The 2026 Summer Solstice

in Montana will occur at 2:24am June 21. Just before then, the Moon will be in its First Quarter phase, with an illumination of about 50% (half the scoop). Because it is a First Quarter moon, it rises around noon, is high in the sky by sunset, and sets around midnight. It is a great time to view lunar craters and mountains along the terminator (the dividing line between light and dark on the Moon) using binoculars or a telescope. At the time of the Solstice, we will have neither the Moon or the Sun. On the Solstice, the Sun reaches its northernmost position, reaching the Tropic of Cancer and standing still before reversing direction and starting to move south again.

Renowned landscape artist displayed in paint and words

The Livingston Depot Museum proudly presents the Featured Exhibit for 2026: "**Absarokas: Mountains Defined by Two Rivers**" from artist and author, Paul Waldum.

"... the Yellowstone to the west and the Boulder to the east... between those rivers lies a stretch of wilderness that has shaped my life." – Paul Waldum

Waldum's decades exploring the Absaroka-Beartooth Wilderness come to life through oil paintings, pastels, field sketches, serigraphs, and excerpts from his memoirs. His work captures the changing seasons of the backcountry, ascents across the rugged Absaroka Range, and time spent in the historic mining town of Independence. Together these pieces reveal both the grandeur of the landscape and the quiet, personal moments found within it. The exhibition coincides with the release of his autobiographical book, *A Wilderness Defined by Two Rivers*.

Waldum was born and raised in Livingston, where the Yellowstone River and the Absaroka and Beartooth Ranges formed the foun-

ation of his lifelong connection to the land. As an artist, photographer and educator, he spent more than forty years teaching art and interdisciplinary studies, including many years in Montana State University's Honors College. His work – paintings, pastels, serigraph prints, photography, and sketches – has been consistently inspired by the mountains, rivers, and wilderness of Montana.

His art has been exhibited in regional galleries and museums, reflecting decades spent exploring the landscape between the Yellowstone and Boulder Rivers. More than forty years later, his work continues to reflect those formative experiences in the mountains. His exhibition at the Depot Museum in his hometown brings together paintings, prints and images inspired by the same landscape that forms the heart of this story.

A book release and artist reception are scheduled for Sunday, June 13th. Beginning at 5pm at the Depot Center, Waldum will present a selection of his autobiography followed by a public reception of his work.

The event is open to the public with limited seating and refreshments available.

The historic Livingston Depot Center now functions as a railroad history museum and community cultural hub downtown. The beautifully restored Northern Pacific Railroad station, dating back a century, is a remarkable exhibit in itself. The Depot's flagship exhibit, "Rails Across the Rockies: A Century of People and Places," provides captivating insight into Montana's railroad history and the grandeur of train travel. Particularly focusing on the Northern Pacific's pivotal role in Yellowstone's establishment as America's first national park, the exhibit highlights Livingston as the gateway to Yellowstone since the 1880s.

The Depot Museum is open Monday through Saturday, 10am–5pm, through Labor Day. Admission is \$5 for adults, \$4 for seniors and children 12 or younger. Group rates and tours are available upon request. Additional information may be obtained by visiting www.livingstondepot.org. •

MSIP announces 54th summer tour

Each year, Tom Watson watches his scenic designs come to life onstage before they are broken down again and again. Sixty-four times, to be exact.

Small wooden pieces and loose wing nuts are tucked into the van of traveling acting troupe Montana Shakespeare in the Parks, only to be rebuilt by actors themselves at the next stop on their western route across 64 rural communities. As part of an outreach program in Montana State University's College of Arts and Architecture, they are on a quest to bring free, quality performances to audiences who might not otherwise experience theater of this magnitude.

"There's this sort of rush of excitement and pride, I suppose. And that never goes away," said Watson, the program's resident scenic designer and a film professor at MSU.

This year is no different. Montana Shakespeare in the Parks' summer productions will kick off in June at MSU's Duck Pond along South 11th Avenue. Performers will bring playwright William Shakespeare's *The Merchant of Venice* to the stage June 10th–13th, while *Much Ado About Nothing* will be performed June 17th–20th. The program will return to Bozeman for its final performance of *The Merchant of Venice* on Sept. 8 at Grant Chamberlain Park on the MSU campus. In all this summer, it will offer free performances in 64 communities across five states: Montana, Idaho, North Dakota, Washington and Wyoming. The full tour schedule can be found on MSIP's website.

MSIP, now in its 54th year, is one of the largest and oldest Shakespeare companies in the U.S. It has become an artistic home for creatives across the country and a beloved fixture of the Mountain West, said executive artistic director Kevin Asselin. Audience members of all ages return each year with blankets and picnic baskets to watch the outdoor performances as a community.

