



Tinworks opens new artistic space downtown

Tinworks Art is thrilled to announce the opening of a new Downtown Bozeman site at the historic Rialto Theater, expanding the organization's footprint and deepening its commitment to bringing contemporary art to the American West.

The new space, **Tinworks at** Rialto, is now open with Matthew Barney's *Redoubt* on view through January. The presentation of Redoubt coincides with the 30th anniversary of the return of gray wolves to Yellowstone National Park, one of the most successful conservation efforts in modern history.

The addition of Tinworks at Rialto establishes a dynamic, yearround presence for contemporary art in Downtown Bozeman. The space offers a flexible venue for installations, artist talks, film screenings, and performances, inviting visitors to engage with new ideas and creative experimentation at the center of the city.

This complements Tinworks' existing two-acre site on N Ida Ave comprised of a former metal manufacturing warehouse and mix of former agricultural buildings, which continue to support large-scale art projects, exhibitions, artist residencies and experimental work.

"Bringing Tinworks into the heart of downtown strengthens our connection with the community and ensures that ground-breaking contemporary art is part of Bozeman's daily life," said Jenny Moore,

Director of Tinworks Art. "The Rialto is a beloved local landmark and we're thrilled to see it become a hub for new ideas and creative dialogue. It feels especially fitting to open with Matthew Barney's *Redoubt*, a film that captures the magnificence and complexity of the American West and reflects Tinworks' ongoing engagement with place, myth, history, and experimentation."

Barney's Redoubt was filmed in Idaho's Sawtooth Mountain range and layers classical, cosmological, and American myths about humanity's place in the natural world. When it premiered in 2019, the New York Times called it "breathtakingly beautiful... a western that reaches for the cosmic." Continuing the artist's longstanding interest in landscape as both setting and subject, Redoubt loosely adapts the myth of Diana, goddess of the hunt, and Actaeon, a hunter who trespasses on her and is

Like much of Barney's work, the film contains no dialogue. The narrative is conveyed through an original score composed and orchestrated by Jonathan Bepler, the moderndance movements of Eleanor Bauer and Laura Stokes, and the hoop dancing of Sandra Lamouche, a member of the Bigstone Cree Nation. These elements echo and foreshadow the characters' encounter with the wildlife and terrain of the West.

Since joining Tinworks in 2023 as its inaugural director, Moore has guided the organization through a significant period of growth. Tinworks commissions and presents

work by diverse artists that reflects the distinctive context of the contemporary West. Under Moore's leadership, the organization has expanded its programming, formalized its operations, and launched major capital projects, including the addition of Tinworks at Rialto and the renovation of its mill building on N Ida Ave, set to open for the summer 2026 season. These initiatives advance Tinworks' vision of continuous, yearround, dynamic engagement with audiences and community.

The opening of Tinworks at Rialto is a key component of this broader initiative, linking Bozeman's historic downtown with Tinworks' evolving campus on the edge of the city in the creative and industrial Northeast Neighborhood.

In addition to Tinworks' own programs, the Rialto space will also serve as a community resource, available for use by other local non-profits and partnering organizations for cultural and educational programming, and also offering venue rentals that provide essential support for Tinworks' commitment to fostering a vibrant cultural ecosystem in the Gallatin Valley region.

Doc Series profiles unlikely Macedonian friendship

On Sunday, December 7th, at the Emerson Center for the Arts & Culture, the Bozeman Doc Series continues with the Montana premiere of the critically acclaimed new documentary, The Tale of From the Oscar-nominated

director of Honeyland comes a poignant and visually arresting story set in the heart of rural Macedonia. Nikola, a farmer grappling with the harsh realities of new government policies, finds himself unable to sell his land or crops. When his family leaves in search of a better life abroad, Nikola takes a job as a landfill attendant, where he encounters the injured white stork Silyan. As he nurses the bird back to health, an unlikely bond forms between man and animal. The result is a deeply moving film that touches on climate change, economic migration, resilience and the quiet power of

The Tale of Silyan world-premiered at this year's Venice

International Film Festival to widespread critical acclaim and has gone on to screen at prestigious festivals around the world.

