Emerson displays new springtime exhibits

The Emerson Center for the Arts & Culture is pleased to host its newest shows featuring emerging artists from our community.

Montana State University artists feature as part of student exhibition *In Good Company* in Galleria Hall. The show brings together a wide range of artistic voices working across diverse media and approaches.

The exhibit highlights students at different stages of their practice, creating a space where experimentation, process and polish coexist.

Painting, drawing, sculpture, print-making, photography and hybrid forms are presented side by side, emphasizing conversation rather than hierarchy. *In Good Company* celebrates being in dialogue, with peers, materials and ideas, while capturing a collective moment within the MSU art community.

Montana photographer Christopher Campbell showcases

Caldera in the Lobby and Weaver Room galleries. A selection from a much larger series, he comes up with projects or series as he works, not the other way around. He discovers his intention through the photographs.

“My method is slow, but once moving through the land I work assuredly and intuitively, I find there is little equivocation over what to photograph. I question little when moved to expose a sheet of film. The questions come after,” his artist statement reads. “I believe there are always far more questions than answers. The heavy lifting, after I put a photograph out into the world, is up to the viewer. If I have done my job the weight should be manageable in its own way by anyone willing or able to take the time.”

Paint artist John Henry Hastelund unveils *The Mountain Clown & Other Foul Animals* in the Jessie Wilber Gallery. The exhibit is an

irreverent jab at our cultural mythologies, specifically our Western and Pioneering narratives.

Utilizing toys, puppets, performance and comics in addition to painting, Haseltine explores how both self-produced folk art and kitsch mass production equally contribute to the legacy of western mythology. He’s interested in the parallels between historical western expansion and contemporary gentrification in the region, as well as the ways stories can be manipulated to represent local and personal identities.

Love transcends borders in next Doc title

The Bozeman Doc Series continues on Thursday, March 5th, at the Emerson Center for the Arts & Culture, with the critically acclaimed new documentary, *The Cycle of Love*. The film screens at 7pm.

In 1977, P.K., a 23-year-old Delhi street artist from a poor, ‘untouchable’ family, picked up a handful of paintbrushes and a second-hand bicycle and set off on a 6000-mile cross-continent mission – to find Lotta, the woman who had captured his heart. A love story like no other, *The Cycle of Love* is an inspiring, heart warming, epic true-life adventure about the search for self-belief and risking everything for what your heart tells you.

The film is co-presented by the Bozeman Sunrise Rotary Club

International Committee and will be preceded by a reception beginning at 5:30pm in the Emerson Ballroom featuring internationally impactful, local nonprofits, with food, drink and music by Bozambique.

YGM speaker explores history of regional hunting

The speaker series of the Yellowstone Gateway Museum Foundation continues with multiple events during the second week of March. The feature event is a lecture at the Dulce Theatre of the Shane Center for the Arts on Wednesday, March 11th.

Craig Lee PhD, MSU Professor of archaeology and sociology, will address the topic of drive lines and buffalo jumps in Paradise Valley. His presentation entitled “**Hunting the High Country: Drivelines & Ancient Strategies in Greater Yellowstone**” will begin at 6pm.

In association with Dr. Lee’s tenure as scholar-in residence, a reception, featuring related exhibit “Archaeology Out of Ice,” will take place at Yellowstone Gateway Museum on Tuesday, March 10th. Like the lecture, this is free and open to the public and begins at 5:30pm.

Prior to his March 11th lecture, Dr. Lee plans to visit with 5th graders at Eastside Elementary School and also with a Native American Studies class at Park High.

On Saturday, March 14th, Dr. Lee and several of his associates will lead an archaeology field trip to view parts of a drive line / buffalo jump complex in Paradise Valley. The guided field trip begins at the Fairgrounds at 8:30am sharp. Comfortable bus transportation has been arranged and some walking/hiking is required at the site. Total cost is \$125 per person. Registration is available through the

museum website.

“Long before roads and fences, people in the Greater Yellowstone shaped the landscape to hunt animals moving through the mountains and valleys. Drawing on recent archaeological research, this talk explores how stone drivelines, hunting blinds, and ice patches were used together as part of sophisticated hunting strategies rooted in careful observation of animal behavior, terrain, and seasonal change,” Dr. Lee says of his presentations.

“As melting ice reveals alpine sites, we are seeing evidence of long-term indigenous stewardship – engineered hunting landscapes built, revisited, and maintained across generations. These observations offer not only a window into the deep past, but also insights into sustainable human-animal relationships that remain relevant today.”