"Our audiences are excited about Shakespeare in the Parks, and they have been instrumental in helping sustain us for 54 years," he said. "The company belongs to them."

This year's productions contrast themes of justice and mercy, exploring how humans behave when they are "thrown off of the compass" of what they believe in, Asselin said.

Much Ado About Nothing, directed by Johamy Morales, is a romantic comedy set in Messina, Italy, after World War I and follows two couples: one – Beatrice and Benedick – tricked into confessing their feelings for each other; and the other – Hero and Claudio – confronting a disastrous misunderstanding ahead of their wedding.

The Merchant of Venice, directed by Asselin, features courtroom drama and romance through the characters of Antonio, who enters a dangerous agreement with moneylender Shylock; Bassanio, who seeks heiress Portia's hand in marriage; and Jessica, who leaves her father's house in hopes of finding love and freedom.

As a scenic designer for *The Merchant of Venice*, Watson will transport audience members to 20th century Italy with limestone-like materials. The stage helps tell each production's story, almost like its own Shakespearean character dressed in the "costume" of scenic design, Watson said. His ideas begin as sketches covered in director's notes before transforming into a massive structure built in MSU's Black Box Theater workshop. Witnessing the end result never grows old for Watson, despite spending nearly 28 years with MSIP and, at the same time, instructing production design students at MSU.

"I can imagine a lot of jobs where you do it for 30 years, and it could feel like the same dang thing, but because it's a different show each year and it's a different problem to solve, it keeps it exciting," Watson said.

The way MSIP continuously reimagines Shakespeare feels boundless, said Gabbay Madu, who will star as Beatrice in *Much Ado About Nothing* and Salania in *The Merchant of Venice*. The directors stay true to Shakespeare's intent but break the mold when it comes to artistic direction and involving actors of all genders and ethnicities.

"It's the essence of what I think theater is and should be," said Madu, who is originally from Montego Bay, Jamaica, and is pursuing her master's degree in fine arts from the University of Arkansas. "You're giving and creating the opportunity for people to not only experience something that's wonderful and beautiful and moving, but you're giving them the opportunity to do it with a larger group of people, whether those people are friends or family or a group of strangers." •

Fiona Lee stars as The Little Mermaid with YBC under the sea

Yellowstone Ballet Company presents *The Little Mermaid* on Thursday, June 18th. The single-night performance comes to the Willson Auditorium at 6:30pm. Kathleen Rakela, YBC Artistic Director and recipient of a prestigious Montana Arts Council Fellowship in the Performing Arts, has created an enchanting multimedia production that will delight all ages with magical costumes, delightful choreography, and projected ocean images.

Daniel Parker, former conductor of the Hartford Ballet, composed the compelling score interwoven with moving narration of the Hans Christian Anderson fairytale (not Disney version) by orator Robert Worobec.

The title role of the "Little Mermaid" will be danced by Fiona Lee of the world renown Royal Danish Ballet. Ms. Lee started train-

ing at the Yellowstone Ballet Academy at age five and danced at the school for nine years. She then received a full scholarship for the School of American Ballet's summer program in New York City and was invited to continue at the school year round. She packed her bags, left her carefree Montana childhood behind and moved to the Big Apple to learn the rigorous Balanchine-style ballet technique. During the pandemic she auditioned for the Royal Danish Ballet and was accepted into the world famous company.

The role of the "Prince" will be performed by Marko Micov. Mr. Micov began his ballet education at the State Ballet School in Skopje and was awarded the Special Prize at the International Ballet Competition. In 2011, Micov danced as a guest artist with Croatia Ballet in a co-production with the Madrid Ballet on an international

tour in South America. In 2012, he was invited by the legendary Gelsey Kirkland to join her company, where his performances were noticed by major publications, including *The New York Times*, *Huffington Post* and *Ballet*. In 2016, Micov joined Ballet San Antonio where he was promoted to Soloist. He then joined Milwaukee Ballet and received the national award, Menada, for Young Artist of the Year.

BFS- indie crime and fashion satire

Bozeman Film Society continues its latest season with a screening of indie drama, **Tuner**. The event will be held at Downtown Bozeman's Ellen Theatre on Friday, June 12th. The film begins at 7:30pm.

Academy Award-winning director Daniel Roher's first narrative feature stars Leo Woodall as a gifted young piano tuner whose heightened sense of hearing draws the attention of criminals, who see his talents as useful for opening safes as well as for tuning Steinways. With his once-promising musical career over, he works across New York with his mentor Harry Horowitz (Academy Award-winner Dustin Hoffman), encountering a range of characters, including composition student Ruthie (Havana Rose Liu), with whom he forges an unexpected connection. Niki's safecracking work threatens his budding romance with Ruthie and pulls him into increasingly dangerous territory. Rated R, the film runs 109 minutes.