Bozeman Film Society continues its latest season with a screening of the critically acclaimed indie, The **Mastermind**. The event will be held at Downtown Bozeman's Rialto Theater on Friday, December 5th. Directed by Kelly Reichardt, the film will screen at 7pm.



Find perfect tree with backcountry excursion

of self-discovery.

As the holiday season quickly approaches, locating the family tree is a great opportunity to enhance the communal spirit. Christmas tree permits are available for purchase for those who neglect to erect theirs the day after Thanksgiving.

Those with a permit may cut a Christmas tree anywhere on the Custer Gallatin National Forest except at cabins, campgrounds, picnic areas, trailheads, wilderness or riparian areas, natural landmarks, timber sales and areas where trees have been planted for reforestation purposes.

General guidelines for cutting a tree include:

mum (lower the better) Do not remove the top of the

Stump height: 6 inches maxi-

tree; cut down the entire tree

No cutting of five-needle pines (i.e. 5 needles in one cluster) - Limber Pine and White Bark

Pine trees are NOT permitted; If unsure, please check with your local ranger district about tree species identification and restrictions - If snow is on the ground,

remove it from around the stump so you can accurately measure the stump and tree height

Be Alert! There are many dead and dying trees that could fall at the slightest disturbance

Trees help protect watersheds, provide habitat for wildlife, and contribute to beautiful scenery; keep

these values in mind when selecting

– After cutting your tree, attach the purchased permit to a lower limb near the trunk for transporting

A permit can also be purchased for gathering personal-use boughs, but no cutting from Hemlock or Cedars. Permits, maps, forest road access updates and more are available through the website

When preparing for the day, dress in layers for changing weather conditions, grab a snack and water, always let another know where you are headed and enjoy spending time outdoors with friends and family

Purchase your permit online at www.recreation.gov/tree-permits (search 'Custer Gallatin' or 'Montana'). Limit of three. Please contact any Custer Gallatin National Forest office with additional questions or inquiries. For general forest information, visit www.fs.usda.gov/custer gallatin. •







MSU's 'Can the Griz' collects record for contest

Montana State University and Gallatin Valley communities donated the equivalent of more than one million pounds of food, a record amount, to the Gallatin Valley Food Bank and MSU's Bounty of the Bridgers food pantry as part of the 26th annual Can the Griz food drive.

Can the Griz - and the corresponding Can the Cats food drive in Missoula – is an off-field competition between MSU and the University of Montana to see which school can collect the most donations for its local food bank. The competition is held each year as part of the celebration of the Brawl of the Wild football game between the two rival

This year, MSU and Gallatin Valley communities donated 335,189 pounds of food and \$683,424,

according to Kim Cleary in the MSU Office of Student Engagement, which coordinates Can the Griz. Pounds and dollars are added together for the contest, resulting in a total this year of 1,018,613 pounds donated to Can the Griz. The Can the Cats food drive in Missoula brought in the equivalent of 1,091,754 pounds of food for the Missoula Food Bank, Cleary said.

The previous record at MSU was set in 2021 with the equivalent of 654,126 pounds of food donated. MSU and the Gallatin Valley communities have won the competition 20 out of the 26 years it has been

"While we didn't bring home the title for Can the Griz this year, our community has still won," Cleary said. "This food drive helps people in our community for months to

come, and at a time when many of our neighbors might need extra support, Can the Griz is even more impactful. The efforts that took place across the state are so inspiring, and I am so proud of each community for rallying around their food banks. We are already looking forward to facing off for this cause again next year!"

The donations from Can the Griz will help the Gallatin Valley Food Bank, as well as the Bounty of the Bridgers food pantry, provide food for families in the community through the spring and summer. The Gallatin Valley Food Bank is one of the HRDC Food and Nutrition Programs' Initiatives. The Bounty of the Bridgers, housed in MSU Student Wellness, is a student-driven initiative to combat food waste and food insecurity on the MSU campus for students, faculty and staff. •

Homelessness increased in the Gallatin Valley during the pandemic,

Chief civil attorney Anna Saverud and Ben Bailey, neighborhood services and code compliance program manager, will join the discussion and represent the City of Bozeman at the event.