Montana Ballet Company, Symphony team up for enchanting ballet

Montana Ballet Company continues its 2025-26 season with the romantic, classic story ballet, *Sleeping Beauty*. In collaboration with the Bozeman Symphony conducted by Norman Huynh, performances will be held on Saturday, March 7th, at 2pm and 7pm, then closing on Sunday, March 8th, at 2pm. All will be held at the Willson Auditorium.

Sleeping Beauty represented the first collaboration of the French ballet master Marius Petipa and Pyotr Tchaikovsky. Still one of the most beloved and enduring ballets of all time, this production offers a special opportunity to experience MBC’s interpretation alongside Tchaikovsky’s iconic score, performed by a full Bozeman Symphony Orchestra under Huynh’s direction.

“We are deeply excited for this collaboration with the Bozeman Symphony and grateful for the artistry and generosity the musicians bring to the stage. Having Norman conduct our dancers for the first time – together with the full symphony –

is an exciting and meaningful milestone for MBC. The expanded orchestra creates a rare and powerful opportunity for ballet and live music to meet in their fullest expression, and we are honored to share that experience with our audiences.” Said MBC Artistic Director, Melissa Bowman.

“I’m really looking forward to this production and to collaborating with the artistic team at Montana Ballet Company,” said Bozeman Symphony Music Director Norman Huynh. “What excites me most is the expanded pit, which allows us to bring a larger orchestra into the performance. Having a full orchestra in the pit adds tremendous depth, energy and impact to the ballet – it’s going to be an incredible experience for audiences.”

Norman Huynh is Music Director of the Bozeman Symphony and the Britt Music & Arts Festival in Oregon. He has earned widespread acclaim for his natural musicality, technical command, dynamic presence on the podium, imaginative

programming, and ability to connect with new audiences. Huynh has guest-conducted many of North America’s leading orchestras, including the New York Philharmonic, St. Louis Symphony Orchestra, San Diego Symphony, Seattle Symphony, Minnesota Orchestra, Oregon Symphony, Detroit Symphony Orchestra and Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra, among others. A proud first-generation Asian American, Huynh discovered classical music as a 12-year-old trombonist in Alabama.

In addition, MBC has expanded its collaboration within the Bozeman arts community to include Genevieve Trygstad-Burke, Co-Founder and Executive Artistic Director of Raison D’être Dance Project and Development Director of Opera Montana, and Riley O’Toole, Associate Artistic Director of Montana Shakespeare in the Parks.

The tale of *Sleeping Beauty*, known for its enchanting storyline and timeless appeal, has captivated audiences for generations. Through its rich symbolism, memorable characters, and enduring themes of hope and destiny, the ballet continues to resonate with viewers of all ages, securing its place as one of the most cherished ballets.

LFS screens hilariously strange small town tale

The Livingston Film Series will present the next in its free screening series with *Waiting for Guffman* on Thursday, March 12th. The film begins at 7pm at the Shane Lalani Center for the Arts.

When the town of Blaine, Missouri approaches its sesquicentennial, there’s only one way to celebrate: with a musical revue called “Red, White & Blaine.” Hoping the show will be his ticket back to Broadway, impresario Corky St. Clair (Christopher Guest) rounds up a cast of enthusiastic but untalented locals (Eugene Levy, Fred Willard, Catherine O’Hara) to perform his masterwork. But, when Corky reveals that theater agent Mort Guffman will attend the opening, things really kick into high gear.

Blaine was founded, we are told, 150 years ago by settlers trekking to the West Coast who stopped when their leader “smelled the salt air.” Its place in history has been cemented by two events.

The first, the presentation of a wooden stool made in Blaine which led to the city becoming the “stool capital of America.” The second, when a flying saucer landed nearby the town in 1946. Within the resulting crater, it was “always 67 degrees with a 40 percent chance of rain.” Local residents were invited aboard for a potluck supper, and one of them still has no feeling in his buttocks.

The hilariously strange history of Blaine leads to a ridiculous production of “Red, White & Blaine.”

Continuing its latest season of screening independent features, documentaries, local films and vintage classics, doors open at 6:30pm with screenings to follow at 7pm. Bozeman Film Society has answered the cosmic call and continues its latest season with a very special evening with acclaimed filmmaker Gabe Polsky, Director of *The Man Who Saves the World?* The event will be held at Downtown Bozeman's Ellen Theatre on Saturday, March 7th. The film screening and panel event begins at 7pm.

