related, their friendship throughout these many years has created a special bond between them. Molly describes her affinity with Lucas as a brother and sister type of relationship. "I know that I am very cared for when I dance with Lucas on stage. When you are lucky enough to have a strong and trusted partner like him, you can just let go of any fears and perform to the top of your ability."



After a bountiful season last year, Southwest Montana has already received its first supply of mountain and valley snow – a tantalizing sight for area skiers and snowboarders eager to carve up the hill. Worry not, Bridger Bowl's winter season will soon commence! Here's a breakdown of their most popular pass options so you're ready to go when the lifts open. They also make a great gift for holiday celebrations (wink, wink)!

Enjoy unlimited skiing all season with no black-out dates with the purchase of a season pass. Rates are as follows: \$1,230 for adults (25-69), \$1,180 for young adults (19-24), \$670 for juniors (13-18), and \$370 for children (7-12). Preschool aged youth (6 and under) pay only \$15. Senior passes (70-79) are \$670, or \$15 for super seniors (80+).

Adult Midweek Season Passes (19-69) are also available for \$610, or \$475 for seniors (70-79). This will grant access to unlimited skiing

Monday through Friday all season. Or get your gloves on the Value Pass to ski and ride every day except for blackout dates over busy holidays. These are \$1,030 for adults (19-69), \$440 for juniors (13-18) and \$315 for children (7-12).

Purchase season passes, upload pass photos, and sign electronic agreements through Bridger's website. Be "on-line" rather than "inline." Go straight to the lifts on opening day!

and adults and also grooms a vast network of winter trails in and around Bozeman, including snowmaking at Sunset Hills.
