Shane screens riveting indie thriller

Abroad is a gripping, low-budget indie thriller that keeps you on the edge of your seat. Despite its modest production, the film excels in creating tension with its tight script and clever pacing.

The lead actor's performance is impressive, particularly in portraying

a character consumed by obsession with great subtlety. The minimalistic set design and dark lighting enhance the eerie atmosphere, emphasizing feelings of isolation and unease. While the film occasionally relies on familiar clichés, it more than makes up for it with clever twists and a suspenseful, satisfying conclusion.

While *Abroad* may lack the flashy visuals of big-budget thrillers, it more than compensates with its smart storytelling and intense atmosphere. It's a must-watch for fans of tension-filled

mysteries.

Symphony's free Community Concert returns

The Bozeman Symphony will present its annual free Community Concert featuring Dan Brown's **Wild Symphony** on Saturday, February 21st, at the Willson Auditorium. Conducted by Music Director Norman Huynh and narrated by Riley O'Toole, Associate Artistic Director of Montana Shakespeare in the Parks, the program is designed for children ages 5–12 and provides an engaging introduction to orchestral music for audiences of all ages.

Wild Symphony brings nearly two dozen musical portraits from the animal kingdom to life on stage and is quickly becoming a modern children's classic. Audiences will journey from the joyful rhythms of "Bouncing Kangaroo," to the mysterious melodies of "Wondrous Whale," and the hair-raising harmonies of "Brilliant Bat." The music is inspired by Brown's *New York Times* bestselling children's book of the same name, which features vibrant illustrations that complement the score.

Concertgoers are encouraged to come dressed as their favorite animal or those from *Wild Symphony*: Mouse, Woodbird, Kangaroo, Kittens, Ray, Hippo, Frogs, Ostrich, Armadillo, Boar, Ponies, Whale, Cheetah, Elephant, Rat, Beetles, Spiders, Bat, Swan and Cricket.

Brown, best known as the #1 *New York Times* bestselling author of *The Da Vinci Code*, reveals another side of his creativity as a lifelong musician and composer. *Wild Symphony* reflects his early inspiration from beloved works such as *Peter and the Wolf*, *The Carnival of the Animals* and *The Young Person's Guide to the Orchestra*.

Also returning to the Community Concert this year is

the Bozeman Symphony's Instrument Petting Zoo, offered before, between, and after each performance. Young attendees can explore orchestral instruments up close with the help of knowledgeable "instrument zookeepers." Children will have the chance to touch instruments, learn proper holding techniques, identify instrument families, and even try making music themselves.

"For more than 30 years, the Bozeman Symphony has presented free community concerts to inspire young people and create opportunities for everyone to experience the joy of symphonic music," said Executive Director Jacob Blaser. "These performances often spark a child's interest in playing an instrument, creating a ripple effect that uplifts and unites generations. It's one of the most rewarding ways we fulfill our mission."

Two public performances of *Wild Symphony* will take place on Saturday, Feb. 21st, at 10:30am and 1pm at the Willson Auditorium in Downtown Bozeman. In addition, all area fourth graders will attend a special concert on Thursday, Feb. 19th.

Montana State University brings tastes of the world to campus

From Vietnamese pho to Greek halloumi flatbread to French crepes, there will be something for everyone at Montana State University's annual **International Food Bazaar** on Wednesday, February 18th.

The event will be held in MSU's Miller Dining Commons and Rendezvous Dining Pavilion from 4:30 to 7:30pm. It is open to the public and requires paid admission

to the dining halls.

Adult admission is \$17 for entry into one dining hall or \$25 for both dining halls. Admission for children ages 5-13 is \$15; children up to age 4 are admitted free. Students with residential meal plans can access the bazaar by swiping their CatCard, as they would for a standard meal.

Culinary staples from more than 25 countries will be represented at the bazaar. MSU Culinary Services

will prepare food for the event, which is put on with the support of the MSU Office of International Programs to celebrate the university's diverse student body.