Resurrection, indigenous prophecies, and adventures around the globe – this is the story of Patrick McCollum. A spiritual leader and peace advocate, he finds himself at the very center of an ancient prophecy that could decide the fate of our planet.

Pulled into McCollum's world, acclaimed director Gabe Polsky (*Red Army, Butcher's Crossing*) will bring us across continents on a spiritual journey in which the absurd and profound merge.

A post-film guest panel entitled "Where the Buffalo Roam – Reviving the Great Plains" will follow the screening.

OLLI at MSU hosts forum on AI use in education

The Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at Montana State University will host its monthly Friday Forum on March 13th, titled "AI in Education: Friend or Foe?" The event will take place from noon to 1:30pm on Zoom and is free and open to the public.

In an era of emerging artificial intelligence, it is important to examine how children and adults are learning with AI and using it in everyday life, including social media, research, internet communication and online shopping, event organizers note. The forum will feature two panelists who work in education and will speak to AI use, management, implications and influences both in higher education and grades K-12.

During the forum, Jason Clark, professor and head of research optimization, analytics and data services at the MSU Library, will give an

overview of AI and address its opportunities and challenges in higher education and research. Alex Ide, curriculum and multi-tiered system of supports integration specialist for Bozeman School District 7, will discuss how the district and its teachers implement, manage and address AI.

End-of-life explored with annual conference

Community members are invited to participate in annual conference, **Mountains of Courage: Conversations on Death & Dying**. The single-day conference is designed to explore the end of life journey by providing a relaxed setting for individuals and caregivers to discover available resources, tools and information.

The conference will be held on Saturday, March 28th, at Dahl Funeral & Cremation Services from 9am–4pm. Early registration is encouraged as space is limited. The registration fee includes lunch. Doors open at 8am.

Presenters and panelists will include health professionals, spiritual counselors, social workers, community support services and caregivers. Participants will have the opportunity to explore practical issues, emotions, myths and traditions and learn how to shift the current paradigm. They will learn about practical tools and resources to assist in making informed decisions when faced with end of life issues.

Keynote speaker Dr. Shane Doyle will present "Honoring the Sacred Wind That Binds Us."

The presentation will provide insight and wisdom about death and dying from the ancient Indigenous cultures of the Northern Plains. 'Moving Camp to Join our Ancestors' is the most common way to describe the process of death, and this metaphor illuminates the larger truth of not only dying but living as well.

Dr. Doyle (Apsaalooké) is a community and environmental advocate who hails from Crow Agency. He serves as the North America Indigenous Right Relations Director for The Nature Conservancy, as well as the Executive Director of Yellowstone Peoples an Indigenous nonprofit that supports and organizes an annual Intertribal Tipi Village event in Yellowstone Park.

In his role with The Nature Conservancy, he works across the United States and Canada to support Tribal Bison Restoration on

Native lands, as well as the revitalization of Indigenous Traditional Ecological Knowledge and Land Back to Native communities.

Other presenters include Nona Chambers and Susan Kreitzberg with 'Rewards & Challenges of Caring for Aging Parents,' Marsha Goetting with 'Estate Planning Made (Almost) Fun,' as well as various workshops that aim to help attendees navigate the dying experience.

The host nonprofit encourages open conversations about death and end-of-life planning through educational events and its annual conference, helping people approach these topics with greater understanding and compassion.

Celebrate 30th anniversary of RENT

Local thespians return to the stages of Livingston and Bozeman with a trip to 1980s New York this month. The Shane Lalani Center for the Arts presents the 30th anniversary production of Jonathan Larson's *RENT* through March 8th, before moving to The Ellen Theatre for performances from March 13th through March 22nd.

RENT made its world premiere thirty years ago last month, on February 13th, 1996, at the New York Theatre Workshop where it transformed American musical theatre. Created by the late Jonathan Larson, the show was nominated for ten Tony Awards, winning four – including Best Musical, Best Book, Best Featured Actor and Best Original Score – and became one of the only musicals in history to receive the Pulitzer Prize for Drama. It has since been translated into twenty-five languages and performed around the world.

With its groundbreaking rock score and unapologetically diverse cast of characters, *RENT* focuses on the stories of marginalized communities at a time when such narratives were rarely seen on commercial stages. It fused musical styles not traditionally heard on Broadway, and helped reintroduce contemporary music into mainstream theatre culture.