Emerson features photo, versatile arrays

The Emerson Center for the Arts & Culture is pleased to host its newest shows featuring emerging artists from our community.

Montana photographer Christopher Campbell showcases **Caldera** in the Weaver Room gallery. A selection from a much larger series, he comes up with projects or series as he works, not the other way around. He discovers his intention through the photographs.

"My method is slow, but once moving through the land I work assuredly and intuitively, I find there is little equivocation over what to photograph. I question little when moved to expose a sheet of film. The questions come after," his artist statement reads. "I believe there are always far more questions than answers. The heavy lifting, after I

put a photograph out into the world, is up to the viewer. If I have done my job the weight should be manageable in its own way by anyone willing or able to take the time."

Montana-based artist Kirsten Kainz unveils **Mutual** in the Lobby, Galleria Hall and Jessie Wilber galleries. The new exhibition invites visitors into a vivid and thought-provoking exploration of our interconnected relationship with the natural world.

Kainz channels her enduring fascination with nature into a dynamic range of work, including bejeweled sculptural pieces, collage, and a striking "hall of heads" installation in the Lobby Gallery. In Galleria Hall, a powerful large-scale polar bear set within an arctic environment anchors the pop-up space,

offering a poignant reflection on fragility, adaptation, and survival in a changing world.

Using unexpected, everyday materials, Kainz creates sculptural creatures that invite viewers into a more personal and emotional connection with the living world. Her work suggests that we are inherently wired to respond to beauty and that losing sight of it can have profound consequences.

He is the founder and driving force behind Voice of the Wetlands, an organization working to preserve the coastal waters of his home state. In 2010, he received the Governor's Award for Conservationist of the Year from the Louisiana Wildlife Federation. Tab has also starred in the iMax motion picture *Hurricane on the Bayou*, a documentary narrated by Meryl Streep on Hurricane Katrina's effects, with a call to protect and restore the wetlands.

Inspired by his upbringing on an Oklahoma farm, Harris infused the work with the expansive spirit of the American West.

The season concludes with Tchaikovsky's exhilarating *1812 Overture*. Famous for its triumphant themes and dramatic intensity, the

work is often associated with outdoor performances featuring cannons and fireworks. Performed inside the Willson Auditorium, audiences will experience the full richness, clarity, and emotional power of this enduring audience favorite.

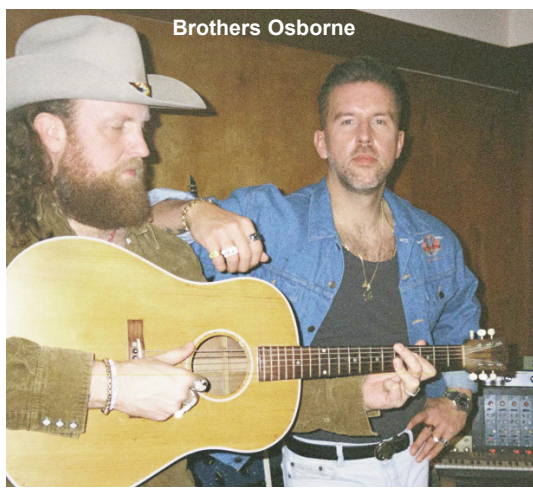

a festive atmosphere to Montana and the Northwest. The festival takes place at the venue known as The Bridge, an area near Three Forks comprised of 159 acres and is the final resting ground for the historic Sappington Bridge that once spanned the Jefferson River. Sixty acres are used for the state-certified campground, which holds 1,200 20x40 sites. Within the venue is a 12-acre arena where all the magic happens. Live music from national and local acts plays all day and into the night. Aside from the music, festival-goers can enjoy horseshoe tournaments, dance contests, mechanical bull riding, as well as food and merchandise vendors. •

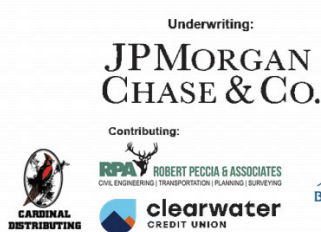

with opener Early James. For the past 30 years, the band has stood as one of rock's most dynamic and purposeful acts – a unit dedicated to