"The International Food Bazaar is a fantastic opportunity to bring people together through a shared experience – food – while celebrating the cultural and culinary traditions of our many wonderful international students," said Sally

Mudiamu, dean of global engagement and international programs at MSU. "The event embodies our international mission of 'bringing Montana to the world and the world to Montana.' We hope to foster conversation, curiosity and meaningful cross-cultural exchange through this decades-long tradition on campus."

Miller Dining Commons will feature cuisine from Thailand, Malaysia, Vietnam, Philippines,

Indonesia, Argentina, Turkey, Greece, Brazil, Iran, India and Pakistan.

Rendezvous Dining Pavilion will feature dishes from Germany, Nepal, Ethiopia, Italy, China, Tanzania, Ghana, Nigeria, Uganda, Morocco, France, Sri Lanka and South Korea.

PK features Venezuelan tour, Montana music venues

In a timely presentation, Bozeman oncologist and Venezuela native William Konkright will showcase his country's natural beauty, culture and history at back-to-back presentations this month.

Konkright is one of eleven presenters at the next **PechaKucha Night(s)**. The events will be held at Downtown Bozeman's Ellen Theatre on Wednesday and Thursday, February 18th and 19th. Both shows

begin at 6:40pm and feature the same lineup of speakers each night.

Much natural beauty can be found right in our own state. Matt Peters will give us a tour of some of Montana's greatest venues for music, ranging from Pine Creek Lodge, to a 9,000-person forest oasis.

Of course, beauty is in the eyes of the beholder, or so the saying goes. Few have ever imagined needing to wear a prosthetic eye in a cul-

ture where eye contract is so important. But Melissa Butynski will introduce us to the surprisingly hilarious and evolving world of ocular prosthetics, which offer a novel means of self-expression.

Sometimes you just need to get away from it all, and Karen May has the perfect vehicle – a 1949 International Harvester pick-up truck she calls "Rusty." Karen will describe the two-year process of bringing Rusty back to life and the many adventures she and Rusty have shared.

In keeping with this "retro" theme, Ron Harms will recount his life as a country doctor in northern Wisconsin and give an old timer's perspective on healthcare today.

Auctioneering is another profes-

sion that has changed greatly over the years. Craig Mandeville, who grew up in the auction business, will trace its history from Babylonian time to eBay.

Dog mushing also reminds us of a bygone era. Lisa Trankley will tell of her unique and humorous struggles racing a small sprint team in the 1990s.

This PechaKucha features two presentations that focus on raising children outside of the traditional school. Jamie Hetherington will recall the story of Victor, "the wild boy" of Aveyron discovered in the forests of Southern France circa 1800. The boy, once dismissed as "hopeless," became the subject of a landmark experiment that would forever change the landscape of

education.


Here in Bozeman, many parents continue to look for new approaches to educate their children. Ciera Krinke will explore why the school day feels misaligned for so many families. She argues that understanding the origins of schools helps us rethink what learning could look like.

It's not just children who can benefit from a new approach. Tricia Williamson, a school counselor for 20 years, helped create Felines and Foliage for Fulfillment (4F), a non-profit that partners with local therapists to refer clients to "cat enrichment sessions" and pairs people to work on gardening projects.

Gardening is close to Tori Pintar's heart as well. Two years ago, Tori and her husband began converting their turf grass into raised vegetable gardens and perennial drought tolerant plant beds. Like any DIY project, it took much longer than anticipated, cost more, and gave them far more than tomatoes, including some unexpected visitors.

No day but today: famed musical comes to Shane, Ellen

Local thespians return to the stages of Livingston and Bozeman with a trip to 1980s New York late this month and into next. The Shane Lalani Center for the Arts presents a production of Jonathan Larson's ***RENT*** from February 27th through March 8th, before moving to The Ellen Theatre for performances from March 13th through March 22nd.

Larson's Tony and Pulitzer Prize-winning masterpiece that revolution-

ized Broadway and captured the spirit of a generation celebrates its 30th anniversary this year. Set in New York's East Village, *RENT* is a raw and exhilarating story about love, friendship, and finding your voice. This special production will appear in both Livingston and Bozeman – an anthem for living boldly in the now.