Thirty years later, Larson's message continues to resonate. *RENT* explores love, loss, friendship, creativity and resilience in the face of uncertainty. Its enduring anthem,

"No day but today" reminds audiences that life is fragile and fleeting, urging us to live fully, love deeply, and let go of regret before life passes us by.

"Bringing *RENT* to both Livingston and Bozeman during its 30th anniversary feels so meaningful," said Erika Adams, Executive Director of Shane Center. "This production celebrates not only an iconic work of art, but the power of community, and above all love. At its heart, *RENT* is about connection, about showing up for one another. Artistic Director, Russell Lewis has put together an incredible group of actors and I'm so excited to share this story with our community."

RENT runs weekends through March 22nd. Performances take place in the Shane's Dulcie Theatre and Bozeman's Ellen Theatre. Show times are Fridays and Saturdays at 7:30pm, with Sunday matinees to follow at 3pm. An additional 7:30pm performance will be held March 19th at the Ellen. Tickets are on sale now. Filler hosts night of roots-rock, 'party-grass'

If March is when Bozeman starts to come out of hibernation — longer light, drier roads, a little more appetite for a night out — then the bill at The Filler on March 20th lands right in that sweet spot. It's a co-bill that makes sense for this town: a local artist with deep roots and a touring resume that keeps expanding, paired with a band built to turn any room into a moving, laughing, sing-along mess (in the best way).

On Friday, March 20th, **Madeline Hawthorne** shares the night with **Pixie & the Partygrass Boys** at The Filling Station. Music begins at 8pm with night-of tickets available for \$15. Doors at 7pm.

For anyone new to town, or for tourists trying to understand why locals talk about certain rooms the way they talk about certain trails, The Filling Station is a beloved local venue. For decades it's been the place where national touring acts roll through and get surprised by how locked-in the crowd is, and where local artists have the opportunity to showcase their talent and build a following. The reputation is simple and durable: if you're going to catch one show while you're here, this is one of the rooms you're told not to miss. The nights have a way of feeling close to the music, close to

the people you came with, and close to the kind of memory you'll still be referencing months later.

That sense of "this matters" is part of why Hawthorne fits this stage so naturally. Her story has the kind of Bozeman practicality that tends to produce good live performers: she put down roots here during college, spent years doing the work — backing other artists, playing in bands, stacking gigs — and then stepped fully into her solo career in the pandemic era when a lot of artists were either rebuilding or disappearing. Her sound sits comfortably in the overlap of Americana, roots, folk and rock with a band-forward approach that understands dynamics, pacing, and the payoff of a chorus that actually earns itself.

Live is where the whole thing clicks. The set tends to move from quiet focus into full-voice choruses without feeling like a mood swing; it feels like a story gaining momentum. She's also shared bills with heavy hitters like Jason Isbell and Nathaniel Rateliff — a signal that what she's building translates beyond hometown love and into bigger rooms, bigger audiences, and higher expectations.

Then there's the other half of the night: Pixie & the Partygrass Boys, a group that brings a very specific kind of lift. They started as

"ski bums playing house parties" out near Salt Lake City, with early roots tied to the Cottonwood Canyons scene, and grew into a nationally touring band known for velocity, precision, and a stage presence that doesn't take itself too seriously. Their brand of "party-grass" uses bluegrass instrumentation like a high-powered engine: fast, bright, and built to get a crowd moving. They lean into big hooks, sing-along moments, and an anything-can-happen feeling that turns a normal show into the kind of night where strangers become temporary friends.

Their arc tracks the modern touring reality: start local, build a reputation for being undeniable live, and keep leveling up. Since their 2018 EP, *Utah Made*, and their 2021 release *Snake Creek*, they've cultivated an audience that includes serious pickers and casual fans who just want to dance. And yes, the band has done support runs for artists like Billy Strings and Lake Street Dive, which makes sense once you see them: they're tight enough for music nerds and fun enough for everyone else.

If you want a night that feels local without being small, and rowdy without being sloppy, March 20th is one to circle. •

Shuffle to the sounds with Chico Saloon

Take the chill off during those lingering winter days with a visit to Chico Hot Springs. The local resort offers accommodations for overnight visitors and features regular entertainment in the Saloon. Check out the upcoming live music schedule.