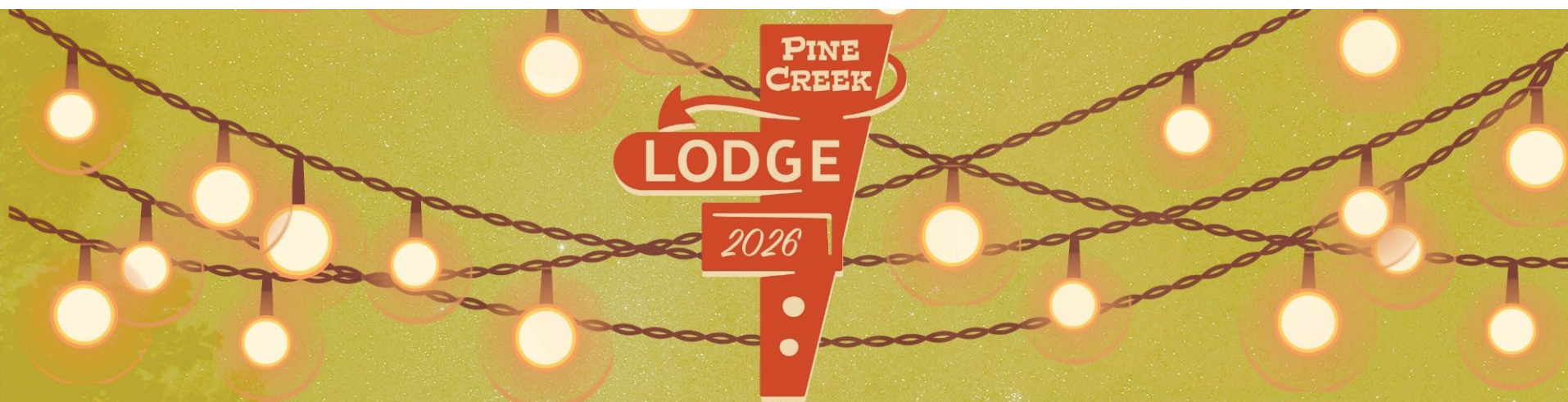
and continually honing a sound that meshes timeless songwriting and storytelling with a hard-hitting and decidedly modern musical attack. That signature style has been

Yellowstone's 'Top 10' for summer visits

This summer, visitors to **Yellowstone National Park** are being urged to plan ahead – both to stay safe and to help protect one of America's most iconic wild landscapes.

Across 2.2 million acres, Yellowstone offers unparalleled opportunities to observe wildlife in an intact ecosystem, explore geothermal wonders that include half the world's active geysers, and view geologic landmarks like the Grand Canyon of the Yellowstone River.

By following these top 10 things to know before you go, you can make the most of your visit while helping ensure that Yellowstone remains healthy, wild, and awe-inspiring for generations to come. – *Reservations are not required to enter Yellowstone*

Reservations are not required to enter the park – just a park entrance pass. Keep in mind that summer is busy, so pack your patience and be prepared for crowds at popular areas and lines at entrance stations, construction areas, and roadside wildlife sightings. – *Check the status of park roads*

Most park roads open to personal vehicles in mid-April and close in early November. Weather may cause temporary closures at any time, so check the status of park roads for more information, including potential traffic delays due to road improvement projects. – *Plan ahead*

All campgrounds and lodging require reservations and are often booked well in advance. Operating hours and service levels may change with little notice. Check the latest information before coming to the park. – *Give wildlife room*

Wild animals are dangerous if you get too close! It's your responsibility to respect safety regulations and view wildlife from a safe distance. Always maintain a minimum of 100 yards (91m) from bears, wolves, and cougars and 25 yards (23m) from all other animals, including bison and elk. All of

Yellowstone is bear country, so be sure to carry bear spray and know how to use it. Learn how to watch wildlife safely and travel safely in bear country.

– *Drive and park responsibly*
Observe posted speed limits and use pullouts to watch wildlife, take pictures, and let other cars pass. Do not stop your vehicle in the road. When pulling over, park with all four tires fully to the right of the white line.

– *Stay on boardwalks*
People have been severely injured or even killed after stepping off boardwalks in thermal areas, where the thin, fragile ground can suddenly give way, causing them to break through or fall directly into scalding hot springs. – *Enhance your experience*

Download the free National Park Service app (and offline content) before you arrive in the park for interactive maps, tours of park places, on-the-ground accessibility information, and more. – *Expect limited connectivity*

Don't be surprised if you can't receive calls or texts, even in the few areas where you might have cell reception. – *Prepare for weather changes*

Unpredictability characterizes Yellowstone's weather. Expect big temperature swings, rain, or snow during every month of the year. No matter when you visit, bring a warm jacket, rain gear, and lots of layers. Check current weather conditions before you arrive. – *Make the most of your trip*

Make it the trip of a lifetime by attending a ranger program, exploring the Yellowstone Tribal Heritage Center, or participating in the free Junior Ranger program.