Based on Puccini's beloved opera *La Bohème*, *RENT* follows the ups and downs of a year in the life of a

group of impoverished, artistic friends living in Manhattan's East Village. Mark, an aspiring filmmaker, struggles to find his place in the world; his roommate Roger, an HIV-positive musician, wonders how he will leave his mark before he dies. Mimi and Angel look for true love as they face the harsh reality of life as HIV-positive young people, while the businesslike Joanne seeks fidelity from her wild-child performance artist girlfriend Maureen.

The group's dreams, losses and love stories weave through the musical's narration to paint a stunningly raw and emotional portrait of the gritty bohemian world of New York City in the late 1980s, under the shadow of HIV/AIDS [*Stage Agent*].

RENT runs weekends from Feb. 27th to March 22nd. Performances take place in the Shane's Dulcie Theatre and Bozeman's Ellen Theatre. Show times are Fridays and Saturdays at 7:30pm, with Sunday

Oscar season takes over BFS calendar

Bozeman Film Society continues its latest season with a screening of Jordan's official selection for the 98th Academy Awards, ***All That's Left of You***. The event will be held at Downtown Bozeman's Rialto Theater on Wednesday, February 11th. Directed by Cherien Dabis, the film will screen at 6:45pm.

In the Occupied West Bank of the 1980s, a Palestinian teenager is swept into a protest that changes the course of his family's life. Reeling from its aftermath, his mother, Hanan, shares the story that led them to that fateful moment. Spanning seven decades, this epic drama traces the hopes and heartaches of one uprooted family, revealing not only the scars

of displacement, but the unbreakable spirit of survival.

Presented in Arabic with subtitles. Not Rated, the film runs 145 minutes. The *New York Times* Critics Pick was produced by Mark Ruffalo and Javier Bardem.

Returning to the Ellen Theatre, critical darling ***Hamnet*** screens on Tuesday, Feb. 17th. The film is Directed by Chloé Zhao whose 2020 feature *Nomadland* secured her the Academy Award for Best Director as only the second woman to ever win in the category.

Hamnet tells the powerful story of love and loss that inspired the creation of Shakespeare's timeless masterpiece, Hamlet.

After her son Hamnet dies, aged eleven, Agnes Shakespeare is

struck with intense grief. As she mourns with her husband William, the pair struggle to come to terms with the frailty of life and the ruthlessness of the plague. Set in 16th-century England, Agnes, a healer by trade, must find a way to move on with her life and provide for her other children.

Hamnet was nominated in eight categories as part of the 98th Academy Awards, including Best Film, Director and Actress. Starring Jessie Buckley and Paul Mescal, the film is Rated PG-13 with a runtime of 125 minutes.

Hosted by BFS, the annual **Oscar-Nominated Shorts** event will be held at the Ellen on Friday, Feb. 27th. The evening begins at 7pm with an animation, documen-

tary and live-action triple feature.

Natural energy subject of next Science lecture

What has made solar-generated electricity cheaper than all other methods of power generation, and what does it mean for our energy future? Learn more from Dr. Erik Grumstrup, professor in the MSU Department of Chemistry and Biochemistry, and Gallatin Valley Friends of the Sciences, whose popular lecture series returns this month.

Co-sponsored by local nonprofit Hopa Mountain, the next talk of the series is set for Wednesday, February 11th. **“Solar Energy: from Physics to Policy”** will begin at 6:30pm. It will be held in the Community Room at Bozeman Public Library.

In his presentation, Grumstrup will explain the fundamental physics of photovoltaic generation and how economic and adjacent technological drivers are leading to unprecedented changes in how our energy needs will be met in the future.

Dr. Grumstrup holds a Ph.D. in Chemical

Physics from the University of Colorado, and served as a post-doctoral researcher at the University of North Carolina and the Army Research Office. He has led a research group at Montana State University since 2014, studying how electrons behave in “functional materials” – materials that make possible modern technologies from solar cells to computers.

The presentation will be followed by a Q&A period. The informative talks are presented in person on select Wednesdays. The presentations are free and open to the public, with seating on a first-come, first-served basis.