The Shuffle Bums are next up on March 6th and 7th. Retro-electro blues and rhythm inspired by classic American blues from the 50s, the band plays an eclectic selection of tunes from Bo Diddley and Howlin' Wolf, to jazz-blues instrumentals and the second-line beats of New Orleans. This is rollicking roadhouse blues that will have you jumpin' until you get your mojo workin'.

Gallatin Valley tribute group **710 Ashbury** follow with a pair of shows on March 13th and 14th. The Helena four-piece lays down all your classic Grateful Dead favorites with every spirited performance. Committed to preserving the legacy of the popular genre-skewing rock band, 710 features a talented group of veteran Montana musicians.

Performing March 20th and 21st is the **Trent Brooks Band**. The band delivers on their reputation as an in demand, energetic live act with stunning vocal harmony and stage presence. The frontman's style of authentic originals and outlaw country borrows from the greats, from Williams, Paycheck, Jennings and Jones, to Jackson, Strait, Pardi and Combs.

Local rockstars **Tsunami Funk** deliver on March 27th and 28th. The Bozeman-favorite group always packs the dance floor with Funk/R&B-rocking grooves. They play tunes from artists like Stevie Wonder, Pharrell Williams, Bruno Mars, Red Hot Chili Peppers, James Brown, Earth Wind & Fire, Sly & the Family Stone, Kool & the Gang, Van Morrison, Steely Dan, Bob Marley and more.

Live Saloon music begins at 9pm, unless otherwise noted. Chico Hot Springs is located in Pray, 20 miles south of Livingston. For more information, visit www.chicohot-springs.com. •

Budding cellist fronts Symphonic splendor

The Bozeman Symphony invites audiences to revel in sweeping melodies and heartfelt expression at **Romantic Splendor: Schumann & Schubert**, featuring acclaimed cellist Jonathan Swensen. Performances will be held Saturday, March 21st, at 7:30pm, and Sunday, March 22nd, at 2:30pm. Both will be held at the Willson Auditorium in downtown Bozeman.

Swensen, one of today's most compelling young cellists, takes center stage in Robert Schumann's Cello Concerto in A Minor, a work as poetic as it is unconventional. Rather than separating the concerto into distinct movements, Schumann allows the music to unfold in one seamless arc, creating an intimate, almost dreamlike journey. The concerto opens with a rhapsodic, improvisatory character before giving way to a deeply lyrical middle section and a spirited, virtuosic finale.

Unusually ambitious for its time, the symphony stretches the boundaries of the classical form, unfolding on a grand scale with soaring themes and vibrant energy. Schubert's admiration for Beethoven is evident throughout, including subtle musical nods that connect this symphony to the great tradition that inspired it.

Swensen has earned international recognition as a rising star of the cello. He is the recipient of a 2022 Avery Fisher Career Grant and shared First Prize at the 2024 Naumburg International Cello Competition. Named Musical America's 'New Artist of the Month' and highlighted as 'One to Watch' by *Gramophone* magazine, Swensen

has appeared with leading orchestras across Europe and the United States, including London's Philharmonia Orchestra, the Copenhagen Philharmonic, and the Kennedy Center. He currently serves as an Artist in Residence at the Queen Elisabeth Music Chapel in Belgium.

Explore most recent Yellowstone supereruption

How can we understand volcanic “supereruptions” when none have occurred in recorded history? Stacy Henderson, Ph.D. candidate in MSU’s Department of Geology, will address this question in the next presentation of Gallatin Valley Friends of the Sciences’ Science Inquiry Series.

Co-sponsored by local nonprofit Hopa Mountain, the next talk of the series is set for Wednesday, March 11th. **“It’s Tuff Out There: Reevaluating a Yellowstone Supereruption”** will begin at 6:30pm. It will be held in the Community Room at Bozeman Public Library.

In her presentation, Henderson

will discuss her study of minerals in the Lava Creek “tuff” –consolidated volcanic ash from Yellowstone’s most recent supereruption – and the clues the minerals reveal about how these eruptions work, and how this can help us assess volcanic hazards and interpret signals from Earth’s largest active volcanic systems.

Henderson is a graduate of Westminster College and Idaho State University with degrees in Geology. Her undergraduate research examined the geomorphic and tectonic evolution of Idaho’s Swan Valley. Her current research, with her first PhD publication in preparation, focuses on the .63 million-year-old Yellowstone supereruption, investigating how magma systems are stored and ultimately erupt.

The presentation will be followed by a Q&A period. The informative talks are presented in person on select Wednesdays. The presentations are free and open to the public, with seating on a first-come, first-served basis.
